1. RECALL LIATION LOO NO. 51 for WMA ENDING 20 APRIL 1945.

a. Sunday 22 April. Conferred with Lt. Bittinger and Lt. White of NSB regarding withdrawal of 6th I.S. Regt. troops from guard duties at the Naval Base and substitution of the 2nd Battalion of the 5th I.S. Regiment. Lt. White stated that he preferred to keep the 6th Regiment because they had been on the detail for a long time. I explained to him that that was the main reason the Italian Military had designated the 5th Regiment for the job, that the 6th Regiment had not been doing any training and it was decided to take them off the job so they could do so. I explained to the officers that AFHQ had ordered the transfer of two Battalions to the 5th District, and the designation of the units had been left up to Territorial Headquarters Palermo. I further explained that the Military had desires to withdraw the 6th Regt. from the Navy since January, but because of the internal disturbances at that time it was never done.

Half day off.

b. Monday 23 April. Conferred with Lt. Col. Patti, Deputy Chief of Staff regarding exchange of the 2nd Bn., 5th I.S. Regt., for the 6th Regt. doing guard duty at U.S. Naval Operating Base. The 2nd Battalion is not up to authorized strength and I explained that the Navy is now using approximately 300 guards and are constantly creating new posts, therefore, it is imperative that the Battalion be brought up to strength immediately. It was decided to strengthen the Battalion from units in the 5th Regiment and to do so before the guard is changed. Officer strength of the Battalion is up to 70/82.

A report had reached me that Military Transport was being used to haul furniture, etc. for civilians. I took this up with Col. Patti and he explained that furniture and personal possessions were sometimes hauled in Military Transport, but that it was limited to property of Military personnel when changing station and then only if the transport was otherwise traveling empty and in the proper direction.

We also discussed a complaint made to me by the Communications Section of U.S. Naval Operating Base, that the Italian Military were placing many long distance telephone calls to Naples, Rome, Messina, Catania, and other parts of the island over their lines. It was requested that I see if the practice could not be discontinued or at least materially reduced. Col. Patti and I discussed the matter with Colonel Griglio, Chief of Staff, and it was decided that all such calls over Navy lines would be stopped, except in emergency and in such an event express authority of the Chief of Staff must be obtained before the call is placed. Otherwise, Italian lines would be used.

c. Tuesday 24 April. Conferred with Lt. Comdr. Murphy, Intelligence Officer of U.S. Naval Operating Base, concerning matter of general interest between our two offices.

a. Sunday 22 April. Conferred with Lt. Bittinger and Lt. White of NEEB regarding withdrawal of 6th I.S. Regt. troops from guard duties at the Naval Base and substitution of the 2nd Battalion of the 5th I.S. Regiment. Lt. White stated that he preferred to keep the 6th Regiment because they had been on the detail for a long time. I explained to him that that was the main reason the Italian Military had designated the 5th Regiment for the job, that the 6th Regiment had not been doing any training and it was decided to take them off the job so they could do so. I explained to the officers that AFHQ had ordered the transfer of two Battalions to HQ. Three District, and the designation of the units had been left up to Territorial Headquarters Palermo. I further explained that the Military had decided to withdraw the 6th Regt. from the Navy since January, but because of the internal disturbances at that time it was never done.

Half day off.

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A report had reached me that Military Transport was being used to haul furniture, etc. for civilians. I took this up with Col. Patti and he explained that furniture and personal possessions were sometimes hauled in Military Transport, but that it was limited to property of Military personnel when changing station and then only if the transport was otherwise traveling empty and in the proper direction.

We also discussed a complaint made to me by the Communications Section of U.S. Naval Operating Base, that the Italian Military were planning many long distance telephone calls to Naples, Rome, Messina, Catania, and other parts of the island over their lines. It was requested that I see if the practice could not be discontinued or at least materially reduced. Col. Patti and I discussed the matter with Colonel Origgio, Chief of Staff, and it was decided that all such calls over Navy lines would be stopped, except in emergency and in such an event express authority of the Chief of Staff must be obtained before the call is placed. Otherwise, Italian lines would be used.

c. Tuesday 24 April. Conferred with Lt. Comdr. Murphy, Intelligence Officer of U.S. Naval Operating Base, concerning matter of general interest between our two offices.

Conferred with Lt. Comdr. Winbey, Communications Officer of U.S. Naval Operating Base regarding our signals. Commander Winbey explained that our signals were not creating the load that he had anticipated they would when he first agreed to handle our traffic, but that our weekly stock state was creating a problem due to their great length. He asked if the signals could not just as well be sent by Aero-grams through Navy channels and 24 hours service was assured. I explained to him the importance of the stock states going straight signals. He finally agreed that whenever the load on his communications became too heavy to handle the lengthy stock state, it could be sent Aero-gram and I would be immediately notified that such action was taken.

c. (continued) Therefore in the future weekly stock states from Sicily may be slightly delayed.

Lt. Snider traveled to Galtanarotta today with a representative of the Commissariato where they inspected the Food Distribution Depot, (See SAT Report No. 42), then proceeded on to Catania in the afternoon.

d. Wednesday 25 April. Conferred with Lt. Col. Appicciatelli, Asst. Director Commissariato regarding food stuffs and issues thereof in general. We then visited the Food Distribution Depot in Palermo and inspected the entire stock. No foodstuffs of Italian origin were found along with like or similar Allied items. Orders were requested that all Italian items would be issued before like or similar items of Allied origin. A physical check of the stock with the records showed that all foodstuffs in the depot had been taken on charge. The depot was found to be clean, neat and well policed. We then visited the San Antonio Bakery, which we found neat, clean and orderly.

Talked with Major Corbelli, O.O. British Troops, Sicily, and explained to him a message he received from T.E.P. requesting that new guard companies on the eastern end of the island be installed in their jobs as early as possible. The Major stated that he would do so.

Lt. Snider inspected both the Bulk and Distribution Food Depots in Catania today in company of a representative of the Commissariato. (See SAT Report No. 42)

e. Thursday 26 April. The 2nd, 3rd, 4th, 5th Regiment was placed on guard duties today at U.S. 808 and the 6th Regiment withdrawn.

Conferred with Lt. Col. Morton, Liaison Officer Allied Commission Sicily concerning turnover of salvages now at Tuckery Salvage Installation. At the present all the material is in bulk and has to be packed and crated. Lt. Col. Morton has a number of civilian employees which he is using to expedite the packing of the material. It is expected that the work will be completed and handover made by Monday.

Office routine.

f. Friday 27 April. Since Alcorn has left Sicily application for acetaline and oxygen used in repairing of motor transportation must be made direct to U.S. Naval Operating Base. I conferred with Lt. (jg) Lindsay, GSK Supply Officer concerning our requirements and procedure to be followed to obtain same. Lt. Lindsay pointed out that the supply of oxygen was practically unlimited but acetaline was considered more or less a critical item.

I visited the Tuckery Salvage center along with Major Blivier of the Commissariato and inspected the work being carried out in packing and crating the material being made ready for Alcorn.

Office routine.

g. Saturday 28 April. Lt. Snider inspected the Headquarters Company of Territorial Headquarters and the San Antonio Military Depot.

Conferred with Lt. Col. Morton, Liaison Officer Allied Commission Sixty concerning turnover of salvage now at Tuxary Salvage Installation. At the present all the material is in bulk and has to be packed and crated. Lt. Col. Morton has a number of civilian employees which he is using to expedite the packing of the material. It is expected that the work will be completed and handover made by Monday.

Office routine.

f. Friday 27 April. Since Alcon has left Baily application for acetylene and oxygen used in repairing of water transportation must be made direct to U.S. Naval Operating Base. I conferred with Lt. (ag) Lindsey, USN Supply Officer concerning our requirements and procedures to be followed to obtain same. Lt. Lindsey pointed out that the supply of oxygen was practically unlimited but acetylene was considered **6861** scarce or less a critical item.

I visited the Tukory Salvage center along with Major Oliver of the Commissariato and inspected the work being carried out in packing and crating the material being made ready for Alcon.

Offices routine.

2. Saturday 23 April. Lt. Swider inspected the Headquarters Company of Territorial Headquarters and the San Antonio Military Bakery.
(See SAC Report No. 62)

I conferred with General Suardi and Lt. Col. Patti at Territorial Headquarters reference matters of general interest. The General is much concerned about losing the Montegrano Alpini Battalion. He points out that the homes of these troops are in Northern Italy and inasmuch as they are mainly of the older classes and their homes are being freed they will for the most part demand their release from the Army.

g. (continued) ... he further explained that 2,700 U.C.M.B. are being withdrawn from Sicily. In view of the scheduled landing from the brigades moving the island it is much concerned that the island will be left with an insufficient number of police to cope with them. A conference is planned for Monday evening between General Severini, The High Commissioner of Sicily and the General Commanding the U.C.M.B. in Sicily to discuss internal security and the withdrawal of the Brigades. General Severini asked me to attend and I told him I would gladly do so.

We also discussed the Call-Up. The General stated that 17,000 men had, as of the 27th., been sent to Reggio, but I explained that my figures, as of the 27th., showed only 16,300 as having been accepted. Col. Marcelino U.C. statistics was called in and it was learned that he had based his figures on reports coming from the Straits to Reggio which meant that he was counting men twice. The General told Col. Marcelino to get his figures straight with me and render to his superior report.

I also discussed with the General Headquarters letter 22/51/1 dated the 25 April, subject supply of personnel for AIC, ICE Ocean. A signal had just been received by the General from the War Ministry ordering the acceptance of 1000 Volunteers in this category. Five hundred during the period 14 - 20 May and five hundred during the period 21 - 27 May. The General stated that the Volunteers are available and we will meet with no difficulty in obtaining the 1000 men.

We also discussed the gun trolly tractor/move in the possession of the 10th. and 20th. Div. These tractors are not mentioned in the new 2/2 for motor transport. The guns and caissons are still not used. The General desires that the tractors be retained in the Units as they are not of considerable use and eventually they may be used again for towing the guns. My 22/1 dated 10 April, refers.

A. GENERAL SECURITY.

1. Morale. The morale of the Italian troops remains good.

2. Fascist, Pro-German, Anti-Allied Activities or Trends.
Colonel Micalotti, Chief of Intelligence, Territorial Headquarters Palermo, is under surveillance by local Allied Intelligence officers. It has been reported to me that this officer has been observed in the company of persons whose viewpoints and activities are somewhat questionable. No definite Fascist, Pro-German, Anti-Allied activities or trends can be proven as yet against Colonel Micalotti. And for that reason the above information is passed on to your office for whatever information it may be worth to you. I have met Colonel Micalotti on occasions and although I haven't noticed anything pointing to an Anti-Allied trend, he is not generally liked for reasons by his fellow officers.

3. Illegal Storage of Arms and Ammunition.

a. Nothing to report from the Army.

b. The belief that arms and ammunition were being smuggled into Sicily from the Island of Pantelleria has been discredited and that no arms have been taken from the Island.

a. From my own observations - good.

b. Captain Mooney, O-3 22d Sub Area, called at the office and showed me a report of the incident in Catania when an Italian soldier threw a hand grenade at a British C.M.V. and injured him. It seems that about 2300 hours, 1st April 45, two British and two Italian Military Police while patrolling a street in Catania approached two Italian soldiers who appeared to be drunk. The report shows that the soldiers were sitting on a safety island in the street and when the MPs checked their papers they found a

It seems that about 20 British G.M.V.s, two British and two Italian Military Police were patrolling a street in Catania approached the Italian soldiers who appeared to be armed. The report stated that the soldiers were sitting on a motor vehicle in the street and when the G.M.V.s entered their position they found a knife on one of them which was confidentially. One of the soldiers drew a hand grenade from his pocket and threatened to throw it at the soldier who was sitting in his G.M.V. The soldier and the soldier who was sitting in the G.M.V. subsequently shot the two soldiers and one of them (an MP) subsequently fired several shots at them. 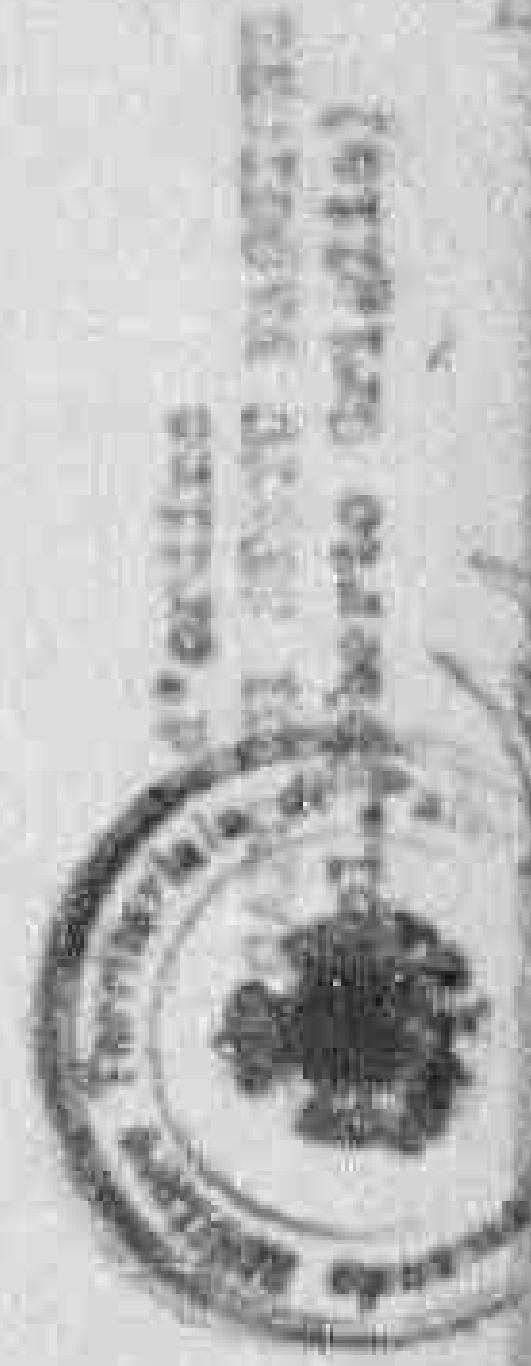
