1. Reference is made to this Unit's AG/6/1009 of 18 July 45 and enclosure.
2. The proposals discussed in this and previous memoranda were considered by the Director and were agreed in principle and, to a very great extent, in detail.
3. The following modifications, based on a more complete knowledge of the facts and requirements, were laid down by the Director:
 - (a) A conference was unnecessary as the Director himself, in consultation with his staff, was prepared, and in fact has given, a definite answer to all the questions raised.
 - (b) Pioneers are unskilled labour; they require only basic training for a period of six weeks, at the expiration of which they are available for posting where they are required and where they will receive such advanced training as is necessary. Hence there is no need for an Advanced Training Pioneer Battalion.
 - (c) The period of basic training is agreed at six weeks for all arms and the rates suggested in AG/6/776, Appendix 'A', are accepted, with the exception that Advanced Training of S. O. V. personnel will be increased to twelve weeks after the period of advanced training at GHAHR, reinforcements to Combat Groups will receive further advanced (collective) training with the Group.
 - (d) No leave will be granted throughout the period of training at GHAHR.
 - (e) Recruits will be drafted to the arm of the service in which they will serve immediately on joining the Centre. In view of D.M.S.'s emphasis on effective movement, the M.I. & T.S. will originate a surveying system to ensure that recruits enter the arm of the service for which they are best suited.
 - (f) The proposed layout of battalions to locations will be altered to enable all basic training to be conducted at GHAHR and not at GHAHR or GHAHR or GHAHR.

For Administrative Requirements for other arms (Advanced Training Battalions)

1. Reference is made to this Unit's AG/6/1909 of 18 July 65 and enclosed.

2. The proposals discussed in this and previous memoranda were considered by the Director and were agreed in principle and, to a very great extent, in detail.

3. The following modifications, based on a more complete knowledge of the facts and requirements, were laid down by the Director:

- (a) A conference was unnecessary as the Director himself, in consultation with his staff, was prepared, and in fact has given, a definite answer to all the queries raised.
- (b) Ministry are unskilled labour; they require only basic training for a period of six weeks, at the expiration of which they are available for posting where they are required and where they will receive such advanced training as is necessary. Hence there is no need for an advanced training Pioneer Battalion.
- (c) The period of basic training is agreed at six weeks for all arms and the ratios suggested in AG/6/1976, Appendix 'A', are accepted, with the exception that advanced training of S. & F. personnel will be increased to twelve weeks. After the period of advanced training at GSEAF, reinforcements to Combat Groups will receive further advanced (collective) training with the Group.
- (d) No leave will be granted throughout the period of training at GSEAF.
- (e) Recruits will be drafted to the arm of the Service in which they will serve immediately on joining the Centre. In view of D.M.F.'s emphasis on effective screening, the D.L. & F.U. will organise a screening system to ensure that recruits enter the arm of the Service for which they are best suited.
- (f) The proposed layout of Regiments to locations will be altered to enable all basic training to be carried out at GSEAF and Advanced Training at DIVISIONAL HEADQUARTERS or BRANCH.
- (g) No Regimental Headquarters for other than advanced Training Battalions (themselves so organized as to be miniature Regimental H.Q.'s with full (battalions in command), is required and hence this will be dispensed with.
- (h) The allotment of recruits to the artillery arm is considered adequate.
- (i) 'A' Branch, M.M.I.A. will evolve a system whereby only sufficient reinforcements required to meet the demand at the end of the full, agreed training period will be posted to GSEAF. This will eliminate the necessity for a Reception Regiment or a Reinforcement Holding Regiment to contain personnel surplus to the authorized establishment. If the system works smoothly there will be none.
- (j) Railway and Dock Engineers will receive advanced training at HMAS/130, identical with, and for the same period as, that given to normal Apprentices.
- (k) Only the lower grades of existing personnel will be trained and hence the period allotted (twelve weeks) is considered to be adequate. Vehicle Mechanics are the highest grade M.E. tradesmen to be aimed at. Fitters Gun and Armourers Courses, as at present constituted, are adequate.

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- (a) The Director's reasons for introducing these changes are given in Part IV of H.M.I.A. 'C' Enclosing Letter.
- (a) As advanced trainings of Infantry will take place at CIVITAVARELLA, it is necessary to move the Infantry School for the Infantry Specialist School (together with the I.F. School), to CIVITAVARELLA and for this purpose the barracks formerly occupied by the American G.I. Company will be requisitioned and the schools transferred to them. The buildings formerly utilized by these Schools can be usefully employed for providing new intake or for basic training classrooms.
4. As a result of these instructions, some comparatively minor modifications are essential to the data given in Appendix 'B' of 20/4/76 and to the layout suggested in Appendix 'C' and 'D' of the same memorandum.
5. These modifications are :-
- (a) Pilots require no advanced training. Hence, all Pilots must be included in one or other of the two Basic Training Regiments. This affords an opportunity of equalizing their strength and utilizing a common War Establishment for both Regiments. There are 1,500 Pilots to be considered. The training in both Basic Regiments is identical and therefore 225 can be accommodated in 20.1 Infantry Basic Training Regiment and 1,275 in 16.5 Other Arms Basic Training Regiment.
- (b) The increase in the period of advanced training for E. & S. personnel from 6 to 12 weeks alters the ratio from 1 : 1 to 1 : 2. Hence, out of the total of 450, 150 will be undergoing basic training while 300 will be doing advanced training.
- (c) Mailly and Loch operations were previously regarded as occupying out their advanced training elements then in CHASSE. It is now agreed that they shall receive normal advanced Sapper training. The ratio of basic to advanced is 1 : 2 and the total 300, so that 100 will be in the Basic Other Arms Regiment and 200 in the Advanced Other Arms Regt.
6. Hence it is possible to re-write Appendix 'B', incorporating these revisions. This revised appendix is given at Appendix 'A' to this letter. It will be noted that provision has still been made for 1,200 students from the Army to be accommodated in Advanced Training Regiments at CIVITAVARELLA and SUSSALDO. (300 Pioneer Sapper students formerly included are now omitted). It seems unnecessary to revise the survey as the data given is self-evident.
7. It is thus possible to amend Appendix 'C' of 20/4/76 and this amendment is given at Appendix 'D' to this letter.
8. The final set up of the whole Centre is shown in the diagram at Appendix 'E'.

- 5. These modifications are :-
 - (a) Platoon requires no advanced training. Hence, all Platoons must be included in one or other of the two Basic Training Regiments. This offers an opportunity of equalizing their strength and utilizing a common War Establishment for both regiments. There are 1,900 Platooners to be considered. The training in both Basic Regiments is identical and therefore 200 can be accommodated in No. 1 Infantry Basic Training Regiment and 1,700 in No. 2 Other Arms Basic Training Regiment.
 - (b) The increase in the period of Advanced Training for S. & T. personnel from 6 to 12 weeks alters the ratio from 1 : 1 to 1 : 2. Hence, out of the total of 450, 150 will be undergoing basic training while 300 will be doing advanced training.
 - (c) Infantry and Cook Operators are previously regarded as carrying out their advanced training elsewhere than in OMBs. It is now agreed that they shall receive normal advanced Sapper training. The ratio of basic to advanced is 1 : 2 and the total 300, so that 100 will be in the Basic Other Arms Regiment and 200 in the Advanced Other Arms Unit.
- 6. Hence it is possible to re-write Appendix 'B', incorporating these revisions. This revised appendix is given at Appendix 'A' to this letter. It will be noted that provision has still been made for 1,000 students from the United Kingdom to be accommodated in Advanced Training Regiments at CEFVIA/AFVIA and INVALIA. (300 Platooners engaged students formerly included are now omitted). It seems unnecessary to revise the annex as the data given is self-evident.
- 7. It is then possible to amend Appendix 'C' of 10/6/76 and this amendment is given at Appendix 'B' to this letter.
- 8. The final set up of the whole Centre is shown in the Diagram at Appendix 'C'.

The utmost speed is essential, but clarity and accuracy must NOT be sacrificed. The final War Establishments recommended, though preliminary, are necessary to ensure that all factors discussed in previous Memoranda will be taken into account.

On conclusion of these tasks the Committee will review the whole question of the 21st Brigade, in the light of a possible move to NORTH AFRICA, where final confirmation has been found.

In view of the division of the duties of the British Liaison & Planning Staff, a review of the War Establishments to meet the new locations and the responsibilities involved may be required. The Committee will submit their recommendations in due course.

CO-ORDINATION OF TRAINING FACILITIES WITH AVAILABLE ACCOMMODATION.

Dealing first with Basic Training we have a total of 4,175 (say 4,200) recruits to be trained.

Facilities exist at OSANG to accommodate this number and for convenience they should be divided into two equal regiments.

The buildings occupied by the present No.2 Regiment (the Osang) will accommodate the new No.1 Infantry Basic Training Regiment, with an actual, maximum strength (including their proportion of Officers) of 2,100.

The buildings occupied by the present No.1 Regiment will just accommodate the new No.3 Other Arms Basic Training Regiment with an actual, maximum strength of 2,100 (including their proportion of Officers).

This deals with all Basic Training.

The new No.2 Advanced Infantry Training Regiment, with a strength of 2,625, can be accommodated at the AMULLA BARRACKS, CIVILAVARILLA, although some proportion of this Regiment will be attached to the Infantry School and Infantry Specialisation School in the S.S. Barracks at CIVILAVARILLA. Hence, there is ample accommodation for the whole of this Regiment.

There remains the Advanced Training of Other Arms. The total to be trained, including of vacancies for 1,200 students was 4,375 - 2,625 = 1,750. There will be no Regimental Headquarters and the following table gives their locations.

The new No. 2 Advanced Infantry Training Regiment, with a strength of 2,625, can be accommodated at the ALEXANDRIA Barracks, CIVILIANVILLE, although some proportion of this Regiment will be attached to the Infantry School and Infantry Specialists School in the G.P. Barracks at CIVILIANVILLE. Hence, there is ample accommodation for the whole of this Regiment.





1. As a result of the I.T.C. Training Meeting held at H.M.I.L., Rome, on 10 July 1945, and with reference to the Minutes of this meeting, the British Liaison & Training Unit prepared a Memorandum (A.C./6/976 of 11 July 45 (enclosure No.1)), setting out a scheme for the re-organization of the R.T.C., I.C.P., in accordance with the decisions taken at that meeting.

2. Reference paragraph 5 of the Minutes, it is not deemed practical to commence the preparation of War Rehabilitation until the proposals contained in the Memorandum (or such alternative proposals as may be accepted) are agreed by Higher Authority. Pending this approval, no steps are being taken to prepare H.S.

3. The subject of this report, referred to in paragraphs 16 and 17, is dealt with in a separate letter under reference M/17/1008 of 17 July 45 (not enclosed).

4. Reference is also made to this office letter - subject "Reinforcements of R.T.C., I.C.P." under reference M/2/1006 of 17 July, copy of which is attached (enclosure No.2). From this it would appear that plans for the training of recruits or intake into certain units are being prepared until the end of September. Hence, the active urgency of preparing a plan for re-organization no longer exists and every possible consideration can be given to all aspects of the problem.

5. In order to obtain the views of as many interested persons as possible, the Memorandum referred to in paragraph 1 (M/6/976) was discussed with a number of officers, who are in a position to contribute valuable advice and suggestions.

These discussions showed a general agreement with the proposal in principle, but introduced a number of queries and modifications which are considered to be most helpful and constructive.

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1. As a result of the No. III Training Meeting held at M.M.I.A., Base, on 10 July 1945, and with reference to the Minutes of this meeting, by British Liaison & Training Unit prepared at Mesuruban (A.G./6/976 of 11 July 45 (enclosure No. 1.)), setting out a scheme for the re-organization of the R.F.C., I.C.P., in accordance with the decisions taken at that meeting.

2. Reference paragraph 5 of the Minutes, it is not deemed practical to commence the preparation of the establishments until the proposals contained in the Mesuruban (or such alternative proposals as may be accepted) are agreed by Higher Authority. Pending this approval, no steps are being taken to prepare W.E.

3. The subject of transport, referred to in paragraphs 16 and 17, is dealt with in a separate letter under reference A/17/1008 of 17 July 45 (not enclosed).

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4. Reference is also made to this office letter - subject "Reinforcements at M.M.C., I.C.P." under reference A/2/1006 of 17 July, copy of which is attached (Enclosure No. 2). From this it would appear that plans for the training of recruits or intake into CMBAN need take no cognizance of the period until the end of September. Hence, the serious urgency of preparing a plan for re-organization no longer exists and every possible consideration can be given to all aspects of the problem.

5. In order to obtain the views of as many interested persons as possible, the Mesuruban referred to in paragraph 1 (A.G./6/976) was discussed with a number of officers, who are in a position to contribute valuable advice and suggestions.

These discussions showed a general agreement with the proposal in principle, but introduced a number of queries and modifications which are considered to be most helpful and constructive.

6. Enclosure No. 3 - "Addenda to Mesuruban A.G./6/976" gives the main headings of the points raised during these discussions.

7. It is therefore suggested that a further meeting should be held to discuss the Mesuruban itself and the suggested modifications. To simplify the proceedings, the Agenda has been prepared in the form of a number of specific questions, to which (where it is a question of policy) Higher Authority will no doubt supply the answer prior to the meeting, and where it is a case of practical preference, the views of those present at the meeting may be taken, thus enabling the Chairman to give a decision. The proposed Agenda is attached, as Enclosure No. 4.

8. It is presumed that M.M.I.A., in conjunction with A.M.F., will arrange the time and place of this meeting and issue instructions as to who will attend.

- PARA. 10. 1. Suggested that the pool of recruits surplus to War Establishment could be co-ordinated with the existing facilities at CEVIGNO. How long will these facilities remain available?
- PARA. 11. 2. Would VIMERO Barracks be a suitable place for the reinforcement holding centre, if such is deemed desirable or essential?
- 3. It has been urged that six weeks basic training is inadequate and that eight weeks would be preferable. This would enable the advanced training period to be increased proportionately, i.e. Infantry from six to eight weeks -- Sergeants from twelve to sixteen -- but see next paragraph :-

4. Periods of Advanced Training.

It is suggested that British Training Officers of the various Arms be present at the Meeting, to express their views on the period of advanced training indicated in the Memorandum. These are :-

Similarly, Staff Officers with experience of working with Italians should be prepared to express their opinion on the time required for the further training of the various Services. This applies particularly to the immovable trades included in S.O.F. Can drivers be trained from "scratch" and if so, what period is required?

R.S.M.S. should be asked to express their views on the training of Workshop personnel from "scratch". It was emphasised that whereas the machinery for training the fighting arms has been proved, that for the training of Services is still in a relatively elementary stage. A Committee of Service heads might well express an opinion.

- 5. The solution of accommodation and location problems is merely ^(initial) arithmetic once the decisions asked for in (3) and (4) above have been taken. (This will be done by 'P' B.L. & F.H.)
- 6. Consideration must be given to whether Specialist Training can be carried out in Craggi. Although this has been accepted in British Divisions, it is not thought that Craggi are yet qualified to do this. It would be difficult to maintain a standard doctrine.
- 7. It is presumed that no leave will be granted during the training period at CEVIGNO.

4. Periods of Advanced Training.

6. Consideration must be given to whether Specialist Training can be carried out in Gruppo. Although this has been accepted in British Divisions, it is not thought that Gruppo are yet qualified to do this. It would be difficult to maintain a standard doctrine.

7. It is presumed that no leave will be granted during the training period at CEMANO.

8. Italian custom lays down that a recruit shall be allocated to a specific Arm from his first day of service. In this essential or desirable? If all basic training was in one place it would be a simplification. This can probably be arranged if required.

Documentation and initial equipment is more easily carried out at CEMANO than elsewhere.

Hence it is suggested that the location of Nos. 2 and 3 Regiments be changed over and the Pioneer Battalion moved to CEMANO.

9. The provision of a Regimental H.Q. for No.4 'Other Arms Regiment' is generally considered unnecessary.

10. Pioneers.

There is considerable doubt about what this category really means. It is pointed out that they require no advanced training whatsoever - certainly not under Sapper Guidance. Hence, the provision of a Pioneer Advanced Training Battalion may be considered unnecessary. May a fuller

definition of their status and duties be provided?

11. Does the I.M.I.A. regulations allow for enough Artillerymen -- it seems to be on the small side, but facilities exist for increase if found desirable?

12. It has been suggested that instead of recruits, C.S. Infantry, transferring from No. 1 Base including Regiment to No. 2 Advanced Training Regiment at the expiration of six (or eight) weeks, it would be preferable if a recruit stayed in one Regiment with his own Officers and N.C.O. Instructions for the whole period of twelve (or thirteen) weeks. This would easily be arranged and more closely conform to British practice.

1. A Meeting was held at H.Q., M.M.I.A. on 12 June 1945 to consider the problems caused by the termination of hostilities in connection with the re-organisation of the Italian Army.
2. The Chairman, Lieut-Col. S. Eggleston, gave as much information as was available, and it was finally decided that a specific proposal should be prepared to form a basis of discussion at a further meeting.
3. A draft proposal was prepared by Col. Mackay and the broad outlines discussed with Lieut-Col. Poddie of D.M.T., while a series of conferences were held at CEMANO to review all aspects of the problem. As a result of these conversations, the following memorandum was prepared and is submitted as a basis of discussion.
It is understood that G.3 CWD. A.P.H.Q. are preparing a memorandum on the same subject but it is considered that in view of the urgent necessity of ending the present uncertainty at CEMANO, it is better to submit this proposal without delay, so that, if desired, it may be considered at the same time as that coming from A.P.H.Q.
4. It is appreciated that any scheme of re-organisation must be divided into two phases. The first phase will cover the period during which the Italian forces of all types, both combat and service troops, will be utilised by the S.A.C. to assist in the re-organisation of Italy and in the control of enemy P.O.W. and Concentration Camps. This phase may last for as long as twelve months. The second phase covers the period when the Italian Army will gradually be developed into an independent National entity, free of Allied control, but assisted by Allied personnel, if such is the wish of the Italian Government.
5. The object of the present proposal is to evolve a scheme which will meet the requirements of the S.A.C. in all respects at present, but which can be merged into the second phase with the minimum of alteration or adjustment.
6. The ultimate object is to convert CEMANO and the associated military establishments at BRACCIANO, MARLIANA, VITERBO and CIVITAVECCHIA into an Italian "Allied" base. 4264
7. Such being the case, it would appear that CEMANO district (the term is intended to include all the associated establishments referred to above), should be designed to have a dual function:
 - (a) The first of these functions is to provide a training centre corresponding to the British Army Depot, where recruits may be received, equipped and given the main essentials of elementary military training, regardless of the Arm of the Service to which they will ultimately belong.

To conform, however, to accepted Italian procedure, such recruits cannot be lumped together for this initial training, but the principle of separation of the various arms must be introduced from the first day of their service. This introduces certain complications, but as the nature of this elementary training is, nevertheless, identical, there is no insuperable difficulty.

- (b) The second function is to provide schools and specialised training establishments where refresher and advanced courses in all Arms of the Service may be provided. Pupils for these courses will be derived not from recruits, but from trained personnel of the Group or Service Divisions, who are in need of advanced training or refresher courses. Hence, the pupils of these Schools will not be included on the strength of R.T.C., but will merely be attached over Establishment for the duration of the respective Courses.
- (c) Facilities for both these functions already exist in CEMANO and District and the question resolves itself into ascertaining how best to make use of the existing facilities and, if necessary, to extend them in order to obtain the best possible results.

8. The cessation of hostilities has entirely altered the function of CEMANO. Hitherto its work was confined to the training (as far as circumstances permitted) of recruits, to enable them to take their place in the line with the combat Groups in the shortest possible time. In view of the demand for reinforcements, many recruits were sent forward inadequately trained, and it was necessary for them to complete their training in actual service with the Groups. This was unsatisfactory but had to be accepted.

The position is now entirely changed. In the first place, the former differentiation between Combat and Service troops is to be virtually abolished. CEMANO will henceforward be the reinforcement Centre for the whole Italian Army, whatever the nature of the duties that may be assigned to it.

Secondly, the nature of the required training is altered. The intensive field training which was essential for a soldier who was intended to form part of a fighting division is now of infinitely less importance. What is now required is to produce a soldier who is well disciplined, capable of handling his personal weapons and with sufficient military background to enable him to execute the duties for which he is required.

9. Definite figures of the strength of the future Italian Army are not yet available but the existing Army (Combat and Service) is of the order of 160,500. It is believed that this figure will for the time being remain unchanged, but the breakdown will vary. The following breakdown has been proposed.

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It is not considered necessary to discuss a further breakdown between Service units and Combat Groups, as the nature of the initial training for all branches of the Italian Army should be identical.

The problem appears to define itself. Cosano and District must :

- (a) provide facilities for the initial training of 7,500 recruits of all arms, and
- (b) provide the equivalent of the C.M.T.C.

10. Although it is unnecessary to differentiate between Combat and Service troops it is necessary to assume an arbitrary breakdown of these 7,500 recruits into the Arms of the Service for which they are destined. For simplicity and only in so far as it relates to elementary training, I have included those intended for Service units under the heading of Infantry. The arbitrary breakdown on which all calculations have been based is as follows, although it is realised that this may be subject to drastic modification.

11. The next factor to be considered is that of accommodation. Proper accommodation is essential for the well-being and efficiency of every soldier. Whereas during hostilities a relatively low standard of accommodation had necessarily to be accepted, in the post-hostilities and peace period, the personnel of the Italian Army are entitled to proper accommodation in permanent buildings, with adequate amenities and sufficient space for recreation, etc. It is probable that the tentage at present on loan to the R.T.C. will be called in very shortly and so allowance must be made for the accommodation of all those at present under canvas. A revision of the war-time estimate of the capacity of the buildings occupied by the R.T.C. must therefore be made.

Although work is proceeding on the repair of all buildings, an immense amount still remains to be done and hence any estimate of accommodation must visualise not less than 33 1/3% of the total accommodation being unsuitable for habitation for a considerable time to come, due to the presence of civilian workmen engaged on repairs.

There appears to be no necessity to introduce these revised standards immediately. They should be regarded as a goal towards which all efforts should be directed, although in the meantime some measure of overcrowding and inconvenience must be accepted.

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12. The following estimates of available accommodation are therefore based on peace-time standards and allowance has been included for the non-availability of at least one-third of the total living space. In these figures the main number relates to accommodation for recruits, while the figure in brackets is an allowance for the subsidiary accommodation required for personnel of the Garrison Battalion to which reference is made in a later paragraph. No reference has been made to the accommodation required for the personnel of the R.T.C. Headquarters, or for the permanent training and administrative staff as it is considered that the accommodation at present occupied will prove to be adequate for the reduced establishment required for the smaller ceiling now envisaged.

*The accommodation at BRACCIANO and MANZIANA will not be occupied by recruits and similarly out of the available space for 4,300 at CERANO, space will be required for 1,300 Students not included in the recruits ceiling.

The whole subject of advanced training for students other than recruits is dealt with in a later paragraph.

13. The next problem to be considered is the time factor. What is the minimum period required to train a raw recruit to such a state of military efficiency that he is able either :-

- (a) to fulfil the requirements of guard or garrison duties,
- (b) to have sufficient military background to assimilate the specialised military training of his particular Arm (provided he is destined for the Combat force).

Considerable discussion has taken place on this matter and the consensus of opinion appears to place the minimum time required at eight weeks. At the end of this period, it should be possible to assess the recruit's capabilities and to devise some form of category of his probable military aptitude.

14. If this period of eight weeks basic training is accepted and the ceiling figure of 7,500 at CERANO is confirmed, it will be seen that the essential period of minimum service (assuming a conscript army) can be readily calculated. Current output will be 7,500 every two months; (actually it would be preferable to send forward 3,750 every month).

The proposed BR-FPI ceiling is 143,000, so that to maintain this ceiling permanently at full strength, the soldier will be required to serve for a minimum period of :-

$$\frac{143,000 \times 2}{7,500} \text{ months}$$

= 38 months, or say, three years.

143,000 include permanent staff which approx 50% = 18 months

This period may be considered to be excessive. One solution would be to increase the ceiling at Cesano or to reduce the period of training. Neither would be entirely satisfactory, but it should be borne in mind there is another factor which materially affects the issue. Provided the terms of engagement were made sufficiently attractive, a large number of officers and soldiers would be prepared to sign on for long term permanent engagements. If the number so doing were to approach one-third of the total strength of the Army, the period of conscript service for the remainder would automatically be reduced to two years, which may well be considered acceptable.

In the meantime all calculations are based on a ceiling of 7,500 at CESANO and an arbitrary breakdown as indicated in paragraph 10.

15. It is now possible to consider in greater detail how best to utilize the available accommodation to meet the training requirements of 7,500 recruits and to provide advanced training for the maximum number of students from the Gruppo.

In the Chart given at Appendix 'A' a practical solution of this problem is indicated.

Analysis of this chart shows the actual location of all recruits and also the amount of space available for students, from the Combat Groups, not included in the Recruits ceiling. This analysis is given at Appendix 'B'.

It will be seen that 7,500 recruits are accommodated at CESANO, VITEBSO and CIVITAVECCHIA and instructional and accommodation facilities are provided for 3,000 students at CESANO, BRACCIANO and MONZIANA.

It is submitted that this solution fully meets the requirements of the Centre, as set out in paragraph 7, sub-para (a) and (b).

16. No mention has yet been made of one essential requisite, which, in the writer's opinion is of the most vital importance. Training, to be effective, must be continuous and uninterrupted. One of the gravest handicaps of the present system has been the constant demand for guards, fatigues and other duty men, which has reached such a pitch that between 25% and 35% of the men who should be under training are employed for this purpose. This reduces the effectiveness of training by a much higher percentage and should be avoided at all costs. The writer suggests that the Cesano District should have a permanent Garrison Battalion of at least 1,200 who will be attached to the Centre and will carry out all fatigues and duties. This unit will not be on the establishment of the R.T.C., I.C.G. but will be attached to it in the same way as a Battalion of the Cheshire is attached to R.A.A.C. for similar duties. The importance of this provision cannot be over-emphasized and hence in the accommodation schedule provision for their accommodation has been included in the figures shown in brackets.

17. In the analysis it has been shown that accommodation has been allowed for a total of 3,000 students for advanced courses and refresher training.

The present training plan has been devised to provide two forms of advanced training.

The first, which is typified at the SIVA Schools, is to provide a standard of instruction which will enable successful students to qualify as Unit instructors. The second, which is included in the Engineers, Signallers and Artillery courses at BRACCIANO and in the Infantry Arms courses at CESANO, aims at providing a standard of instruction which will enable the successful student to pass the various P.O.E.T.'s of his particular Arm.

The object of these courses is to train the individual soldier to be proficient in his own arm and it is not intended that any attempt should be made to produce instructors. Hence there is no suggestion of duplication with the same subjects which are taught at SIVA Schools with a different object. None the less, any outstandingly promising pupil may well be earmarked as a unit instructor if this is considered advisable.

Primary object. To meet the requirements of Gruppi and Divisions for this class of Specialist. It is of the utmost importance that students should be carefully screened as it is obviously impossible in a conscript army to train completely ignorant men to the necessary standard of proficiency. All students must have the essential basic knowledge derived from their civil occupation, and where possible preference should be given to men who have signed long term engagements.

It is obvious that additional courses and instruction beside that enumerated above can be included in the training syllabus as required. It is submitted, however, that the training facilities already available are of sufficient vital importance to justify the retention of these Schools and Courses.

18. A comprehensive reorganisation such as has been indicated in this memorandum will require a certain period to implement. It is believed that M.M.I.A. have this factor fully in mind and are contemplating drafting as many as possible of the recruits at present under training to enable the re-organisation to be carried out with the minimum of difficulty. Only sufficient personnel will be left to carry out essential guard and maintenance duties.

19. In conclusion, attention is drawn to some of the major, general problems which continue to affect the overall efficiency of the Centre.

(a) TRANSPORT.

The vital importance of proper vehicle maintenance and discipline has repeatedly been impressed on all ranks at R.T.C., I.C.B. It is to be regretted that a most condemnatory report has been received on the condition of the vehicles at the Centre, as a consequence of which, energetic steps have been taken in an endeavour to remedy the present position. Although to some extent the condition of the transport may be attributed to the state of the roads, the most serious factors are:

- (i) the majority of vehicles when received were Class V and receipt have done considerably more than the 1,000 miles estimated life, and
- (ii) nearly every vehicle was received without tools or spares, and though repeated indents have been submitted, very few have been received.

In consequence, while not condoning the lack of maintenance, there is, unfortunately, a great deal of justification for the excuse which are made.

(b) WORKSHOPS.

The workshop organisation in the Italian Army is at present virtually non-existent and although a Workshop for the R.T.C. has now been approved, the whole problem requires review on a very high level. It is believed however, that A.S.H.Q. are fully aware of the defects of the present Italian organization and are taking steps to provide a remedy./B.

(c) ACCOMMODATION.

This subject has been fully discussed but the main problem still remains: that of basic structural repairs.

It is recommended that a Standing Committee should be formed comprising representatives for each of the following :-

H.Q., R.T.C., I.O.F.
Genio Militare.
Ministro della Guerra.
M.M.I.A.
'P' D.L. & T.U.

This Committee should meet very frequently to consider plans for expediting the completion of all buildings in CESSANO and District. It is also recommended that they should include in their terms of reference the maintenance of roads and approaches. A great deal of the present transport difficulties are due to the almost incredible condition of the only approach roads to CESSANO.

(d) PAY.

There is at present no special pay for skilled tradesmen or any form of proficiency pay for specialists. Neither is there any proper form of documentation for these invaluable personnel. Hence it frequently happens that after a great deal of time has been spent in training an important specialist he is lost sight of and reverts to the general level of the ordinary untrained soldier. This is not only grossly wasteful but leads to a great deal of discontent and to complete lack of enthusiasm among those selected for specialist training. This is a matter of the greatest importance.





1. The re-organisation outlined in your memo, as an interim measure before policy is established, presents no difficulty from the G & A side. One or two points, however, are not quite clear and do affect greatly my appreciation of KAC INF organisation.

2. First.

What are the terms of enlistment in the Italian Army going to be? Is the Italian Army to be a conscript army, as before the War? If so, are conscripts going to serve for eighteen months only as before?

In an Italian Army of 150,000 the permanent cadre would be say 50,000 at maximum, leaving 70,000 conscripts.

If training is to take six months, conscripts will be six months at KAC INF and one year with their units. Therefore KAC INF must hold one-third of Army conscripts, or 25,000 at a time, which is not possible.

Therefore, if only 7,500 are to be held at KAC INF what are the terms of service?

How are intakes to be calculated?

Personally I do not think that six months can be allotted to the soldier at KAC INF. I am of the opinion that the soldier should spend eight weeks in the Basic Training Regiment and then be posted to his unit, returning to KAC INF later for courses, as necessary.

This would mean that the layout of units at KAC INF would be modified to be:-

Personally I do not think that six months can be allotted to ^{the} ~~the~~ soldier at HQ IIF. In one of the orders that the soldier would spend eight weeks in the Basic Training Regiment and then be posted to his unit, returning to HQ IIF later for courses, as necessary.

To comment on proposed layout :-

- (a) Infantry and Genio. No comments from A & S & G.
 (b) Workshops. There is no Workshop (MSS) Corps in the Italian Army - the nearest thing is Genio (Mechanical). Personnel trained at E & M School comes from:

Genio
Artillery
Infantry

So there would be no "Workshop" personnel in basic training Regts. To start training a fitter from scratch takes literally years. IAMS advises that in a fitter's life the first six months are spent "chipping and filing". IAMS is of the opinion that only basically trained fitters or apprentices can be accepted for courses at E & M School. These courses must be available only for personnel that are on long military engagements and will take from 5 - 6 weeks.

Capacity of School is 270 students.

- (c) D & M. There is no S & T in the Italian Army. Drivers are supplied by Corpo Automobiliato.

Capacity of School is 400 students. Course will take six weeks. 4253

The figures in your memo of 200 at Basic Training Regt and 200 at School refer, no doubt, to Corpo Auto.

The remaining 200 vacancies can be allotted to units for courses.

- (d) Ordinance. Ordinance personnel must be on long engagements. Training of Ordinance personnel on short engagements of 18 months or so is not worth while.

Ordinance in position is an extremely small affair. 40 at basic training is adequate. Advance training must be at the EWG IIR.

(7) Training, there is no Workshop (class) Course in the Italian Army - the nearest thing is Camps (seminars). Personnel trained at E & M School come from:

- Cavalry
- Artillery
- Infantry

So there would be no "workshop" personnel in basic training Regts. To start training a fitter from scratch takes literally years. SALES advises that in a fitters life the first six months are spent "cutting and filing". IMEM is of the opinion that only basically trained fitters or apprentices can be accepted for courses at E & M School. These courses must be available only for personnel that are on long military engagements and will take from 6 - 8 weeks.

Capacity of School is 270 students.

(c) D.A.M. - There is no S & T in the Italian Army. Drivers are supplied by Corpo Autovehicolo.

Capacity of School is 1,000 students. Courses will take six weeks. 4253

The figures in your memo of 200 at Basic Training Regt and 200 at School refer, no doubt, to Corpo Auto.

The remaining 200 vacancies can be allotted to units for courses.

(d) Ordnance. Ordnance personnel must too be on long engagements. Training of Ordnance personnel on short engagements of 18 months or so is not worth while.

Ordnance in peacetime is an extremely small affair. 40 at basic training is adequate. Advance training must be at the Ordnance Depot and therefore not of strength of XPS III.

Accommodation.

Your comments are fully noted. It is recommended strongly that, once the basic layout of Regiments is agreed, a standing Accommodation Committee be formed.

This Committee to be composed of representatives from :-

- HQ XPS III
- Cavalry
- Ministero della Guerra
- P.M.
- M.M.A

The Committee should agree a plan of work for each Building and allot priorities.

It should sit every two weeks to review progress made and take any action needed to ensure work goes according to plan. One member of each firm should be in attendance at these meetings to answer for his firm.
