During the above period the work for Ordnance Services of 12 B.L.U. has gradually decreased, owing to the fact that the demanding of stores through D.A.D.O.S. officially ceased on 31st December 1945, although stores demanded prior to that date were still arriving, when they had to be checked and handed over to the Italian Central Storehouse & Transit Shed for Distribution, which kept the clerks and storeman of D.A.D.O.S. Staff well employed.
2. Now that British Stores are being issued in bulk to the Italian Army, and the Italian Ministry of War is making its own distribution there is no longer need for handing over at this end, although an Ordnance representative may be needed to assist in designating, and checking of vouchers for receipt, of such stores that may arrive for the Schools.
3. Since the Commissariato Section of the Central Military Schools is now disbanded, and the Italian Central Storehouse is the responsibility of 8 Territorial Command, Rome, the work of Ordnance Services, 12, B.L.U. ceases in this direction. However there is still some correspondence, from time to time, cropping up with 557, B.O.D. concerning past issues, etc. There are also D.A.D.O.S. office records and correspondence, which need a responsible N.C.O. to deal with, whenever necessary.
4. On 1st August 1946 the only remaining Ordnance representative will be one Corporal Clerk. The W.E. for Ordnance Services 12, B.L.U. is as follows.

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All other personnel of the above establishment have gone on Release or Python, except D.A.D.O.S. who is proceeding, on Release at the end of this month.

Although deficiencies of these ranks have been shown on the Field Return of 12 B.L.U., it is understood that it is most unlikely for replacements to be available. At the present moment the Corporal Clerk is standing against the rank of W.O. I.

3. Organization

1) S.O.A.R. - SERVICIA

The project of establishing a C.A.R. in Serdima is in abeyance. It is considered that the need for this C.A.R. has been cancelled out by the policy of NOT forming Territorial Regiments.

2) Serving Soldiers from ex-Colonies

It is reported that the discharge of soldiers from ex-colonies and their passing to employment by the Ministero di Assistenza Post Bellica is under consideration.

Soldiers in the above category are not being discharged at present but are permitted to resign if they can become self-supporting.

4. Training

a) S.O.A.R.

Training at S.O.A.R. is proceeding satisfactorily.

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b) Experimental.

i) The training of the Granatieri Regiment in Rome is very difficult owing to the heavy duties being carried out.

ii) The Battalion at Viterbo is still in the process of being changed into Granatieri and is in a state of re-organization.

British small arms have arrived during the month but there is a great dearth of competent instructors.

iii) The Battalion at L'Aquila is very much in the same state as the Battalion at Viterbo except that the efficiency is higher.

5. Intelligence.c) Ascertainable activities of Italians vis-a-vis other countries.

It is reported that Yugoslav agents have established an office in Milan and seek to attract ex-Fascist and dis-occupied soldiers and especially aviators.

It is further suggested that organized armed bands of Slavs circulate in many towns of the Adriatic where they conduct black market and smuggling activities. Fear is expressed that only action by the Allies can successfully intervene since the Italian Government has its hands tied by the Communist Party.

b) Frontier activity.

\* Concern is mounting over the Yugoslav incidents in the Veneto and Friulia.

c) Relations between troops and populace.

Reported to be good and improving, probably assisted by a growing resentment of the partisans who are seen to be adopting the Fascist principle of obtaining by force a recompense for their patriotic service and so exploiting the weakness of the Government.

d) Political current segment troops.

New recruits are reported to be far more truly patriotic.

e) Public security.

Banditry, disorder, smuggling are all, rightly or wrongly, attributed to Slav agents who seek to disturb the equilibrium of the Italian people.
