GRADUATION

As the moment when the recruits will flow in for the Advanced Training by this School is getting near, I think it necessary to put things clear about the situation of the School with regard to the necessary accommodations and the training premises.

1. - Up to this date - 10 March - of all the work foreseen to give a simple but reasonable settlement to this School nothing has been done - not a single nail has been driven nor a single brick laid.
Nothing has changed from the original condition except for a very few works done by some workmen of the Direzione Lavori for the accommodation of the permanent staff.

2. - Of all the following works planned:

- to transform the stables into school-rooms	- amounting to L. 0.000.000
- fixtures for the school-rooms	" " " " 0.100.000
- H.Q. buildings, barracks A & B etc.	" " " " 17.000.000
- General services - Buildings (kitchens-dishes-washing-rooms etc.)	" " " " 11.000.000
- to make or repair the fixtures for all the buildings.	" " " " 15.000.000
- Water supply and hygienic install.	" " " " 1.100.000
Total	L. 54.200.000

only the first one has been financially approved under the date of the 1st of March last - the work for same will be started, let us hope, at the end of this month - all the others, although technically approved, lie still - in spite of my repeated pressures - by the "Direzione del Genio" waiting for the expenditure to be approved by the "Gabinet". As it seems, the "Gabinet" will not approve for the moment any new expenditure.

3. - As I know something about this kind of works and about the difficulties to carry them on I can easily foresee that on the first of May the situation will be about the following:
when the Recruits will arrive only a few schoolrooms will be ready, fit without doors or windows - the expenditure for same not having been granted as yet - and besides:
a) - fairly good accommodation - as already ascertained by General Ronco - for 750 men;
b) - lodgings for 2500 - no doors/no windows,no light;

- c) - Hygienic installations very poor and such that may lead to dangerous epidemics; draining system needing badly to be repaired;
- d) - Water supply needing to be repaired and improved to satisfy the necessities of about 300 men, especially in summer.;
- e) - Kitchens available - Field kitchens - for 600 units only, that could be made sufficient at the utmost for 900 units while the units to be fed are 3000.

This is the situation as it actually is and as it will remain for a long time still if exceptional measures will not be taken.

General Ponzo will certainly agree that this situation is not such as to favourably impress the new recruits that from the start should receive the impression that everything has been conveniently prepared for them in a military fashion.

Now, even if a decent accommodation must be put off for the moment owing to particular reasons even if the question of the kitchens can be temporarily solved by using field-kitchens, if available, even if provisionally I will try my best to provide for the electric light (switches, bulbs, etc., must be bought anyhow), nothing can be done to solve, in the same way, the problem of the missing windows, doors, draining system and water supply.

According to my opinion it is necessary therefore, that the authority should be immediately given for the following expenditures:

- Fixtures for the school-rooms	amounting to L. 2.100.000
- Repairs and new fixtures for all the remaining buildings	" " " 15.000.000
- Water supply & Hygienic installations	" " " 1.100.000
	Total L. 18.200.000

Expenditures for all the remaining works could be deferred to the next financial year, or considering it as an exceptional measure - it is not really exceptional at all - authority could be given for the works to be started and payment of same postponed until the next financial year.

I am sure that all the contractors would agree to a deferred payment.

I consider my duty to inform General Ponzo of what above because it is necessary that - if he will consider it convenient - the real situation of the schools should be taken up on high level.

1. As a result of an inspection of contracts at Ossiano, it appears evident that most contracts have only been half controlled. For example, one contractor has been responsible for a lot of sensitive instruments such as explosives, but is still controlled contractors under less strict terms.
2. It would appear that a majority of public works have only been half controlled.
3. It would also appear that some contracts at Ossiano, particularly those involving heavy engineering, have been completely controlled.

General Military Schools,

1. As a result of an inspection of premises at ground, it is suggested that the work done by Joliet whom has ever been held in mind. For example, one contractor was both responsible for scaling down, another for the walls etc., the third being that a lot of the work of insulation had been carried between two different contractors with disastrous results.
2. It is suggested that a representative of the Central Institute should review the work already done (particularly in the retarding) to ensure that the terms of the contract have in fact been carried out.
3. It is evident much work has been done extremely well and controlled.

Under the temporary arrangement proposed by S.M.C.P., the total number to be accommodated in the school will be approximately 2,600 men H.G., subject to a limit of 3,000 by regulation.
 2. It is believed that the D. & M. School are wanting the buildings adjacent to the Central School, when the old ones from Government, and are transferring the portion of their old buildings allotted to the Central School, into the accommodation to be provided by the old buildings, which are now both at present devoid of roof, while one end block of the main building is almost devoid of doors and windows.

3. The present allocation of accommodation, as proposed by the contractor of the Central School can, however, only be put into effect by 1st May 1945 if a considerable amount of rehabilitation is carried out before that date. The buildings allotted as "Accrual, conditions and received buildings", into the "Accrual" category, during 1945 are both at present devoid of roofs, while one end block of the main building is almost devoid of doors and windows.
 4. At present, four men are assigned to the re-conditioning of the buildings and unless considerably more men and material are made available for this work in the immediate future, there appears little prospect of the buildings being in good condition by the beginning of May.
 5. Owing to the large numbers to be accommodated it has been necessary to use three of the four main blocks entirely for accommodation, and unless considerably more men and material are made available for this work in the immediate future, there appears little prospect of the buildings being in good condition by the beginning of May.
 6. It is proposed that for accommodation purposes over a period, when the school has its first students, it is suggested that the recently acquired barracks block constitute the main "Accrual" block, accommodates considerably more than the 557 men allocated to it. During the course of the year, additional accommodation may be required, possibly 700 men.



1. General Cortellensa advises that a comprehensive scheme for the re-habilitation of Nos. 1 and 2 Regiments has been prepared and passed by the S.M.R.E. However, work cannot be started until the Ministry of War have authorised the expenditure of the required sum to carry out these improvements. It is expected that work will be started in full on the buildings of these two Regimental areas by the 1st August.

2. Reference your paragraph 5, there should be no difficulty in obtaining whitewash, paint and timber from the Genio Militare. All the above are manufactured locally and the vast majority of this material used by the British authorities is also obtained by local purchase.

3. With regard to cement, any requirements of Regiments for cement should be sent to the Ufficio Servizi. A certain amount of cement has been allotted to Impresa Genasi, who is supposed to be doing the work. If this Impresa is not doing the work Ufficio Servizi can arrange for the cement to be withdrawn from Genasi and given to the Regimental working parties, but complete details of the work to be undertaken must be given to the Ufficio Servizi, with a copy to this office. I have seen Genasi today and it seems they

are yet to work - they are also getting glass for windows from the British.

1. While there are such few men in the Centre it is now a favorable time to improve the accommodation in both these Regiments.
2. The state of accommodation remains in both of these Regiments virtually as it was on the day I arrived. The exceptions are that there is some improvement in the Regimental HQ of No. 1 Regiment and the water and bathing facilities are slightly better in both Regiments.
3. The contractors' daily effort would average in No. 1 Regiment possibly five men, and in No. 2 Regiment nearer two. It is felt that the distribution of effort by the contractors is very unfavourable to the Infantry Regiments and that any requests for work receives the lowest priority.
4. It is not possibly right to make comparisons, but it seems to me wrong to build elaborate storehouses, etc., for equipment before the conditions of living for the men are at least tolerable. The cookhouse, for example, in Nos 1 and 2 Regiments are a disgrace, and very unsuitable.
5. Much work of improving the buildings could be done by the Regiment's themselves if materials could be made available. No. 1 Regiment, for example, has paid 50,000 Lire for whitewash which costs 1,000 Lire a quintal, this from Regimental funds. The provision of material such as whitewash, paint, cement and timber, etc. In quantity from British sources would enable much work to be done by the units themselves.
6. Whilst it is appreciated that the RE have stated the work is too big for them, it is felt that more could be done than at present. In the same way it is hoped that the provision of tables and chairs from British sources might again be considered as the Italians appear incapable of the provision of them.

2. The state of accommodation remains in both of these Regiments virtually as it was on the day I arrived. The exceptions are that there is some improvement in the Regimental HQ of No.1 Regiment and the water and bathing facilities are slightly better in both Regiments.

3. The contractors daily effort would average in No.1 Regiment possibly five men, and in No.2 Regiment nearer two. It is felt that the distribution of effort by the contractors is very unfavourable to the Infantry Regiments and that any requests for work receive the lowest priority.
