1. For your information and approval, the points which Training Majors will discuss in their visits to Regt and En Comds are :-

- (a) Which of the TWTs or lectures in para 11 would be of value.
- (b) The methods used in equivalent British Units to foster morale, turn-out, and general 'teasing-up'. In particular, during periods when the lot of the soldier gives ample scope for discontent. It is admitted of course, that the British soldier is much more fortunate than the Italian soldier as regards amenities, cartoons, etc; but it must be remembered that he too has many grievances, eg: tours of duty abroad for 4 years away from his family and home; limited home leave only after two and a half years abroad; pay and allowances which are a mere fraction of those earned by his civilian counterpart; many immense fatigues; the high cost of living for his family at home. In fact, the British soldier has many worries which are identical with those of Italian soldiers, not to mention a variety of political views.

Accordingly it is thought that some of the methods used by British Comds to combat the ill effects of the above may well be of value to Italian Comds, particularly as some of these methods, though seemingly trivial, have proved most effective during five years of war. The main headings are given below.

2. Indirect methods of promoting discipline, smartness and pride of unit.

- (a) Drill. (i) Fifteen minutes drill first thing every day by all ORs of guards, picket etc; incl guards over dumps. (ii) Every day at some definite and suitable hour, all ORs (excl (i) above) but incl all Regt and in employed personnel, ie: cooks, IPT, sanitation men etc, do the above, and/or ten minutes vpm try or PT.

(b) Inspections. "What isn't inspected isn't done" is a principle which may well apply to the Italian Army in the same way that it applies to the British Army! Methods for laying out kit for inspections: uniformity of walking-out dress.

(c) Good large unit signs and clean billets. The psychological effect of the above on the British soldier is remarkable. It undoubtedly promotes pride of unit and formation and in general seems to breed a real superiority complex in their units, formations, etc.

- (d) Games. The improvisation of kit and grounds.

(e) The smart turn-out of all officers and their effect on the men they command.

(f) The little privileges accorded to NCOs to enhance their 'standing' with the men.

(g) The system of fostering a sense of responsibility in NCOs. (The newly promoted British NCO is just as loathe to accept this and give direct orders as is the Italian NCO, but there is no doubt that after a while the British NCO does accept responsibility and command).

- (h) Young officer instruction.

1. Information has been received from HQ MIA to the effect that they have requested the Ministry of War to issue orders immediately for training to commence: the subjects which are to be given priority are noted below.

2. MIA point out in this letter that it is appreciated that since the capitulation of Germany, the Combat Groups, for various reasons, have had little opportunity to train, and therefore in order that the necessary standard be maintained, they consider it essential for training on the lines given to be carried out immediately: this covers individual training only, but at a later date, dependent on the progress made, collective training will be started again.

3. 8. INTERNAL SECURITY DUTIES.

Officers and senior NCOs must have a thorough knowledge of Internal Security duties. In addition, all troops must be instructed and practiced. This training will start immediately.

9. I.T.

A very high standard of I.T discipline and maintenance is essential. D&I instruction must be continuous. This is best carried out by Gruppi courses.

10. COURSES.

Full use must be made of ITC, ICF courses. Only the best officers and NCOs available should attend in order that real value may be obtained when they return to their units.

11. OFFICER AND NCO TRAINING.

Officer and NCO tactical training will be carried out within units. This training will consist of outdoor and sand-model exercises, lectures and discussions. It is essential that before commencing collective training, officers and NCOs are capable of instructing and commanding their men.

As regards officer training, training majors will conduct a limited number of these in unit areas by arrangement with Regt and Bn Comds on any of the following subjects :-

- (a) Duties of NCOs: the method of training and developing NCOs - 2 lectures.
- (b) How to set and run a scheme - lecture.
- (c) Verbal orders - lecture and T.E.V.T.
- (d) Abscency of command - sandmodel.

As regards NCO training, sub-units ^{shall} devote 2 afternoons per week to NCO training.

Subject: Training of men and cadres of
combat groups.

1. MMIA pointed out that after the capitulation of Germany combat groups have remained in a difficult position insofar as the development and completion of their training is concerned.

In order not to lose the ground gained so far, it will be necessary to resume training activities. This is necessary also because of the need to train reinforcements with little or rudimentary training, and to complete, perfect and bring up to date the technical and professional preparation of the cadres and men.

For the time being, training will have to be limited to objectives which are more to be realized.

2. To this end I order:

a) that there be prepared a well-ordered

(2)
plan of instruction based upon the program outlined in the enclosure.

b) that there be provided a 3 month period of development (for your guidance: the subsequent group training will be started in accordance with the progress achieved)

c) that there be started immediately the theoretical and practical instruction of the internal security service.

3. Please let me know on November 15th and December 31st next how the time was actually spent and what results were achieved.

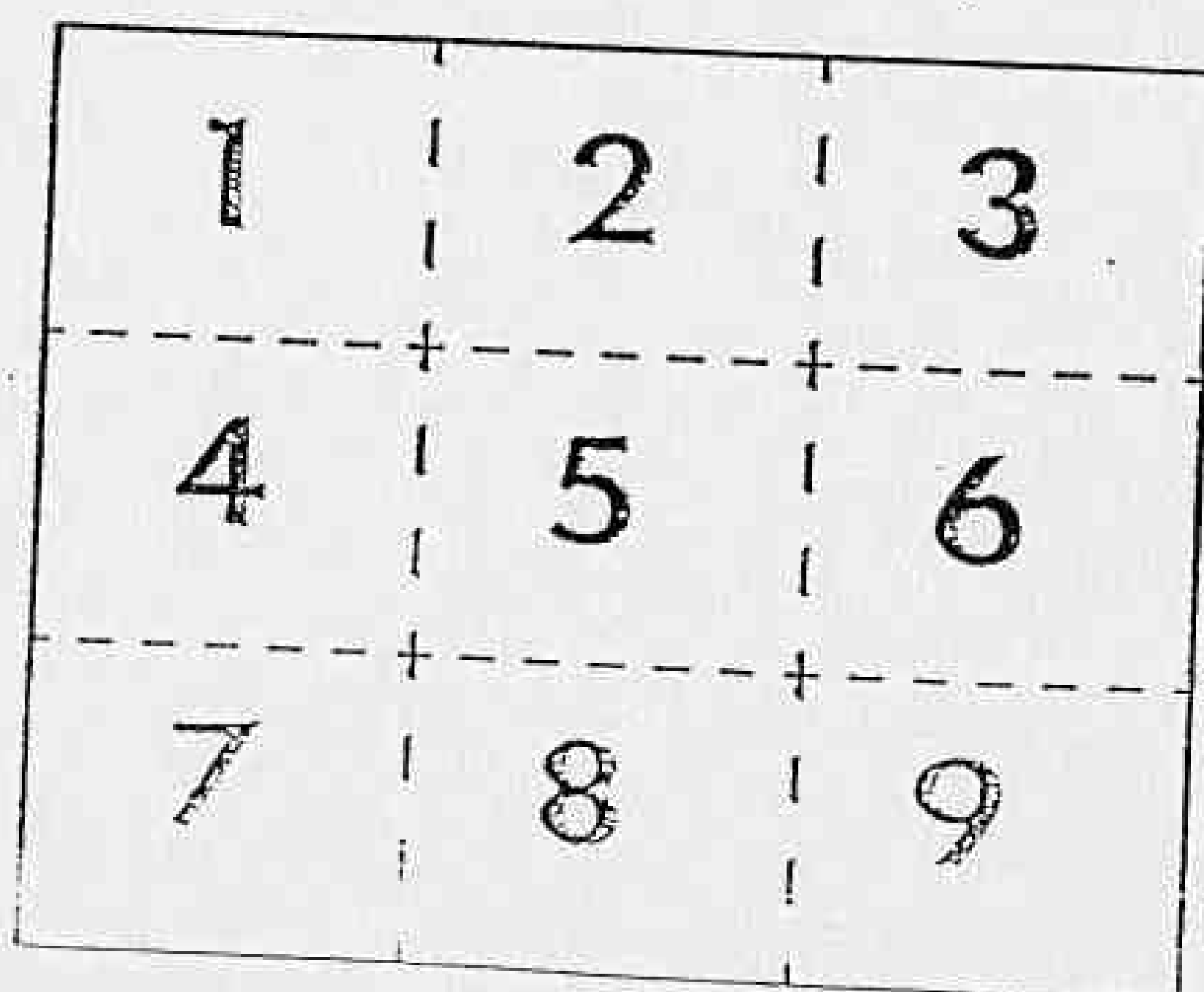
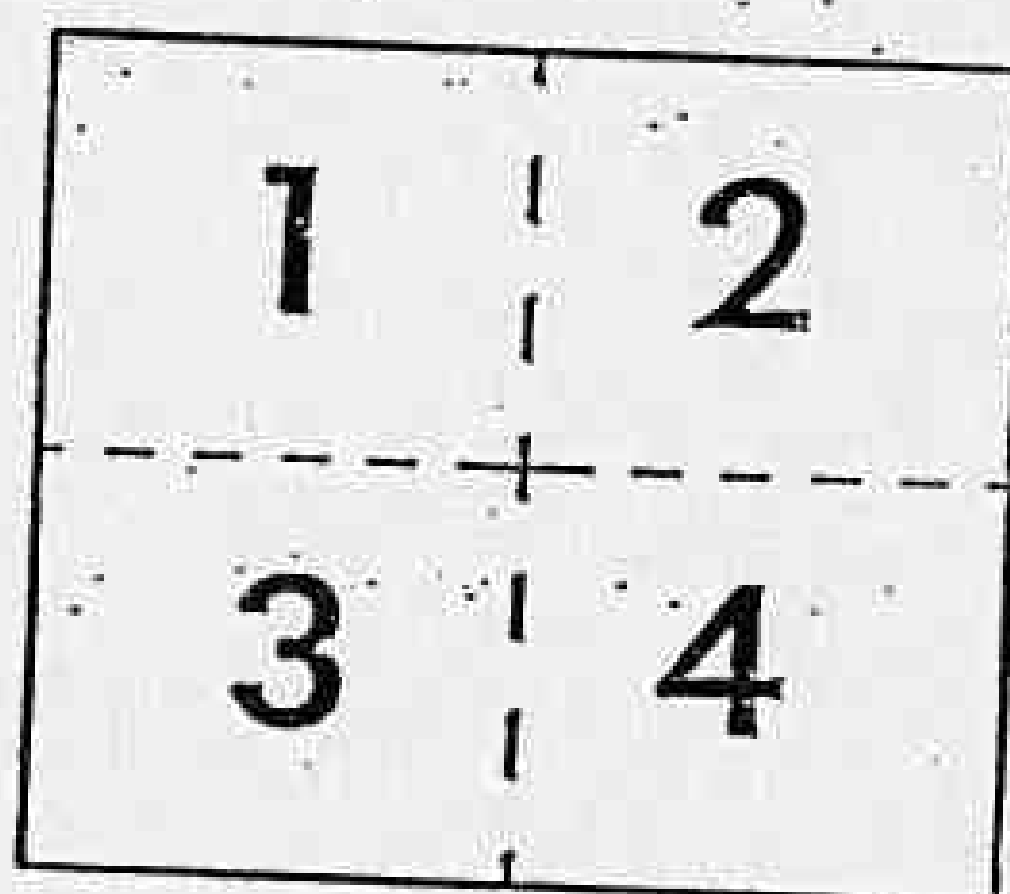

A very high standard of MT discipline and maintenance is essential. D & M instruction must be continuous. This is best carried out by Group courses.

8. COURSES.

Full use must be made of RTC, ICP courses. Only the best officers and NCOs available should attend in order that real value may be obtained when they return to their units.

9. OFFICER AND NCO TRAINING.

Officer and NCO tactical training will be carried out within units. This training will consist of outdoor and sand-model exercises, lectures and discussions. It is essential that before commencing collective training, officers and NCOs are capable of instructing and commanding **their** men.

With reference to the proposals sent to M.M.I.A. by "P" B.L.T.U. with letter AQ/6/1068 dated 25 Jul 45, this S.M.R.E. proposes to use the barracks at Civitavecchia as follows :

Barracks on the Aurelia route : 2nd Infantry Reinforcement Training Regt.

The premises that this regiment will evacuate at Cesano will be occupied by the regiment which at present is tented at Trevignano.

Duca D'Aosta Barracks :

Engineers Corps Regiment and School.

The availability of the premises existing in this barracks will consent a thorough organisation of the school rooms and teaching material. The firing range of the Engineers Corps (which were the seat of the Central School of the Engineers Corps since 1940) will facilitate practical training for all the corps.

This S.M.R.E. thinks that it is not advisable to transfer 152 Arty Regt to a/m barracks, because, since a permanent set up is to be given to the schools, it is necessary to consider primarily the availability of a fully suitable firing range. Civitavecchia firing range has a restricted availability of firing lines and can not be employed for all the arms that should be used. Bracciano area instead is more suitable, because we can use the firing ranges of the old Arty school (which function from 1894 to 1915 and from 1920 to 1923) and is considerably better because ~~maximum use of the firing range~~ it has a greater number of firing lines and can be usefully employed for all the arms to be used.

It is also to be borne in mind that Bracciano area is thinly populated and this would facilitate evacuation, whilst at Civitavecchia there are plants that obstruct the normal Arty training.

Therefore Bracciano area should be reserved entirely for 152 Arty Regt.

Duca degli Abruzzi Barracks :

Infantry and specialists corps school.

The premises that will be evacuated at Cesano will give a better accommodation to 2 Infantry Regiments.

The Civitavecchia range has a limited capacity and does not make ^{it} possible to utilize the available ammo at its full range. The Bracciano area, on the other hand, is well suited for that purpose: it can utilize the ranges formerly belonging to the old artillery school (which operated from 1894 to 1915 and from 1920 to 1923) and offers substantially better possibilities: especially a larger number of firing lanes and a possibility of utilizing the length of such lanes in relation to the range of the ammo. It is, furthermore, to be borne in mind that the Bracciano area has a less dense population and a smaller number of isolated buildings, which would facilitate evacuation operations, while at Civitavecchia there are installations which hamper ~~the~~ normal ~~the~~ artillery target practice.

Consequently, the Bracciano area would be reserved in its entirety for the 152nd Artillery regiment.

- al gettito medio di uomini validi che una classe può dare.

Dato che tutti i cittadini validi debbono prestare il servizio militare e tenuto conto che una classe può fornire in media circa 250.000 giovani, la riduzione a 120.000 è tale che il principio della coscrizione ne risulta infirmato.

- delle operazioni di reclutamento e di congedamento;
- dello svolgimento del ciclo addestrativo con unicità di indirizzo e di procedimenti.

a) - Il sistema comporta ogni anno:

- 12 chiamate
- 12 congedamenti;

quindi, praticamente, continuità di movimenti: partenza dai Comuni, affluenza ai distretti e rapida defluenza per i centri di addestramento, breve sosta in questi, proseguimento per i reparti nei quali alle affluenze mensili corrisponde il congedamento di un dodicesimo della forza che, a sua volta, produce conseguenti operazioni presso i distretti, sempre impegnati nelle incessanti chiamate mensili.

Il meccanismo appare complesso e anche complicato.

La ripartizione del personale tra le varie armi e servizi, anche a causa delle molte specializzazioni, deve tener conto dei requisiti dei singoli (requisiti fisici, professione o mestiere, ecc.).

E perchè la ripartizione numerica possa risultare in armonia con quella qualitativa occorre che, di massima, essa venga definita inizialmente dai distretti stessi. Inoltre, la composizione degli scaglioni mensili non può essere ottenuta attraverso il sorteggio riferito agli appartenenti all'intera classe, ma occorre sia attuato in ogni distretto sui singoli blocchi di giovani annualmente predesignati per le varie armi.

Congegno anche questo non semplice e che dovendo funzionare ininterrottamente ed a tempi serrati, non offre garanzia pratica di regolarità.

unicità di indirizzo e di sistema, sarebbe certamente utile poter accentrare l'istruzione individuale.

Peraltro, al vantaggio di sole 4 settimane di addestramento centralizzato si contrappongono i seguenti inconvenienti:

- svolgimento di 12 cicli addestrativi, sfasati appena di 1 mese l'uno dall'altro;
- mai una sosta, sia pure breve, nell'attività dei 4 reggimenti previsti, cosicchè si dovrebbe contare su un rilevante numero di istruttori;
- enormi difficoltà pratiche di sviluppo dell'ulteriore addestramento presso i reparti. Infatti, se l'addestramento di reparto (cosidetto "avanzato") si esaurisse in un mese - il che è assurdo - il problema troverebbe ancora una soluzione; ma poichè occorrono alcuni mesi, si dovrebbero svolgere contemporaneamente tanti programmi quanti sono i mesi di durata del ciclo addestrativo.

Quali ne sarebbero i riflessi inevitabili sull'addestramento di reparto e di insieme è agevole intendere: i reparti diventerebbero soltanto altrettante scuole con numerose sezioni cessando perciò di essere anche unità d'impiego della massa dei propri effettivi.

Occorrerebbe inoltre poter disporre sempre di ufficiali, sottufficiali e graduati in quantità notevolmente superiore a quelle necessaria per un normale inquadramento.

Tutto sommato, l'indubbio vantaggio di 4 settimane di addestramento iniziale centralizzato viene annullato dalle numerose, evidenti ed inevitabili difficoltà pratiche.

Esso è invece possibile e maggiormente interessa per gli specializzati.

Per la massa, la necessaria unità di indirizzo e di procedimenti è realizzabile assicurando che gli istruttori dei reparti siano tutti formati dalla stessa scuola di Cesano.

- IV - Il ciclo addestrativo completo che consente una solida preparazione dei reparti ritengo comporti 6 mesi di lavoro e pertanto sono convinto che sia preferibile, sotto ogni riguardo, adottare qui in Italia il sistema di 2 chiamate all'anno: una verso la fine dell'verno (marzo) l'altra verso la fine dell'estate (settembre).

- La soluzione che si prospetta non è scevra di svantaggi: essa presenta, infatti, tutti gli inevitabili inconvenienti comuni ai tipi di ordinamento nei quali la ferma è eguale od inferiore ad un anno. Ma è da considerare che un problema di ordinamento, nei limiti dati, non trova una soluzione ideale e deve pertanto tendere alla ricerca della soluzione meno svantaggiosa.

D) ADDESTRAMENTO DI REPARTO

E' infine mia convinzione che alla migliore preparazione del piccolo esercito italiano potrà in futuro concorrere assai efficacemente la creazione di vasti campi di istruzione adeguatamente attrezzati, nei quali sia possibile centralizzare l'addestramento nella sua fase conclusiva: quella cioè delle esercitazioni di singoli reparti e di insieme, in cooperazione fra le varie armi.

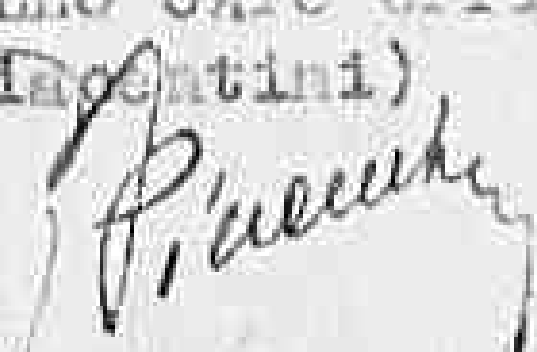

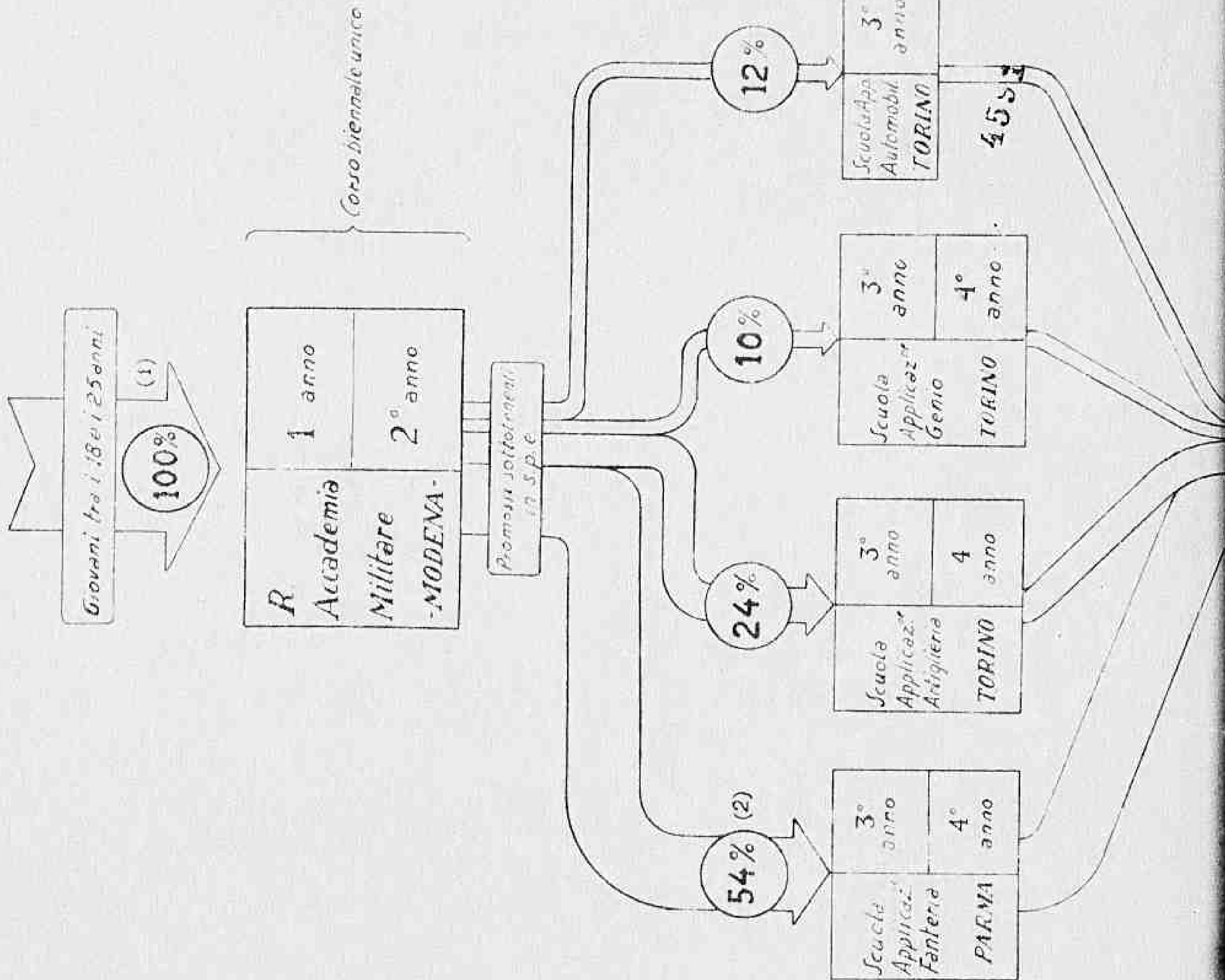

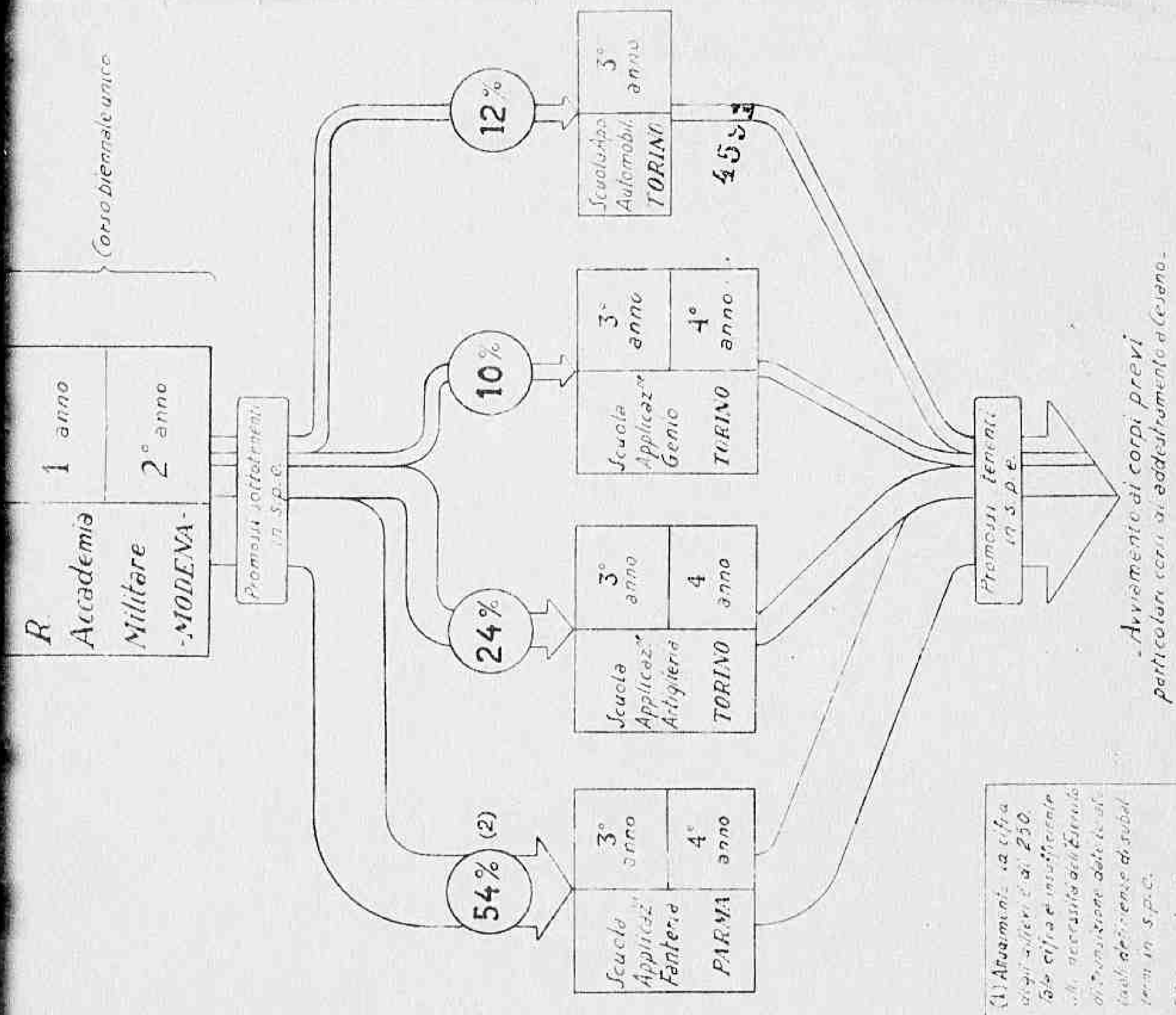

TACTICAL EMPLOYMENT OF BATTALION SNIPERS

The Battalion Snipers are a small body of most highly trained specialists, hand-picked and difficult to replace.

They should never be employed on patrol work, and should never be linked to a fighting patrol.

They should always be given worthwhile missions based on full information. The primary business of making contact with the enemy and obtaining the preliminary information is the work of patrols and not snipers, except in emergency situations.

Normally snipers should not be used at night, except in strong moonlight. What they achieve by day in the way of obtaining information and inflicting casualties is by night the work of offensive bombing parties, or raiding parties, or harassing fire.

If the sniper's main task is to work by day, when he can best use his primary weapon, the rifle, he must be adept in the use of cover to conceal his movement. If the terrain is open, movement may not be possible, so that he may have to lie up for considerable periods. Almost always the sniper must be in position in his area by first light and will often not leave the area until night has fallen. It follows that he must be an expert mover in darkness and proficient in the use of landmarks, the 'feel' of the terrain in the dark, in compass work, and in the use of the stars; and he must be able to eat hard tack, and do with the minimum of water.

From the time trainees are gathered together, the snipers should be 'mated'. This should be most carefully done. They will, at the outset, be working in pairs, the usual method being that one acts as observer whilst the other is the shot. In each pair each sniper must be equally capable of carrying out each role. Mutual confidence between the two is essential. 'Ill-assorted' pairs must be broken up if the mating was at fault.

The pairs should be constant, but every man should have a reserve 'mate'. The pairs do all work together including range classification where the mate acts as 'observer-coach' to the firer and vice versa.

Until the snipers reach the veteran stage they should be used in pairs. This initially will lead to confidence in the 'lane-killer game'. Later the veteran sniper may prefer to act alone, thus cutting down the risk of detection by half. Whenever a sniper volunteers to act singly, he should be allowed to do so.

By working in pairs, the scope of the battalion snipers is strictly limited, emphasising two points - they must be used only on worthwhile missions, and they may not be able to cover the whole mission of a sniper's screen. This is where the section sniper must relieve the burden on the battalion snipers.

Between missions, the battalion snipers should have preferential

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Between missions, the battalion snipers should have preferential treatment. They must not live in F.D.I.s and should be as much in 'rest' areas as possible. They should get good rations, be well equipped as regards clothing, especially canvas shoes; and should have every facility given them to select the same batches of ammunition, to get some firing in to keep rifles zeroed and eye and hand attuned; and to keep physically and mentally hard and tough. They should be one and all bosom-pals of the

Intelligence Section, getting Sitreps and the latest activities of patrols and F.D.L. activities. They should have every opportunity given them for reconnaissance both on the ground before they go on a mission, and from all O.Ps. The M.C.O. should be in the confidence of the Commanding Officer, the Adjutant and the Intelligence Officer and "persona grata" with every company and platoon commander.

There are two main uses for the battalion snipers. They are totally different.

The first main mission is to obtain mastery over some particular area. Mastery means a reign of sniping terror so instituted that movement by the enemy by day becomes an impossibility. In this mission, the sniper should calculate all risks and should accept none. He works for his opportunity, and kills without being killed. He makes certain of his opportunity by good observation and deduction, and he makes certain of his kill before taking his shot. Everything is cool and calculated. It may take a considerable time before the upper hand is obtained.

If the jungle is not too thick, but otherwise if good cover is available, the above mission may best be carried out by mobile snipers - they are not tied down to hides, but rather by good use of cover and patient observation, they flit from view-point to view-point, much the same as a king-fisher does. They go on searching for their opportunities. Once the prey is spotted, the stalk and the working into position is the next step, and then the kill is made. In the mobile way of working it is always best to fade-out immediately after the kill, although it may be a good plan to keep the area of the kill still under observation, possibly by the 'mate'. Many times, especially when there is enemy activity in the sniping area, one of the 'pair' will work for position to make the kill, whilst the 'mate' watches the 'back door' or in other words watches the right, left and rear of the killer's line of advance and is ready to engage any enemy appearing there, or call his mate off by pre-arranged signal. Pairs must never move abreast, but always in depth one behind and to a flank of the other.

It is generally advisable to move one at a time and always by bounds. The rear mate can and should move up to the other so that by signals or whisper, the next bound or plan is always common knowledge between the two.

Deception and deceit should always be uppermost in mind in the mobile mission, and the principles of the double-bluff well known, and used.

The normal reserve of fire-power for the mobile game of sniping is the hand grenade either A.P., or, on occasion, smoke.

For the mobile mission, the sniper-pair should be given plenty of 'elbow-room' for manoeuvre. The pairs should be thin on the ground and it follows that in enclosed country such a sniper position cannot be expected

The pairs should be thin on the ground and it follows that in enclosed country such a sniper screen cannot be expected to spot all enemy movement towards our own positions. That is not their task. The observation of enemy movement and the reporting of it, although it may be supplemented by the work of the battalion snipers (and very valuable supplementation this may well be), is the task of rifle-company patrol-screens, and the commanding officer must plan accordingly. As already stated snipers should never be linked to patrols, but they may report to forward patrol bases.

A corollary to this is that snipers should not carry out 'relief on the ground'. This ties them down too much. To avoid reliefs getting in each other's way it may be necessary for the new relief to enter the sniping area at one-compass point and the old to leave the area at the opposite compass point. The disadvantage of course is that the old relief cannot pass on the latest information. But it does mean that all the snipers are keeping out of each other's way. If they are also out of the way of the fighting and standing patrols, they can thus work on the slogan that "all movement is enemy movement".

To avoid gaps in any 'stranglehold' being created, the overlapping of the time factor is important. As an example the following is given :-

In front of a Jap platoon bunker position on a ridge one pair of snipers are to be in position from first light till dusk. The following instructions are issued :-

"1st pair into position of observation at X on West edge of area of sniping by 0545 hours. Leave East edge of area of sniping not before 1400 hours and not later than 1500 hours.

2nd pair into position of observation at X on West edge of area of sniping not before 1500 hours, not later than 1400 hours."

Here both pairs might be on the ground any time between 1300 hours and 1500 hours, but would for certain both be on the ground at 1400 hours, although separated as far between as the East and West edges of the area of sniping.

The use of the battalion snipers in the noble role or in gaining the upper hand in a 'no man's land' usually means that they are briefed to carry out the mission 'without accepting casualties'. But there is another use for the snipers which is a very different kettle of fish where the briefing takes the form of the inclusion of the words 'at all costs'.

Either in attack - and generally the attack will be of the fast moving variety of encirclement, sealing off, and infiltration - or in the offensive - defensive - e.g., the holding of a road-block behind the enemy's main force, - a plan may be made which succeeds in general, but in which some slight loop-hole exists which must be closed. These loop-holes are generally difficult to close, or troops may not be available without gravely diminishing the offensive reserve.

Here the highly trained snipers come into their own, for it may well be in their power greatly to consummate the success of the whole operation, or greatly to aid in it. Two examples of recent operations illustrate the principles of using the snipers and showing how the 'at all costs' risk must be accepted.

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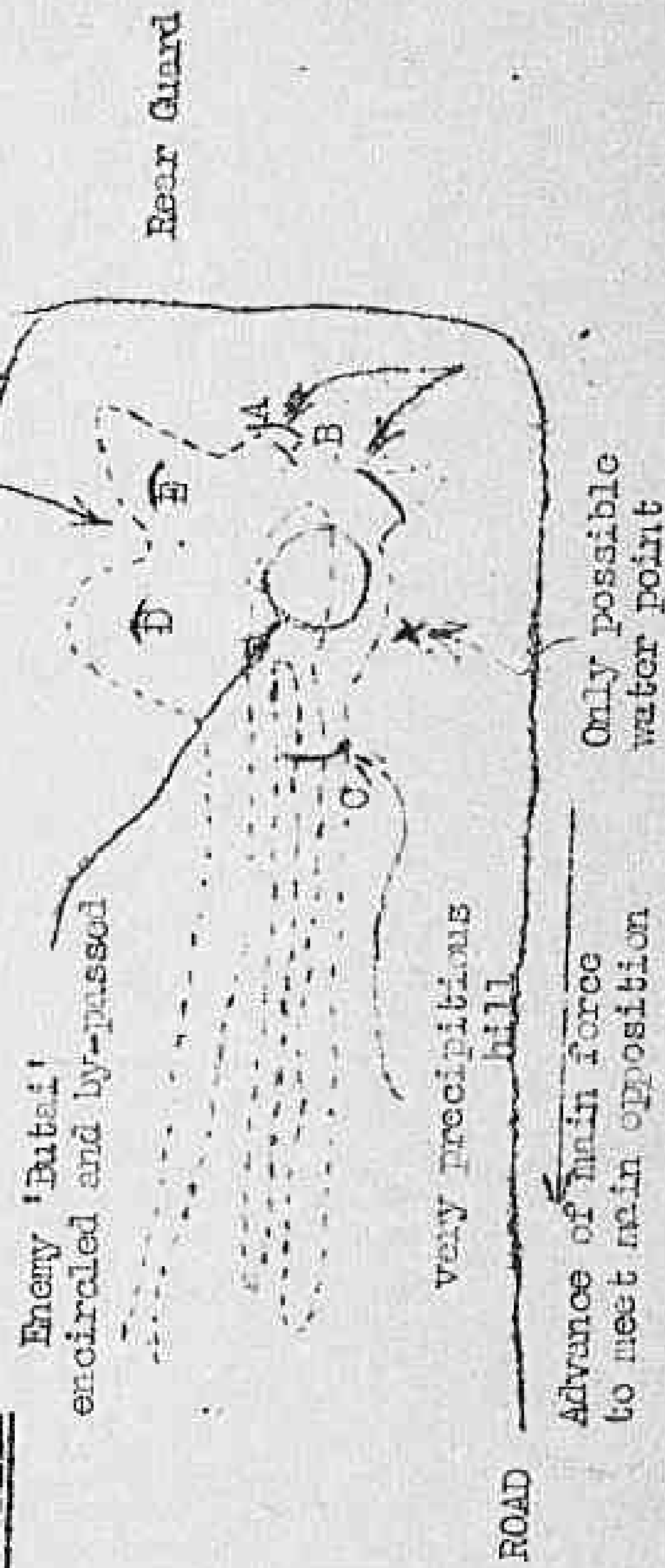

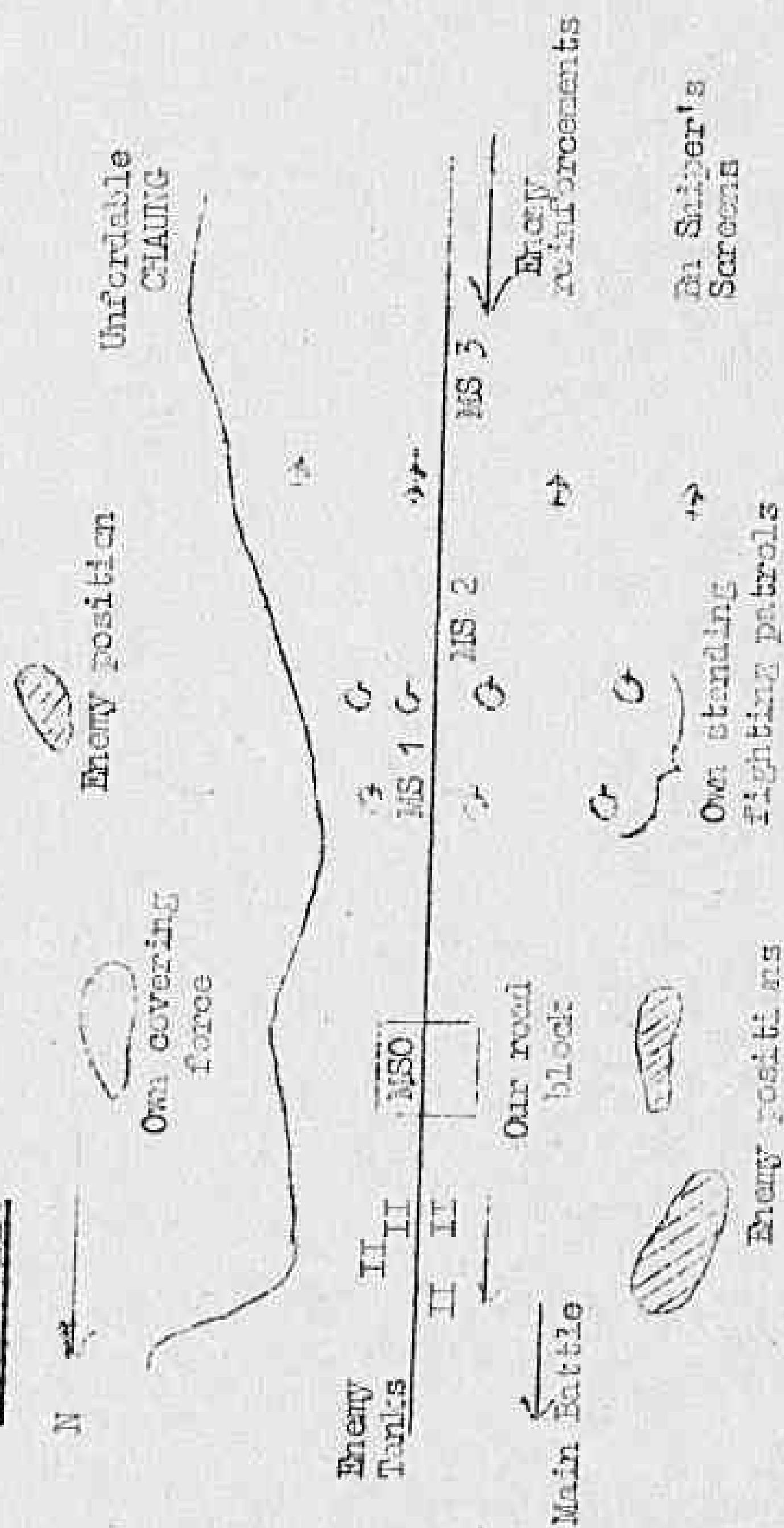

In this example, one battalion attacked the bunkered 'butai' from A and B, one other company closed in from C after the Bn attack was held up but had started the stranglehold. Two more platoons were despatched to D and E to complete the encirclement. The gap between B and C was a piece of extremely steep and difficult jungle. The only watering point possible was at X within mortar range from the 'butai'. To close the gap B - C would have used up at least another platoon, which could not be spared. The four sniper pairs of another battalion were ordered to prevent the Japs drawing water at X 'at all costs' for 12 hours. Two Japs were sniped and killed trying to reach X and no further efforts were made by the enemy. We had no casualties. The terrain was unknown and unrec- onnaitred to the snipers when they set out. Time was the essence of the plan. Risks were taken. The 'butai' did not further interfere with our general plan.

2nd EXAMPLE



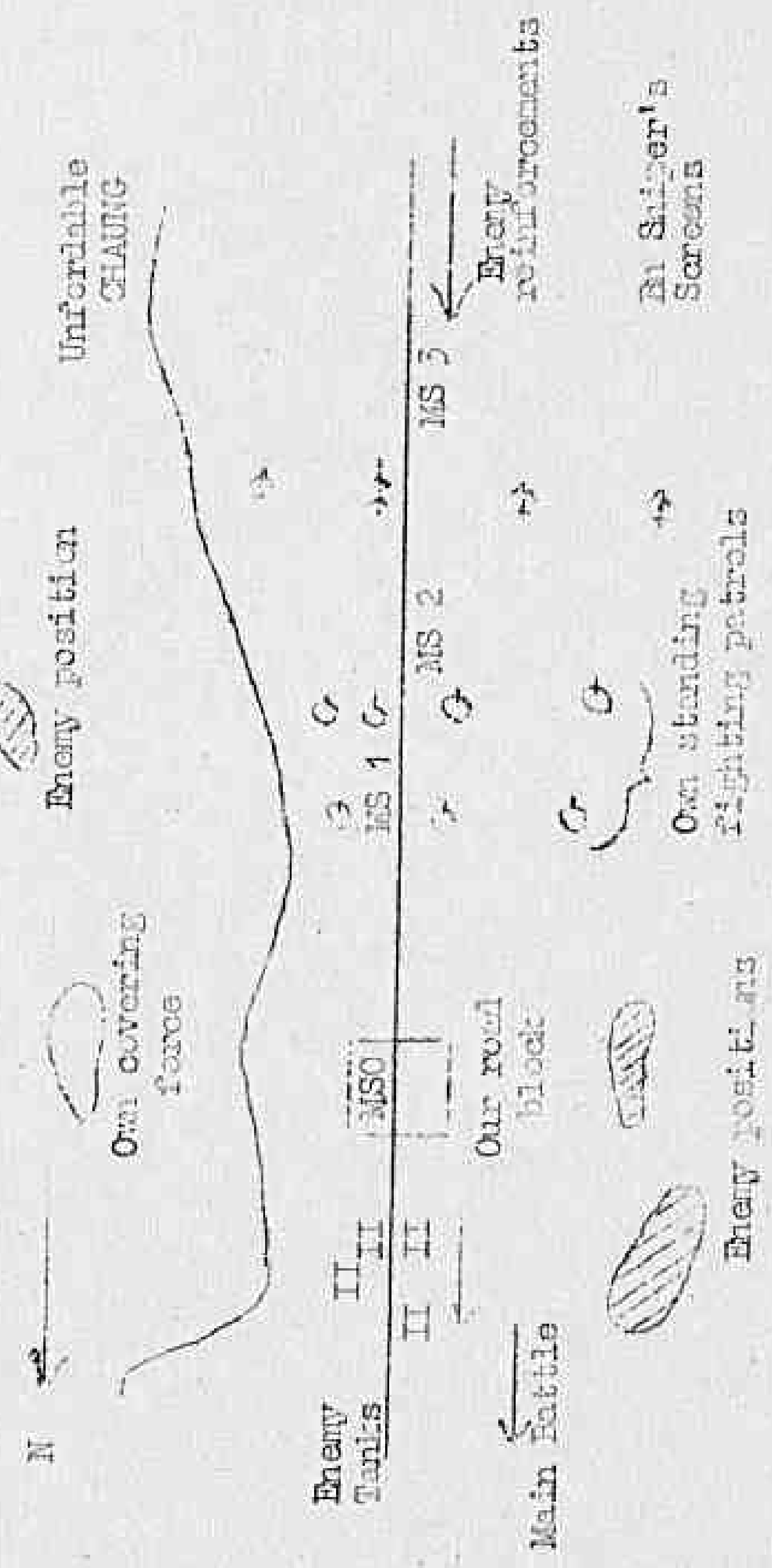
In this example, M Battalion secured a road block at MS O. Enemy tanks and infantry invested the block from the North and West. Enemy reinforcements moved up in considerable strength from South. We expected our tanks to break through from the North and link up with us at MS O. To delay the enemy moving up from the South to the greatest possible extent was therefore vital to the plan.

M Battalion at the road block established a snipers' screen about 3 miles South of their main position. A mile to the rear of the screen, another screen from rifle companies, consisting of fighting patrols, was also established. **4582**

The snipers were ordered to disrupt any enemy advancing from MS 5 where the best part of an enemy battalion had already debussed. They were ordered to do so 'at all costs', but when no more was possible to fall back through the standing patrols and return to the road-block base. The snipers held back the enemy for at least 36 hours, the patrols with the aid of

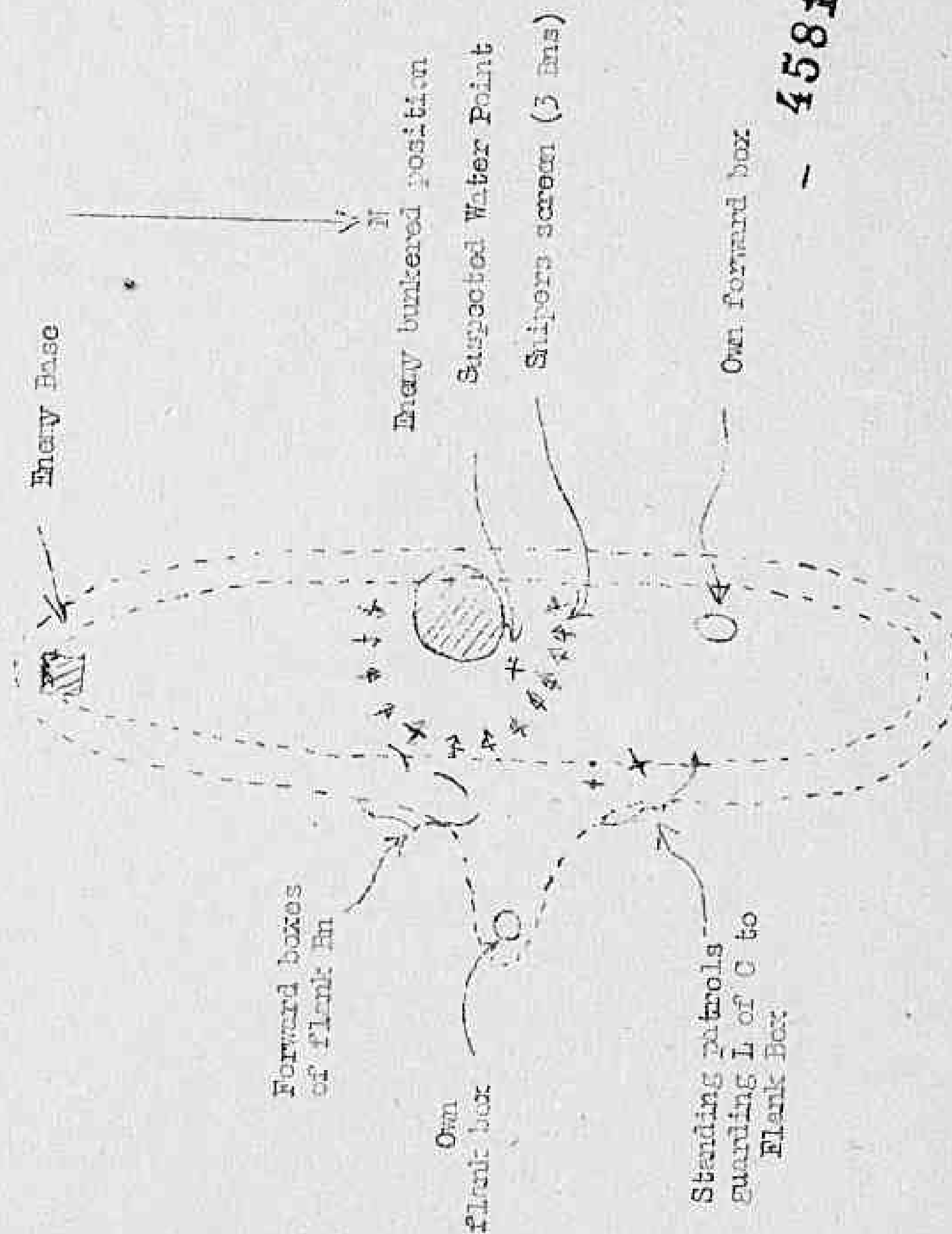
This hold-up undoubtedly shook the enemy's morale badly, and he never succeeded in breaking the road block. Dooby traps laid by the successive lines on giving up areas also helped the delaying tactics.

Battalion snipers as a rule should be under the command of the unit commanding officer. They should seldom, if ever, be delegated to the command of a company commander, but the latter can always ask for help if by any chance the enemy have snipers causing a serious situation to our own troops and who have not been successfully dealt with by the company commander's own efforts.

Occasionally, however, battalion snipers may be briefed for a brigade plan in order to obtain a full 'tie-in'.

An example of this, also from recent operations, shows not only this principle, but how the two methods - the 'do not accept casualties' and the 'at all costs' missions - were combined in the one sniper operation.

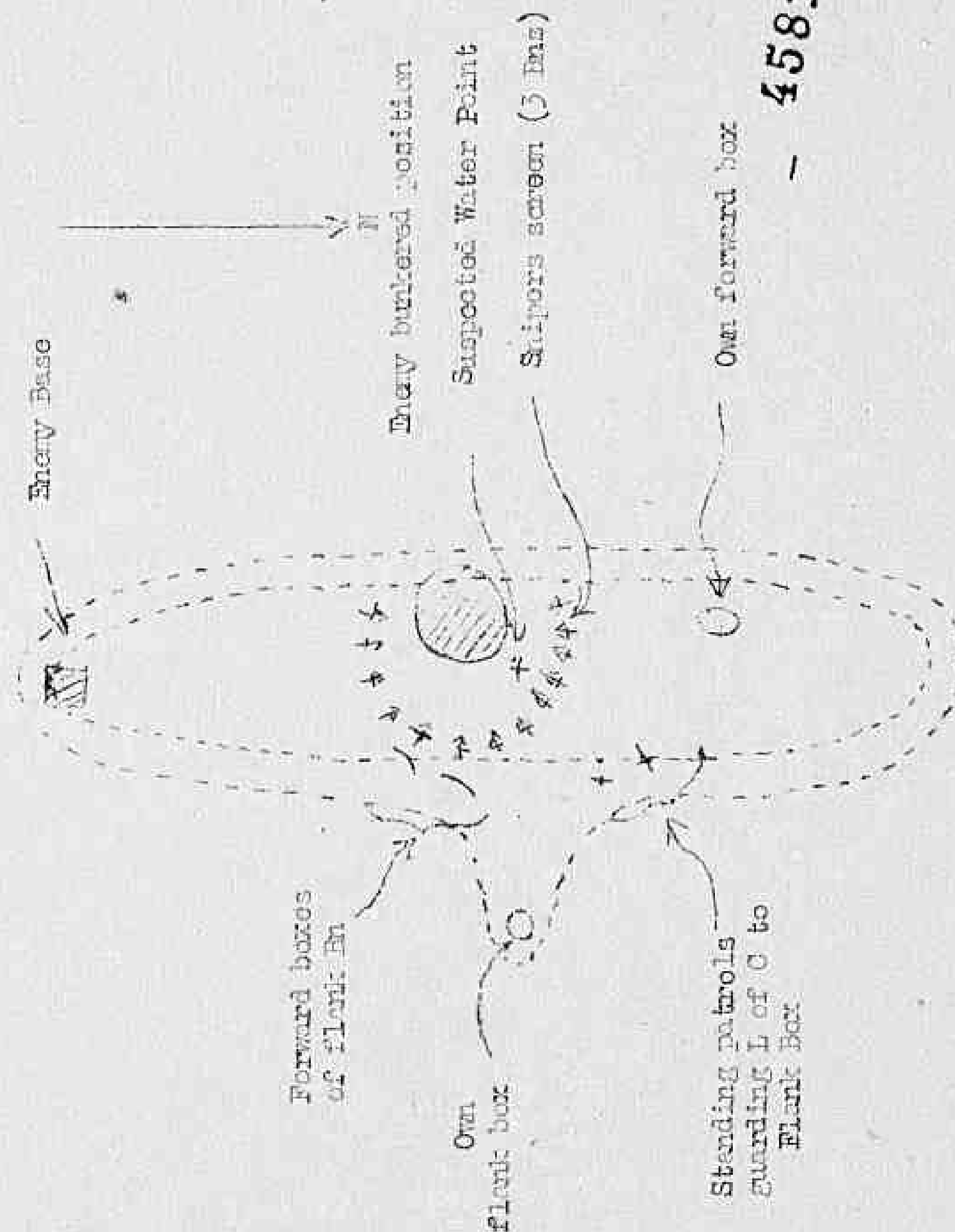

Here the sniper screen not accepting casualties to themselves dominated the 'no man's land' on the two possible sides. The enemy were not allowed to work or move by day. Sniper successes - casualties 30 killed, probable killed or wounded 20, own casualties Nil.

At X, doubt arose as to whether the enemy in the bunkered position were obtaining their water supply here. A close sniper screen was detailed to prevent the enemy drawing water here 'at all costs'.

In this example, the snipers were working in a 'no man's land' of 250 yards on the flank and 750 yards opposite our own forward bases. But at the same time other snipers were working to the East 5 miles out from base.

When snipers are set the task of working to obtain domination of the battlefield, the commanding officer must not be impatient of success. It is fatal to rush the snipers.

The sniper is a human being - he should be a very good one. When he is put on a mission, whatever it is - 'all in' or 'all out' as the phrase may be - those who handle and brief him should remember that he is being put at a tension higher than his fellow soldiers the moment he leaves the base. It is a lone game. He is not one of the crowd. There are difficulties and dangers which he faces unaided to a degree greater than any other member of the battalion. The commanding officer who expects immediate success and success every time is the commanding officer who will destroy the fighting morale of his unit, including his battalion snipers, sooner or later. A sniper, especially if he is buying his experience, and is unescorted by the veteran of the modern battlefield, who is prepared to 'try, try, and try again' is one of the 'unknown and unsung' heroes, and this must be duly appreciated.

1. At the time of the heavy casualties in Italy all five Combat Groups had reached a good state of training.
2. That state was achieved and maintained by constant hard work and training.
3. Since the capitulation the Combat Groups have been variously employed, mainly on Guard duties and have done little or no training.
4. The Combat Groups still have a task to perform and they must therefore keep up their standards, even though the necessary training will have to be accomplished whilst employed on Guard duties.
5. It is therefore necessary to consider immediately the training possible under present conditions:--
 - (a) Individual training can well be carried out, outside the dispersion from which units suffer. Section work and platoon officers can run this training even in detached posts.
 - (b) Elementary collective training at the section level.
 - (c) Study by officers and men of the next stage i.e. platoon training.
6. Individual training comprises training in:--
 - (a) Discipline
 - (b) Personal hygiene
 - (c) Close order drill
 - (d) Weapon training
7. High standards of achievement must be set and insisted on:--
 - (a) Discipline. Attitude towards authority. Military obedience of orders. Respect for officers and NCOs. Manner without any equipment. Clean uniforms, boots and equipment.
 - (b) Personal hygiene. A clean body free from dirt, lice, sores and infection. Feet and underwear clean and free from sweat. Latrine exercises.
 - (c) Close order drill. Foot drill. marching. marching. marching. Arms drill. Battering drill.

3. Since the capabilities of the combat groups are being tested on a small scale, it is necessary to have some little or no training.

4. The combat groups will have a task to perform and they must therefore keep up their standards, even though the necessary training will have to be accomplished without delay on their part.

1. It is considered that the training of the Interim Army will fall under three headings:

- (a) Training of Cadets;
- (b) Training of officers and NCOs of the Regular Army Cadre which will form the future instructors;
- (c) Training of replacements for yearly wastage.

2. In order that training as in 1(a) may be planned, please submit your proposals in detail.

3. With regard to training as in 1(b), it is considered that the present layout of schools at CESANO and ERACCIANO and S.I.V.A. at MANZIANA are an adequate basis on which to expand. You are requested to forward your plans, including list of schools, number to be trained in each, and staff required.

The students trained in these schools will be on temporary duty from the unit to which they are regularly assigned.

- 4. (a) The large training problem is the training of intakes vide para 1(c).
- (b) A figure of 10,000 has been set aside for trainees. It is particularly desirable that their training should be concentrated in centres near ROME, for which the remaining barracks in the CESANO-CIVITAVECCHIA area will be of use.
- (c) The training of 10,000 recruits per month, in basic individual training only, will provide 120,000 per year. The basic training period must not exceed four weeks, at the end of which time the soldier is assigned to a regular unit. Here he becomes a working member of the team and receives further training in his duties.
- (d) It is emphasised that central standardised training, under competent instructors, is essential if recruits are to become soldiers capable of being efficient members of their teams. No other method will give standardised basic instruction.

- (e) It is estimated that four training regiments will be necessary. The Officers, NCOs and administrative staff of these being permanently assigned, while the trainees remain with the regiment for one month only after which they are classified and sent to permanent assignments. This system will provide a sufficient number of new men with a minimum of staff.

- (f) With these principles in mind, submit your recommendations to include numbers permanently assigned to the regiments and locations for the regiments.

INTRODUCTION

This letter is divided into four parts:

Part I - Preamble.

Part II Para by para comment (where comment is needed) on your letters and memos.

Part III Statement by Arms of length of training required.

Part IV Outline layout of main units suggested by MIA.

PART I - Preamble.

1. The object of this letter is to enable "F" BL and TU to plan in detail the organisation required and the WE necessary to train intakes for the reinforcement of the Italian Army pending the declaration of a final policy by AFHQ.

2. With regard to para 7 of AQ/6/1009 of 18 July 45. In view of:-

(a) The urgency for concluding the reorganisation

(b) The time involved in calling a conference

(c) The fact that agreement in principle has been reached it is not thought necessary to call the meeting you suggest since this letter will answer all your questions.

3. You are required to produce your plan for training such rfts as may be posted to you to fill the necessities of the forecast by MIA (to which reference is made in PART II, para 10 below).

4. The proposals made by you in the correspondence under reference are agreed in principle and to a very great extent in detail.

1. (a) This H.Q. considers it most desirable that:-
 - (i) Recruits be given a change of air, scenery and officers on completion of their basic training.
 - (ii) Both basic training regiments should be accommodated in the same area. This would mean an economy of basic training stores, demonstrations, 30 yd ranges etc.

1. Reference is made to this Unit's AQ/6/1009 of 12 July 45 and enclosures.
 2. The proposals discussed in this and previous memoranda were considered by the Director and were agreed in principle and, to a very great extent, in detail.
 3. The following modifications, based on a more complete knowledge of the facts and requirements, were laid down by the Director:
 - (a) A conference was unnecessary as the Director himself, in consultation with his staff, was prepared, and in fact has given, a definite answer to all the queries raised.
 - (b) Pioneers are unskilled labour; they require only basic training for a period of six weeks, at the expiration of which they are available for posting where they are required and where they will receive such advanced training as is necessary. Hence there is no need for an Advanced Training Pioneer Battalion.
 - (c) The period of basic training is agreed at six weeks for all arms and the ratios suggested in AQ/6/976, Appendix 'A', are accepted, with the exception that Advanced Training of S. & T. personnel will be increased to twelve weeks. After the period of advanced training at CESANO, reinforcements to Combat Groups will receive further advanced (collective) training with the Gruppi.
 - (d) No leave will be granted throughout the period of training at CESANO.
 - (e) Recruits will be drafted to the Arm of the Service in which they will serve immediately on joining the Centre. In view of D.M.T.'s emphasis on effective screening, 'P' B.L. & T.U. will organise a screening system to ensure that recruits enter the Arm of the Service for which they are best suited.
 - (f) The proposed layout of Regiments to locations will be altered to enable all basic training to be conducted at CESANO and Advanced Training at CIVITAVECCHIA or BRACCIANO.
 - (g) No Regimental Headquarters for Other Arms Advanced Training Battalions (themselves so organised as to be miniature Regimental H.Q.'s with full Colonels in command), is required and hence this will be dispensed with.
 - (h) The allotment of recruits to the Artillery Arm is considered adequate.
- (i) 'A' Branch, M.M.I.A. will evolve a system whereby only sufficient reinforcement

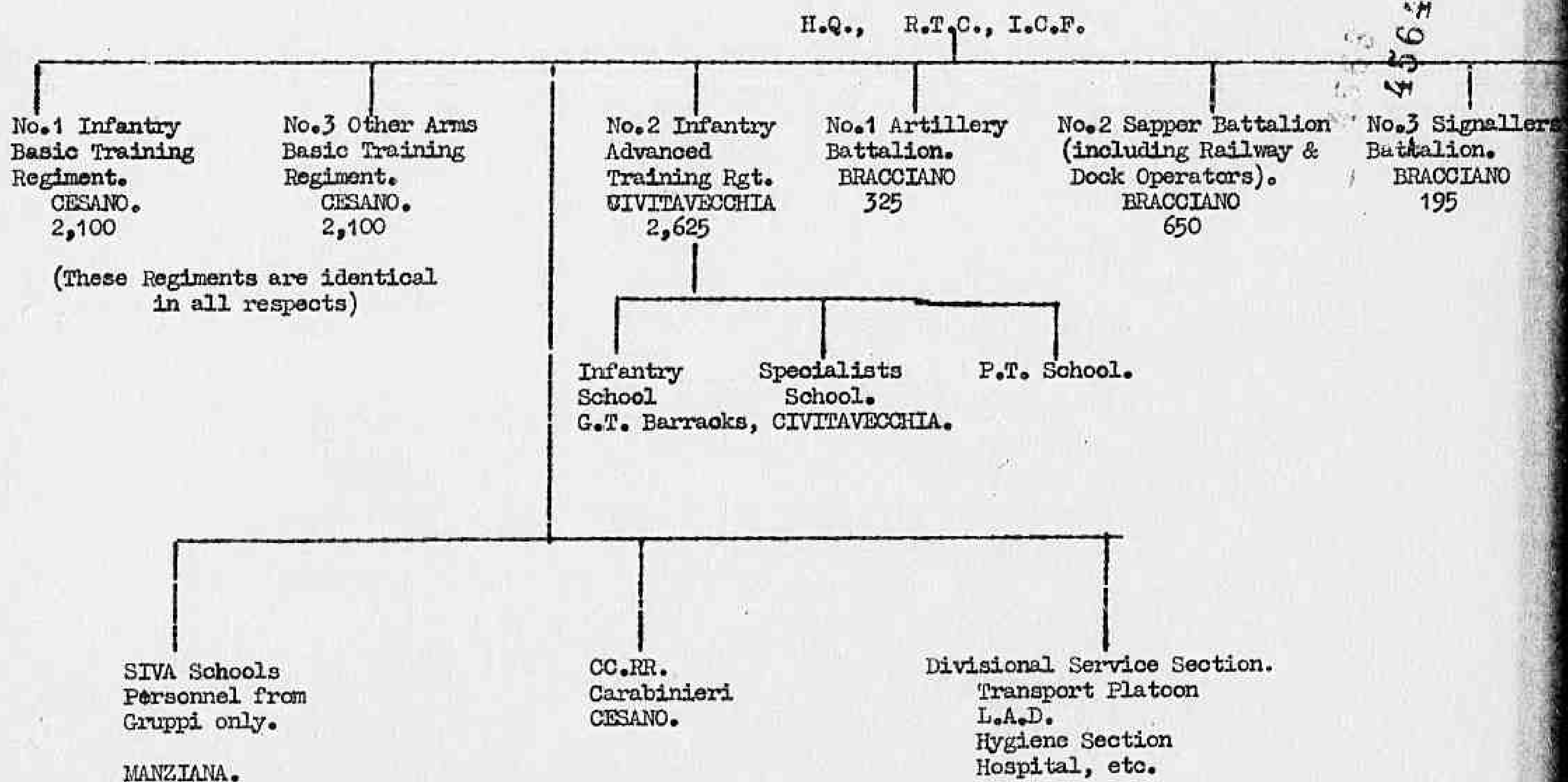

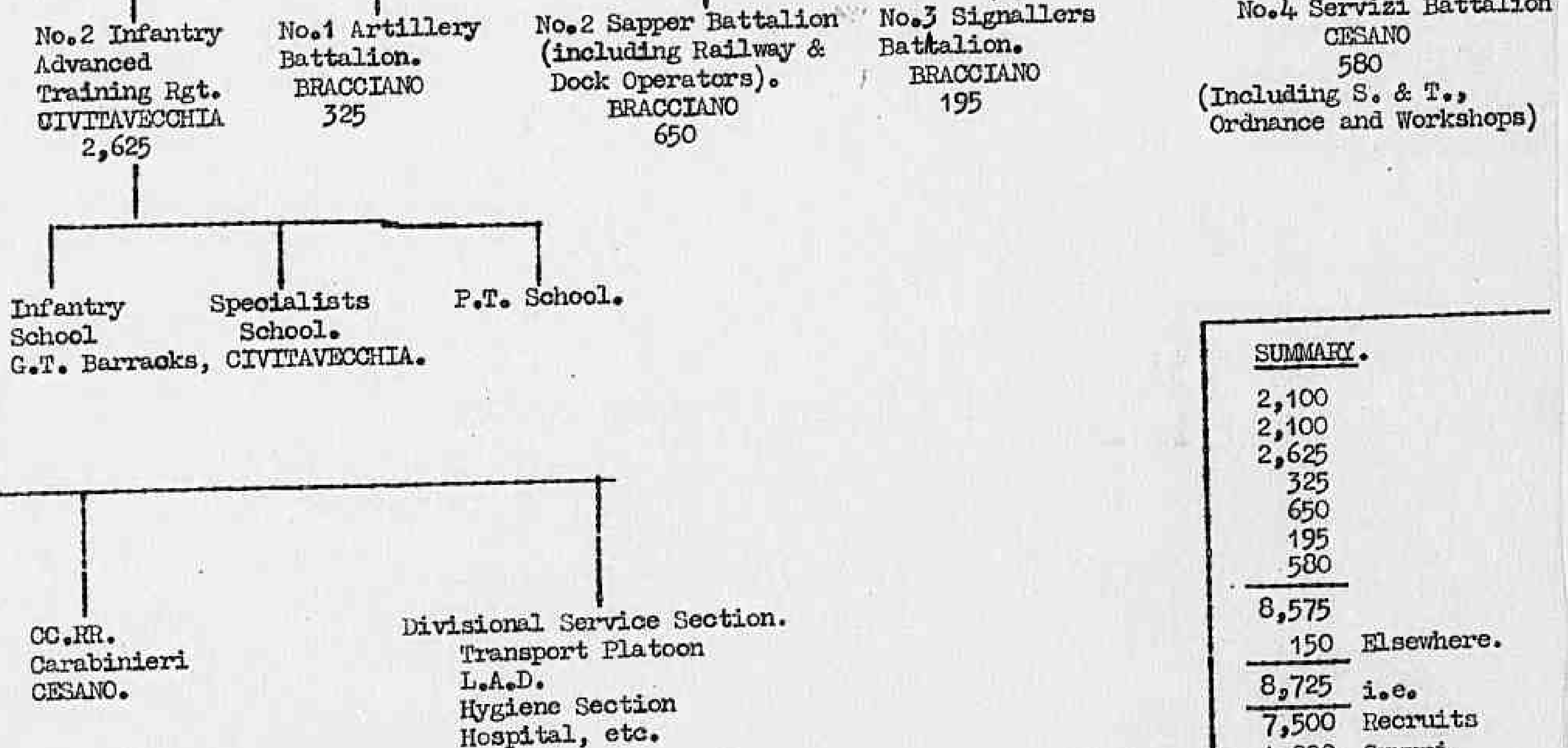

1. Your letter AG353/131 GCT-0 of 10 April lays down the policy for control and supervision of training of the Italian Army.
2. It is thought that conditions have now changed to such an extent as to warrant the reconsideration of this policy.
3. The letter under reference lays down that MMIA controls (under general direction of DIT) the training of Italian Units not under command of 15 Army Gp. 15 Army Group has the same responsibility for the training of Italian formations as for formations of other nationalities under command.
4. This arrangement was necessary whilst Italian Tps were being trained for and actually engaged in battle.
5. The cessation of hostilities however, makes it probable that all Italian formations will be trained and maintained for an internal security role.
6. Should this premise be in accordance with AFHQ policy on the future role of the Italian Army it is suggested that MMIA should be made responsible for direction of training of all Italian formations as these are released from control of 8 and 5 Army or 15 Army Group.
7. If this is agreed, I suggest that it might be advisable to inform all concerned accordingly.

DIRECTIVE - BRITISH TRAINING STORES AND EQUIPMENT

ISSUED TO ALLIED AND ITALIAN TRAINING CENTRES

1. The purpose of this directive is to define the responsibilities for training stores and equipment issued to Allied or Italian Armies.
2. Allied and Italian Commandants of training centres are responsible for the correct accounting, safeguarding and maintenance of training stores and equipment issued to them from British sources in accordance with accounting directives.
3. British Liaison Units are responsible for the following:-
 - (a) Advice on the initial distribution of stores and equipment between different wings, units etc, of training establishments.
 - (b) Instruction, organisation and supervision of Allied or Italian personnel in correct accounting procedure for stores with which they are concerned.
 - (c) Advice and instruction, where necessary, in the correct methods of carrying out regular maintenance of training stores and equipment.
 - (d) Supervision of the introduction of a system, by the Allied or Italian personnel concerned, for the issuing of training stores and/or equipment from stores against signature and returning them to store immediately after use.

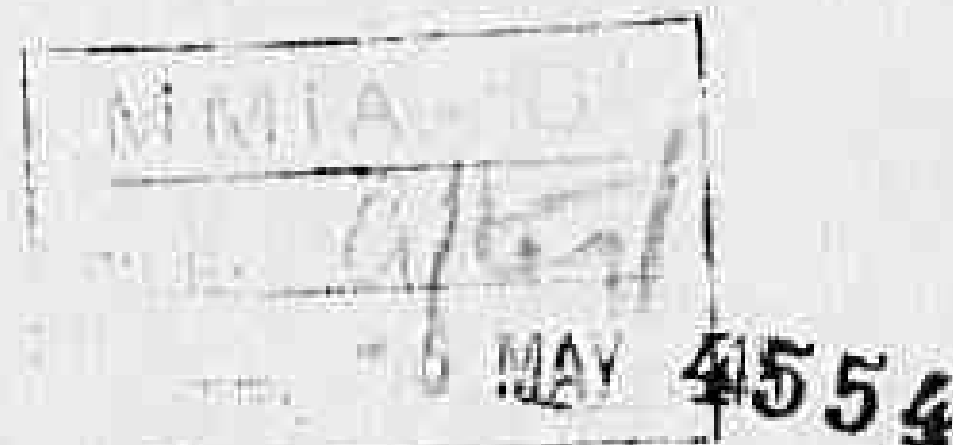

WAR OFFICE POLICY.

2. War Office have stated that their policy with regard to the training establishment requirements of CME after the defeat of GERMANY is broadly as follows :-

- (a) An allotment of vacancies at UK schools of instruction will be made to CME. One advantage of this procedure is that it will enable personnel sent on courses to UK to be given leave in UK.
- (b) CME training establishments will be disbanded on a phased timetable subject to any special requirements and commitments within CME.
- (c) At a later stage instructors from UK and/or SEAC will be posted to MIDDLE EAST schools, which will then be in a position to cater for All Arms. Some allotment to this theatre may then be made from MIDDLE EAST Schools.

AFHQ POLICY.

3. The following factors have been taken into consideration in the formulation of the policy regarding the future of training establishments in this theatre :-

- (a) The implications of the War Office policy.
- (b) The special commitments and requirements of certain Arms and Services.
- (c) The need for the utmost economy in manpower in the theatre.
- (d) The very considerable dislocation which will arise in all formations and units resulting from "sorting", release scheme, movement ex ITALY, duties in connection with the occupational role of formations and units, etc.
- (e) The movement of personnel attending courses.
- (f) The present location of CME training establishments, and the time factor involved before they could be moved and established in closer proximity to the Army of occupation.

NOTE PLAIN.

4. It has been decided therefore, that the policy will be to close down all schools of instruction under AFHQ control on a phased timetable, having regard to the factors in para 3 above, as follows

6. LIST. COMES. District, Area and Sub-Area commanders will not be responsible for the training of Italian troops (except insofar as local admin assistance can be provided) unless specifically ordered by AFHQ. They will, however, be prepared to assist MIA in the training of service troops insofar as is possible.

7. ITALIAN AUTHORITIES. The implementation of training schemes, the provision, allocation and training of instructors will be the responsibility of the Italian War Ministry under the supervision of MIA as in paragraph 3 above.

8. US - ITIS. Where the training of US-ITIS requires coordination with the Italian War Ministry, this will be done through MIA.

7. ITALIAN AUTHORITIES.

8. US - ITIS.

Italian personnel of the Combat Groups and the Rft Trg Centre Italian Combat Force will be trained in defense against gas warfare to the standard required for British soldiers as outlined in "Gas Training, 1942" Section 2 para 1. This training will be included in the normal training programmes of all ranks.
2. The scale of personal anti-gas equipment will be as shown at Appendix 'A'.
3. (a) A special course is being organised at the Chemical Warfare School CWTSC to train the necessary instructors.
(b) Personnel to attend this course will be drawn from Combat Groups and the Reinforcement Training Centre ICF.
(c) The number of vacancies allotted to each Combat Group and the Rft Trg Centre will be forwarded later together with joining instructions.
(d) A small trg team consisting of one officer and two senior NCOs is being formed and will be available to Combat Groups w.e.f. a date to be announced later.
4. On return to their units the Instructors trained at the CWTSC will organise cadres of Junior leaders who will be trained to give unit instruction.
5. All respirators will be tested in a gas chamber as soon as possible after issue.
6. Extracts from "Gas Training 1942" are being translated and will be issued, when available, to all instructors.
