SUBJECT:- Modena C.A.R.

(Reference letter G/TRG/27/5/LF of 3rd inst)

At the time of the recent call-up, it was noticed that there was an excessive number of men in the barracks at Modena C.A.R., so as to form a danger in case of infectious diseases, and, at any rate, a hindrance to the normal running of the unit.

This inconvenience is existing during the preliminary training period, while it is reduced or eliminated at the beginning of advanced training.

While this S.M. is arranging a better permanent organisation of the C.A.R. under the command of Udine Military Territorial Command, the adoption of particular measures to avoid this inconvenience at the time of the next call-up (beginning 12 May) is considered necessary.

For this period it is necessary that Modena C.A.R. is put in a condition of meeting the situation which will ensue, reducing within the limits of possibility any amassing in the unit.

For this purpose we beg you:

- to examine the possibility of reducing the congestion in the barracks at Modena by concentrating a greater portion of the unit's strength at the detachment at Sacile (during the last year this detachment could accommodate six companies in place of the four on the W.E.);
- to recur, if necessary, to temporarily using the buildings normally used for classrooms, as entirely or partly as dormitories during the period of preliminary training.

We wish to be informed what is done as regards the matter.

1. The selection of MODENA for the detachment of V CAS was made, I know, because no suitable accommodation exists in V Territorial Command, and your Ministry have repaired these barracks so as to make them as suitable as possible.

But in my opinion the barrack rooms for the recruits are overcrowded to the point of danger, and a very grave risk is being run in allowing so many men to sleep under such conditions.

2. I know this will be eased after the first month of the course, but even so the danger of infection spreading and causing a severe epidemic should be considered in all seriousness. In this small town several married men have their wives living with them and seem perfectly happy.

INSTRUCTIONS

The usual tale of woe about the graduatis is heard. They are very short.

TRANSPORT

Transport seems rather short and the C.O. not quite satisfied with his share of the MODENA establishment. I took this point up whilst at MODENA.

TRAINING

I saw one squad undergoing Bren Gun instruction. The instructor, a Maresciallo, was very good. Indeed he would have been a good instructor in any Army.

CONCLUSION

I think this branch C.A.R. will function well once it is over it's teething troubles.

The recruits certainly looked happy and they live in ideal surroundings.

REPORT ON VISIT TO MODENA BRANCH OF 5 C.A.R.
ON 16 - 27 APR BY GSO I (TRG)

1. GENERAL

This CAR is bad. It is very evident that the many external problems (mainly the city's Communists) are weighing heavily on the Commander's mind. He has however obviously tried to get things into some shape and has partially succeeded.

2. ACCOMMODATION

This is very overcrowded and not good. The Bk rooms appear to be very largely converted stables and coach houses. There is a bad risk from overcrowding when it gets slightly warmer.

3. MESSES AND COOKHOUSES

Cookhouses are not good. They are too small. Good ranges are fitted but not enough. Drainage is bad and larders are not properly protected against flies etc. The Sottuficialis and Officers Mess outside Barracks. The Officers Mess which I saw was a very small, crowded and dirty room. The C.O. explained that he used it because it saved his Officers money.

4. ACCOMMODATION FOR OFFICERS AND SPECIALISTS

This also was bad; very bad for NCOs, who were crowded 16 to a tiny room in double file Bunks. They could not possibly have had a self respect under such conditions.

5. TRAINING

Squads were too large and Cpls i/c squads were very bad. I saw one Cpl teaching Bren Sightsetting. The recruits were being taught to adjust the sights in the firing position, using the right hand over the top of the Gun. I asked the Officer if this was correct and he said yes - Obviously he did not know - Another squad were doing rifle instruction. Aiming at an eye disc. The instructor was letting them aim and dismissing them without criticising their aim. He said he meant to criticise them all later, but he took no notes. The drill being done was very bad.

Training areas are hopeless.

6. CONCLUSION

The instruction was bad. I believe this is a result of the shocking conditions. No one has time to be interested in such things when their own personal comfort does not exist.

7. I recommend the strongest possible action on our part to move this

 (16 - 27 APR 1950) (SHE)

1. GENERAL SITUATION OF BARRACKS

From being in a very bad state 3 months ago the Barracks are now in an excellent condition. The last few remaining jobs are being done. Barrack rooms are dry and pleasant. Dining Hall etc. are most adequate as also are the recreation room and canteen. New drains are being installed and cockroaches are exterminated. The local terrain is good and there appears to be suitable ground for field firing.

2. COMPLAINTS

In this Barracks it is of a particularly high order. The C.O. is most interested in the subject and has obviously been to great pains to ensure that the recruit makes for nothing.

In the town he has been presented with a large house which is being converted into a house for the C.O. When completed this will be excellent. The C.O. is establishing a library for the men and the civilians have been encouraged to contribute.

This Barracks is an offshoot of MUMBAI and has not had its full share of the U.M. personnel. The C.O. employs large numbers of women in Barracks, as cooks, waitresses and canteen attendants. They certainly produce appetizing meals out of the ration.

3. RAISES

7. TRANSPORT

Transport seems rather short and the C.O. not quite satisfied with his share of the MURRIA establishment. I took this point up whilst at MURRIA.

8. SUMMARY

I saw one squad undergoing Bren Gun instruction. The instructor, a Maresciallo, was very good. Indeed he would have been a good instructor in any army.

9. CONCLUSION

I think this branch C.A.R. will function well once it is over its teething troubles.

The recruits certainly looked happy and they live in ideal surroundings.
