

The proceedings opened with an inspection of all recruits by General de Castiglioni.

Following the arrival of S.E. the Cardinal and civil dignitaries among whom were the High Commissioner of Sicily the Vice President, ill-westone, the Director of Education and representation of ex-soldiers and war veterans societies the parade was drawn up on four sides of memorial stone erected in memory of "Uivo Scianna" a Sicilian soldier who was awarded the Gold medal in the last war and in whose honour the barracks have been named. After the dedication of the stone by the Cardinal addresses were delivered by General de Castiglioni and Colonel Alfieri Commandant of the J.M.R. This was followed by F.I. demonstrations by two Companies and a mock attack under cover of smoke by members of the staff of the J.M.R.

The guests were then conducted on a tour of the barracks where much originality had been displayed in their decoration and there obviously existed a keen spirit of competition between Companies.

The Company "artists" had been given a free hand with some of the barrack room walls and the results varied between the highly artistic - the soundly practical and the mildly monographic.

This tour of the barracks gave about 500 of the recruits opportunity to change into P.P. kit and by this time the Party reached the "Canto Ginnastico" a foot-ball match was in progress and one of the most enthusiastic displays which I have ever witnessed was in full swing - with the J.M.R. Jane orchestra "giving of its best".

After this followed a distribution of ice cream to the recruits and everyone else present and a recruit carried round his dinner tray among the guests and invited them to sample the fare which we were assured was exactly his correct ration.

I. THE CALL-UP

This call-up was 100% successful. The full number of recruits was obtained. There were no serious incidents during the call-up period and the morale and discipline of recruits was high.

II. GENERAL REMARKS ON THE C.A.R.

All comments on the C.A.R. are completely overshadowed by the fact that the buildings are at present incomplete by over 50% and are unlikely to be completed for at least 6 months. This is in no way due to the local Territorial Commander and his staff who have done all they can to get the necessary work carried out.

The fault lies in the original selection of CAS LA ROCCA for the C.A.R. So much work was required to put this very incomplete Barracks into a state to hold 4,000 men and provide all the necessary installations for a training centre that it should have been obvious that the Barracks could not possibly be ready in time. This was recognised and reported by No. 11 BLU from early January onwards.

III. TEMPORARY ACCOMMODATION ARRANGEMENTS

Owing to lack of accommodation at CAS. LA ROCCA only half the recruits (2 Battalions of 3 Companies each) are quartered there. The remaining half (1 Battalion of 6 Companies) are temporarily quartered 2 miles away in another Barracks which they share with an Infantry unit of the AOSTA I.S. Division.

IV. DETAILS OF ACCOMMODATION AT CAS. LA ROCCA

For complete details see Appendix 'A'.

- (a) The Barracks are filled with workmen during working hours.
- (b) Incomplete buildings and piles of construction material etc. alternate with completed buildings in occupation of C.A.R.
- (c) Water pressure is insufficient at present to provide water for lavatories and ablutions on the top storey. These are consequently not in use and those on the ground floor are over-crowded. Territorial Command hopes to overcome this by a temporary pumping arrangement shortly.
- (d) Barrack rooms are over-crowded. This will adjust itself at the end of the month when non-infantry elements leave for Central Schools.
- (e) The following buildings and installations are not yet ready in addition to the actual Barrack room accommodation required for Battalion at present housed elsewhere.

V. DETAILS OF ACCOMMODATION AT TEMPORARY BARRACKS

With the exception of a certain amount of over-crowding, which will adjust itself in May on the departure of the non-infantry elements, accommodation is reasonably adequate but suffers from the disadvantage that the recruits share a Barracks with an Internal Security Unit whose general standard of clothing and equipment is considerably lower than that of the recruits. This is bound to have an adverse effect on morale.

VI. TRAINING:

- (a) The lack of readiness of the C.A.R. in every way and the necessity for improvisation in all fields has resulted in the training programme being behind schedule.
- (b) Training on the whole however appears to be thorough, within the limits set by the rather poor quality of many of the instructors particularly in the junior ranks. The bearing of the men on parade is smart and soldierly and a general appearance of organised activity is very noticeable throughout the parade grounds during working hours.
- (c) Instructor situation allows of squads of 18 to 20 men.
- (d) P.T. instruction has been hampered by the absence of CESANO trained instructors but an officer and NCO instructor from CESANO are due to arrive shortly.
- (e) There appeared to be a general tendency for instructors to keep their squads standing during periods of a "lecturette" nature instead of allowing them to sit down.
- (f) Ranges and Assault courses are not yet complete.

VII. ADMINISTRATION:

Subject to the limitations set by lack of completion of many essential installations and the necessity for improvisation, administration appeared to be sound and hygiene to be receiving adequate attention.

VIII. CONCLUSION:

When all work on the C.A.R. buildings has been completed the C.A.R. will be well housed, in up-to-date and well equipped barracks subject to the following deficiencies for which present plans do not apparently cater.

- (a) Lack of accommodation for married families of officers and other ranks of the permanent staff.
- (b) Insufficient barrack room accommodation to prevent over-crowding if numbers are maintained at present peak.
- (c) No facilities for wet weather instruction other than in Dining Halls.
- (d) No large room for Lectures, Cinema, Concerts etc. - 555?
- (e) Cramped Officer's Mess and insufficient accommodation in Barracks for un-married officers.

Herewith a report on conditions at No. 11. A.R. Palermo, and suggestions for immediate steps to improve its standard.

GENERAL.

The new Colonel Commandant is, I think, a most excellent officer and certainly has done all he possibly can under the present conditions, but he is badly handicapped by certain circumstances. The instructors are still working very hard, but also under great difficulties.

1. ACCOMMODATION.

Owing to local shortages labour strikes and the lack of payment of contractors by the Ministry of War, the building is only progressing very slowly. Sufficient money has not been received by the Ministry of War to commence work on the S.M. Training Area and rifle Range or the additional barracks accommodation.

Accommodation is totally inadequate for the vast number of recruits being trained, this takes into consideration the fact that many recruits are living in the barracks of the 129th Regiment: it has been reported to me that this is a very bad regiment and is affecting the morale of the recruits.

At present 53 men are sleeping in each section of the barrack rooms in double tier beds, with all beds touching.

As a result of this overcrowding hygiene is very bad. (see para:2).

The following are my very strong recommendations for the immediate improvement of conditions:-

These figures were arrived at after taking the following facts into account:-

- c) P.L. The P.L. has suffered greatly owing to the fact that there is no sports equipment.

Action taken:- Sports kit has been purchased in Naples, but so far has not arrived. It is hoped that it will be sufficient for the next intake. Any sports equipment which can be provided by home would be a great asset.

(d) Weapon Training. Weapon training has been greatly hampered by lack of equipment and ammunition. The instructors have however done a great deal of improvisation since the arrival of the new commandant.

The following equipment is currently required:-

Aim corrections are required to the scale of one per recruit.
303 drill cartridges required to scale of 10 per recruit.

Equipment. There are no drill bombs, no inert bombs and no practice shot. These are required urgently as the scale of live ammunition is so small.

(e) Ammunition and Explosives.

General. There is shortage of ammunition and explosives, the latter although promised have not yet arrived. The main deficiencies are enumerated below:-

i. 2 inch Mortar: B.S. none held - a small quantity is required for demonstration purposes.

Flame Parachute. None held a small quantity is required is required for demonstration purposes.

Smoke. There is only enough ammunition for 17% of the recruits to fire 2 bombs each. This I consider totally inadequate.

ii. Grenades. No.36. Enough held on the scale of one live grenade per recruit. Sufficient extra grenades are urgently required to make practice grenades and sectional models. No.77. None held. I consider these of the most vital importance for assault course training and section fieldwork. Can some be issued immediately. Explosives, detonators, miners, safety fuse etc: as 9 or 77 Grenade. These have been requisitioned but have not arrived.

3. 203 Ammunition. The allotment of .303 ball is adequate. Under a percentage of tracer ammunition is required for demonstration purposes, none is held.

Explosives, detonators, primers, safety fuse etc: As for 77 grenade. These have been requisitioned but have not arrived.

3. 100 ammunition. The allotment of 300 ball is adequate?

Present a percentage of tracer ammunition is required for demonstration purposes, none is held.

(g) Armourer. There is a civilian armourer who says that he is not very experienced in British weapons, but it is impossible to judge his ability because he is unable to work owing to complete absence of tools and spare parts.
These are urgently required.

4. DRESS AND EQUIPMENT.

Each recruit is at present in possession of:-

- 1 Green winter battle dress - at present used for training.
- 1 shirt (Ibelian type) or ceremonial and walking out.
- 1 pr. boots, 1t. AC reserve.

The battle dress and woollen shirts are much too heavy for wear during training in such a hot climate. I have suggested and the colonel has requested that P.I. shorts, shorts and shoes be issued and used for normal training. This would be more hygienic and improve the standard of training.
The issue of shorts has been approved, but not yet received.
These are required urgently.

CONCLUSION.

In conclusion I would like to draw a comparison between the most excellent C.A.R. at Orvieto and 11 C.A.R. PALERMO.
The reasons for the great difference between these 2 establishments are in my opinion, the following:-

1. From beginning Orvieto had an excellent colonel commandant.
2. Orvieto had ideal accommodation with plenty of space.
3. Recruits at Orvieto were of a higher educational standard.
- + . Orvieto had a virtually unlimited supply of money for improvements taking into consideration the fact that they had to spend very little money on buildings, cinemas, theatres, gymnasiums etc.
- They were therefore able to spend their money ad.lib. **55388**
kit, newspapers and other welfare amenities.

All I am asking in the above report is that the C.A.R. at Palermo should be given the same equipment and opportunity as the other C.A.R.'s in Italy.

I am not asking for anything extra only for bare necessities

complete absence of tools and spare parts.
These are urgently required.

MOVING AND URGENT

Each recruit is at present in possession of:-
1 green winter battle dress - at present used for training.
1 suit I.D. (Italian type) for ceremonial and visiting out.

1 pair boots, with 10% reserve.

The battle dress and woollen shirts are much too heavy for wear during training in such a hot climate. I have suggested and the colonel has requested that T.M. shorts, singlets and shoes be issued and used for normal training. This would be more hygienic and improve the standard of training.
The issue of shorts has been approved, but not yet received.
These are required urgently.

CONCLUSION.

In conclusion I would like to draw a comparison between the most excellent C.A.R. at Orvieto and the J.A.A. at Palermo.
The reasons for the great difference between these 2 establishments are in my opinion, the following:-

1. From beginning Orvieto had an excellent colonel commandant.
2. Orvieto had ideal accommodation with plenty of space.
3. Recruits at Orvieto were of a higher educational standard.
4. Orvieto had a virtually unlimited supply of money for improvements taking into consideration the fact that they had to spend very little money on buildings, cinemas, theatres, gymnasiums etc.

They were therefore able to spend their money ad lib. **5588** to kit, newshavers and other welfare amenities.

All I am asking in the above report is that the C.A.R. at Palermo should be given the same equipment and opportunity as the other C.A.R.'s in Italy.

I am not asking for anything extra only for bare necessities to bring training to a reasonable standard.

I have read from previous 11. B.L.U. Progress Reports that the situation at 11. C.A.R. has not been regarded as satisfactory for some time and that suggestions have been made for the replacement of the Commandant Colonel Longo Francesco.

From my own observations I consider that the criticisms levelled at this Officer are entirely justified and that his replacement is now most urgent if the first batch of recruits is going to achieve anything like the required standard of training in time.

The actual building of the C.A.R. has made good progress and although conditions and still somewhat crowded, there are now an adequate number of showers in working order etc. and there is really nothing lacking which would interfere with training.

General slackness is, however, apparent everywhere and the organisation of training and the training programmes leaves much to be desired.

When I was taking leave of the Commandant and some of his Officers, on the occasion of my last visit to 11 C.A.R., a number of recruits, hatless, and for the most part with their hands in their pockets, gathered round to listen to the conversation. When I asked that they should be ordered to move away the Commandant turned and more or less drove them away himself - as we passed the gate a member of the guard was "picking out" a dance tune on the trumpet.

Attached is a copy of the Training Programme published by 11 C.A.R. for the period 13-19 May.

It does not conform with the official programme for 2nd week advanced training but when we visited every Company on their training ground on the afternoon of May 15 even this programme was not being carried out.

I. THE CALL-UP

This call-up was 100% successful. The full number of recruits was obtained. There were no serious incidents during the call-up period and the morale and discipline of recruits was high.

II. GENERAL NOTES ON THE C.A.R.

All comments on the C.A.R. are completely overshadowed by the fact that the buildings are at present incomplete by over 50% and are unlikely to be completed for at least 6 months. This is to no way due to the Local Territorial Commander and his staff who have done all they can to get the necessary work carried out.

The result lies in the original solution of C.I.D. in regard for the C.A.R. so much work was required to put this very incomplete Barracks into a state to hold 4,000 men and provide all the necessary installations for a training centre that it should have been obvious that the Barracks could not possibly be ready in time. This was recognised and reported by No. 11 RLU from early January onwards.

III. TEMPORARY ACCOMMODATION ARRANGEMENTS

Owing to lack of accommodation at C.A.S. 1st RCCA only half the recruits (2 Battalions of 3 Companies each) are quartered there. The remaining half (1 Battalion of 6 Companies) are temporarily quartered 2 miles away in another Barracks which they share with an Infantry unit of the SCOTIA T.S. Division.

With the exception of a certain amount of over-copying, which will adjust itself in view of the nature of the confidential elements, accommodation is reasonably adequate but before final adjustment, first the requirements should be discussed with an Internal Security Lawyer, then those general standards of closeness and confidentiality of communications which are reasonable. This is to be done in accordance with those recommendations of the General Security Board.

VI.

STORING

- (a) The loss of records of the C.A.R. in every way and the necessary protection of all fields has resulted in the following procedure:
- (b) Training on the single however accounts to be transferred within the limits set by the General Security Board or part of the organization for instructions to keep them in the junctions. The bearing of the files on security and safety and well as to the personnel of the organization is as follows:
- (c) Instructional situation allows of storage of 15 to 20 men.
- (d) P.W. instruction has been arranged by the absence of records to be stored in the junctions. The bearing of the files on security and safety and well as to the personnel of the organization is as follows:
- (e) It is proposed to be a general tendency for instructions to keep them in separate storeys.

VII.

MOVING

Subject to the limitations set by loss of completion of many essential installations and the necessity for liaison, it is recommended that to be stored and weighed to be maintained at present points.

VIII.

CONCLUDING

From all work on the C.A.R. buildings has been completed the C.A.R. will be well housed, in up-to-date and well equipped barracks and sheet to the following deficiencies for which present do not immediately call for:

- (a) Loss of communication, or medical supplies of officers and other ranks as the following date, for protection, etc.
- (b) Insufficient barracks room, accommodation to prevent overcrowding, etc., buildings are maintained at present points.
- (c) No solicitor for wet weather insertion other than in dining 5529 5528
- (d) No large room for lectures, Cinema, Concerts etc.
- (e) Granted Officer's Mess and Insubordinate accommodation in Barracks for unattached officers.

(b) Training on the whole however appears to be thorough & well. In the limits set by the native home quality of most of the instructors particularly in the junior ranks, the bearing of the men on parodo is smart and soldierly and a general appearance of organised activity is very noticeable throughout the parade grounds during training hours.

(c) Instructor situation allows of squads of 15 to 20 men.

(d) I.C. Instruction has been inspired by the absence of "shallow trained" instructors but an officer and NCO instructor from ORMAN are due to arrive shortly.

(e) There appears to be a general tendency for instructors to keep their squads standing during periods of a "lecture's" nature instead of allowing them to sit down.

(f) Ranges and assault courses are not yet complete.

VII. DISPOSITION

Subject to the limitations set by lack of completion of many essential installations and the necessity for improvisation, administration appears to be sound and vigorous to be receiving adequate attention.

VIII. CONCLUSION





1) Barrack Accommodation.

1) On or about the middle of November 45, after SHAE had ordered to carry out simultaneously the call up of the 2nd. and 3rd tour months of the class 1924 and to create, in the Military Territorial Commands, the regional training centres, the Military Territorial Command of Palermo was faced with the problem of accommodation for double the strength estimated (4000 men instead of 2000).

That problem is not a simple one to solve since ~~none~~ of the barracks at Palermo can accommodate a strength above 2000 men.

Hence, we had two alternatives:-

- or increase accommodation space in building up new constructions in one of the barracks: that would not have permitted to have a barrack adequate to the requirement of a material and moral life of the new centre.
