February 1944, addressed to the Army General Staff by the Supreme Command and signed by Field Marshal Messe, that notified officially, for the first time, that A.T.H.Q. had laid down that the fighting Division should be changed into pioneer and sapper engineer units.

It is from that date then, and no previous one, that, in my opinion, the division should be considered disbanded and consequently

demobilised, if it is not considered more fair to fix said demobilisation date as the 3rd. of April, the date on which I officially informed the assembled officers and men of the decisions referred to in letter 11280, previously quoted, and actual operations for the forming of the pioneer units were commenced.

I consider that this same limit should, in the name of justice, be fixed from the point of view of awards of the War Cross.

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I communicated the above to the troops during my mission in Palestine and they heard with lively satisfaction this further measure by the government in their favour.

It does not seem, however, that the promise has been maintained, and that the extra pay has only been given to the very few who have so far been repatriated.

I have received some correspondence on the matter; the latest letter complaining of the lack of the extra pay was sent to me last month by Pte. Boschirolli Augusto dixCremia (enclosure 5)

General Mario SOLDARELLI - former G.O.C. of the "Cuneo" Division in Egypt in 1943 - has forwarded to me a new, detailed, report, a copy of which I enclose, in respect of the situation of the troops of the "Cuneo" and "Regina" Divisions who are at present held in camps in Egypt as "prisoners of war - cooperators".

General Soldarelli once more urges the intervention of the Ministry of War in this delicate and controversial question, thus to obtain from the Allied Authorities:

- the rapid repatriation of the above mentioned troops;
  - recognition, in their favour, of the "status" of cobelligerant, formerly granted them, rather than that of prisoner-of-war - cooperator.

The said General also submits and urges other measures which come within the sphere of influence and possibilities of my Ministry and the Ministry of Post-War Assistance and which, therefore, will be seen to direct.

The situation pointed out in the enclosed report has already, in the past, been made known to the Presidency of the Council of Ministers in letters 204386/11 of the 26th October 1944, and 200287/11, 207172/11, 220170/11, dated 14th January, 25th March, and 15th September, 1945, respectively.

Radio messages of goodwill and faith, directed to the troops of the above mentioned divisions to testify to the remembrance *W.F.M.*

and interest ~~of~~, the central military Authorities, were sent out, in the name of Minister Casseti and myself, in April and September last.

Up till June 1944, the Allied Control Commission was approached, in agreement with the then Supreme Command, for authorisation for the dispatch to the Middle East of a Colonel, as representative of the Ministry of War, with the duties of welfare and disciplinary control in respect of the troops in question. After lengthy negotiations the dispatch of Colonel Tiberi was authorised; the mission entrusted to him was practically never commenced, insofaras, as is known, he was stopped, as soon as he arrived in Egypt, by the Allied Command in the Middle East, which, not recognising the duties entrusted to him by M.M.I.A., placed him in a dilemma - to return to Italy immediately or retention "in loco" as a prisoner of war.

Similar negative results were obtained to requests put forward in the past by numerous men of the two divisions to participate, at home, in the war of liberation; on this particular matter the Presidency of the Council was also approached, in the above quoted letter, No. 200287/11 of the 14th January 1945.

Finally, in agreement with the Ministry of Post-War Assistance (then still the High Commissariat for Prisoners of War), further negotiations were entered into with the P.O.W. Subcommission of the Allied Commission with the object of obtaining the rapid repatriation of the troops in question. This step also failed to reach the desired end so that, despite the promises and interest of the said Sub-commission, nothing was obtained.

a. Represent to higher and other headquarters, requests (if any) from the Italian Ministry of War for Allied assistance where Italian military resources are insufficient to cope with the number of P/W being repatriated at any one time, e.g. requests for the use of transport, handing over of buildings requisitioned by the Allies, and camp equipment for reception centres etc.

b. Complete arrangements with Allied Commission for the feeding of repatriated Italian P/W from civilian ration stocks prior to re-enlistment or demobilization.

c. Ensure that arrangements are made by the Italian Ministry of War and Territorial Headquarters for the taking over of the P/W at ship-side (and/or railway terminals), at which point respective US and British responsibility cease.

3. Effective that date, Allied Commission will transfer to MIA the personnel of the Italian Prisoners of War Division.

4. The primary task of MIA remains the direction and training of the new Italian Army and the new commitment must not interfere with the performance of this task.

It has been agreed between the Italian and Albanian Governments to send an Italian Mission to Albania for sending home and assisting Italian civilians and soldiers.


The Ministry for Foreign Affairs with a "telespresso" N.61/7879/333 of July 1st, in communicating that the mission presided over by the Consul General Turcato, is ready to leave for Albania having obtained the approval of the Allies, requests to be given 45,000 Albanian francs, to be assigned to the said Consul for the first needs (renting of office, furnishing of same retribution to local employees advances on allowances, office expenses, etc.).

At the Ministerial meeting of April 14th last it was decided to put at the disposition of the mission, for the first 6 months, the amount of 1,000,000 Albanian francs to be obtained by the payments of those Italians who when returning to Italy will ask to transfer their fortunes, reimbursable in Italy in Italian currency. With reference to above and keeping in mind the necessity of sending this mission, your Allied Finance Sub-Commission is requested to give its opinion about the assignment of 45,000 Albanian francs which the Istcambi would put at their disposition and also about the use as above stated of 1,000,000 Albanian francs.





According to recent information the condition of those soldiers have not improved; on the contrary the fact that no alteration has taken place in the preceding state of affairs, the long privations and the belief that no practical assistance is being afforded them by their Country have inevitably produced a further deterioration in their already distressing material and moral situation.

3. The Ministry of Foreign Affairs beg to reassert their belief that an equitable and humanitarian solution of this latter problem can be reached only with the repatriation of the soldiers to Italy and they have again interested the French Embassy to this effect.

In the meanwhile, the Ministry for Foreign Affairs would be very grateful if the Allied Commission would kindly acquaint them with the steps which, on their part, they may have seen fit to take in the matter.

Further to this morning's conversation, I detail hereunder agreements made by me at Tirana with the Chief of the Albanian Government, Col Gen ENVER HOXHA.

(a) The Albanian Government adheres to the proposed repatriation of all Italian subjects residing in Albania with the exception of Italian enterprises and specialised enterprises which are indispensable for the reconstruction of the country.

(b) The repatriation will be carried out in groups with effect from 15th April 45 and in the following order :~

- (1) All military personnel (including those incorporated in the "GRAMSCI" Brigade and in the two Batteries stationed at Tirana) and sick personnel.
- (2) A group of approximately 10,000 civilians.
- (3) All remaining civilians.

(c) Nominal rolls of repatriated subjects will be forwarded as soon as possible to the Albanian Government by General PICCINI.

(d) Italian subjects to be repatriated will be authorized to take away with them their belongings, furniture and personal effects.

(e) The Albanian Government will inform the Italian Government the categories of specialized men together with the number of men required of each category whom they will consider necessary to retain for the reconstruction of the country.

The Albanian Government agrees that the Italian Government may replace specialists remaining in Albania and who desire to be repatriated, with other specialists of the same category.

Italian workers remaining in Albania or those who go there from Italy will be in possession of a regular working contract in which their pay will be shown. The clauses of this contract will be made out with the agreement by both parties.

I shall be grateful to hear your proposals with regard to the practical carrying out of the repatriation in question.

SUBJECT: Signor PALERMO, Italian Government Under-Secretary of State for War.

Ref. AFHQ letter file G-5: 300.4-4 dated 21 March 45, subject as above.

1. In so far as this Headquarters is concerned, the matter of Palermo's unauthorized visit to Albania has been thoroughly investigated. In brief, there is no record of any specific authority ever having been given by this Headquarters for such a visit. Originally, an Air Forces Sub-Commission operational report disclosed that such a trip had been made. Accordingly, a full investigation was immediately instituted.

2. On 22 February 45 the former Political Section received a memorandum from the Minister of Foreign Affairs stating that within the next few days it was expected Signor Palermo would ask MMIA for permission, etc., for a brief journey to Tirana (see incl 1). The Political Section referred the memorandum to Land Forces Sub-Commission MMIA, and it was agreed that any expression of opinion on the proposed trip would be reserved until such time as the Minister of War directly approached MMIA (see incl 2). However, no such formal request was ever received by MMIA from the Minister of War and thus the matter was allowed to stand with no further following up.

3. Meanwhile, however, Air Forces Sub-Commission on 4 March 45 had received directly from the Italian Air Ministry a request for air transport facilities to be extended to Palermo in order that he might undertake an important Tirana trip (see incl 3). Believing that official permission for the trip had been settled on a much higher level, Air Forces Sub-Commission arranged to facilitate the passage. The request was accordingly referred to the Balkan Air Forces Movement Section (see incl 4), where, eventually, aircraft was provided for the trip.

4. It has been reported that, in accounting for his actions to the Prime Minister, Palermo stated permission had been obtained from Air Forces Sub-Commission AC. The Air Vice Marshal Bowen-Buscarlet, AOC, states that at no time was permission or any specific authorization given to Palermo for such a journey by Air Forces Sub-Commission. Your attention is further invited to the statement (see incl 5) made by Squadron Leader Bradshaw of Air Forces Sub-Commission, who handled the original inquiry.

5. It is understood that during his visit to MMIA (General Browning on 25 March 45, Palermo was to give an explanation of his visit to Albania; however, the minutes of this meeting do not disclose that any such explanation was given. A proposal of this, MMIA has this date (26 March) received from the Minister of War a proposed plan for repatriating Italian military and civilian personnel now residing in Albania. This plan, it is understood, was worked out by Palermo and Colonel General Horha, of the Albanian Government, during the recent Albanian trip. Action in

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regard to this plan is being held up pending the return of Major General Brown-  
ing the latter part of this week.

6. In order to help prevent recurrence of similar incidents, the Civil  
Affairs Section, this Headquarters, has prepared and submitted to your Section a  
plan for processing trip requests of Italian officials.

2. M.L.A. (TRAINING)

- (a) All officers, men and vehicles of R.T.U. at OXFORD will be kept by R.M.L.I. for transfer to TRG branch M.L.A. when R.M.L.I. is approved.
  - (b) D.M.L.I. will try to find a good G.S.C. I (Org) for M.L.A. and attach until posting is authorised by R.M.L.I.
  - (c) Agreed that, pending amalgamation or disbanding of TRG increments and battalions, each TRG increment would work under orders of its O/C M.L.I.
  - (d) D.M.L.I. will try and send a G.S.C. II (Org) to "P" BCU from those surplus to Combat Groups and notify M.L.A. his name.
  - (e) Special Section M.L.A. will take care of training matters till G.S.C. I (Org) arrives.
5. REPARATION OF ITALIAN P.R. OFFICERS from U.S. for duty with R.M.L.I. having been agreed in principle by S.A.C., M.L.I. will send names, numbers and conditions to G.S. (Org) soonest. R.M.L.I. will request repatriation by AIR (S.A.C. offered to ask S of S personally if necessary).
6. D.A.C. having agreed to examine application for Local rank of Colonel for O/C "P" BCU, M.L.I. to submit re-commission.
7. D.A.C. having supported the request for extra battle dress or denim for R.F.T.S. at R.T.C. GS (Org) will take up the question of a pool of 20,000 suits and notify M.L.I. result.
8. GS (Org) will take up at next S.A.C.'s decision to re-examine Italian army ration scale.
9. M.L.A. strong recommendations for division of responsibilities of R.T.C. GS and R.M.L.I. were considered and have been submitted to R.M.L.I. in writing.

- 10. M.L.I. awaits views of 15 Army Group before giving a ruling on M.L.I. proposals for the formation of partisan rescue units. It was agreed that the main object of this scheme was "to take the heat out of the problem," and that the organisation should achieve that object, which has as much a political as a military flavour.
- 11. GS (Org) was asked to ensure that M.L.A. was kept informed of any discussions on post-war Italian Army matters.

(e) Agreed that, pending amalgamation or disbanding of org inventories and units, each increment would work under orders of its O 1/c H.M.

(d) D.M.L. will try and send a C.C. II (Org) to "P" EU from those surplus to combat groups and notify MIA units.

(e) Special section MIA will take care of training matters till C.S.O. I (Org) arrives.

5. REPATRIATION OF ITALIAN P.W. OFFICERS from U.S. for duty with org, having been agreed in principle by C.C. II, MIA will send names, numbers and conditions to G.S. (Org) soonest. AFHQ will request repatriation by U.S.A.C. ordered to ask C.O.S personally if necessary).

6. C.A.C. having agreed to examine application for Local rank of Colonel for C.A/C "P" EU, MIA to submit recommendation.

7. D.M.L. having supported the request for extra battle dress or domino for AFHQ STAFF CO. GS (Org) will take up the question of a pool of 20,000 results and notify MIA result.

8. MIA strong recommendations for division of responsibilities of R.A.C. Command were considered and have been submitted to AFHQ in writing.

9. AFHQ awaits views of 15 Army Group before giving a ruling on 1/ proposals for the formation of British refugee units. It was agreed that the main object of this scheme was "to take the heat out of the problem," and that the organisation should achieve that object, which has as such a political as a military flavour.

10. GS (Org) was asked to ensure that MIA was kept informed of any discussions on post war Italian Army matters.

11. GS (Org) agreed to ensure that the GSO II (Lieutenant) appointment which M.I.A. proposed to transfer from MIA to "P" EU as D.M.L. referred only to the person of Major CHUDI and NOT to the appointment on the V.E. of MIA, which was still required.

12. GS (Org) will define the new new responsibilities of MIA in relation to D.M.L. D.M.L. will initiate action in this respect.

13. MIA management courses being organised by MIA will be in line with similar courses at MIA and MIA. Action MIA to produce certain proposals for AFHQ to consider.
