I. GENERAL.

1. Acknowledgment. This report is based on AC 091.71 C(SD)-O dated 2 Nov 45 and is intended for internal purposes only. It is intended for transmission and secondaries only. Future reports will be issued as and when the situation demands.

II. HISTORY.

2. ITALIAN Army. In accordance with the above instructions, responsibility for the organization, training and administration of the Italian Interior Army, including the CCB, was handed over to the ITALIAN Government at 2000 hrs on 14 Nov 45 (Article 1 of M.D. Directive No 1 of Nov 45). Operational command of troops stationed in territory not handed back to the ITALIAN Government (which included the five combat divisions and of 808 C.S. Bn), remained in the hands of Allied Force Headquarters. The Order of Battle on that date is shown in ITALIAN Army Strength State No 3/45.

III. MILITARY MISSION.

- (a) The Land Forces Sub Commission of the Allied Commission (ALCM), together with the five British Liaison Units formerly attached to the five combat divisions, were given the same date reorganized or reformed as outlined in new war establishments to provide:

- (i) The Headquarters of an Allied Military Mission within the Land Forces Sub Commission, L.C.,
- (ii) A British Liaison Unit (either type A or B) with each of the eleven ITALIAN Territorial Commands.

- (iii) The duties of the Sub Commission and of the military mission as laid down in M.D. Directive AC 091.71 C(SD)-O dated 3 Dec 45 have been made known to officers concerned and relevant information from this directive has been passed in accordance with Article 7 of M.D. Directive No 2 of 7 Dec 45.

IV. ORGANISATION.

1. Strength. The actual strength of the ITALIAN Army on 15 Nov 45 compared with the authorised ceiling was as follows:-

The responsibility for reorganisation and training of CC, etc., passed
to M.L. on 1 Nov 45 (AMO AG 014.12 SEC-6 dated 14 Oct 45 refers).
A CC, R.M. Sec of 12 Officers will be added to the M.E. of M.L.

Pending the arrival of those Officers, certain exploratory discussions have taken place between this HQ on the one hand and the Ministry of War and G.H.Q. CO.2 on the other.

Through Staff Tables have been prepared based entirely on existing Italian Pictures and MSS.

It is apparent that very considerable reorganisation is necessary.

9. Equipment Tables.

Provisional equipment tables for the Interim Italian Army M.R.C. were submitted to AFHQ with M.L. letter SD/109 of 6 Dec 45. These were based on such agreement as has so far been reached with Ministry of War, and are liable to modification when firm decisions have been given on the MSS concerned and the sources and types of equipment to be provided.

10. The Ministry of War.

It is apparent that the organisation of the War Ministry and S.M. is cumbersome and not entirely suitable to the needs of the future Italian Army.

It would not be advisable to effect any major reorganisation immediately, while the Army itself is in a state of flux, but certain essential readjustments are being recommended with a view to preparing the way for a complete overhaul at the proper time.

Up to date the only reorganisation recommended is the formation of a Training Directorate; the separation, within the GENIO branch, of Engineers and Signals for all operational purposes; and the removal from the Artillery branch of all the REIN and TIR functions which the Artillery now combines, a separate Directorate to be formed to deal with these functions.

It is not considered opportune to hurry the bigger reorganisation of the Ministry of War and S.M. until the formations, units and training establishments of the Army have themselves been reorganised and brought to settle down. This inversion of the normal process of reorganisation is unavoidable in present circumstances.

On the other hand, the reorganisation of the Ministry of War and S.M. presents a considerable problem, requiring much exploration and study. It is proposed to commence a full examination now with the War Ministry officials, so that an agreed cut and dried plan can be evolved in detail, for implementation when the time is ripe. The eventual outcome will require Italian legislative sanction.

IV. TRAINING.

11. Territorial Training Centres.

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IV.

11. Territorial Training Centres.

(a) A WT has been produced by the Ministry of War which will raise the figure for the Military Staff to take advantage of the additional 2,500 granted from the IS Peet ceiling. This is now being implemented.

(b) The training of instructors proceeds entirely according to plan and will probably reduce a surplus which could be posted to weak units (Independent Forces etc) to raise the standard there.

(c) Programmes are being worked out. British I.T.C. programme is being forwarded from UK for comparison.

- V. INSTITUTION
15. Training.
 Up to the present date the 1919 and 1920 classes have been
 dispersed. The T-11M authorities are anxious to disband the 1921,
 22 and 23 classes as soon as possible, (in fact for our convenience in the matter
 would preferable to do all over again). The structure of the Army will fall to
 10,000. Further amalgamation will not, however, take place until after
 the next call-up.

 course of 40,000; the first will take place in the winter of 1925

There are no recruits in existence for the 1926, 1927 and 1928 classes, but those are being prepared and will be ready by the end of 1946.

16. Conditions of Service

The Italians are of the opinion that out of the Army of 140,000, at least 50,000 must be long service permanent cadre, they would like to have up to 50% on a long service basis and 50% on a one year's conscript basis. At present only about 20% are permanent cadre.

It is unlikely that they will find sufficient volunteers for long service under existing conditions of service. Various suggestions have been put to the Ministry of War for improving conditions of service, covering both the period of actual service and the facilities that can be given to a man on discharge from the Army. The whole question is now under consideration by the Ministry of War, who are making a detailed study of the minimum number of personnel (Officers, Instructors, Specialists etc) required to form the long service permanent cadre. The eventual proposals will of course be subject to Italian Treasury approval and, therefore, the amount of increased cost of a regular over a conscript is being examined also.

17. Morale

The recent demobilisation of the 1919 and 1920 classes has had a favourable effect on morale. The Italian press generally speaking ignores its army and even tends to lower morale by working on the public and making them hostile to the Army. This is countered to some extent by the radio and by articles in a weekly paper sponsored by the Italian Government.

In all Italian morale reports, pay and allowances figure largely, and an examination of some of the pay anomalies makes the fact that the Italian Army has got some morale all the more surprising. A sweater of the Comune of Genoa gets Lire 6,237 a month, a manual labourer over 18 years 325 lire, Lire 6,000, a 2/Lt married without children Lire 5,984, and a Regular Army Colonel Lire 9,385. The importance of this aspect has been stressed to the Ministry of War. The matter is under active consideration.

18. Personal Services

The Italian Army Penal System has been revised and reformed under our guidance and Military Detention Barracks, a Military "Correction" Company and three Military Gaols have now been set up.

The administration of justice in the Italian Army has up to the present been almost non-existent. There are in round figures 175,000 military offenders awaiting trial. A solution to this problem is being sought in three ways. The strength of Military Tribunals has been increased. 19. Officers

Methods by which the standard of Officers in the Italian Army can be improved have been the subject of much correspondence and many conferences between MIA and the Ministry of War.

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It has been decided cut to the Ministry of War that it is essential that inefficient officers be compulsorily retired, and some form of accelerated promotion introduced. Both stems require the passing of a legislative decree.

The decree covering compulsory retirement has been drawn up and submitted to the Council of Ministers. The terms under which it is proposed to retire Officers are so generous however that the decree is meeting with opposition from the Treasury Minister.

The decree covering accelerated promotion has not yet been drawn up, and the Ministry of War are opposed to drawing it up until preparation is completed.

20. Appointment.

The limiting factor in regard to the organisation and training of the Interim Army is likely to be the provision of suitable buildings for barracks, Training Centres and Schools. This is due to:-

- (a) Continued occupation by Allied Troops.
- (b) Improper occupation by Allied Civil Authorities.
- (c) Bomb damage.

ATO are aware of this difficulty which was represented at Conference at CASERTA on 11 Dec 45. A decision regarding the ATO Training and Administrative points of view is awaited.

21. Transport.

The latter was referred to GHQ (U) at a conference on 11 Dec 45 and they result is omitted.

- (b) The control of the issue of vehicles and of No.1 Special Transport Co. is now in the hands of S.P.D but it is found necessary to keep close touch with their agencies in this matter and our advice is much appreciated.

- (c) Bids for P.O.I. and methods of distribution will be a major problem after 1 Jan 46. It is anticipated that a certain amount of Allied assistance will be needed for some time especially during the winter as the war ministry will be living from hand to mouth with no reserves.

23. Clothing and Equipment.

The provision of Army and Ammunition is still subject to high level discussions.

The provision of clothing for the Interim Army is the responsibility of the War Ministry for stocks already available or being released from C.E.M. and for stocks of cloth now becoming available. 3250

Clothing and boot making and repairing establishments are being maintained and extended.

The Comitato have been placed on the highest priority for the issue of boots, clothing and blankets, and an improvement has taken place.

24. Medical.

(a) Essential medical stores and supplies for the ITI-ITI Navy, Army and Air Force, which have not been available from British indigenous resources, have previously been supplied from British stocks. With the hand over of the Army to the Government, the War Ministry became responsible for provision of these stores from either surplus disposal agencies or the civil import programme.

In this manner, penicillin, which has not been available from British stocks for supply to the Armed Forces will be procured. In the meantime, arrangements have been made for the training of three Italian military surgeons in the use of this new drug.

(b) In formation has been received that the German Pharmaceutical Institute and Stores Depot at TERNIO will be turned over to the Italian Government when no longer required by the Allies. It is hoped, ultimately, that the Italian War Ministry will be able to resume production of medicinal stores in the Institute. Provisional lists of MEDICINE with equipment and stores from TERNIO.
