Complying with the orders issued by C.C. G.H.Q., Florence and Bologna Mobile Bns have established the light mobile workshops.

Exception made for the engine-lathe and the drill supplied by the Military authorities, the whole machinery has been directly bought from the local commerce on the scale established by C.C. G.H.Q.

The workshops, equipped with such machinery, are now regularly proceeding, performing daily small repairs to the vehicles on charge of the Enz.

Repairs of a certain entity have been also executed for serious necessities - i.e. the substitution of brass-bushes mounted on heavy trucks.

It should be born in mind anyhow that, after the assignment of Staghound A.C.'s of 1½ tons to the Mobile Bns, it would be necessary to equip the W.S.'s with the suitable machinery in order to enable them to execute repairs also for those vehicles.

Up to the present time the understated personnel is employed at the Workshops.

BOLGNA MOBILE BN

7 military of the Arma and 4 civilian workers paid with bills.

FLORENCE MOBILE BN

11 military of the Arma, -only few of them may be considered skilled; the remaining are improving by daily practice and filling their lacks of capacity with good will.

They are facing great difficulties in performing repairs with promptness owing to the absolute want of spare parts. In fact, all spare parts, including also the smallest and most usual ones, are either to be requested from the far Military Depots, or bought from the free market. Moreover, the lack of those spare parts in the free commerce and sometimes their high cost create interruptions and delays.

1. I can find no mention of a water truck in any correspondence relating to M.E.'s of Mobile Bn's, although in one suggested M.R. provision was made for the employment of a water duty man.
2. I would suggest that, in cases where Bns were likely to operate in "water less" areas, water to the scale of 1/2 gallon per man per day should be carried in cans on all 4 wheeled vechs. I should imagine that it would be most unlikely that cans could not be refilled once in 24 hours.
3. Requirements would be approx 65x4 gall cans, weight when filled about 30 cwt.

1. The provision of reserves of ammunition to be held at CC.RR. is receiving the close attention of this Headquarters and stocks will be more suitably distributed now that additional transport is available.
2. It is not proposed to recommend the issue of tear gas grenades for Carabinieri use, as it is considered that the provision of arms, machine guns and grenades are adequate for station defence.
3. Instructions have been given by G. Mq. CC.RR. that all personnel of Mob. Bns will return to their stations not later than the 30th April 46.
4. A translation of CC.RR. letter 170/83/1945 of the 21 Feb. 46 is attached herewith. The mobile battalions will not be used in normal combat situations. But the battalions can normally go in by my discretion to any 100% of the 10th Arm. Inf.

It must be understood that:

- (1) Local commandant offices will be protected by these battalions and training battalions who have the most numerous personnel. Their stations and positions will be kept in sufficiency in order.
- (2) If this is impossible or in sufficient, the mobile battalions will be used in re-inforcement purposes. This work will only be done by complete sections (quadra, platoon, or three) and in missions necessary of the situation, the move should be in convenient to the U.S. area in cities from which they cannot be destroyed.

The following instructions are given on the function of the mobile battalions, in order to eliminate fears of the A.C. during the later.

- (a) Normally, the Mobile Battalions will be used - partly or wholly - for special occasions. If the object of service is expected to be a very short one, the authority can be given by the Divisional Command. If it is expected to be a long period, the use of the mobile battalion will be previously authorized by the Commanding General.
- (b) In case a commander will use the mobile battalions in time of emergency, or when there is greater danger for the public security, only to such cities, the Legion commandants will be made aware and satisfied. They will inform at once, by signal, the Division Command and the General Command.
- (c) The mobile battalions of Italy and Sicilia can be used without any previous authority - by two specific commands for Italy and by the Leggeri Legion Command for Sicilia - the commanders will inform their Division Command and the general command every time they use the mobile battalions.

SUBJECT : Mobile Battalions.

TO : Division Command HQs.

The Mobile Battalions must not be used in normal re-inforcement services. Such instruction was previously given by my circular letter 170/80 of the 19th January 46.

Therefore it is understood that:

- (1) Normal re-inforcement duties will be performed by those Stations and "Training Sections" who have the most numerous personnel. Such stations and sections will be kept in efficiency and order.
- (2) If this is impossible or insufficient, the Mobile Battalions will be used on re-inforcement services. This work will only be done by complete sections (squads, platoons, companies) and on previous authority of the writer, who knows whether it is convenient to use M.B. men in duties from which they cannot be disengaged.

The following instructions are given on the functions of the Mobile Battalions, in order to clear some points of the a.m. circular letter:

(a) Normally, the Mobile Battalions will be used - partly or wholly - for special occasions. If the period of service is expected to be a very short one, the authority can be given by the Division Command HQ; if it expected to be a long period the use of the M.B. will be previously authorised by the Commanding General.

(b) The Legion Commanders will use the Mobile Battalions in cases of emergency, or when there is serious danger for the public security. Only in such cases, the Legion Commanders will act on their own initiative. They will inform at once, by signal, the Division Commands and the General Command.

(c) The Mobile Battalions of Sicily and Sardinia can be used without any previous authority by the Brigade Commander for Sicily, and by the Cagliari Legion Commander for Sardinia -. The Commanders will inform their Division Commands and the General Command every time they use the Mobile Battalions.



A MOBILE IN CCR - PROPOSED WIRELESS LAYOUT



1. With further reference to my report regarding the above subject dated 7 Feb 46 and the letter received from the Ministry of War dated 31 Jan 46, I have today discussed this subject with Col CELLI at the CC.RL Headquarters.

2. The suggestions set out in the Ministry of War communications of 31 Jan 46, are in fact the views of the Carabinieri as to the composition of the Carabinieri Mobile Battalions. Col CELLI said they had been drawn up by CC.RL Staff Officers, agreed to by the War Ministry and forwarded to M.I.A for approval.

3. Col CELLI said none of the transport had been supplied by the Ministry of War, and that the only promise he had received from the Ministry of War was the supplying of a small number of reconditioned Italian lorries, so far none have been received.

4. I pointed out that the number of vehicles shown in the suggested organisation of the Mobile Battalions would not move the proposed number of 519 Officers and men in "one lift". Col CELLI agreed and said that the reason the number of men had been reduced from 572 to 519 and the proposed amount of transport was so very modest, was because they were afraid that the Carabinieri would never receive sufficient reliable transport for anything more ambitious. Col CELLI said the Carabinieri hoped to be able to get this very modest amount of transport from the Ministry of War and the Allies.

5. Col CELLI said the strength of the Mobile Battalions depended entirely upon the transport available. It was no good planning to have 572 men and then only having transport to move 200 officers and men in "one lift".

6. Col CELLI appealed very strongly for transport to make the Mobile Battalions a success. He pointed out that while the Carabinieri had absolutely insufficient transport and most of what they had was old and worn out;

- (a) The Italian railways had been supplied with 6,000 new American lorries.

- (b) Several hundred excellent Italian and German lorries were in the hands of the Cooperativas in the North of Italy (Partisan Transport Cos.) These men in the Cooperativas and the persons running them were nearly all Communists and Socialists.

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4. I pointed out that the number of vehicles shown in the suggested organisation of the Mobile Battalions would not move the proposed number of 519 Officers and men in "one lift". Col CELLI agreed and said that the reason the number of men had been reduced from 578 to 519 and the proposed amount of transport was so very modest, was because they were afraid that the Carabinieri would never receive sufficient reliable transport for anything more ambitious. Col CELLI said the Carabinieri hoped to be able to get this very modest amount of transport from the Ministry of War and the Allies.

1. Reference the letter dated 31st January 1946, from the Italian War Ministry regarding the above subject.
2. Having examined the War Ministry suggestions for the composition of the Carabinieri Mobile Battalions, I would put the following points forward for your consideration.
3. The War Ministry proposes to arm each Battalion with only nine armoured cars and not twelve, which seems to be the figure agreed upon by A.M.C. and U.M.I.A.
4. The suggested total strength is only 519 Officers and men, and not 578 which is the figure always previously mentioned. I feel that 519 is too small in any case.
5. 30 machine guns are suggested and no mortars are included. I do not know if 30 machine guns are sufficient, but would most certainly advocate the inclusion of a few mortars. The Carabinieri are familiar with the Italian mortar and have a few in their arsenaries. I am informed that the Carabinieri are using them now in Sicily. I think they should be supplied with both smoke and H.S. mortar ammunition.
6. Only 165 men are shown as being armed with automatic rifles (Mitrini) and 275 men armed with the model 91 musket. Far too many men are to be served with Battalion be armed with an automatic rifle (Mitra) except:
- (a) Drivers of motor cars, light and heavy trucks, P.U.'s;
 - (b) Machine gun crews;
 - (c) Mortar crews;
 - (d) Workshop crews (These men could have muskets, when necessary).
7. I would suggest that two automatic rifles be carried in each armoured car, and one by each motor cyclist. (two per motor cycle crewman)
8. 47 motor cycles have been suggested, whereas 60 motor cycles are usually maintained for each mobile Battalion and in fact have been, or are being, issued to five mobile Battalions in the North.
9. The proposed transport is two motor cars, 18 light trucks, 6 heavy trucks, one workshop, and one P.U.. It seems very doubtful if the whole Battalion would be moved in one "lift". More transport, especially 15 ton lorries, not in two or more "lifts".
10. No doubt the "G" Staff Officers can work out how much transport will be required.

4. The suggested total strength is only 519 Officers and men, and not 578 which is the figure always previously mentioned. I feel that 519 is too small in any case.

6. Only 165 men are shown as being armed with automatic rifles (Mitrailleur) and 275 men armed with the model 91 musket. Far too many men are to be armed with muskets. I would suggest that every A.C.O. and Carabinieri in the Mobile Battalion be armed with an automatic rifle (Mitrailleur) except:
- (a) Drivers of motor cars, light and heavy trucks, P.U.'s;
 - (b) Machine gun crews;
 - (c) Mortar crews;
 - (d) Workshop crews (These men could have muskets, when necessary).
7. I would suggest that two automatic rifles be carried in each armoured car, and one by each motor cyclist. (two per motor cycle combination)
8. 47 motor cycles have been suggested, whereas 30 motor cycles are usually mentioned for each Mobile Battalion and in fact have been, or are being, issued ~~to~~ to five Mobile Battalions in the North.
9. The proposed transport is two motor cars, 18 light trucks, 3 heavy trucks, one workshop, and one P.U.. It seems very doubtful if the whole Battalion could be moved in one "lift". More transport, especially 15 ton lorries, would be required as it is essential to move the whole Battalion at once and not in two or more "lifts".
10. No doubt the "G" Staff Officers can work out how much transport will be required to move in one "lift" the whole Battalion, together with mortars, ammunition, and spare ammunition for the machine guns an automatic rifles.
11. Consideration will have to be given to the amount of transport likely to be available. I do not think it would be wise to plan a most ambitious Mobile Battalion if we have no hope of ever obtaining anything like the required amount of transport. This would be a big disappointment to the Carabinieri and loss of prestige on our part. Perhaps after consideration it may be found that the strength of the Battalions has to be reduced in order to make them completely mobile.
12. A further point to keep in mind is the providing of a reasonable amount of reliable transport for the remainder of the Carabinieri. There are only 700 men in the 12 Mobile Battalions out of a total of 6500. If little

new transport is given to the rest of the Carabinieri and the Mobile Battalions get the lion's share, then it will not get used in the way it is intended that it should be used.

13. Mobile Battalion transport will be used for all sorts of purposes in connection with the rest of the Carabinieri. Local Legion Commanders will never allow a number of lorries to stand idle in barracks, waiting in case the Mobile Battalion gets called out to a disturbance, when there is a tremendous shortage of transport for ordinary CC. In daily needs. We can never force the Carabinieri to use Mobile Battalion transport only for Mobile Battalion purposes if we neglect the rest of the Carabinieri. I would suggest that every consideration be given to this point when deciding upon allocations of transport for the Carabinieri.

Enclosed is a return on the organisation of the Mobile Battalions, as established by the General Command, such organisation has been mostly approved by the Chief of Staff of the Royal Army.

The Legion Commanders, who have already got Mobile Battalions, will comply with the figures of this return, as for the strength.

Owing to the lack of personnel, this should be done as soon as possible: all the C.R.s will be taken from the Legions; and also 15 officers, not including:

- the commanders of the platoon commands, the battalion commanders, and the commanders of the motorised companies - 4 junior officers;
- 6 out of the 9 platoon commanders of the 3 motorised companies will be substituted by Maresciallo's,

The Legion Commanders will supply the Mobile Battalions with:

- all the transport and arms, as established in the enclosed return (the armoured cars will be exchanged for tanks by A.C.)
- young personnel, possibly volunteers and unmarried.
- good barracks accommodations.

They will also have the Mobile Battalion personnel trained (physical, tactical, military and technical training).

They will take care of the discipline, co-operation, esprit de corps, and leave the organisation, training, and tactics, to the Battalion Commanders, within the limits put by my circular letter of the 18th Jan.

The Mobile Battalions will be the living expression of the "Model" Sections.
