- 1/. We beg you to kindly take into consideration the case of the above PW detained in India. Dr. ALFANO's family is composed of his wife and two children. It is in a very difficult financial condition, due to the long absence of the head of the family, who is PW since January 1941. The wife of the PW who, for about four years, was the only support of her two children, suffers now from neuropsychasthenia, and the general state of her health does not allow her to deal any more with the education of her children.
- 2/. Owing to the peculiar condition of his family, as well as to the fact, that the PW belongs to "protected personnel", we ask for the repatriation of Dr ALFANO, who could be assigned to escort sick PW during their repatriation.

The wife of the PW, Mrs. Gabriella FOULLIER-RIOLO, c/o G.P.O., Addis Abeba, could not be repatriated in due time, owing to the precarious condition of her health. She lives now at Addis Abeba with her daughter, and has no morale and material help whatsoever.

2nd Lt. FOULLIER asks to be allowed to join his family at Addis Abeba, so as to be able to resume his work and to give his family the necessary support.

Examined by the mixed Italian and Allied Commission, he was exonerated because it was found clear and evident, as you also verify, that he had always been active in favor of the patriots and against the Nazi-Fascists and has never sworn allegiance to the latter. The Italian Spuration Commission, on 17 September 1944, issued the order regarding Lt. Col. PONTILLO, Giacomo, father of the writer, who, in the meantime, on 24 August had been interned in POW Camp 209 at AFRAGOLA.

As yet he has not been freed because authorization from this Headquarters is required.

Therefore, the undersigned begs this Headquarters to take the necessary action, bearing in mind, in addition to his inconvenience, the precarious conditions of health of his father and certain members of his family as certified to by the attached medical certificate.

ACTIVITY OF LT. COL. PONTILLO GIACOMO FROM 8 SEPT 1943 to 4 JUNE 1944.
Interned in PV Cam. 209, AFRAGOLA.

Lt. Col. PONTILLO GIACOMO, Administrative Branch, returned with his family in May 1943 from the Aegean possessions after being there for six years. He was assigned to the Administrative Headquarters of the Rome Army Corps and from 1 July, specifically in the Administrative Office.

Since its establishment (1924) said office had been held by a civilian official, and was assigned to the above mentioned officer for his previous experience and his particular technical-juridical knowledge. In fact, Lt. Col. PONTILLO was assigned duties by Commander TREVISANO, Chief of Section of the War Ministry and undertook the work that may be summarized as follows:

(a) Administrative Duties: Transactions regarding automobile accidents; safeguarding the interests of the Government in litigations concerning such accidents; reports on behalf of the Government, etc.

(b) Opinions on interpretations of laws, regulations, etc.

(c) Matters of assistance, especially dealing with families of prisoners, lost, dead (subsidies for the transportation of bodies, advances to families) etc.

(d) Administrative responsibilities: The work continued with the usual application and on 8 September, Lt. Col. PONTILLO, remaining at his post to avoid the sacking of the files as had happened in certain cases, he saw his office become filled with all Administrative Officers and with those holding administrative positions in the Army Corps who had been released by directives and instructions.

To save what could be saved among such disorder, the settlement offices were cared for and PONTILLO intensified his work of assistance and provided to gather the elements for retrieving the lands and material lost by the occurrences of 8 September.

In the meantime, the new Fascist Army was taking form and PONTILLO invited by some General Staff Officers to take an administrative position with the General Staff refused categorically remaining assigned to the open city of Rome - performing the indicated duties with all his files plus the administration of monies and the revision of accounting procedure for establishment of the open city, all having the form of assistance units. In fact, the establishments administratively dependant from the administrative-accounting office directed by PONTILLO were the following:

The CELIO HOSPITAL, the BALDI HOSPITAL, the Center for the Wounded, Rome District II (minus recruiting office) with the allowance liquidating office for the assistance of Italian military families, Commissariat Office, bakery, food warehouse, administration office. The above mentioned establishments, as already stated, having the function of assistance, were instigated, authorized and employed by the personal work of Lt. Col. PONTILLO who, in harmony with his sentiments, with his underground activities, carried on either with the BALDI military organization or with the DEMOCRATIC LABOR PARTY, provided:

- 1 - To grant authorization for payments, indemnities and loss of baggage without documents of proof to patriotic officers and those who were guerrillas.
- 2 - To organize assistance for the families of prisoners and internees together with Major BRUSCOLI of the Allowance Liquidation Office and with Major GRAP-ELLI of Rome District II.

Thousands of families were made capable of obtaining a living; although the majority were without documents proving their right.

3 - To permit the CELIA HOSPITAL and Rome District II to pay convalescent allowances to officers of any branch who were known patriots without ever asking their status.

4 - To permit the BALDI HOSPITAL to admit numerous partisans among which two Royal Carabinieri Officers (GRASSINI) organizers of groups of the resistance underground front.

5 - To permit the BALDI HOSPITAL to earmark fund, linen etc, issued to the new Army on 5 June 1944 as can testify Captain PASQUA and Lt. SACCELLIERS.

6 - To earmark a billion lire on the special accounting and 12 million in cash that were consigned to the Royal Army as can be verified by the statement of receipt prepared by Captain BATTAGLIA and files in the Presidio.

7 - To favor all underground work carried on by the Quartermaster Delegation (Statement by Lt. Col. MANCO); to favor the organization of the BALDI HOSPITAL and become a member of the Democratic Labor Party as certified to by the attached certificate and communication sent to the Ministry of War under date of 3 August 1944.

8 - Finally, to issue an order placing into a pool all monetary advances that were allowed officers who in a thousand ways were avoiding, by remaining in Rome, the order to transfer North.

Therefore, the entire administrative and accounting endeavor of Lt. Col. PONTILLO was carried on solely in favor of patriots, wounded and sick in the hospital, of the families of prisoners and partisans. No personnel or unit part of the Nazi-Fascist army has ever had any kind of relations with PONTILLO. This is clearly proven by the fact that all Junior and Senior Administration Officers directly and administratively dependent from Lt. Col. PONTILLO have not been among those that swore allegiance to the Fascist Republic, although the document states such facts and circumstances. For further verification we refer to Lt. Col. SUGLIA and Captain BEVILACQUA del CELIO, de FRANCESCO, MARLETTA of the Allowance Liquidation office, Major GRAPPELLI of Rome District II and finally, Capt GIANUZZI and Lieutenant QUARTO and SAPORE of the same office and directly dependent from PONTILLO (All regular Army Officers).

Lt. Col. PONTILLO's sentiments are evident not only from his career record but are brought to light by what follows:

He has a family in unfortunate circumstances; he has five children one of which has infantile diabetes and the wife sick with paranoia.

Of the two senior children, one is a Lieutenant of the Royal Carabinieri and the other is a second year Cadet at the Military Academy of Modena. Both have been hunted, condemned to death and have been active in the underground front supported, incited and upheld only by the father.

On June 4, 1944, the son who is a Lieutenant of the Carabinieri resumed his duties under the Allies and is now with the fighting troops; the second who has specialized in tanks has offered his services and is waiting to be called to offer his contribution in the struggle for liberation.

Lt. Col. PONTILLO has always lived only on his salary and his family has always suffered and suffers now dignified hunger, even because he spends over Lire 100 per day on insulin alone to keep alive his diabetic youngster. By so much adversity has not shaken his high sentiments, his attitude. PONTILLO, at 52, is in administration because pitted by a pernicious form of anemia gotten in war, as certified to in attached certificate, has given his all to the underground movement by his direct action and by not making his two senior sons fight.

Therefore, on 2 February 1944, when he was asked to swear allegiance, he decided to resign from the service as will testify the officers of the Delegation. He remained in the service only because he considered the open City as a de facto unit having neutral status and for purpose of assistance and principally because his underground activities were solely directed to aiding of wounded personnel, sick and families of prisoners who would have nothing to do with the republican pseudo-government.

Never, in fact, in deference to the republican organization, were acts of adherence to the said Government requested of him or other officers in the open city.

Therefore, on 9 February 1944, together with all the other officers, PONTILLO did not swear allegiance either orally or in writing.

Lt. Col. MANCO, Chief of the Delegation, however, after having stated his true sentiments and made it clear that he was authorized by the underground movement and the Allies stated that all the officers had sworn allegiance and such formality carried no responsibility, but rather was necessary to avoid that the organization be dissolved because it was so advantageous to the patriots. All the other establishments and all Administration Officers etc were similarly controlled. In conclusion and by way of resume, PONTILLO by continuing in the same administrative and accounting capacity after 8 September 1943, he saved all the legal files that represented enormous interests for the public treasury; he made possible the search for money and material hidden or lost by the armistice. He has aided thousands of families of prisoners and interned, many patriots. He earmarked a billion, saved the Office organization; he strengthened the Internal Front by all the payments he ordered made as can be verified by the accounting records turned over to Captain BATTAGLIO appointed by the presidium (General TAMASSIA).

Furthermore, he took part in the organization of the BALDI HOSPITAL, of the Democratic Labor Party (Card No. 2429) while his sons were guerillas, fighting for the liberation.

GIACOMO PONTILLO and found him to have a pernicious form of anemia, verified by repeated blood tests. In Rhodes, due to this sickness, Col. PONTILLO underwent, in addition to hepatic therapy, even blood transfusions.

In Italy during the latter part of 1943, I re-examined Col PONTILLO and although the continued therapy caused an improvement of the more salient and grave characteristics of the grave malady, nonetheless, I still noticed serious traces of anemia. In fact, Col. PONTILLO - through hematological examination by the authorities of the Governor of Rome - obtained provisional allowances.

The attached certificate is being prepared upon request of the family, to be used as specified by law.

I certify that Mrs. PONTILLO Gasperini Maria, living in Piazza della Pilotta No. 3 has been examined by me and found to suffer from grave neurasthenia accompanied by anxious crisis and melancholy periods. Such a psychological state has been in effect for a long time and during this period has been aggravated due to family disturbances.

In her present condition, the patient absolutely cannot fulfill the ordinary family activities but rather needs someone to care for her, to prevent possible grave consequences.

Allow me to call attention to the fact that family happiness is one of the necessary environments required for the improvement of the above mentioned sickness.

When I am obliged to stay in bed, in the period I feel worse than usually, I have nobody who looks after my poor children.
- 3) Owing to the absence of my husband I can't farm a bit of ground that previously, we together used to, for the purpose of raising foods for our family.
Now I am no more able to go on in such a work owing to my serious health conditions and I have to hire some workmen. In this way I don't succeed to get the family along.

The discharge paper is not with me, now, for I handed it in to American authorities. In support of my statement I beg to enclose herewith some letters showing that my discharge motives had been taken up for verification by the Regia Questura in Rome, on the 23th May 1943. On the 30th June 1943 I left Villa Grazia (Palermo) where my Company Headquarters was, in order to go home; while travelling I had an attack of malaria; in fact, I suffer from "chronic malaria and arthritis at scapula of right arm". A German truck picked me up at Ponte di Grazia (Palermo) and took me to the Italian General Hospital No.1 in Palermo, where I was stayed till the 27th July 1943; I was subsequently transferred to the No.3 Italian Military Hospital (San Lorenzo Colli - Palermo) for further treatment, as is evidenced by attached paper. American Forces took me captive on the 22nd July 1943 while I was a patient in Hospital No.1. On the 28th August 1943 I was discharged from hospital No.3 and I was turned over to the 301 P/W Enclosure, Palermo. There I submitted an application and produced my Army Discharge paper in order to be released. Such a paper has never been given me back. But, since my residence is in Rome and since, on the 8th September 1943, Italy was occupied by the Germans, it being impossible for me to go home, I gave up insisting on my release. On my being transferred to this Camp, I submitted an application in order to be released and repatriated; but, perhaps, owing to want of data and details, it went unanswered.

The financial circumstances ~~xxxxxxxxxxxxxxxxxxxx~~ of my family are simply disastrous; its members are: my wife and three children, none of them being more than ten years old. Since my wife is affected with lung-consumption, as is evidenced by attached papers, she is unable to earn a living for herself and the children. My father-in-law died on the 30th May 1943, as is evidenced by attached letter.

Owing to above reasons, the Italian Crown Prince judged my case pitiable enough to order my discharge from service in the Italian Army.

In two letters, respectively dated 7th August and 15 September 1944, sent to the High Commissioner for Prisoners of War, the undersigned, LUONGO Raffaele son of the late Domenico, living in Naples, Corso Vittorio Emanuele N. 378, explained to the Commissioner the case of his half brother 3/908 Corporal LUONGO Mario XI Camp. c/o G.P.O., Bombay, Prisoner of War since April 1941, as a result of the Allied occupation of Cherem (East Africa).

He explained this case because in his opinion every possible consideration is due. The undersigned states that a P.W. CAIATI Teodoro, Capt. recently repatriated from India, told him that the subject's name has been on the list of repatriables, for over a year and that he has recovered in Hospital owing to a nervous illness.

The repatriated P.W. could not give the cause of such illness, nor could he describe it, but he gathered, in several conversations held with the subject's doctor at the P.O.W. Camp, that the reason is to be found in the long term of imprisonment suffered, (about forty-two months) and the fact that the subject was in Africa, away from home for five years before that. His bad state of health may also be due to (the climate and conditions of custody) The doctor also stated that the patient's state would surely improve, if repatriated.

CAIATI wrote to the undersigned on July the 20th. 1944:

" ...yesterday I saw Mario; I stayed with him about an hour. I talked to the doctor, who promised me to take his case into particular consideration, he stated that Mario would get better in Italy... "

The undersigned, received only today after two months a reply from the High Commissioner, stating that he has forwarded the case for consideration to this Commission. The undersigned further requests that his commission order the immediate repatriation of subject, so that his family may give him all necessary comfort due to his particular case.

The undersigned reminds this Commission that, by international rules, all cases recognized as medical cases by the Military Mixed Commission, should be repatriated six months after the beginning of illness.

The subject has not informed his family of his health, as his correspondence is limited to a few words. The undersigned hopes that this Commission's Authority in the matter, may return to a family gravely hit by war, its normal serenity.

Ho parlato col medico, il quale mi ha promesso di tenere in particolare considerazione il suo caso; inoltre mi ha assicurato che Mario guarirà certamente in Italia....."

Stando così le cose, il sottoscritto che soltanto in data odierna ha ottenuto, dopo due mesi di attesa, una risposta dall'Alto Commissario nella quale è detto di avere segnalato il caso a codesta Onorevole Commissione, si rivolge a codesta Onorevole Commissione perché, accettata la veridicità dei fatti esposti, sia ordinato l'immediato rimpatrio del proprio congiunto, onde la famiglia sia in grado di apprestargli tutti quei conforti e quelle cure che il caso richiede. Tutto ciò a prescindere dalle convenzioni internazionali - che tanto ossequio e rispetto hanno da parte delle Autorità Militari Alleate - che il rimpatrio degli ammalati, riconosciuti tali da apposita Commissione (è il nostro caso), dovrebbe verificarsi entro il sesto mese dall'inizio dell'infermità. Si tenga anche conto, infine, che il Luongo, ⁵⁵¹² per il clima, è stato finora colpito da dissenterite bacillare, male dal quale, allo stato, non è possibile sapere se è tuttora sofferente o guarito. È inutile dire che il prigioniero nulla ha fatto conoscere direttamente alla famiglia, essendo la sua corrispondenza limitata a poche parole e molto di rado.

Il sottoscritto ha ferma speranza che l'intervento autorevole di codesta Onorevole Commissione ridarà ad una famiglia, già colpita in altre sventure, quella serenità che ha perduta, con grande nocumento nella salute, per le condizioni del proprio congiunto.

The undersigned do. Guido PASOLA, living in Rome, Via Claudio Monteverdi 19, communicate to your Excellency the following in favour of his own brother Capt. Roberto PASOLA of the late Alfredo: The above Capt. Roberto Pasola, reserve officer, called in the Army since the beginning of the present war, was on September 8th 1943 recovered in the Military Hospital of Alessandria (Italy) affected by malaria while in the line of duty.

During the Captain's period of being hospitalized he made his escape to Alessandria to prevent himself from becoming a German prisoner. He lived with his uncle, Cesare Pasola in Florence, for a while. He went south finally reaching "the Italian lines who were fighting against the Germans". He wrote to this effect to the undersigned addressed to Rome on September 1943.

The undersigned who as a functionary of Ministry of Agriculture had left his own office on January 1944, with the purpose to avoid the transfer to the North, retreating to the country has not been able, till the Allied occupation, to ask informations about his brother for obvious reasons. As soon as he was able to return to Rome, he knew that his brother was interned in a concentration camp No. 371st camp (Italy).

The Capt. Pasola has declared in his letters that he has been interned in that camp, because they did not believe in his intentions; on the other hand he must have crossed the lines in civilian costume and he could not procure to himself testifications showing his intentions. Following what he has explained before, the undersigned prays Your Excellency for the liberation of his brother Capt. Roberto Pasola. It could be easy now therefore to H.S. and to Allied Authorities to take the necessary informations also in the above Captain's house in Rome, via Parco Popoli 5, from which it will result the true facts. And it is added that Captain Pasola has never been mixed in political activities.

And for certification the above referred the undersigned attaches herewith a statement of Col. Ugo Bedogni, formerly commander of the regiment where his own brother was in service.

Hoping a favourable consideration, the undersigned sends his best regards.


