## REPORT ON A TOUR OF CAMP AT ANGOSTO FOR I.P.T. IN P.I.M.

TOK. 8 - 26 March 1946

B

- 1) ANGOSTA (Provincia di Pisa). Visited 19 March.  
 Conditions in this camp are ideal for the handling of a considerable number of I.P. but to date none have been received.  
 Col. Innocenti is in charge of the camp and commands the following staff:-

20 NCO's

20 S.

The camp has been open since last November and consists of three large buildings, namely the Victoria Asmara home for children, an I.P. capacity of 7000 and an average of 5000 who could be housed but only approximately 1500 are at present there. They have a full complement of cooks, etc. however etc.

The chief problem appears to be that no one knows how many I.P. may be coming over from Eritrea. There were only unconfirmed reports of future arrivals, e.g., the date of Langford's arrival, but he had recently promised to send 1000 by sea in two months and none heard of them since.

On the other hand Dr. Gradiash, the liaison Officer with I.P.A., claimed that they were soon due to arrive by sea to Eritrea. The Provost Marshal section has could not confirm this, although with the departure of the R.M. 1 Navy from the port some shipping facilities are reasonably available.

- 2) GIBRALTAR. Visited 21st March.

This camp is at present situated in the Gibsons' building, which is central and most convenient for rail and sea transport. They are threatened, however, with soon being moved to Bolanovita, 12 km. with no transport except the tram service.

A trainload of PW arrived from Czechoslovakia during my inspection and several from Russia and the Russian zone were interviewed. One an ex-skier champion hospitalized in Central Russia stated that he still Oct 1945 the Russians were liberating PW and sending them westwards. After that date however orders were changed and PW were again interned. Those from the Russian zone in Germany said they had been to the allied zones and all complained of maltreatment and severity. They certainly looked in bad physical condition. They could give no estimate of the amount of PW still in Russian hands.

#### SUMMARY

It appears that the traffic of PW undoubtedly has slowed up greatly since 1 Jan 46. The Central H. bilogic on the coast are capable of receiving PW by sea but are in fact ineffective. It is suggested that Rothenburg and Danzig be used for shipments from northern Germany to concentration in the southern ports.

On 1st week is no. coming to or the overall POW are 2000. The WAFS and several camps have been closed, at Berlin, Dorn, Stettin with others shortly to be closed, probably Lubeck, Hamburg etc.

Advance information is to the reported arrival of PW in camps and camp commandants cannot tell just numbers so intrepid not their exact whereabouts.

The Italian Division officers in position at Prague are doing a good job of work, according to information PW.

The number of PW voluntarily crossing back to France, Scotland and Britain is unestimated and it is unknown how many are held by the Germans.

Precariously, however, these men will only be returned, if for too long it will be necessary to keep open several camps in the north Italy for whom there is no room.

1. Following an agreement with the Allied Authorities, the Lodging Center and Civilian Transit Camp at Pescantina will be turned over to the Italian Military Authorities as from Jan 1st., 1946.

2. On the same date the Lodging Center of Pescantina comes under the Constitution of C. Center and under the regulations of Circular 18950 ord.II of the General Staff, dtd 6 Dec 45, for that which regards the Military and Civilian Personnel on the spot.

The Command of the Center will be given to a Colonel who has given proofs of his capacity to perform that duty.

The eventual need of increased Personnel will be reported to the Military Territorial Command of Bolzano.

**3. The Lodging Center of Pescantina, will be used as follows:**

For all that regards the transit in said Camp of all Military and Civilian Refugees of whatever nationality, as is prevewed in the directives of the A.C.P.D. and R.S.C. Enclosure I

- for the rationing of all the trains that stop at Pescantina, with refugees, regardless of the nationality of said refugees, who have need of rations.

**4.a.** At the R. Prefecture of Verona there will be a liaison Officer of the A.C. -S/C for Displaced Persons and Repatriation, whose duty will be to aid the Command of the Center in all problems which concerns transport or any other questions of particular interest to the Camp.

**b.** At the Command of the Lodging Center at Pescantina and under the direction of said Command, there will be a representative of the Ministry for Post War Assistance, who will be charged with the care and assistance of all the Civilian Refugees, whether Italian or Foreign, with the possibilities that will be put at his disposal by the Commander of the Center.

**c.** An Allied Officer will remain in the Camp for a few weeks.

**5. The Turning over of the Camp.**

**a.** The Allied Command will withdraw all the Materials and rations belonging to the D.P. and R.S.C., or that belong to the English Armed Forces that are not necessary for the functioning of the Camp.

**b.** For all Allied Material given to the Camp by the Allied Command, a receipt must be given in quadruple copy.(Two copies to be retained by the Allies and one to be sent to this Ministry).

**c.** The Command of the Outgoing Camp must leave complete rations for 10.000 people

**6. Services.**

**a. Rationing.**

The Foreign Civilian Refugees will receive the same rations as those given to the Italian Refugees (Circular 121140/S/1 dtd 21 June 1945 from the General Direction of Administration and Commissary Department).

As for the Military, the rations for the Civilians must be asked for at the Se. Pr. Al. and withdrawn by the Command of the Lodging Center.

The Interior rationing for the Military Personnel, must be kept separate from that of the National and Foreign Civilian Refugees.

**b. Materials.**

The interior management for that which concern the distribution

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for personal use of Blankets, straw mattresses etc. etc. must be kept separate from that distribution which regards the Military Personnel.

c. Sanitary Corps.

The following Italian Sanitary Units, which at present are at the disposal of the Allied Command of the Camp, will remain at the disposal of the Lodging Center at Pescantina.

- 522nd. Italian Field Hospital.

- 15th Disinfection Section.

- 20 Motor Ambulances from the 1st. Motor Ambulance Section.

d. Transport.

External.

As in paragraph 5 of Enclosure I railway transport must be utilized as much as is possible according to the modalities indicated.

When indispensable, motor vehicle transport, the Commander of the Lodging Center will request the intervention of the Liaison Officer (attention paragraph 4 a).

Interior.

For the interior services of the Camp, in the place of the 4 trucks and the four "Autobotti" at present in use and which will be withdrawn, the General Staff will assign before the 31 Dec 45, 4 trucks in the place of the 3 trucks as is cited in circular No.18950 and 4 "Autobotti".

Rules and Regulations for the internal Functioning  
of the Camp of Pescantina.1. Disinfestation and Medical Control.

In consequence of the arrival of trains from Russia, (coming from Russia or not) will pass a Medical Visit and be disinfected immediately after their arrival, and the doctors will provide for the isolation of any contagious disease and for the disinfection of all the other travelers.

The Medical Visit and the disinfection must be done in Camp "A" before the distribution of the tickets. Means of illumination must be provided in order that this work may be performed also at night.

During the period of waiting, a ration of soap must be served. The enclosure must be provided with a latrine.

Straw Mattresses must be issued immediately. They must be periodically substituted and put in piles and disinfested regularly with D.D.T. powder.

2. Heating

In the large tents of Camps "A" and "B", 6 large stoves or Charcoal Burners will be installed.

3. Refugees of Foreign Nationality.

Due to the fact that the Refugee Camp of Verona is to be closed down, all the foreign refugees will be sent to Pescantina. There, they will follow the same system as was used in the Camp of Verona. They will receive the same rations as the Italian Refugees, but when possible will be assigned to separate quarters.

4. Transport

When possible the railway will be used.

When special trains are not available, the rail cars in which the Refugees travel, will be attached to ordinary trains.

Motor Vehicle transport will not be used unless the repatriates will have to remain more than one night or in the case of two or more trains arriving on the same day.

The Italians who are going towards the interior of the Country

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may instead be held two nights before having to resort to motor vehicle transport.

- 1/. The Territorial Military Command of Genova arranged with the local Authorities for the use of the Naval Station "Ponte dei Mille", capacity 7,800, as a Lodging Centre for repatriated Italian PW. This is a temporary arrangement and it must be returned to the port authorities when the port is open.
- 2/. The city of Genova was badly damaged during the war and has very few suitable buildings that can be used as Lodging Centres.
- 3/. The barracks known as VITTORIO VENETO, at present used by the Allies, are considered by the Italian War Ministry as being suitable for the use as a Lodging Centre.
- 4/. It is presumed that a part from the repatriation from France, the port of Genova may be used for the repatriation from overseas so that it is important that provision be made for the reception of veterans.
- 5/. May steps be taken to secure the derquisition of the a/m barracks.

SUBJECT: Lodging Centre of Genoa (No.201).

1. The Territorial Military Command of Genoa, after many discussions with the local Authorities, Allied and Civilian, has been able to arrange for the use of the Naval Station "Ponte dei Mille" for the Lodging Centre(201) in that City, Capacity 7800, with the agreement that said Centre will be returned to the Port at the beginning of the Ports' Activities which will be within a very shorty period of time.

2. The City of Genoa, due to damages received during the war, has no other possible place to offer for this Centre except for the barracks "Vittorio Veneto", at present at the disposal of the Allies, and occupied by a small number of people.

3. It is to be considered that apart from the repatriations from France, it is not to be excluded that the Centre in question, will be needed for the sorting out of veterans who will arrive from Overseas, and we therefore would greatly appreciate if your Division could obtain the de-requisition of the Barracks in question from the Allied Authorities.

1. In conformity with verbal orders from this Headquarters, I made an inspection trip to the Leghorn Area on the 3d and 4th of December. I visited the Italian Army properties in Leghorn as set forth in Appendix "A" attached.
2. As outlined in Appendix "A", there appears to be no immediate prospects of finding suitable accommodations for an Italian Army Training Center in the Leghorn Area. The Caserma Fanzionale at Ardenza or the Fascist Caserma, now PBS Headquarters, would both be ideal, but as long as PBS remains in that area, those properties will not be available.
3. Suggest that AFHQ's attention be called to PBS using an Italian Military Hospital as a transit camp.

1. With effect from 1st October 45, the Italian Combat Groups, which supply the Centri Alloggio with vehicles, have no longer been able to draw Petrol direct from Allied sources. Instead they draw a strictly controlled amount of petrol from C.I.P.

2. Since the vehicles are supplied by the Combat Groups, it is presumed they will also continue to supply petrol. However the Groups, in view of the limited supply at their disposal, are not always able to provide the Centres with sufficient petrol to carry out their necessary duties; e.g., the Centre at Milan receives a bare 10 galls a day.

3. It is suggested that the Italian War Ministry give a separate allowance to the Centri Alloggio to enable them to carry out their duties efficiently; a total of 20 to 25 gallons per day for all vehicles would suffice. The Milan Office of the Ufficio Autonomo P. d. G. is writing to its HQ at Rome to this effect.

1. Camp Visited : Centro Alloggio Genova
2. Date : 28 September 45

2. Location.

The Centro Alloggio, Genoa, is at present in part of an orphanage in Via Florio No. 6, where it was taken over from his predecessor by the present Commandant, Lt. Col. Carbone. This location is not satisfactory as it is some distance from the town centre, and in addition the whole of the building is needed by the Nuns who run the orphange. Accordingly Lt. Col. Carbone, in agreement with the Chief of Staff of the Territorial H.Q., Genoa, found another site at the Stazione Larittina, part of which has been leased from the Italian Harbour authorities.

3. Proposed Location.

The Stazione Larittina is favourably sited near the main Station. The building is large, and, as far as roof, walls etc. are concerned, is structurally sound. If double-tier bunks can be installed, it will have an overnight capacity of 1,500. A good deal of work is required on the repair of windows, latrines showers etc, and installations of cooking facilities. This work has already been started by the Italian military engineers, and the building will be ready for occupation by an advance party by the end of September. By Oct. 15 the work of refitting should be completed to the arrival

This work has already been started by the Italian military engineers, and the building will be ready for occupation by an advance party by the end of September. By Oct. 15 the work of refitting should be complete, and the camp able to operate, subject to the arrival of the necessary equipment.

### 4. Equipment, Stores etc.

The greatest difficulty will be the procuring of the necessary equipment. The Genoa Territorial HQ. can provide no blankets, vaileasses, beds etc. The local D.P.R.S.C. Group Commander, Lt. Nash, with whom Lt. Col. Carbone is in contact, had informed him that he had a large amount of surplus stores in Genoa. Col. D'Arcalis and I spoke with Lt. Nash, who showed us correspondence with HQ. D.P.R.S.C. in which he had requested permission to hand over these stores (including upwards of 1,000 blankets, paillasses and about 500 sets of alluminium bowls, knives, forks and spoons) to the Centro Alleggio; he has, however, been ordered to send them to the D.P.R.S.C. store in Reggio Emilia. It may be considered worth while taking up this matter with HQ. D.P.R.S.C., as the stores are still in Genoa.

The necessary eating bowls can be provided from Milan.

### 5. Personnel.

This has been provided in accordance with the general

agreement by the local Combat Group, the "Mantova". They have also provided one 15 cwt and one 3 ton truck.

6. Movements.

The numbers of ex-PW passing through at the moment are small - 20 to 30 per day. Only a few isolated numbers of the 8,000 cooperators due to return from the South of France have arrived.

7. Bordighera.

A section of the Centro Alloggio, Genoa, is operating in a former D.P.R.S.C. camp (No 73) at Bordighera. This Camp has now been taken over by the Prefect of Imperia, and is run by the Italian military Camp Staff which formerly worked for D.P.R.S.C. The Camp can handle 500 overnight, 1,000 in and out during the day. A difficulty arises in that Bordighera is inside the controlled border zone, and the small number (10) of personnel sent there by Lt. Col. May it please be confirmed that this applies only to their transportation.





Report on visit to IPW Reparation camp, TREVISO

Sir,

I visited the a/m camp at 1130 hrs 13 June, inspected the site, and talked with Col. NAPOLI. Later I visited Lt. EVANS, OC No. 12 Civilian Evacuation Centre, which is situated in a large barracks about 400 yds from the IPW camp. The IPW camp is at the site of no. 11 Civilian Evacuation Centre, equipment of which has been used by Col. NAPOLI on loan from Lt. EVANS. No. 11 Centre has, however, been ordered to move north to the ~~PONTEBBIA~~ area, and Col. NAPOLI now has no equipment other than some tents, tables & chairs. IPW are therefore no longer being sent to Col. NAPOLI's camp, but are passing through No. 12 Civilian Evac. Centre and being treated as Civilian refugees. I therefore requested Lt. EVANS to allot to Col. NAPOLI an office at no. 12 Centre, in which IPW can be accommodated as a temporary measure.

PONTEBBIA

Points arising from my talk with Col. NAPOLI and visit to the camp were as follows:

1) PW. Since arriving in the area on 17 May, he has documented 712 IPW. The average daily flow is between 100 and 200, but lack of equipment, staff, etc., has prevented the camp from running smoothly.

2) Permanent Staff. The Italian team due to arrive from the Comisi had not turned up. On application to the Italian district HQ at TREVISO, Col. NAPOLI was allotted 5 officers and 11 OR's, who had been serving with local partisans. In addition, Lt. EVANS lent him some Italian Military personnel from No. 11 Centre. These latter have now been sent north to the new area of no. 11 Centre, incl. the MO and 2 hygiene men.

3) Equipment. Certain stores were allotted to Col. ~~2611~~ from no. 11 Centre, incl:

4	100 lb tents
6	portable cookers
1000	blankets

All the above equipment, other than the tents, was sent away with No. 11 Centre. The tents are possibly to be sent away also. The only other equipment is some tables and chairs borrowed from a school building at the site.

4) Accommodations. Apart from the tentage detailed above there is one building on the site. This is a school large enough to accommodate 150-200 bodies. It is in reasonable repair and has running water & electric light, both in working order, but no furniture other than some tables & chairs. Provided the tents are not removed, there is accommodation in them and in the school for 700 persons. Apart from gravel near the school, the nearby land is mostly ploughed, not very suitable for a posted camp. Field latrines have been dug. Sick and wounded can be sent to the Italian Military Hospital, TREVISO.

5) Requirements. Col. NAPOLI maintained that he could have function smoothly if the equipment of no. 11 Centre had not been removed. He requested that it be replaced or supplemented if numbers of PW warrant extra equipment, and that the promised truck should be sent. He also needs a typewriter for the office; paillasses; and a small truck for fetching rations and for other necessary duties. In connection with this, I explained that special vehicles to carry PW to their houses could not be provided and advised him to maintain contact with Lt. EWANS to get them loaded onto MP returning empty. All PW who have so far passed through his hands have been taken away in civilian vehicles.

Under these conditions it has been impossible to accommodate IPW at the camp, and they have been passing through no. 12 Civilian Centre with no military documentation. No. 12 Centre has a maximum capacity of 15,000 persons. Of the daily flow up to 200 are IPW. I therefore visited Lt. EWANS, explained to him the position of Col. NAPOLI, and requested that an office in No. 12 Centre be put at the disposition of the latter. This was agreed, as a temporary measure, and will ensure that IPW while still being treated & evacuated as though they were civilians, will at any rate be registered & documented as military before leaving the camp. Efficient screening is difficult as there are no SMI or FS personnel at the camp. As a temporary arrangement this is better than leaving Col. NAPOLI with an IPW camp in which no one can be accommodated; but Lt. EWANS pointed out that he could not house and feed Col. NAPOLI's present staff as they are classed as local civilians and rations may not be drawn for them. It was therefore agreed that they should live and feed at their houses and receive a ration allowance from Italian District HQ. It is to be hoped that this temporary arrangement will serve until Col. NAPOLI can be provided with his own staff & equipment.

REPORT ON TRIP AND ARRANGEMENTS MADE FOR PW CAMP; IN NORTHERN ITALY

Upon arrival in Milan and after waiting for two hours at the airport for transportation to the City, I contacted Col. POMERI Regional Commander, Lombardia. I explained the purpose of my visit and asked for transportation to 5th Army Headquarters (secured a 500 weight), supposedly at Verona.

Sunday the 21st I left for Verona and was informed upon arrival there that the AFHQ 5th Army had moved to Gardone. Upon arriving there I contacted Col. Sutherland C-3. He claimed that this plan was new to him and that at this moment he would block any addition of personnel being sent to the camp.

When asked to facilitate the securing of transportation (via car from captured enemy dumps) from C-4 he stated that nothing could be done in this matter as C-4 had refused his previous request and he asked me not to approach C-4 until he noticed me.

I then contacted C-1 who sent me to C-3 and the opposite number in the British I.M.C. None of these gentlemen seemed to know that any such plane that I proposed existed, nor had they made any provisions for release of teams from the Italian Groups under their control. After several conferences it was decided that the matter would be brought before the Chief of Staff and that I would be notified as to his decision.

A sub plane was assigned to me to fly to the Headquarters 8th Army, where the same lack of knowledge and interest was displayed by C-1 (ops) and A.Q. Colonel. They both promised to investigate this matter further and notify me of their decision.

ANQ officer 8th Army was not interested enough in my plan to even see me or talk to me over the phone. He stated that it was not his business.

I returned to 5th Army Headquarters the same night. A conference was called with Chief of Staff C-3 (A) C-3 (Br) I.M.C. and liaison officer Italian Army Groups. I again stated my request and upon finding out that the Chief of Staff had approved securing the teams, why and means were discussed and I was instructed to proceed to Milan and report to Colonel CUTTS C-3 4th Corps. When I arrived he was surprised that he had not been informed by 8th Army of my coming and of my purpose and asked me to return next day, so that he could contact Army and get instruction.

I called next day and he informed me that a conference would be held on Monday the 28th with Army C-3 (Br) and (A), Representative of the several Italian Army Groups Commanders, the Representative of M.I.T., and that time decision would be made as to where and from what groups these teams should be secured.

I borrowed transportation from the 4th Corp and proceeded to Turin where I visited the camp at Moncalieri Castle and called on Major GUTHRIE Displaced Persons Sub-Commission Representative Piemonte Region and discussed the location of camps, use of personnel, etc.

On Monday the 28th, I met Col. MILLAY in Milano and he and I inspected two of the camps in Milano and then attended the conference at C-3 4th Corp. Col. MILLAY informed the officers at the conference that he had approved cutting the teams to 35 persons per camp and when I objected stating that this plan was approved by Allied Force Headquarters and that I refused

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to take responsibility of changing it, the Colonel stated that he could only house and feed this number and the matter would be taken up upon his return to Rome with the Director of the War Materials Disposse and Italian Prisoners of War. I then agreed with the provision and a clear understanding that if additional personnel up to the original 66 bodies for each team were needed they would have to be provided.

On the matter of transportation I secured from the Legnano Division the assignment of 1 (3 tons) lorry and one 1500 weight for each of the teams going to Como, Milans, Turin and Genova.

On the 29th accompanied by Lt. Col. MUZZILLO and Lt. Col. CARBONE I attended a conference at the Legnano Division Head quarters in Bergamo.

The Chief of Staff declared that the teams should be drawn from local assigned groups and he ordered the transfer of an Artillery Battalion to Turin to furnish the teams for Turin and Genoa and it was decided that the teams would be rationed by the parent groups.

Further instructions from Col. FINDLAY were received. One additional team for Modena was requested.

I contacted Lt. Col. TUFF British I.M.C. 5th Army and he said that General CRANE refused to approve any further releasing of Italian Army Personnel unless orders came through the 5th Army Group. I then contacted G-2 (A) and (Br) Col. MILLER and Col. PAXTON at Florence. I explained to Col. MILLER the difficulty raised by the 8th Army and further the decision of Gen. CRANE. He immediately dispatched a signal to 8th Army Headquarters instructing them to comply forthwith with my demands and authorizing them to deal directly with us in the future.

5th Army Headquarters was also informed on this matter by Col. PAXTON.

Transportation to return to Rome could not be found through both Colonel MILLER and Col. PAXTON telephoned to all Army Installation and AMG Officials. One day was lost waiting for the counter, which left June 1st at 0900 and arrived in Rome last night at about 18.00.

I further recommend that Col. FINDLAY's plan of assigning an officer to act as liaison for our two Commissions with the 5th and 8th Armies and 4th Corp Headquarters, Districts and Regions as well as acting Inspector and trouble shooter for all PW camps be approved.
