SUBJECT: Alimentary treatment for the former war-prisoners and other persons returning home.

The Presidence of the Ministers' Gabinet has notified that it would be right to equilize the alimentary treatment of the former war-prisoners and other persons returnin home, either they suffered the same privations or the ration scale laid down for some categories, is not sufficient to restore the human organisms already seriously undermined.

As per attached copy of a letter sent by the Presidence of the Ministers' Gabinet, the following alimentary treatment has being in force for those returning home:

1) For the former war-prisoners or persons returning home from France.

ation made up of foodstuffs to be purchased through the Seprals and from the dealers (as per attached form I)

- 2) For the returning men from Balancania.
- a) Food ration "30" (which is distributed to the men landing at Taranto and loading in the S.Andrew Center managed by the Alli431) Military Authorities (as per form 2):
- b) food ration as per form I (distributed to the other persons landing at the other harbours a d lodging in the resting centers managed by the Italiana Military Authorities)

In order to solve this situatio, as it is a matter of urgency, and taking into account that many returning men are subject to the military service and have to return to their Armies or working groups, as soon as their licenses expire, we beg the Allied Food Sub-Commission

to kindly cancel the paragraphs, concerning the former war-pri-

soners returning home (chapter II-para) B) from the Rationing new general scheme for military service men, which was sent to you for your approval with letter 1563 /CII/R dated November 9th 1944.

Meanwhile we beg you to authorize, for the moment, only those returning home to enjoy the special alimentary treatment proposed in the shheme,

1'ALTO COMMISSARIO

- a) ration " 30 " (as per form 1) distributed only to the returnin men from Grecia and landing at Taranto and lodging in the S. Andrew Center, under the cintrol of the Allied Military Authorities.
- b) ration as per form 2 made up of merchandise purchase through Sepral and wholesalers, distributed to the former war-prisoners returning men from France and to those returning from Balcania (Gre, cia included) not lodging in the S.Andrew Center.

The Minist y of the War specified that this difference in the alimentary treatment is for the British Authorities regard the Italian Troops coming back from Grecia, returning Mome and assisted by them as the Allied refugee, while the former war-prisoners the returning men from France and other zones of Balbacia, and even the military troops from Grecia who addressed themselves to the Italian Authorities, are considered as Italian civilians (before their re-employment as military troops).

As the present rations have a great difference in quality and quantity (ration 30 is more than sufficient, while the other is insufficient) many inconvenie ts and moral discontent rise up 4317 among the men enjoying the latter alimentary treatment.

In order to avoid this situation the Ministry of the War on December 5th 1944, sent to the Military Allied Authorities concerned, for approval, the following proposals: (one of them should be approved at least):

- everybody returning home should enjoy the ration 30
- everybody returning home enjoying, at the present tie, the alimentary treatment as per form 2 should be authorized to enjoy

the " military ration tipu unico for the Italian Forces " or their present treatment should be improved.

While we are waiting for the approval of the Allied Autho -. rities, as it is a matter of urgency to improve the food rations for the returning men not enjoying the ration 30 during the winter season we request that the Italian Food Civil Authorities increase the ration pointed out in the form 2.

To this purpise we notify that it would be sufficient to restore the ration as er form 3, already in force until last October for the above mentioned category of returning persons.

Therefore we beg you to kindly take into consideration our proposals and to improve, as far as you are concerned, the bas situation of those persons.

I wonder if you have been able to get any further on this matter as I am being rather badgered by the different Italian Government Departments concerned.

Sorry to worry you but I would like some decision and really feel it is quite impossible to answer the Italian Government as long as my only reply is - "civilian rations" - which are quite inadequate to meet the position.



SUBJECT: Repatriation and return of Italian Boldiers from the Balkans.

TO : 055 Section, Allied Force Headquarters, APO 512.

Referency my letter No. IPW/80/81 dated 5 December, 1944 on the above subject to which an answer is still awaited.

- l. The Autonomous Office for Veteran Soldiers and Repatriated Prisoners of War of the Italian War Ministry have again requested that urgent consideration be given to the question of a universal type of ration for all Italian soldiers and Frisoners of War who are being repatriated to Italy.
- that type 50 ration be made available to the Transit Camp at Barl which handles the repatriation of a considerable number of soldiers and Frisoners of War coming into Italy from the Egikans and the East.
- Office for Veteran Holdiers and Repatriated Prisoners of War has now requested that type 3C rations be not only made available at Earl but also for esaps at Lecce/and a second came at Naples
- coming through our lines will be afforded treatment similar to that accorded the Italian army in respect of rations and clothing, it is for urgent consideration that those other Italians returning from the Balkans who have been fighting with the Potriots in these countries should have similar treatment. I would point out that those passing through the Bari, becce and the Small Taranto Gamp are small in number compared with the 4311 coming from Greece and the numbers likely to come through our lines from the North.

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5. It is very difficult to get the Italian Government to understand the necessity to insue civilian rations in one instance, and the higher scale of rations in the other, purely on account of the fact that soldiers or Prisoners of war arrive by different means and at different Ports.

6. It is strongly recommended that all camps receiving repatriated Italian soldiers and Prisoners of War be out on the same footing in respect of rations and clothing as the camp operating at Taranto.

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4. The question of rations for the returning soldiers and POW was discussed. Gen. Mannerini made strong representation for type 30 ration to be made available for the Camps at Naples, Bari, Lecce and a 2nd Camp at Taranto. Now that Army rations are being supplied to Patriots coming through the lines in the North and Type 30 ration being issued to Italian soldiers and POW returning from the Balkans who arrive at Taranto, it would seem that if at all possible, the type of ration supplied to repatriated Italian soldiers and POW should be a universal one and similar for all parties returning to Italy.

SUBJECT: Repatriation and return of Italian soldiers from the Balkans.

- 1/. The Italian Ministry of War has pointed out that a considerable number of soldiers repatriated from the Balkans are arriving in Bari District by airplane and small boats. A camp has been prepared at Bari for their reception.
- 2/. The Italian Ministry of War has requested that authority be given for the issue of type 30 ration to the Camp at Bari under similar conditions as those prevailing at the Camp in Taranto.
- 3/. The Italian personnel arriving at Bari are in every way similar to those arriving at Taranto and it is therefore recommended that type 30 ration be made available as requested.
