On the 7th of November 65 individuals, military personnel, arrived at Udine from Yugoslavia (Camp 6 near Belgrade) who were repatriated by the Yugoslav Authorities because sick and unable to work.

They arrived on the 3rd at Triest, where they were given assistance by the It. Red. Cross.

At the Lodging Center of Udine they were given the usual treatment regarding clothes, matriculation, administration and were sent to their respective homes.

Of the 65 veterans, two remained in Triest because they could not be transported, one in Triest by the Allied Authorities and 5 were hospitalized in Udine.

The veterans reported that there are still 1200 It. prisoners held in camp 6 and near-by, who are with-out clothes or shoes who are being forced to work 12 hrs. a day and on night shifts. The food is better in comparison to that of the post, 600 gr. of bread per day but the rest is scarce, particularly the fats and there is no medicine.

They are repatriated if resulting ill, unable to work or if they belong to the communist party. Those who belong to the party and there are 400 at Camp 6, are sent to take a course of lessons that last a month.

Primarily it must be pointed out that this Division never gets any prior notification of the impending arrival of these men. Moreover the Ju-G-Slav authorities, not noted for their cooperation with this R.A. have a habit of so arranging movement that these unfortunate men usually arrive during the night. No. 17 Displaced Persons Centre - Trieste which handles this movement is a transit Centre only and few facilities exist for exhaustive reclothing, etc. In consequence the men are medically examined, mainly for infectious diseases and after bathing and feeding are sent on by the first available train to Udine where arrangements are such that they are attended and succoured by Displaced Persons staff and Italian Red Cross at No. 16 Displaced Persons Centre there (O.C. Major Ormesher - telephone Udine 1526).

Reference your memorandum No. 2 of 1/11/44 of June 7th.

I think that the first step should be for the Allied Commission officially to transmit at least part of Major Kellett's report to the Italian Government for their information. Perhaps the passage of Major Kellett's letter regarding the alternative route for sending prisoners of war to Italy should be omitted since it is purely speculative and there seems to be no evidence that the Yugoslavs are in fact using this means.

The Italian Government may well feel inclined to give publicity to this report when they receive it. I see no objection to this - indeed, if the Italian Government do not give publicity, I would suggest that our own Public Relations officials should do so. Since these prisoners of war passed through Allied controlled territory we have a certain interest in their welfare and did in fact render them immediate first-aid. I think we should be quite justified in commenting on their deplorable condition and the apparent disregard of the Geneva Convention regarding the treatment of prisoners of war. Our statement might end on the note that the Italian Government will doubtless make an official protest in due course.

Reference recent conversations regarding Italian P.O.M. passing through Zone "A" it is desired to report the following.

At 11 p.m. on the night of the 25th May a group of Italians arrived at the Displaced Persons Assembly Centre in Trieste. No previous notification had been received from the Jugo-Slav Red Cross or other Authorities.

The party was immediately disinfested and medically examined. The medical inspection at the centre of Displaced Persons and P.O.M. is usually for signs of scabies or other similar communicable diseases and in consequence is not intended as an exhaustive and exacting examination. Nevertheless the M.O. reported that it was obvious from his observations that all were in shocking physical condition and were suffering considerably. All were lice infested and 3 had scabies, 8 had swollen limbs, 6 had pulmonary trouble, 1 had advanced tuberculosis some had pleurisy, 1 was almost blind and another completely blind, 3 were suffering through old wounds and amputations.

I personally did not see this particular party but my British Red Cross Assistant Miss Haines did and reported verbally that their condition was terrible. Her views confirm the opinion of the O.C. Centre, Capt. Bannister and reports from them were requested and are attached.

The party was clad in tattered and torn remains of old Italian and German uniforms. Very few had shirts or any underclothing and

It may be of interest that since this party came to Trieste and caused some unfavourable comment, no other P.O.N. have arrived but several hundreds have been sent by sea, direct to Venice and I have heard that their physical condition was no better than our party. It may be therefore that the Yugo-Slav authorities, well knowing that the Allies are punctilious in their dealings with prisoners are sending P.O.N. direct to Italy, thus "killing two birds with one stone".

- a. Having no diplomatic contacts with Italy direct they would not get any diplomatic protest, and
- b. avoid examination by Allied Authorities who now do not operate in Venice.

It seems to be the considered opinion of the officials who dealt with the P.O.N. here that they were not a very good advertisement for Jugo-Slav administration. Whether the rules of the Hague Convention dealing with treatment of P.O.N. have been broken by the Jugo-Slav Authorities is not however within the competence of this Division to decide.

SUBJECT: Release from Yugoslav Concentration

With reference to your memorandum of February 26, 1946, addressed to the American and British Embassies in Rome, the American Embassy forwarded the request of the Foreign Office to the American Embassy in Belgrade for consideration and appropriate action, in view of the humanitarian aspects of the case.

The American Embassy in Belgrade has replied that in its view, any approach to the Yugoslav Government on behalf of the four Italians interned at Bor would serve no useful purpose in the circumstances and that consequently, no action is being taken in Belgrade. It is reported that the British Embassy in Belgrade agrees with this position. The American Embassy in Belgrade points out that despite the humanitarian aspects of these cases they are probably no more deserving than thousands of other Italians interned in Yugoslavia.

The above is for your confidential information and to complete the records of this case and is not to be communicated to the Italian authorities.

L'ing. Stefano Reynaud di Camillo e di Bersaglio, via, nato a Genova nel 1908 e residente a Torino, via San Quintino 26, dall'agosto 1942 era Direttore della Cementerie Riunite Adri. Dalmatie con sede in Spalato. Abitava con la via Cristoforo Colombo 13 (ora Sargatica 13); gli uffici della sua azienda erano nel palazzo Baimonati.

Avvenuta il 12 settembre 1943 l'occupazione di Spalato da parte dei partigiani, l'ing. Reynaud fu imprigionato il 22, condotto a Castel S. Giorgio, a circa 5 chilometri da Spalato e subito al lavoro in una Cementeria. Il 26 settembre, durante i tedeschi in Spalato città, i partigiani si ritirarono conducendo con loro l'ing. L'ing. Reynaud non aveva a Spalato alcuna carica politica o militare, ma solo compiti tecnici e amministrativi inerenti alla sua azienda.

Si sono più intensamente della ricerca e possono dare qualche informazione sull'ing. Reynaud a Spalato: la sopra detta Ditta Mario Ferio e l'ing. Gerio Ferio, amministratore e tecnico della Cementeria, che per la conoscenza dei luoghi e personaggi in grado di assumere le indagini. Inoltre l'ing. Giuseppe - Sargatica 13, Spalato - che era alla Cementeria di Castel S. Giorgio durante la prigionia dell'ing. Reynaud.

We received the following informations from an Italian perioner, formerly interned in the Prisco Logor Camp at Zagabria, (Yugoslavia) who managed to escape and return to Italy.

There are 260 Italians in the Prisco Logor Camp. They are literally dying of misery. They have no clothes and sleep on the naked earth. Twice daily, they get water and turnips and some bread made of Indian corn.

From informations received from Trieste, it appears that it is useless to send parcels to Italian prisoners in Yugoslavia. Such parcels never arrive.

The intervention of the Allies and the Red Cross is urgent. It is requested that the Camp be visited and controlled and that relief be sent without delay.

Considering this painful situation, we beg for your kind intervention.
