SUBJECT: Supply of Italian Equipment & Supplies for AAF/MTO US-ITI Units.

TO : Commanding General, 205th Division (Italian).

1. A recent conference of representatives of MMIA, Air Force Sub-Commission and G-4 MTOUSA with representatives of the Services Division, AAFSC/MTO, on the Supply and Maintenance of the US-ITI's disclosed the following:

a. The issue of Italian equipment and supplies in excess of scales as set forth by AFHQ is dependent upon the status of Italian supplies in Italian War Ministry and Air Ministry stocks and in the possession of all US-ITI Units.

b. MMIA and the Air Force Sub-Commission acting in their capacity as Supervisory and Technical Agencies for the control of Italian equipment and supplies furnished from the Italian War Ministry and Air Ministry to US-ITI Units, require copies of all requisitions submitted to these Italian Agencies for Italian equipment and supplies by US-ITI's, enabling MMIA and the Air Force Sub-Commission to make equitable allocation to US-ITI's employed by all Allied Agencies.

c. MTOUSA, prior to authorizing the release of US equipment (with the exception of Material Status Items authorized under U-47-44) in excess of AFHQ scale of use of US-ITI's, requires a Statement of Non-Availability of Italian equipment and supplies from either MMIA or the Air Force Sub-Commission.

2. In view of the policies set forth above by MMIA, the Air Force Sub-Commission and MTOUSA, and to inaugurate a uniform system of procurement, distribution, inventory, and control of Italian equipment and supplies for US-ITI Units assigned to the 205th Division (Italian), the Commanding General, 205th Division (Italian), is hereby delegated the following responsibilities:

a. The establishment of a uniform system for the procurement and distribution of Italian supplies and equipment for all AAF/MTO US-ITI Units.

b. The establishment of a uniform system of accounting and reporting of Italian equipment and supplies for all AAF/MTO US-ITI Units, in order to insure the control of all Italian equipment and supplies within such authorized scales as may be determined by HQ 205th Division.

c. The issuance of necessary instructions and directives to all AAF/MTO US-ITI Units to accomplish the responsibilities set forth herein.

d. The periodic inspections of all AAF/MTO US-ITI Units to insure the maintenance of such uniform systems of supply, accounting and reporting of Italian equipment and supplies and the submission to Services Division, AAFSC/MTO, of a report of the findings of these inspections.

e. To ascertain the requirements of all AAF/MTO US-ITI Units for Italian equipment and supplies, expedite procurement, supervise distribution, and submission, when items from Italian sources are required, of consolidated monthly requisitions to the Italian War Ministry for AAF/MTO US-ITI Ground Force Units and to the Italian Air Ministry for AAF/MTO US-ITI Air Force Units on the 10th day of each month. Separate consolidated requisitions will be submitted for each type of supply, i.e. QM requisition for QM items, Medical requisition for medical items, etc. Attached to each consolidated requisition will be a copy of each unit requisition which forms a part of the consolidation. Unit requisitions will state location where delivery is desired, in order that MMIA or the Air Force Sub-Commission can set up release from nearest ITI depot. Two copies of each requisition thus submitted will be translated into English and forwarded simultaneously to the respective supply section of HQ AAFSC/MTO. Each supply section of AAFSC/MTO affected by the above will in turn forward one copy to MMIA or the Air Force Sub-Commission, dependent upon whether requisitions are for Ground or Air Force Units, and will maintain a constant liaison with either MMIA or the Air Force Sub-Commission to insure prompt and equitable action by the Italian War Ministry or Italian Air Ministry.

f. To furnish Services Division, AAFSC/MTO, on the 1st of each month, a consolidated report in quadruplicate on the status of all non-expendable Italian equipment and supplies for all AAF/MTO US-ITI Units. Report to bear clearance number HSC-SD-B58, classified RESTRICTED, and rendered in English in the following manner:

Consolidated Totals of Ground and Air Force Units will be reported separately, all totals reported will represent the status of Italian supplies and equipment as of the 10th day of the previous month.

3. Respective supply sections of AAFSC/MTO will assist your Headquarters in whatever way possible to carry out the principles outlined above.

SUPPLY CONFERENCE, G-4 MTOUSA - NORBAS

BASTIA, CORSIGA, 27 - 28 MARCH 1945

I OPENING GENERAL SESSION

1. The first meeting of the MTOUSA - NORBAS Supply Conference was held at 1700 hours, 27 March 1945, in the Officers' Lounge, Headquarters, Northern Base Section.

2. Colonel Blakeney, G-4 Section, MTOUSA, opened the meeting and explained its purpose was to assist in a mutual, cooperative spirit the operations to close out Northern Base Section and to seek the solution to any problems confronting the Base Section.

3. Colonel Lawley, G-4 Section, MTOUSA, announced the schedule of panel conferences for the evening and following morning. Colonel Lawley then introduced each representative from MTOUSA.

4. Major Montague, Chief of Staff, NORBAS, introduced Major Kretsch, G-2 and G-3, NORBAS, who briefly explained the mission and organization of the Base Section as follows:

The mission of NORBAS to supply all U. S. Army Ground Forces and Air Corps Forces in operations from Corsica has been virtually completed, and its efforts are now directed to achieving an expedient close-out. The close-out schedule of NORBAS depends on movement of the Air Corps. Present strength of NORBAS: Assigned, 2,851, attached 524; Slavs, 3,587, total 7,512; less 269 personnel on detached service with other organizations. Based on completion of the Air Corps, 16 April 1945, the release of NORBAS troops is projected as follows:

After close-out of NORBAS there will be one installation on the Island, APO, approximately 75 to 100 troops. It is the desire of NORBAS to reduce troop strength as rapidly as possible and release dates will be advanced whenever possible.

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5. Colonel Blakeney: What is the ultimate completion date except for the ATC?

Major Kretsch: May 31 or sooner if we can get it cleaned up.

Colonel Blakeney: What is the target date of May 5?

Major Kretsch: That will be the close-out of RONRS proper. What will be left will be engineer units including Slavs plus transportation and about 115 men to take care of supplies for the detachments.

Major Montague introduced the RONRS panel members.

6. Major Montague reported estimated tonnage figures for shipments from RONRS as follows:

There is a current backlog due to lack of "bottoms" of more than 5,000 tons and currently available 9,339 tons of supplies and equipment ready for movement. Tonnage listed for movement on 1 May represents pipeline and gasoline tanks for the most part and will not all be available at shipsides until late in May, as it is estimated six weeks will be required to prepare all of the pierced steel planking and pipeline equipment after release by the Air Corps.

7. Colonel Blakeney: Supply discipline, supply security and pilferage is something very close to the heart of the Theater Commander and which has shown tremendous improvement in the over all. We are exerting every effort and spending dollars in order to prevent pilferage of our supplies. However, that is only one of the principle subjects of this conference, and we want to lay specific stress on the urgency of this close-out. It is going to be a matter of transportation. We have made in this theater a commendable record in closing-out North Africa. In fact, that is the

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first base section of any theater in the world which has been closed out and closed out completely. It is essential to decide firmly that the necessity for maintaining NORBS is now over, and the effort must be made by everyone concerned to meet that target date of May 5th. We are interested in clearing out and getting the material off the Island as well as the Personnel. I can't urge upon you too much the necessity and pressure to meet those dates.

The meeting was recessed.

II O-4 PANEL

5. MTOUSA representatives authorized reissue to Slav troops of one (1) additional OG wool trousers and one (1) fatigue suit, presently maintained in Slav warehouses. The scale as outlined by Circular 119 MTOUSA will be followed in the future for replacement issues.

In anticipation of the amendment of Circular 119, authority is granted to issue US - ITI (Slava) brushes, scrubbing; brooms, corn, as necessary cleaning and preserving items on basis of 2 each brushes, scrubbing, and 2 each broom, corn, per 100 individuals per 30 days. It is understood that NMIA will accept.

9. The status of US - ITI (Slavs) was discussed with respect to the prospective movement to France. NMIA is to give O-4 a written memorandum on the present status of these troops and a plan for pay and equipment thereof, and a suggested method of supervision on their move to MTOUSA.

10. It is essential that an immediate survey be instituted to insure that all property requiring disposition instructions by MTOUSA or by the War Department be reported to MTOUSA. This survey is recommended now to obviate the necessity of a hurried compilation of reports and haphazard disposition instructions at close-out time. A cable has been dispatched this date requesting that such a survey be instituted. It is recommended that the survey be expedited and that the results be furnished MTOUSA with the least practicable delay.

11. Procedure to be followed in returning property acquired by Reciprocal Aid is covered by MTOUSA Administrative Memo Number 7, 1944. Reports on transfers made under MTOUSA Administrative Memo Number 7 should be made in the same manner as prescribed in MTOUSA Memo Number 18, 1943, "Reciprocal Aid" (Apr 7c).

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12. Colonel Dodeshoff: What is the status of requisitioned real estate in NORBS; that requisitioned by NORBS; and that requisitioned by the Air Corps?

Major Dryers As concerns property requisitioned by the Air Corps, that is handled by Corsica Air Sub Area. They are responsible for their

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requisitions and claims. As far as NORBS is concerned, we are all clear except for one piece in Calvi, clear in Ille Rousse, and clear in Ajaccio except for two pieces. We are not cleared in Bastia but are de-requisitioning all property as rapidly as possible.

Colonel Dedenhoff: Has the French Government settled with the individual owners of the land that was used by NORBS in the vicinity of Ajaccio for staging troops, and for depots in Calvi and Ille Rousse?

Major Dryer: Sir, we have repeatedly asked the French to notify us when they pay for the property. However, they will not tell us or give us any information about it whatsoever.

Colonel Dedenhoff: It is desired, if information can be obtained discreetly, to be advised of specific instances in which the property owner has not been compensated by the French Government, and specific instances, if any, where the land owner has been paid.

13. The Chief of Transportation has assured us that one liberty ship will be furnished as fast as possible to move out cargo. As far as procedures for our shipping is concerned the Theater Commander would like the maximum out of every available berth when ships are available for loading. In other words, if the ships are here, make arrangements to have them loaded or unloaded around the clock to get them out.

14. Colonel Blakeney: Engineer estimates that it will take six weeks from the time the Air Force flies its last mission to pick up the planking and tear down the pipeline before the last shipment from Corsica can be made.

The meeting was recessed.

III CLOSING GENERAL SESSION

15. Colonel Dedenhoff: The French are claiming damages at Ille Rousse for the improvements made to the port for operations incident to and following the invasion of Southern France. The consensus of opinion was that it was an operational matter and without any basis for a claim. Some discussion was had as to the status of air fields in Corsica and the possibility of using the fields in future operations. We are informed that the areas no longer used by NORBS have been turned back by de-requisitioning. Another question discussed concerned property which had been de-requisitioned and whether the property owner had received the rent from the French Government. NORBS has been asked to check on the payment or nonpayment of this and advise MTCUSA.

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Colonel James, Commanding Officer, NORBS: Is there anything on our part necessary to see that the French pay their just debts?

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Colonel Dodenhoff: I think so. We can ask them to pay the debts. That is the reasons we want specific cases. The situation in North Africa was very bad.

Colonel James: It is here, I know.

Colonel Dodenhoff: The problem of gasoline for AFQ at Poretta will be taken up by us in Caserta. It is noted that HOBBS wants some tankers immediately to take off the POL stock when the Air Corps releases gasoline tanks at the air fields, as the tanks and line must be emptied before they can be dismantled. The HOBBS Engineer reported that he was trying to get the Air Force to stop using Ghinocaccia as soon as possible in order to advance the removal of steel planking.

16. Colonel Blakeney: One other problem is the political implication of the utilization of Slave personnel in France, which needs some clarification at the present time.

Colonel James: I have no information on what repercussions, if any, the Slaves are causing. I would be very much interested in the situation.

Colonel Blakeney: We feel it needs some clarification and are interested to see if the requirements are being met.

17. Colonel Grebe, HOBBS Surgeon: We have been working on an evacuation plan for all personnel not able to go back to their units by 15 May to be transported to the mainland in Italy. We are operating on that basis now. Our units are going to close up as service troops leave. That is just about the sum and substance of the evacuation situation. We are at a low patient level with no anticipated increase, and expect a decrease.

Captain Thomas, Medical Representative: The MTOUSA representative and I discussed the supply situation, and we are in complete agreement on all of our questions. We have arranged to move the Medical Depot by 6 April. We have arranged for medical supplies to be flown in for personnel remaining after the close out of HOBBS.

18. Captain Dean, Ordnance Officer: All questions that came up were satisfactorily settled. With our excess list of 1 April, we will have our ordnance supplies down to the bare necessity for close out operations. We plan to close our depots on 22 April. Supplies necessary for the troops after that time will be issued by the maintenance company. Supplies for the troops here after 5 May will be provided by issuance to trucking companies of a small limited stock of maintenance parts. No maintenance troops will stay behind. To insure that these mechanics are qualified to do the work, we are training the trucking company mechanics in our shops now. A block of five shipping numbers are being assigned to Ordnance for completion of its out-loading. Theoretically our spare parts supply, except for maintenance requirements, should be reduced to zero after 1 April.

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19. Captain Lyle, Quartermaster Representative: All questions and problems discussed were satisfactory to the NORBS Quartermaster and MTOUSA representative. In addition to the matters mentioned in the agenda there were minor problems which were discussed. In reference to impregnated clothing, the theater policy is to have enough on hand for all troops serviced. At present we have more than 100 tons of impregnated clothing and if we keep the impregnated clothing until our final closing out date it adds to the shipping problem. Colonel Wadsworth has given permission to ship the tonnage off by 15 April. In addition there are certain items that can be repaired in this theater such as shoes and salvagable ovens from the bakeries, which will be shipped. Colonel Wadsworth has laid down a policy whereby he concurred with Colonel Fink in keeping a minimum amount of subsistence and supplies for AFC at the time we close our depots. In addition, we have discussed with Colonel Rose from NMIA three problems. First, salvage of property bought by the Italian Government from the U. S. Army for the use of US - ITI troops. He confirms for the Italian Ministry that they do not desire to ship this back to the mainland. Salvage, including shoes that are repairable for reissue, will be reissued to the ITI without charge. Problem No. 2 is that of subsistence at the close-out. The Base Section has certain items that will be furnished for the US-ITI. The items will be shipped with the ITI troops to their new destination. The supplies will be signed for by the American Officer supervising and a copy of the tally-out and the shipping manifest sent to the NMIA for control purposes. The third problem is excess clothing. During last summer overdrawn clothing was issued to the ITI troops. At a later date MTOUSA put out a circular indicating these items were excess. They were gathered up by the 2698th Technical Supervision Regiment and placed in stock. They will be redistributed to the units. A problem came up on statement of charges in connection with supply and will be presented by Colonel Trunner.

Colonel Trunner: Procedure in the past has been to prepare a statement of charges against the individual concerned. Deductions were made on the monthly payroll under Government property lost or damaged. The Military Mission, Italy Army, has subsequently made arrangements, if agreeable to change this procedure since the Italian Government is charged with all clothing and equipment issued to the Slavs from our Government. When further losses occur, no collection would be made on Government property lost or damaged by the Finance Officer. Instead, the Commanding Officer of the 2698th Technical Supervision Regiment would effect collections from the payrolls of the individuals concerned, forward the collection in one amount to the Finance Officer, who in turn will issue a Treasury check payable to NMIA for credit. The NMIA has requested the finance officer to refund previous collections made on Government property lost or damaged.

Colonel Dodeahoff: I question if the MTOUSA Fiscal Officer will concur. The payment of Italian service personnel in this particular case is U. S. funds and the charge against the Italian government is a paper entry. I feel sure he would resist any payment.

Colonel Blakeney: That would not be paid in dollars but would be paid by NMIA.

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Colonel Trumper: It is lira deposited to U. S. account and a check issued against that account in lira funds and not from Federal funds.

Colonel Britten: By the taking of statement of charges it makes a new basis for requisitions.

Colonel Blakney: I think that is a matter of interest to all concerned.

Colonel Dedenhoff: It will have to be a matter to be reviewed by the fiscal officer. If Colonel Trumper will submit the plan through channels, it will be the best way.

Colonel Blakney: I am interested not only in getting an answer to these people, I think that is sufficiently important that a directive should be issued to all concerned on how to handle this thing. I think it is a good question.

20. Captain Siegman, Signal representative: Relative to maintenance supplies to ATG after we move out, it has been decided that ATG can take care of its own needs. I have obtained five blanket shipping orders which will take care of outloading all signal supplies. The problem of expediting Air Corps requisitions for signal items was taken up. A little assistance on the other side is required. The Air Corps has agreed to pick up at Naples and Leghorn all items that they need for maintenance.

21. Lt Colonel Sulak, Transportation Officer: The transportation panel was concerned for the most part with the close-out of ports. It was decided to put a coaster in at Calvi, the latest date being the 15 April with the possibility of one there on April 9. Lieutenant Crosier of the British Navy is there today to make a check on conditions. Plans are to use a 900-ton coaster, which will necessitate three lifts to clear out Calvi. At Ajaccio we have 181 tons of cargo, including one 30-ton crane. Possibility of securing an LST to lift that cargo was discussed. It will take two lifts to clear out Porto Vecchio. We have drawn up a schedule for coasters to close out Bastia. Three coasters will be here within the next three days. The cargo for these coasters has already been allocated. We are working to schedule all Air Corps cargo out by 27 April and NOBBS somewhere around the 5 May. In the Gen Panel Colonel Lambert said it would take six weeks to clean up the pipeline. That will necessitate a schedule until 31 May.

Colonel Blakney: You have set that schedule up tentatively.

Colonel Sulak: Yes, sir.

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Colonel Blakney: Would it be desirable before you leave to make any change, Captain Quinn?

Captain Quinn: On this schedule, we are prepared to make changes as notified.

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Colonel Sulak: We have several questions on civilian travel on WSA ships. We have no WSA agent here. The collections of fees and also what personnel could use this service was brought up. The captain and I could not interpret circular 55-44, so he is going to give us an answer on that. For highway transportation furnished our Allies we are charging 11.5 cents per ton mile and this has met with MTOUSA approval.

22. Colonel Blakeney: There were two subjects not discussed in the Q-H panel that is of interest to all concerned. I should like to have a short discussion as to the plan for ATC. The other subject is that of overall results obtained on supply discipline.

Major O'Connell: Plans on ATC supplies have been tentatively scheduled. Colonel Lambert has prepared adequate storage for the facilities of non-perishable materials at Poretta and also a 650 cubic foot refrigerator for perishables. We discussed the possibility of bringing in other tonnage on schooners, but it is believed that it will be more expedient to fly the supplies here. The field situation is well taken care of. Colonel Lambert has been working in close coordination with ATC.

Colonel Blakeney: They will be actually based upon Fanbase for supplies and submit their requisitions under Fanbase requirements.

Major O'Connell: Yes, sir. There will be a 60-day supply of non-perishables left here. There is no need of loading out and bringing it back in again. I think that covers the supply situation with ATC.

Very stringent efforts have been exercised for supply discipline. The Commanding Officer of ROMM, after his recent trip to Italy, called all members of his command together, and I believe everyone present has read the letter Colonel James wrote regarding the illegal diversion of supplies. Every effort is made to protect supplies in depot to the port and port to depot operations. There is a complete record of all supplies.

Colonel Blakeney: What has been the overall loss on pilferage?

Major O'Connell: It has been negligible. There was a discrepancy on the Genopescia recently of 73 cases, but the exact loss due to pilferage could not be determined as the manifest, portside and depot records were all at variance.

23. Colonel James: Relative to the statement of charges for Slave equipment, it is my understanding that the equipment and supplies as issued to Slave are charged to the Italian Government. Now, when these items are lost they are replaced by us. It seems to me that there is no reason they could not reimburse the United States for that equipment lost and damaged, just the same as you do in the case of an American. It is replaced right here. A pair of shoes, a coat, or \$200 damage to a truck, there is no reason why that man could not pay for it right now. That is the way I am

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going to recommend we continue. Relative to the unloading of our close-out tonnage I would like to mention that this matter has been discussed for the past two and a half months. We have asked for coasters to pick up supplies at Calvi but nothing has happened. We cannot close out unless the supplies are taken away. You have promised me that you would bring no coasters but results have been negligible. What we need now is shipping in the port of Calvi that will lift 3,400 tons. The port is open, the water is seaway, troops are waiting to load it on, and the port can take a ship that will draw 15 feet of water. We must move that tonnage. So please send us a ship that will take 3,400 tons at Calvi. At Porto Vecchio we have 1,300 tons now waiting. It is pipeline and gas tanks, critical items doing no good here and should be taken somewhere else. We must have a ship.

The steel planking at Ghisonaccia cannot be taken up and shipped until the Air Force census operations. That represents about one month to six weeks work. In addition, there is about 100 miles of pipeline and 1 $\frac{1}{4}$ tanks. There is a lot of work involved. We would like to move now the supplies available so that the port will not be cluttered up later.

Colonel Dedenhoff: I appreciate very much Colonel James' interest in pushing this thing.

Colonel James: There is approximately 120 tons of transportation operating gear at Ajaccio that should be moved to a place where it is needed. There are new ports on the continent that could use it.

Colonel Dedenhoff: Other services mentioned have shipping orders for some items regardless of the fact that the Air Force will operate to 27 April. We would like to know what those items are, such items held on temporary shipping tickets will be brought in and moved. I understand from discussion that Air Force units are getting under canvas to facilitate packing, and they will cooperate with you. G-4 will approve T/A items for the Air Force to take with them as organizational equipment.

Captain Quinn: I would like to say that a coaster will move into Calvi on 5 May.

Colonel James: Another point is the ATG supply at Poretta. We are in position to give them all the non-perishable rations they need. It is their responsibility to take care of their needs after we leave.

Colonel Blakemore: I have found this meeting to be of widespread value in ironing out problems, and we have some very helpful information. I move we adjourn.

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The meeting was adjourned.

INFORMATION FOR O&A (A) AFHQ

In per your request to Lt Col Rose during the Supply Conference at ROMANA, the following information is given:

1. a. About June 1945 all Italian troops in Corsica, except those of Slav origin, were withdrawn to Sardinia and certain Italian troops of Slav origin in Sardinia were sent to Corsica, making a total of Italian troops of Slav origin in Corsica of about 4000.

b. These Italian troops in Corsica had not been officered by Italian Army officers. A small detachment of Italian Army officers remained in Corsica but without command and only for the purpose of representing the Italian War Ministry in paying and documenting this personnel. The troops are actually commanded by acting officers appointed by ROMANA from the Slavs in the units, and ROMANA requested that their appointments be commissioned in the Italian Army; this was not possible under Italian law.

c. Up until July 1946, these troops were paid by the Italian Government on the regular Italian pay scale. RATOUSA letter, 1 August 1946, file #O&A.711-1(Italian) PD-2, subject Italian (Slav) troops addressed to Allied Administrative Officer, Corsica, which stated in part: "If Italian funds are not available in payment, you are authorized to make current payments at the prescribed rates and payroll form agreed between your base paymastering agent and the Fiscal Director, this Headquarters. These payments are to be made under the provisions of War Department Circular No. 31, 1942." The Commandant, General, ROMANA, under letter dated 8 August, addressed to Finance Officer, Sardinia, directed the payment of these troops from United States funds as civilian employees and set the rates of pay from \$0.00 to \$3.00 per day. It appears that these troops are now being paid under this authority. There is no record, in this Headquarters, of any request made by ROMANA to the Italians.

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Government for funds to pay these troops; and had such a request been made, the Italian Government would have supplied the funds in accordance with the terms of the capitulation. At this time it would be rather difficult to place these troops on the Italian Army pay scale because the pay being drawn from the United States is about double the Italian Army pay.

a. Prior to 1 August 1944 all of the Italian troops in Corsica were rationed through United States depots at a scale approximately 1-1/3 the U. S. Army "A" ration, plus certain Post Exchange supplies. In addition the Italian Army shipped certain Italian-provided items to Corsica. The vouchers for the United States rations and Post Ex- change supplies for these troops, which have been submitted by ~~UNRRA~~, have been accepted as a charge against the Italian Government. Since 1 August 1944, these troops have been on the authorized Italian ration scale with certain items provided from U. S. depots, and the Italian purchased items being shipped from Italy.

b. Clothing for these troops have been provided from U. S. stocks in Corsica, generally Class "A", and the vouchers submitted by ~~UNRRA~~ have been accepted as a charge against the Italian Government.

c. From the above, you will see that we have the peculiar position of combatient troops being paid by the United States as civil labor but rationed and clothed at the expense of the combatient government. Invite attention to War 16 of AFHQ letter of 16 November 1944, file no O&I.711/108/007-4, subject: Command and Administration of Italian Army.

d. It had been decided by AFHQ that these troops are to be transferred to France. About 1,000 have already been shipped to France.

e. The Italian Government has been concerned about these troops, especially in regard to its responsibility for the expenses and the control of these troops, who are basically still Italian citizens. The Italian Government has requested that some officers of the Italian Army accompany these troops to France in order to handle documentation, pay, and supplies charged against the Italian Government. One Italian officer is in Corsica, and he does sign the vouchers for supplies issued by ~~UNRRA~~, but no authority has been received for these ~~regular~~ officers of the Italian Army to go to France. A request was received from France that one of the acting Army officers be given authority to sign for the Italian Government, but the Italian Government did not agree to this. No vouchers, charging any rations or supplies have been received from France. UNRRA (represent) is handling the matter with UNRRA.

- a. A small Italian Headquarters be sent to France to handle the administrative and supply matters.
- b. These troops be placed on the authorized Italian ration scale, and the U. S. items be substituted for the Italian-provided items issued as it is not practicable for the Italian-provided items to be shipped from Italy. The cost of the entire ration to be borne by the Italian Government. Vouchers covering the rations issued to be signed by an authorized Italian officer and forwarded to USA for charge against the Italian Government.
- c. Clothing and equipment items on the authorized scale to be issued from United States depots as is done for other US-III's and vouchers be forwarded to USA for charge against the Italian Government.
- d. Pay - no recompensations.
- e. The matter of discipline of these troops has not been considered. It is supposed that any serious crimes would be handled by U. S. Courts Martial under the "camp follower" provisions. However, the legality of such a procedure is doubtful as these are actually troops of a non-belligerent nation.

MEMORANDUM: For O-4 (A) AFHQ

As per your request to Lt Col Rose during the Supply Conference at BONNARO, the following information is given:

1. a. About June 1943 all Italian troops in Corsica, except those of Slav origin, were withdrawn to Sardinia; and certain Italian troops of Slav origin in Sardinia were sent to Corsica, making a total of Italian troops of Slav origin in Corsica of about 4800.
b. These Italian troops in Corsica had not been officered by Italian Army officers. A small detachment of Italian Army officers remained in Corsica but without command and only for the purpose of representing the Italian War Ministry in paying and documenting this personnel. The troops are actually commanded by acting officers appointed by BONNARO from the Slavs in the units, and BONNARO requested that their appointees be commissioned in the Italian Army; this was not possible under Italian law.
c. Up until July 1944, these troops were paid by the Italian Government on the regular Italian pay scale. RACOURA letter, 1 August 1944, file no 031.711-1 (Italian) ST-O, subject Italian (Slav) troops addressed to Allied Administrative Officer, Corsica, which stated in part: "If Italian funds are not available in payment, you are authorized to make current payments at the prescribed rates and payroll forms agreed between your base Purchasing Agent and the Fiscal Director, this Headquarters. These payments are to be made under the provisions of War Department Circular No. 21, 1943." The Commanding General, BONNARO, under letter dated 8 August, addressed to Finance Officer, BONNARO, directed the payment of these troops from United States funds as civilian employees and set the rates of pay from \$0.60 to \$3.00 per day. It appears that these troops are now being paid under this authority. There is no record, in this Headquarters, of any request made by BONNARO to the Italian

overnment for funds to pay these troops; and had such a request been made, the Italian Government would have supplied the funds in accordance with the terms of the armistice. At this time it would be rather difficult to place these troops on the Italian Army pay scale inasmuch as the pay being drawn from the United States is about double the Italian Army pay.

4. Prior to 1 August 1944 all of the Italian troops in Corsica were rationed through United States Depots at a scale approximately 1-1/3 the U. S. Army "B" ration, plus certain Post Exchange supplies. In addition the Italian Army shipped certain Italian-provided items to Corsica. The vouchers for the United States rations and Post Exchange supplies for these troops, which have been submitted by BOUBAKH, have been accepted as a charge against the Italian Government. Since 1 August 1944, these troops have been on the authorized Italian ration scale with certain items provided from U. S. depots, and the Italian-purchase items being shipped from Italy.

5. Clothing for these troops have been provided from U. S. stocks in Corsica, generally Class "A", and the vouchers submitted by BOUBAKH have been accepted as a charge against the Italian Government.

6. From the above, you will see that we have the peculiar position of co-belligerent troops being paid by the United States as civil labor but rationed and clothed at the expense of the co-belligerent government. Invite attention to Par 15 of AFHQ letter of 16 November 1944, file AD QM 711/169/OCT-0, subject: Command and Administration of Italian Army.

7. It had been decided by AFHQ that these troops are to be transferred to France. About 1,000 have already been shipped to France.

8. The Italian Government has been concerned about these troops, especially in regard to its responsibility for the expenses and its control of these troops, who are legally still Italian citizens. The Italian Government has requested that some officers of the Italian Army accompany these troops to France in order to handle documentation, pay, and supplies charged against the Italian Government. One Italian Officer is in Corsica, and he does sign the vouchers for supplies issued by BOUBAKH, but no authority has been received for these ~~to~~² officers of the Italian Army to go to France. A request was received from France that one of the acting ~~two~~ officers be given authority to sign for the Italian Government, but the Italian Government did not agree to this. No vouchers, charging any rations or supplies have been received from France. O-3 Org (foreign) is handling the matter with BOUBAKH.

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- b. From the supply and accounting standpoint, the following is recommended:
- a. A small Italian contingent be sent to France to handle the administrative and supply aspects.
 - b. These troops be placed on the authorized Italian payroll scale, and U. S. items be substituted for the Italian-provided items whenever it is not practicable for the Italian-provided items to be shipped from Italy. The cost of the entire ration is to be borne by the Italian Government. Vouchers covering the rations is and to be signed by an authorized Italian officer and forwarded to USAF for charge against the Italian Government.
 - c. Clothing and equipment items on the authorized scale to be issued from United States depots as is done for other USAF's and vouchers be forwarded to USAF for charge against the Italian Government.
 - d. Pay + no recommendations.
- e. The matter of discipline of these troops has not been considered. It is supposed that any serious offense would be handled by U. S. Courts Martial under the "Kang Follower" provisions. However, the legality of such a procedure is doubtful as these are actually troops of a combatant nation.

TO : Allied Administrative Officer, Corsica, APO 386.

1. Reference your recent discussions with the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-1, and the Fiscal Director, this headquarters, on the subject of the future use of Italian (Slav) Troops and their pay and allowances, this matter has been given proper consideration by the interested staff sections.

2. Decision has been made that these units be continued on their present status for the time being. If Italian funds are not available for payment, you are authorized to make current payments at the prescribed rates on payroll forms agreed between your Base Purchasing Agent and the Fiscal Director, this headquarters. These payments to be made under the provisions of War Department Circular Number 21, 1943.

3. Final decision on the use of these troops will be made about two weeks before it is desired to move them into the ANVIL Area, at which time we will ask the Italian Government to authorize it, and at that time will state that we are agreeable to paying and maintaining them.

4. You should advise this headquarters in ample time before planned movement so the question may be discussed with the Italian Government, and final decision reached.

SUBJECT: Establishment of Courts for Slav Units, NOBSS.

To : Colonel James, Acting Chief of Staff.

1. Pursuant to our conversation of yesterday, in which instructions were given the undersigned to prepare a scheme of courts for the Slav units of this headquarters, the following is submitted:

a. It is suggested that a special court be set up for each group of three or more companies, the court to consist of not less than five Slav officers, plus a trial judge advocate and a defense counsel. This court will be instructed to follow the procedure outlined in our Manual for Courts-Martial (1920) and may give sentences up to six months confinement at hard labor and forfeiture of 2/3 pay of the convicted up to the same period. The table of maximum punishments, MCM, 1920, will apply.

b. A separate stockade for the incarceration of convicted prisoners will have to be established and maintained.

c. The unit commanders should be acquainted with the provisions of Article of War 104 and company punishment, and each company should have appointed at least one summary court officer, said appointment to be made by the appropriate group commander.

d. The senior group commander will receive and store all court records involving Slav personnel.

e. Appropriate group commanders will appoint the courts, review the proceedings, publish the orders, and execute all sentences.

2. It is pointed out, however, that unless the consent of the protecting power be previously obtained, no sentence against a Slav by a special or general court can be legally sustained. Administrative and disciplinary action up to and including summary court-martial are at present authorized ^{by G.O. 1} existing interpretation of present regulations; however, the first Inspector General who examined the morning reports of Slav units and notes therein any reference to a conviction or action by any special or general court, will probably demand an explanation thereof which would prove embarrassing to the Commanding General. It is therefore respectfully reiterated and recommended that no such courts be constituted without

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prior authority, and that any Slev personnel that, by their recalcitrant actions have earned such punishment as might be meted by such a court as is desired, be sent back to Italy or Sardinia and returned to the control of the Italians rather than be tried. If this contemplated action is given proper publicity in the units, it is believed that the effect upon delinquency will be most beneficial, and no such courts without the law will have to be resorted to.

SUBJECT: Enforcement of Discipline.

TO : Commanding Officer, Detachment 2615th Technical Supervisory Regiment (overhead), APO 386.

1. For the purpose of maintaining discipline and preserving law and order among the Slav personnel who are working under the supervision of this Headquarters, you will appoint a court-martial of acting Slav officers within your command for the purpose of trying Slav personnel and adjudging suitable punishment to those accused who are found guilty of misconduct. The court will consist of not more than five (5) or not less than three (3) Slav officers. Findings of the court and the sentence adjudged in each case will be determined by secret written vote of the members of the court, the concurrence of a majority of the members present being required to decide these issues. Charges will be brought in writing against each offender, describing accurately the time, place, and nature of the offense; the charges will be signed and sworn to and will be personally considered by the group commander concerned before reference to court for trial. Each case will be decided on the basis of the competent evidence presented by the prosecution and defense; without regard for personal favor or dislike for the accused. The accused will be represented by defense counsel appointed by the group commander or by counsel of his own selection if desired. The accused will be allowed to make a sworn or unsworn statement to the court or to remain silent if he so chooses. The court, the trial judge advocate, and the witnesses will be sworn or affirmed. The senior acting Slav officer will review all proceedings, will act upon such sentence, will publish a report of the proceedings in each case to all Slav units attached to the 20th Port (abt), and will render a report of action taken to the Commanding General, 20th Port (abt).

2. The following offenses and suggested maximum penalties therefor are published for the guidance of all Slav personnel concerned:

a. Minor offenses, including (1) Drunkenness, (2) being in an off-limits area, (3) failure to obey the orders of noncommissioned officers, (4) disorderly conduct, and similar offenses, the punishment may consist of forfeitures of not to exceed 9/10th of pay per month for not more than six (6) months.

b. Intermediate offenses, including (1) insubordination, (2) simple assaults, (3) thievery of any article under the value of \$20.00, (4) AWOL and (5) offenses of sentries and guards, the punishment may consist of reduction in rank, forfeitures of all pay and allowances due or to become due, and return to the control of the Italians.

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c. Serious offenses, including murder, rape, assaults with criminal intent, willful disobedience of the orders of a commissioned officer, wrongfully damaging, neglecting or losing property of the United States Government in an amount greater than \$20.00, and similar offenses, each and all of these matters will be formally investigated by American officers, charges thereupon preferred, and the accused, with all charges, facts, and allied papers, will be summarily returned to the Italians for trial and punishment by them.

Report of Supply Conference with AACMG/MTO, 15 February 1945.

1. The meeting convened in the office of A-4, AACMG/MTO at 9 A.M. Opening remarks in the nature of a welcome were given by the Senior Air Force officer which was followed by General McKay, MTOUSA, explaining the purpose of the conference. He was followed by General Thomas, A-4 of AACMG/MTO who explained briefly the organization of MAFF. This is briefly as follows:

- a. Mediterranean Army Air Forces, which is divided into the Royal Air Force and MAFF/MTO.
- b. MAFF consists of the Strategic Air Force which is Allied, and the Tactical Air Force which is Allied.
- c. The 15th Air Force is the U.S. portion of the Strategic Air Force, and has its own Service Command.
- d. The 18th Air Force is the U.S. portion of the Tactical Air Force, and has its own Service Command.
- e. There is also an Engineer Command whose responsibility is to construct air fields.
- f. The AACMG is the base Depot establishment to service the U.S. portion of all of the above. General Thomas emphasized that the Service Commands of the 15th and 18th Air Forces were like a Division's Service Troops in that they were part of the organization.

2. The conference then broke up into its respective panels. As the AACMG did not have an Army Exchange Office, the MTOUSA Army Exchange representative joined the conference of the Quartermaster, as the questions for discussion of the Army Exchange pertained directly to the Quartermaster. The following comments were made:

- a. The Quartermaster, AACMG is of the opinion that the Naples Area is not getting its full share of critical items.

(1) It was explained to the QM that this is a complaint that is heard all over the Theater and is caused primarily by such critical items not being furnished from the U.S. in sufficient quantities, due to limited production in the States. It was further explained that the Army Exchange Service will now carry 15-days' supply in its own warehouses and that back order systems are being established. The tendency, therefore, will be for an improvement in critical items distribution. The QM also brought up the problem of troops in the Naples Area having to consume bottled beer. It was explained to the QM that this beer is brewed on American standards, and due to the limited shipping space available for the transportation of beer from the U.S., it is still considered essential that local beer be consumed in the areas where it is produced in order to make available American beer to the areas of the Theater where local beer cannot be produced. To the extent possible, beer from the U.S. will be used to supplement U.S. type, bottled beer in the Naples Area.

(2) The question of sheets and pillow cases for root troops were considered. The Army Exchange Officer stated that an effort would be made to secure more of these items.

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5. Reference paragraph 3 of the G-4 agenda, dated 24 February 1945, the following points were discussed:

a. Concrete results obtained on the matters covered in the Theater Commander's directive on Supply Discipline (MTOUSA topic). The AG stated that such evidence as applicable would be presented through G-4.

b. Clothing for civilians employed by U.S. Forces (AAF/MTO topic). The policy for furnishing clothing for civilians employed by U.S. Forces is stated in MTOUSA cable YK-18092, dated 31 January 1945. It was emphasized that clothing of civilians is not an Army responsibility, but is that of A.G. and that in the provisions of the above referred to cable is only an emergency interim measure. Insofar as Base Sections cannot, or do not, furnish the requirements of the AAF organizations employing civilians, such exceptional cases may be submitted to this Headquarters for consideration. It was further emphasized that the tendency will be for a decrease in issues to civilians employed by the U.S. Army, which is necessary in view of the fact that we must build up stock piles of clothing for prisoners of war, repatriates, and other distinctly military obligations.

c. Supply of US-ITI Military Organizations (AAF/MTO topic). The AG of the AAF brought out the fact that certain items have not been furnished in adequate quantities by the Italian Military. These items are:

(1) Stationery.

(a) To the extent that stationery is required for organizational use, requisitions may be submitted through U.S. Army channels for the minimum essential quantities.

(b) Shipping Tickets will be sent to the Chief Accountant, A.G., through MILA for charge against the Italian Government.

(2) Cleaning and Preserving Materials.

(a) To the extent that it is required to preserve the health of the US-ITIs of the Command, cleaning and preserving of material may be requisitioned as prescribed in (1) above.

(3) Officers' Clothing.

(a) There are two sources of supply for clothing for US-ITI officers. One source is for them to be issued green dyed clothing that is made available for all US-ITIs. The other source is for them to requisition as a group for cloth to the Italian War Ministry through Italian channels. To expedite this, a copy of the requisition should be sent to MILA. Limited quantities of cloth of Italian origin are available for this purpose. The cloth will be made into uniforms through facilities available to and at the expense of the Italian officer.

(4) Razor Blades. These items are being furnished by the Italian War Ministry. While the quantity is limited, it is noted that shipments are being made. In addition to the furnishing of razor blades, the Italian War ministry has available some company barber kits which are very appropriate in view of the practice of the Italian Army to use company barbers. These may be requisitioned through Italian channels to the Italian War ministry, copy to be furnished MILA.

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(b) Toilet Soap. The Italian War Ministry is making considerable progress in the furnishing of soap for all IWI. There is only one type of soap made and will have to suffice for general use as well as toilet purposes.

d. Sleeping Bags (AAF/MTO topic). The CM, AAPOC stated that the AAF was very dissatisfied with the sleeping bags. It was explained that the War Department had agreed to allow this theater to utilize the bag, sleeping wool, as it was most appropriate. The policy is, therefore, that two blankets will be considered in this theater as the mandatory allowance, and that the bag, sleeping, wool, will not be required to be issued until such time as additional warmth is required. This will mean that during summer months the bags, sleeping, wool, may be turned in by those troops who so desire, and two blankets, wool, retained.

e. Winter Clothing and Equipment (AAF/MTO topic). It is recognized that there are now many reasons why it would be advisable for certain organizations of the Theater to retain their winter clothing. It is also recognized that unless this retention is carefully supervised, there is a danger of considerable loss through improper storage. Another handicap is that it would be most difficult for this Headquarters to estimate requirements for wool clothing to be issued next fall. The conclusion arrived at was that an official request would be submitted by the AAF and further study would be given to the matter by this Headquarters, with an official reply being made.

(1) Insofar as stores are concerned, it was concluded that it would be more economical for them to be turned in to Base Sections for repair and preservation.

f. Disposition of Flight Jackets (AAF/MTO topic). Disposition will be furnished in the near future.

g. Ration Variety (AAF/ZTC topic). It is thought that with the establishment of a 60-day stock level in Adriatic Depot, that issues can be made which will permit a wider variety of items to be furnished. Quarter-masters will be cautioned to follow the menu as closely as stock permits and to vary the issues in vegetables to the maximum extent possible.

4. In view of the wide interest in the matters discussed above, copies of this report are being sent to CM Fanbase, CM Fifth Army, CM Adriatic Depot, CM AAPOC/MTO and MIA. Where necessary, amendments to existing supply directives will be made.
