The 244 and 332 Field Hospitals continue to receive the sick of the Gruppo. The Nursing Orderlies continue to benefit by practical experience and receive instruction from the Medical Officers.

Medical Section.

This unit has now reached a high standard of efficiency. Under the direction of a British Medical Officer from 10 Indian Div. an exercise for the Stretcher Bearer Platoons, the largest department of the unit, was carried out during the period under review. This was performed in an efficient manner and the stretcher bearers can be considered as having completed their training; they have nearly all had actual battle experience.

ii). STATE OF TRAINING AND SPECIALISTS.

Personnel of the special departments, Hygiene section and pharmacies etc., are performing their duties in a very satisfactory manner and receive regular instruction from their respective officers.

The medical strength has been increased by the arrival of two pharmacist and one dental officers. This will further assist the training of other ranks in these departments.

iii). BALANCE OF PROGRAMME TO BE COMPLETED.

The British Medical Officer attached for training having returned to his unit no further extensive training is anticipated. The Medical Section is, however, taking part at the present time in divisional exercises and will continue to do so in the future.

iiii). COURSES AND SPECIAL TRAINING COMPLETED.

No personnel are attending courses at present or have been instructed to do so in the near future.

The short course in nursing duties, stretcher bearing and first aid for regimental stretcher bearers arranged by a Medical Officer of the Medical Section is now nearing completion.

v). DIFFICULTIES ENCOUNTERED.

No special difficulties have been encountered. The lack of personnel transport makes visits to units less frequent than is desirable.

Part I - GENERAL INFORMATION FROM THE HQ. (Contd)1. HQ.

(a) Duties of CSM - A Directive 'Initiate Any Repair and Emergency Org' clearly defining these duties has been received from the HQ and the CSM is now fully advised of his responsibilities. He has already issued instructions to Wago and LAD for the basic principles to be instructed but before he can commence his full duties as CSM it will be necessary for the Station CSM to authorize the procedure and to issue instructions to Wago, LAD and Lites. This is now in hand.

(c) Wagon Stores Table and Org. - Considerable progress has been made in the sorting and handling of stores etc, but there are still seriously large deficiencies both in stores and tool kits. Also the absence of a good parts list and catalogue and the substitution of postal orders for hired store issues, has impeded progress.

(d) HQ Adm in the Group. - The unit HQ officers are showing a keen interest in their work but the standard of veh maintenance and HQ road discipline is still extremely low. In order to remedy this, the book system of maintenance has been introduced and instructions have been issued by HQ to all Wago and units. The various tables are to be published in full (in Italian) in Part 2 under ref 1.2.45.

(e) Italian HQ Inspections (HQ and Column) 'B' Veh inspections (HQ and) have been started and Lt Jemio of the Wago staff has been selected as the HQ Inspecting Officer. He is rapidly picking up the Wago procedure and should prove a satisfactory HQ Inspector.

Although in the British system one HQ is made responsible for both HQ and LAD it is felt that in the case of the Legnano Gruppe it will be advisable to divide the responsibility and it is proposed to select a technically minded army officer and train him for LAD inspections. (HQ has the matter in hand.)

- (c) Wkps Stores Tools and Test Considerable progress has been made in the sorting and binning of stores etc. but there are still seriously large deficiencies both in stores and tool kits. Also the absence of spares parts lists and catalogues and the substitution of postal lorries for binned store lorries has impeded progress.
- (d) M.T. Administration in the Gruppo The unit M.T. officers are showing a keen interest in their work but the standard of vehicle maintenance and M.T. Road discipline is still extremely low. In order to remedy this the Task system of Maintenance has been introduced and instructions have been issued by C.M.E. to all Wkps and Units. The various tasks are to be published in full (in Italian) in Part I Orders w.e.f. 1.3.45.
- (e) Italian RME Inspections (MT and Ordnance) 'B' Vehicle Inspections (AFB 406) have been started and Lt Jannie of the Wksp Staff has been selected as the M.T. Inspecting Officer. He is rapidly picking up the Wksp procedure and should prove a satisfactory RME Inspector.
- Although in the British system one RME is made responsible for both M.T. and Ordnance it is felt that in the case of the Legnanc Gruppo it will be advisable to divide the responsibility and it is proposed to select a 'Mechanically' minded Artillery officer and train him for Ordnance Inspections. (CME has the matter in hand)

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(e) Italian EME Inspections (MT and Ordnance) 'B' Vehicle Inspections (AFB 406) have been started and Lt Jannie of the Wksp Staff has been selected as the M.T. Inspecting Officer. He is rapidly picking up the Wksp procedure and should prove a satisfactory EME Inspector.

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PART II - State of Training of Specialists and Tradesmen

(a) Small Arms

Ten Unit Armourers have been undergoing a course in Repair and Maintenance of Small Arms in the Mech Engrs Wksp under the instruction of the Increment Armourer.

3 more series of 10 each are to be given similar instruction.

PART II(cont.)(b) Instruments

The Wksp is still deficient of its 2 Inst Mechs and it therefore has been impossible to inaugurate a course of instruction. The seriousness of this position has been pointed out to the CME who is now endeavouring to obtain the necessary personnel.

(c) Wireless

At present there are no Italian wireless mechanics and the position is as in II(b) above. This matter has been referred to the CME for action.

(d) Gun Shop

The one gun fitter available in the Mech Engrs Wkspg is at present receiving instruction on Field Army eqpt. Here again additional personnel are urgently required, and the matter has been referred to the CME.

(e) EME Inspection (Italian)

The training of a 'E' Vehicle Inspecting Officer is going ahead and as soon as a suitable Arty Officer is available the Ordnance Inspections will also commence.

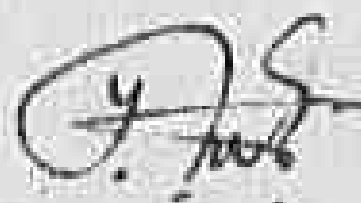
