

DREDGING OF NAVIGABLE CANAL

1. With regard to the dredging of the Navigable Canal of Taranto you are informed that the Ministry of Marine has excluded the use of explosive charges for this purpose, for fear of damaging the stability of the banks, the pillars of the bridge and the tunnel under the canal and also because the work would be extensive and of long duration.

2. The Ministry therefore, has arranged that the suction dredger of the CIDONIO firm, which gave most satisfactory results at AUGUSTA be tried for this purpose, with a recommendation that the operation be confined to a safe distance from the walls of the canal.

The suction dredger of the CIDONIO firm has no slip at present and one would have to be built.

About 20 cubic metres of timber are required for this.

3. To execute the work in question, in addition to the craft which will be used to convey the refuse excavated to the dump, dredger pipes will be laid along both banks of the canal, to deposit the refuse on to the two beaches situated at the entrance of the canal.

4. It is to be borne in mind that as the dredger is to be secured to both banks of the canal, the work should be carried out only at night when the canal is free of traffic, except for small craft.

5. The dredging operations could be effected within a period of 60 working days after the completion of the slip mentioned in paragraph 2.

6. Your concurrence to the above will be awaited before experiments are initiated.

With reference to your letter No. 11730/S.2 dated 13th March 1945, it is requested that you will inform the Ministry of Marine as follows:

(a) Tests for explosive required, compatible with safety, were carried out by Officer-in-Charge of Works on 13th March 1945, and in conjunction with representatives from Marigonimil on 14th March 1945. The results of the tests showed that, using a charge of 2 oxs. polar gelignite at the bottom of a drill hole 70 cms. deep in stiff clay, the earth within a conical shaped hole of surface area 1.20 by 1.00 metres and depth 75 cms. was broken up into sizes suitable for grabbing. The earth was not blown clear of the hole and there was practically no concussion.

(b) The Director of Marigonimil and his representatives who were present at the test, agreed that the use of explosive on the above lines would not, in any way, have any detrimental effects on the foundations of the canal retaining banks nor on the bridge foundations. It was further agreed however, that as a matter of additional precaution, the loosening of the clay bed near the bridge would be done by pneumatic cutters.

(c) It is intended to employ the grab dredger G.A. 180 for this work.



Note New Paper

1. At the meeting held at Hwy House on 14th March 1945 it was decided that the above work would have to be carried out by dredgers available at Toronto.
2. Dredgers available are (I) Section Dredger Malton (II) Grab Dredger G.A. 180
3. Dredger "TANIA" cannot dredge to the depth required, unless her combined cutting and suction arm is extended. These alterations would take approximately 3 months to complete.
4. The only available dredger, ready for use, is the grab dredger G.A. 180.

Proceedings on Manchurian Canal.

1. It is reported that the Chinese Communist Government has excluded the use of railroads for this purpose. One cause of this being the害怕 (fear) and also because the road would be difficult and of long duration.

5. The working conditions on each side of the canal will be decided by the Chinese Com. and the Chinese Com. will be entitled to the right to inspect the working conditions in general.

The view expressed in paragraph 4 of minute I is not concurred in, since there are indications that the policy expressed in A.F.O. 1047/44 may shortly be altered in which case it will become a matter of great importance as to whether payments in Italy are effected by the Italian or British governments.

2. Since the majority of repair work in the Taranto Area is carried out in the Royal Arsenal the question does not assume the same importance as in the Naples Area. It is however considered that the Italian Navy should pay for work performed on vessels under categories a), b), and c) of paragraph 1, minute I. Theoretically the Italian government should also pay for repairs to vessels under d), but as a matter of expediency, it is preferable that, when order to refit these vessels is given by British authorities, payment should be made by the Royal Navy.

3. In order to deny the Italians the opportunity of disclaiming responsibility for repairs carried out on vessels in categories a), b) and c), it is suggested that facilities be given for Italian Naval Officers to supervise the repair work in each instance.



The ships mentioned in memorandum No. 220/108 of 10 August are being prepared for special service by order of the Commander-in-Chief Mediterranean.

After being surveyed, they were selected for this service because they were found to be too seriously damaged to justify repairing them in the present circumstances.

There could be no question of bringing these ships into use for the Italian Government only. If fit for normal service, they would pass into the Mediterranean Shipping Board pool for the general use of all the Allied war efforts.



The Minister admitted the truth of facts (3) and (4) in Paragraph 2 of your letter but after a long discussion, he stated that it could not agree to the suggestion that British Officers must always act under the orders of British Officers in case of loss of seniority. He protested that it would be impossible for him to maintain the morale of his officers if he were to constantly have to attend to enforce this proposal. Subject: Upgrade of armes.

1) During the War of 1915 - 18 the Italian Navy, which had no forces of Marine Infantry, formed a "Brigade of Marines" from an Infantry Regiment and including some Landing Accr'y units and Naval guns mounted in small monitors. This brigade did very good service in the actions which took place on the Isonzo and Piave Rivers, in areas where the land fronts approached the sea-coast.

After the War, only that regiment remained which had been given the name "San Marco", formed in two battalions one of which was sent to China for service in the Shanghai International Settlement.

In the 1920 - 43 war, the San Marco Regiment has fought in North Africa and especially in Tunis, where two battalions remained up to the last, while a third, coming from Libya and reduced to a few men, was transferred to home.

It has so happened that no part of the San Marco Regiment was to be found in Italian territory controlled by R.I. 1st Div. Pavia, after the Armistice.

On the other hand, the I.R. 11 recently desirous to offer all collaboration in this field.

The "San Marco" Regiment has been re-formed into two battalions, to be known under the old 15 - 16 names of GRADO and ALBEE, and which may be used to great advantage in amphibious combat operations.
