




for example as police, guards, orderlies; engineer labourers, clerks, drivers, etc. Other things being equal, patriots should be given preference in the allotment of work. It may be possible sometimes to replace women who have undertaken men's work during the war by patriots. Special care should be taken to see that prominent patriots in any band receive individual attention and special employment on a higher scale of wages when possible and appropriate.

7. Military Employment for Patriots.

The Italian Ministry of War is providing representatives to visit provinces and communes in order to screen these patriots who may desire to join the Italian regular armed forces. Arrangements have been made to facilitate this recruiting.

8. Patriot Representatives.

Pairs of Italian Patriot Representatives - one from each of the two main Italian Patriotic organizations which are recognised by the Allies - will be present at every provincial H.Q. of the Allied Military Government. These representatives are forbidden to conduct any political propaganda. They are sent out at the request of the Allied Military Government authorities with the Armies, and their main task is to assist Allied officers and the Patriotic committees to distinguish genuine patriots from bogus ones. Certificates of merit will be issued to genuine patriots; bogus patriots will be sternly suppressed.

9. Patriot Committees.

Italian Patriot Committees to assist patriots will be set up in communes and at the H.Q. of every province of Allied Military Government. All these Committees are

composed of Italians who are known and respected in their localities; they may be assisted by Allied officers. In Rome there is a National Committee over which the Prime Minister of Italy presides. It is the task of these Committees to give active help and advice in all matters in which patriots are concerned after the liberation of their area.

10. General Alexander's Posters.

The subject matter of the posters addressed to patriots and signed by General Alexander should be drawn to the attention of the leaders of patriot bands.

Thus, they link themselves historically with the great period of Italian history in the latter part of the 19th Century, when Italy freed herself from foreign domination by the military action of Giuseppe Garibaldi and his red-shirted soldiers. It is for this reason that many patriot

bands call themselves "Garibaldi Brigades"; that the patriots wear red kerchiefs or armbands, and have the Garibaldi hymn as their song.

They took to the hills and lived by the help of the peasants, and by their own resourcefulness in capturing enemy material. When the Allies entered Pisces, they found that the patriots had even learned to pronounce the word "mine" in English so as to assist the Allied soldiers more quickly in pointing out their location.

The Patriots also help the Allied authorities after they have occupied a region or a city, by supplying information on the condition of the population, on medical needs, on public services, and on material left behind by the retreating enemy. One of their important services is to supply the Allied authorities

Lauderdale with the Germans, who have selectively colonized the estates of its associates.

In Florence, the patriots played a decisive role in the liberation of the northern part of the city, before the Allied troops could build a bridge across the Arno to replace those blown up by the Germans. The patriots organised the Allied with constant information on enemy activity, which they conveyed across the river by a most daringfeat, which consisted of laying a telephone line, right under the eyes of the Germans, across the only bridge that was left standing. By this method they connected the Headquarters of the Committee of National Liberation in northern Florence with allied Headquarters, in the southern side of the city, and were able to keep in constant touch with the allied military authorities who guided their activity, first restraining a new front making a one-way bridge, then in giving orders: the battle as they pursued the Germans out of the city. They should be persuaded to hand in their arms as soon as possible under arrangements made by A.M.G. Preliminary consultation with band leaders will be necessary, and it should be explained that ===== should be much is expected from patriots in the future. There is a danger that patriots will be tempted to take the law into their own hands, and this danger may be greatest in districts where the main responsibility for the maintenance of law and order before the Allied Military Government has had time to arrive, has rested on the patriots. The temptation to pay off old scores is bound in such circumstances to be considerable. In Florence a case occurred of a patriot arresting a man on a charge of having been a collaboratorist. When the case was investigated it was found that the victim was guilty only of having seduced the patriot's wife. A firm hand is clearly needed in such cases.

Officers of the Allied Military Government have experience in the handling of patriot problems. Bogus patriots must be sternly suppressed. They are often bandits, or men who have waited in hiding until the Allies arrived to jump ~~in~~ the handwagons and claim all the benefits. In the task of weeding out bogus patriots the genuine bands are usually very willing to assist, but it must be remembered that it may be a temptation to some band leaders to increase their own importance by adding to the number of their followers.

The subject matter of the posters addressed to patriots and signed by General Alexander should be drawn to the attention of the leaders of patriot bands. When in doubt the nearest Civil Affairs Officer should be consulted; the local patriot committee can be contacted through him.
