THE ACTUAL SITUATION OF THE PATRIOTS IN FLORENCE

## Report of the Provincial Patriot Office of Florence

1° The Actual situation of the patriots in Florence

The Patriots of other Regions that are now in Florence amount to no less than 600, of whom about 500 are in hospitals or in the "Centro Raccolta" which was opened a few days ago in Via Montebello in the "Sassetti School", while the others are disbanded.

We shall illustrate these three positions in which the Patriots find themselves :

- a) Disbanded Patriots are those that do not want to lodge at the "Centro Raccolta", and have found other accomodation either with friend or at some Commands. These many amount to about 120-130 and are the more fortunate ones, because they are neither wounded nor ill and have settled themselves better than they could have done at "Centro Raccolta"; but these men are in no way controlled and the fact itself that they do not live at "Centro Raccolta" shows a kind of protest.
- b) Patriots lying in hospital, are about 220, and are in the various hospitals of Florence. The benefit of the Ration "M" and without being able to controll it, they have the entire ration which is due to the Patriots, when can say that the accomodations in the hospitals are fairly good.  
When wounded and sick patriots are dismissed from hospitals they are given 30- 60 or 90 days convalescence; but these convalescence which should be a period of rest to rebuild the exhausted organisms the patriots pass it now at the "Centro Raccolta" where they get the treatment stated in the following paragraph 'C' the same can be said of the mutilated ~~leaving~~ <sup>1065</sup> in the hospitals
- c) Patriot at the "Centro Raccolta". A few days ago the building of the "Sassetti School" in Via Montebello was requisitioned, and the patriots have been lodged there(about60) those that at first had been in Via della Scala at the refugees' Camp and also those that lately have arrived in Florence. In the Refugee's Camp Center there are today two hundred and seventy patriots. The school house contains large and spacious schoolclassrooms. The treatment the Patriots receive is the following:  
Two or three blankets,  
the possibility to take baths at the Refugees Camp.  
Flour for making bread gr.250

The kitchen is in the open, and without roof, There are only two water taps for the Patriots to wash at, one on the ground floor and the other on the first floor.

Order is maintained in the Barracks by the Patriots themselves who are sentries, do the cleaning up and the cooking themselves.

This center is well disciplined.

What is essentially needed and should have immediate attention is the following

Mess: The bread and food rations must be augmented -The Patriots are all young people and need sufficient nourishment especially after the hardships of the front line.

Clothes, underwear and boots

Patriots arrived with clothes in a very bad state , their boots are torn and often unmendable . They themselves are generally full of lice and many have scabb; it is not enough that they are able to take a bath, if afterwards they are obliged to put on their old dirty clothes, and it is impossible to have the clothes washed and cleaned if they do not possess a change- it is feared also that the scabb and lice propagate amongst the patriots.

Bedding- When One can not allow the Patriots to continue to sleep on the floor , as they are actually doing; only 28 have a materesses to sleep on, it is indispensable to find straw for them.

Wood-it is necessary to provide wood for cooking purposes as well as heating . The Patriots have to be able to cook, broken up and burnt the school banches - A truck has been asked for to go in the country to get wood.

Water-taps: it is necessary to have others put in .

Convalescent home - if it is not possible to have a real convalescen home for the sick, mutilated and wounded patriots that leave the hospitals, it is necessary to create special ward to give them special treatment and possibly beds or coats and better food.

Cigarettes: Nearly all patriots are smokers but they receive neither cigarettes nor tobacco.

Please notice:

- 1) That there exist already a gathering center for patriots in Via Galliano, which functioned well : it was suddenly requisitioned by the Allies without previously letting this Office know.
- 2) This new center has been constituted of repeated insistence of this office, which has had to overcome many difficulties and

and resistance and was established in a great hurry when it was possible that other patriots were arriving, as in fact they did.

- 3) That Patriots are not asking for anything special, they have been disillusioned and pained by the treatment they have received and this could possibly provoke ~~and~~ a demonstration of protest.

This office feels it its duty to obtain that this state of things should change as soon as possible, because does not seem right or just, that those who have performed their duty should not receive the welcome they deserve and that they have the right to expect.

That in the following days patriots will continue to flow into Florence, they belong to the units who up to now were in connection with Allied Troops, and functioned in vanguard and in the units that were occupied territory : two of this units have already courageously crossed the enemy line in compact units, when one, Commander by Capt. Nardi, not only brought back its own arms but also 30 German prisoners they have captured.

Following the proclamation of General Alexander which impressed them profoundly because in substance it told them to lay down the arms and to live as best they could, the Patriots were unable to remain where they were : to return to their occupied villages and towns was impossible and meant sure death; to remain where they were was also impossible and it was asking for death, owing to the weather conditions cold, they want of proper clothing and food.

It can be calculate that in a little while the Patriots in Florence will amount to about two thousand if not more.

- 4) Necessary provisions required to solve the Patriot question. The patriot question could easily be solved - if there were only a few offices and few people to attend to it; and once is established who is to look after patriots and surmising follow the logical consequences.

The surmising amounts to this :

It is undisputably necessary, for the Italian Government as well as for the Allies to acknowledge that patriots are military men and this is proved by the fact that the privileged pension of war is awarded to wounded and mutilated patriots and some ceremonies are granted to the following patriots and therefore the necessary conclusion is that :

The treatment due to the patriots is that which is given to the Army. It is also evident that this treatment is due to the Patriots from the day they crossed the lines and until they are effectively mobilized returning to their own homes, or joining the forces etc.etc.

Applying ~~re~~ rigorously these principles the patriot problem is automatically solved, because if the patriots are in the army are considered as military they should also have :

- 1) A barracks of their own.
- 2) The same rations as given to the army
- 3) Comforts as allowed to the armed forces.
- 4) Tobacco as given to the army
- 5) Folding beds or materasses with straw.
- 6) Clothing, underwear and boots so they should not suffer from the cold and are able to change underwear.
- 7) The possibility to pass period of convalescence in a way to build up the organismus.
- 8) The possibility to have some honest amenities to ~~keep~~ lift the pressed moral.
- 9) A minimum pay, for small expenses.

ADMINISTRATIVE INSTRUCTION NO 202DISPOSAL OF PATRIOT VICTIMES IN KEY AREASGENERAL

It is intended that Italian Patriots who volunteer for military service will be enlisted into the Italian Army. The Private Branch of the Allied Control Commission are responsible for making the necessary arrangements for the collection, evacuation and disposal of such Patriots.

2. This Organisation will be capable of handling, if necessary, up to several hundred short volunteers per day, and will be designed to move volunteers from Corps and Army Headquarters to the main Italian Army Disposition Centres which have been established at ROME and CAGLIARI. It is probable that the latter Centres will be moved at a later date to a more forward location.

SECTION

3. Screening agents will be established in Italy areas to select suitable recruits for the Italian Army from lists of Patriot volunteers held by A.C.C. officers. These screening agents will operate under the orders of the Army HQ in which they are located.

4. At Army level ROME, CAGLIARI and elsewhere all the screening process, where necessary, and other effort will be made to ensure that only suitable recruits are located back to Army Headquarters.

5. All chosen volunteers will be given a pass showing that they will be taken on the strength of the Italian Army on arrival at the Disposition Centres referred to in para 2 above.

NOTES TO CAPTURED VOLUNTEERS

6. Volunteers will be evacuated along the main Army supply routes to Army HQ 2 and Railheads, whence to the Italian Army Disposition Centres, by the most suitable means available.

- (a) Requests for food and water will be made to the Italian HQ. The Corps concerned by Civil Affairs Officers in front areas and by the Commandant of Patriot Camps in rear areas. (See para 7)

(b) Evacuation and movement will be made to Movements 72A and 72B.

ADMINISTRATIVE INSTRUCTION NO 202GENERAL

It is intended that Italian Patriots who volunteer for military service will be enlisted into the Italian Army. The Patriotic Branch of the Allied Control Commission are responsible for making the necessary arrangements for the collection, evacuation and transport of such Patriots.

2. This Commission will be capable of handling, if necessary, up to several hundred such volunteers per day, and will be assigned to move volunteers from Corps and Army Areas back to the main Italian Army. Enlistment Centres which have been established at REGGIO CALABRIA, TURIN, ROMA, FIRENZE and NAPOLI. These latter Centre will be moved at a later date to a more forward location.

SELECTION

3. Selection areas will be established in Army Areas to select suitable recruits for the Italian Army. The lists of prospective volunteers held by the Corps Commissions concerned, together with those under the orders of the Army HQ in which they are located.

4. At Corps level, HQ will assist in the screening process, where necessary, and every effort will be made to ensure that only suitable recruits are moved back to Army Headquarters.

5. All selected volunteers will be given a pass stating that they will be taken on the strength of the Italian Army on arrival at the Enlistment Centres referred to in para 2 above.

MOVEMENT OF ACCEPTED VOLUNTEERS

6. Volunteers will be conducted along the main Army supply routes to Army Head and Billets, and thence to the Italian Army Enlistment Centres, by the most suitable means available.

- (a) Requests for road movement will be made to the Italian HQ concerned by Civil Affairs Officers in "normal" areas and by the Corps Commandant of Patriot Corps Headquarters areas (See para 7)
- (b) Requests for rail movement will be made to Movements with which all services will be arranged.
- (c) In no circumstances will volunteers be moved from Corps areas whilst they have been so arranged.

ADMINISTRATION

- 7. The responsibility for general administration of Italian volunteers will rest with the Patriots Branch, AAC and that Branch will establish such camps and billeting areas in Corps, Regt and Battalion areas as may be necessary, by agreement with the Italian Army concerned. Wherever possible, these camps will be established in existing buildings. Payment for the same will in the first place be

be found under ACC arrangements. Applications for residence from military sources will be made to H.A.M. Armies can accept no responsibility for the establishment of these camps.

C. Whilst in these camps accepted volunteers will be fed on the refugee ration scale. Rations will be drawn under arrangements to be made by the camp staff.

1. Undoubtedly the handling of patriots in the North of Italy will be on a much larger scale than in central Italy; the patriots in the North are reputed to be tougher than those in central Italy: also they are well organised vide Appendix attached.
2. It seems clear that it is necessary to endeavour to harness and control the energies of the patriots in the North from now until such time as they are finally disengaged into the civilian population. Otherwise there is almost certain to be trouble wherever they are left uncontrolled especially if they are not put into proper civil or military employment after peace has been established in their areas.
3. HQ A.I.I are eager that patriots in the north should now be satisfied about their future so that they may give of their best over the next few weeks. A letter is probably being sent to us from G.Oys to this effect.
4. At present, the fact that many patriots, e.g. in Florence, have not been finally rehabilitated has not presented a serious public safety problem because, first, there are not enough of them and second, we have strong military forces everywhere in the vicinity.
5. What the patriots want is to know that they will be properly employed either in the Army or in civil life after the fighting is over. This means that if we wish to satisfy the patriots we must present to them terms for military and civil employment which they will accept.
6. The present military terms are unacceptable because the patriots wish to continue fighting with their own officers and they refuse to join up if they are to be split into different units in the army.
7. I have discussed the problem of recruitment briefly with General Browning and he has asked us to call a meeting to discuss this after his return from Sardinia about the fourth of October. Whether or not on all accounts it is desirable that the patriots should join the army has also to be

8. With regard to civil employment, I find that many patriots refuse to accept the terms which the army can offer them because the pay is too low and the work unattractive. This has not been a serious problem in Florence but in the North it may be serious and it is suggested that the Italian Patriot Committee could produce one or two civilians for each Region who should canvas leading industrial firms and find jobs for patriots according to their qualifications and experience. If the Italian Patriot Committee can take on this work it would be of great assistance.

9. Both the army authorities and any civilian employment bureau that is formed by Italians must be able to make early contact with patriots, if possible before they are finally disbanded so that a clear scheme for reemployment will be known to the bands in good time.

10. The difficulty in doing this is to get the armies and corps to agree to let the patriots be contacted in the most forward areas. I think, however, that AMI feels sufficiently strongly about the necessity of settling the quellins of patriots on this head, to insist that patriots should be contacted at a very early stage.

11. Col. Mayne, feels strongly that the publicity given to patriots on the radio and in the press is exaggerated and that we are making too much fuss about their rehabilitation, and that the directives to this end given in our orders of 18 July and 24 July are not 'realistic'. He thinks all this will end only in causing trouble for Italy.

12. The daily Combatti programme, sponsored by Brig. Manning, is probably the strongest single authority responsible for encouraging and emphasising the importance of the patriots.

13. There is, undoubtedly, much in what Col. Mayne says but it is difficult to reconcile these views with the ~~practical~~ necessity for encouraging the Italian patriots at this juncture. A little later on perhaps one could ask PWB to include their comments on patriots amongst their articles on the courage and endurance of the whole civil population. At some stage it may be wise to eliminate from the news papers practically all reference to patriots but this presumably would be when Italy was almost entirely liberated.

14. In the mean time the present policy is to endeavour to look after the patriots when they are disbanded and I should like to have a directive if I can to proceed on the lines mentioned above and take particular trouble to put patriots into the army and civil employment. Also is it desirable to cut down our propaganda?

THE INTERNATIONAL ORGANISATIONS OF THE PARTISAN MOVEMENT IN ITALY.

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1. From information received in the last few days it is possible to give a somewhat clearer picture of the internal organisation of the Partisan movement in Italy.
  2. The "CIL" or the movement, as has of course long been known, is in MILAN. This is the logical result of three main causes :
    - (a) MILAN is the natural centre of German occupied Italy.
    - (b) As Italy's principal industrial town it has a large working population which has, in the past, proved a fertile field for anti-Fascist organisation.
    - (c) As a result of (b) the Committee of National Liberation in MILAN had a firm foundation of well organised underground activity which parties of the left had established and maintained throughout the Fascist reign. The CIL was thus able to begin the evolution of an active central organisation at a time when Partisan activity in the rest of Italy was sporadic and entirely uncoordinated. The Committee has gradually increased the extent of its influence until at present it is believed that it is recognised by the great majority of the Partisans.
  3. In essence the CIL aims to coordinate the activities of all resistance elements which are prepared to act against both Germans and Fascists, and to eliminate friction existing both from the wide variety of causes which have induced Italians to join resistance groups, and from the tendency of a large number of political parties to attempt to capitalise on the resistance movement.
  4. (a) The sources from which the Partisan movement derives almost all its active strength are five-fold : -
    - (1) Members of the Italian Army before the Armistice, who for various reasons later refused to throw in their lot with the Germans and Fascists. Their political views appear to be predominantly monarchist and it is probable that the majority of those bands which remained independent of the CIL derived

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- 3. The sources from which the Partisan movement derives almost all its active strength are five-fold : -
- (i) Members of the Italian Army before the Armistice, who for various reasons later refused to throw in their lot with the Germans and Fascists. 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- (b) The rigidity of this classification should however be qualified. Operating with Partisans is a large and heterogeneous body of Italians of no, or only the loosest, political allegiance, together with an unknown number of Russian, Polish, Czech, Slovak, and even German deserters from the Wehrmacht, Slovenes, and a considerable number of allied ex-PR.
5. When it became clear that the CLN in MILAN had achieved a real authority over this complex movement, and had in fact been recognised by the Italian Government, it was decided to send a distinguished Italian officer, with an unexceptionable democratic background, as a representative of A.A.I. to the CLN. He will be referred to as "Colonel X". What follows is based in the main on reports from this officer.
6. (a) The General Command of the ITALIAN CLN consists of five members, one from each of the five principal resistance elements, and a military adviser.
- (b) The Operations section of the Command virtually rules the CLN and consists of the Communist and ACTO on Party representatives and the Military Adviser.
- (c) Colonel X was welcomed by all parties and was nominated President of the Committee. 8. The lack of communications and the clandestine nature of the organisation have made close control of military operations particularly in the case of efficient bands, out of the question. The Committee therefore contents itself with broad operational policy and concentrates mainly on organisation. A.A.I. therefore

A.A.I. therefore maintain their direct operational control of the bands by means of an increasing network of British, American and Italian liaison officers, and a considerable wireless organisation.

9. The CIM has under its direct command the MILAN city command and has divided the remainder of enemy occupied Italy into five regional commands. Each of these regional commands has a number of zones, that of PRIDONT having the TURIN town command in addition. The bands acknowledging the CIM come directly under the respective zones. The following table shows the position in graphic form : -

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The present position is considered to be satisfactory from the point of view of the Allied Armies, in that whilst the CEN achieves a large measure of political unity and common policy, the control of operations remains with HQ AAF, acting through its British and American operating agencies. The presence of Colonel X with the MILAN CEN will it is hoped do much to ensure that the Committee's activities are directly related to the functions of the MILITARY COMMISSION.

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
