DISTRIBUTION OF CERTIFICATES AT FORLI.

On 30 November at Forli, certificates were issued to the Patriots of the Units which operated in that area.

In consideration of the valuable contribution that the formations brought to the fight against the Germans in the area, and considering the efficiency and discipline of the Units, the Military Authorities decided that the issue of the certificates should have the character of an impressive ceremony which was to follow a parade of the patriots.

For the purpose the instructions contained in annex 1, 2 and 3 were issued to the Units.

On 3 November at 10 a.m. the Units numbering about 800 men, 450 of which were armed, grouped in Piazza della Vittoria.

At 10.30 a.m. ~~the~~ began the parade in the following order:

1. 8 Brigata Garibaldi Romagna.
2. Battaglione Corberi Spezzoli.
3. 29 Brigata C.A.P.
4. Brigata S.A.P.

The procession, headed by the national flags, with no party insignia, through Corso Vittorio Emanuele and Piazza Saffi, reached the Government Palace where it gathered in the reception halls.

No incidents happened during the procession which was attended by a great crowd of the local population.

At the Government's Palace, the General commanding the Brigade, the Highest Allied and Italian Authorities including the Prefect, the Bishop, the Mayor, and representatives of the political parties had gathered to preside over the ceremony.

The General held a speech in Italian, thanking the patriots and pointing out the necessity that they should return to their civil lives thus ~~be~~ collaborating to the national reconstruction. He then handed to each commander the certificates for his Unit.

At the end of the ceremony, each Patriot, before returning to the square, handed over his weapon.

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The units reformed in the square and returned to their billets where they had a meal with rations supplied by Allied H.Qs.

At 12 o'clock, the General with the representatives of all the Units laid a wreath of flowers on the spot where some Patriots had been executed in the Piazza Saffi.

Subject: Intelligence situation in Berlin.

Following the last report dated 1 Nov, concerning the situation with regard to the 2nd Polish Corps, etc.

The situation of Berlin has continued over yesterday that - 1 Lie J.W. State reported to the 8th Infantry 2nd Inf., commandant General Thiele (1st Inf.) of the now German forces have moved to Berlin the 1st Inf. to substitute in the area. From 1st 2nd Inf., there the S.I.L. had the 10th Infantry's. The S.I.L. had 100 soldiers over the 1st Inf. from Berlin 1st Inf.

The 3rd Inf. Regt., on allied orders has been assigned an auxiliary open train, which will be detailed in the near future. Some restrictions in a power plant in Unterhaching because, when they were on the verge of entering Berlin, they gave warning for military reasons.

The Poles have been convinced of the necessity of this action, and the atmosphere has been stabilized.

Besides the forces under General Thiele, the other units involved at Berlin are S.I.L.s (except of course 1st Inf.) and the S.A.P. around US made of former Poles.

The first consisted of groups of patrols who operated in the town, carrying out patrols and supplying orders to the 1st Inf., etc.

The second was a reserve where the S.I.L.s and the Germans were dividing their members, we note, Poles, etc.

The S.I.L. had over all of them, as they all belonged to the German Police Berlin - some who had a Polish officer in Berlin.

After a few days of considerable uncertainty, the whole situation clarity is now disclosed by a no little chance sources are the reports, relatives of the two units operating in Berlin, the representative of the 1st Inf. and one relative of the others. This on issue is a tremendous one.

I met in touch with C.S.I. of the 5th Corps, and with my liaison officer of the 1st Inf. They have all their basic conception of the conditions which the Poles are in the fight for liberation.

It will bear in touch with the L.C.M.C. of the 5th Corps, with the C.A.C. and with the International Commissioner, he'll need to give sight on the condition of the issue of

the certificates to the Patriots they should be checked,
and a short ceremony or military ~~ceremony~~ should take place.

The ceremony would comprise:

1. That first, no groups coming out of town should be allowed to enter the town as civilians and only there a few days. They would total about 200.
2. During that period lodgings should be provided for those who could not find some for themselves (about 80 people) and who could be billeted at the Patriots Command.
3. That during that period a certain number of rations should be issued to complete the rations that will be issued by the Commune.
4. The issuing of the certificates will have to take place, in a closed room which can hold from 300 to 400 people, in one of the A.T.s of the prefecture or other such place.
5. It will soon appear that the prefect, the Major, the County Council and a few Allied A.T.'s officers should be present at the ceremony.
6. The ceremony would be held within 7 to 10 days.

1725 1000'S SUBDIVISION IN AND 7000'S ARE
AND 7000'S COURSE.

Following instructions, on 25 October I went to Peshawar
to try to get in touch with Lt. Col. T. M. M. Dr. Col. T. M. M.
with Dr. Col. Pether Provincial Commissioner for Peshawar Province.

On 26 Oct. with the representative of the U.N.R. I went
to S. / 1 Foreign to start on our work and at that occasion
I got in touch with Capt. J. L. Best, who operates in the north
of Peshawar.

The situation is as follows: All elements of this area
belong to the U.N.R. and the 7000's subdivision are at present
engaged upon military operations under the command of the
U.N.R. commanded by Dr. Mori, with whom I got in touch
and had a very long talk.

Dr. Mori has expressed the opinion that while the Dardkhel
area and other military operations there is no need for our
intervention which would only hinder their escort work.
Col. Best, Capt. J. L. Best and myself timely agree with
Dr. Mori. Our intervention will be useful in so far as what
the Dardkhel will be unable to do, to put into action all the
armies available.

The local militia has not suffered the formation of
other Roberts Units besides his own to be so far, nor does
it consist of the employment of groups of Roberts to keep
public order, as was the case in the above areas.

To this day the following entities have been visited:

In S. Dardkhel two incidents took place, they were caused
by two citizens who, pretending to be Roberts, claimed firstly
money, and secondly, lodgings, without paying for them.

After repeated representations it appeared that neither was
a member of the Dardkhel Roberts.

It is up to the P.O. and the Office to stop such activities, I can't do anything about it.

In view of the above and in consideration of the impossibility of "over" I suggest:

1. That the beginning of work in the area should be temporarily postponed, i.e., until the winter will be overcast;
 2. That I should be in the office at least one day a week if possible:
 - (a) - to answer the telephone, get just reading further messages; (b) make contacts who might be willing to assist in the survey;
 - (b) - handle the survey orders;
 - (c) - answer questions concerning where houses are in danger;
 - (d) - meet all the students on assignments which will be issued.
 3. That I should go to the area, have had a week's leave to take family, return to C.A.C. on the 1st. This is what I have in mind, so that I would talk with the Office to get fully acquainted with the survey plan and be stabilized.
- In view of the present situation I suggest that my employment by the Survey Bureau, is necessary for a full understanding of the Project and take place in a sensible way and that special care should be paid to the collection of data. Both operations could be done in March after the weather is moderate.
