Notes on meeting held at the Office of the Ministry of Post War Assistance on Tuesday 13th November 1945.

Present: Sig. Benardinone and Moscone.  
Lt Col White, Major J.S. Reakes and Col Pava.

ANPI.

Lt Col White asked what the position was with regard to the new constitution of ANPI. Reference was made to the letter written by this HQ to ANPI and to the Ministry of Post War Assistance on 22nd October 1945. The Ministry of Post War Assistance stated that they had not received the letter. In these circumstances there was no point in discussing the points raised by the Allied Commission as the Ministry was unaware of them. A copy of the letter would be made and handed to Col Pava for delivery to the Ministry of Post War Assistance.

IMRs.

Lt Col White stated that a Report received from the IMR Treviso indicated that the Secretaries of ANPI needed some guidance as to what their duties were and as to what they could and could not do. In the case of Treviso ANPI appeared to be exceeding their true powers and reference was made to this HQ letter 135/EAT of 1 Nov in which some of the points raised in the Report were answered in detail.

Discussion took place on how far ANPI was entitled to take active measures in epuration, and in the running of private enterprises.

The Ministry of Post War Assistance would consider the matter and let this Commission have its views. It was obvious that some form of guidance would require to be issued to IMRs and that ANPI should give guidance to their branches.

NOTES OF A MEETING  
between

COL. CRIPPS AND SIG. BERNARDINONE AND SIG. MOROSINI

on 6th September at 1100 hrs.

Col. CRIPPS desired to raise the question of treatment of Patriots who fought outside Italy and referred to a letter from the Ministry No 886 dated 29th August. One point he wished to be clear about was the statement concerning persons returning from the Balkans as soldiers. He read it to mean that all fighters coming from the Balkans should be considered as members of the Italian Army and therefore not entitled to any demobilisation bonus they will receive arrears of pay as soldiers.

Sig. BERNARDINONE agreed on this point of view and stated that the Minister has already expressed similar views on this point.

Col. CRIPPS said he would issue that instruction but said there might be exceptional cases of Italians who fought outside Italy (with the *laquila* C). In these cases he suggested that the facts and particulars of each case should be collected and passed to the Ministry of PWA for final decision.

Sig. BERNARDINONE agreed that special cases should be put up for decision by the MPWA.

Col. CRIPPS mentioned that he had forwarded two cases. One concerned 10 Italian soldiers who would be dealt with as soldiers and not as Patriots. The other concerned two men who claimed to have been fighting in YUGOSLAVIA as Patriots. They were soldiers and had already been paid the bonuses due to them as soldiers. Noting from the letter Col. Cripps stated that it said that for the time being all coming from abroad should not be considered Patriots.

Sig. BERNARDINONE asked Col. Cripps to wait a few days to give him an opportunity of speaking to Sig. LUSU and Mr. CHILABOFF who is coming to ROME in a few days.

There was a discussion on the duties of all soldiers to ~~escape~~ and continue to fight on under all circumstances. This should exclude soldiers from being considered Patriots.

Col. CRIPPS mentioned we have many of such applications waiting. Originally it was decided to pass them to Dr. CHILABOFF but he would get snowed under. I personally feel it is better to avoid paying these people.

Considered he might have to open an office to settle with those in transit, wounded, killed etc. He considered they should only deal with those who in fact had Italian citizenship. Suggest a screening Commission and if that was a success then it could investigate all claims.

Sig. ROMANOWSKI had not seen the number of patriots in V.G. but thought it better to wait until Col. CRINGS returned from his visit and get his views.

Col. CRINGS It is agreed that no letter be sent meantime. I will try and persuade Col. Roman to allow an IMA to operate in the Region.

Discussed choice of man suitable for the post. It is better that he should know local conditions rather than be an expert on patriotic matters.

Col. CRINGS Was going to raise the question of AMT. Sig. ROMANOWSKI handed Col. CRINGS a memorandum which he proposed to study, first, and raise at the next meeting.

Sig. ROMANOWSKI spoke about his visit to the North and said there is a difference between AMT of the North and AMT of the South. The difference appears to be one of premises. He feels that one set of instructions would not be suitable meantime but later on it will become a national affair. The two branches act independently but decide together.

Col. CRINGS I have no other point.

Sig. ROMANOWSKI spoke about hospital i. Trento and showed two letters he had received from the IMA in which he stated that the Benettonian at ANCO is not going to be used for military purposes and therefore should be considered available. He will send no copies of the letters. 1,4,000,000 has been allocated for the hospital and Mr. CHANOW thought this was sufficient until the end of October.

Col. CRINGS said he will speak with the Regional Commissioner of V.G. on the subject.

Sig. ROMANOWSKI stated that hospitalization is the subject of special care from the Ministry of IMA without any distinction between patriots veterans or ex-internees. The point of view of the Ministry is not to have different kind of hospitals for patriots, veterans and so forth but to have hospitals well equipped for everybody in need of medical treatment. He said that convalescent centres are to be organized.

Sig. ROMANOWSKI said that during his visit to Milan AMT had informed him that they intend to publish a newspaper but Col. Polenti had not granted permission.

Col. CRINGS I will try and find out why permission was refused. I will ask De Carvion about this point.



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Sig. BERNARDINI spoke about his visit to the North and said there is a difference between ANTI of the North and ANTI of the South. The difference appears to be one of two names. He feels that one set of instructions would not be suitable neither but later on it will become a national affair. The two branches not independently but decide together.

Col. GRINGS I have no other point.

Sig. Notes of a Meeting  
between

COL CRIPPS AND SIG MOSCONI

24 Aug 45

Col CRIPPS discussing the arrangements for the handover said that it might not be possible to close Regional HQ simultaneously with the handover as there might be some ends to tie up. Sig MOSCONI asked that Regional HQs should be maintained for the time being because the MPWA proposed to create a regional organization. As soon as these offices are set up IMAWs will become Regional officers of the MPWA. This proposal has however not yet been approved. If the proposal goes through the MPWA will have its own organization and will not work through Prefects but have their own staff. However this is still in the air.

Col CRIPPS said that a clear decision was necessary if officers were to be kept on, steps would also have to be taken to get or retain offices. Nations quarters would have to be arranged for officers and their families. or messing would also have to be arranged. In reply to the enquiry whether instructions had not already been issued Col CRIPPS said only as regards Provincial offices. Sig MOSCONI said that Prefects of the Provinces in which Regional HQs were situated to provide such accommodation as would be necessary.

Sig MOSCONI said that he would speak to the Minister that day on the matter. He enquired whether AC thought that CHIABE could be made responsible for planning and setting up the new organization and making the necessary arrangements. In answer to Col CRIPPS enquiry Sig MOSCONI said that he did not think that a cancellation of ACE instruction to disperse the Regional staff need go out immediately and that it was not necessary to make a decision at once.

At this point Col CRIPPS left the conference to keep another appointment and Lt Col WHITE continued.

Lt Col WHITE referred to the arrangements for hospitalizing patriots. He said that he had discussed with Land Forces the possibility of releasing hospitals. The Italian Army had had 15,000 beds that had now been reduced to 10,000 and proposals were on foot to reduce it further to 5,000. The 5,000 beds would be required for the use of the Italian Army and was mainly composed of one four hundred bed hospital in each of the 11 military districts. The army would not be able to accommodate patriots in these hospitals nor in fact with one or two exceptions were they located where they could be of any use to patriots. A list of hospitals was produced and examined. To enable the problem to be examined it was necessary to have facts. Could the MPWA say where men requiring hospital treatment were located and how many of them there were in each place. AC was making enquiries but would be glad of any information that the MPWA had on this subject.

15 Aug 45

Col. GRIPES said that the Under Secretary for the Interior had expressed to his his agreement that Prefects should administer Italy. The AC had dispatched instructions to Regions accordingly, a copy of which had been sent to both the MMA and the M Interior. These instructions would have to have effect when the territory came under Italian administration it was necessary therefore that the Italian Government should send out their own instruction as to the organization to be effective when AMG ceased. Sig. BERNARDINI said they agreed and would prepare instructions, which he would send through the M Interior for their concurrence for transmission by AC to the Prefects.

Col. GRIPES informed Sig. BERNARDINI that instructions to prepare lists of patriots entitled to the VA Medal had been sent out and that he had drawn the attention of the officers concerned that the ultimate decision as to entitlement rested with the committee which would be appointed under ML 350.

Col. GRIPES then drew attention to the situation in the North of Italy with regard to AMG. Not infrequently officers previously occupied by various circumstances now had signs showing that they were now the officers of AMG. In many places persons were purporting to act as Provincial or Municipal Committees or as officials of AMG who had not been appointed in accordance with the AMG statutes. These persons had no powers to act and what they had purporting to do was entirely irregular, some of them seemed to be acting most improperly. It might have been of material practical assistance to the Italian Government if AMG had been able to take part in the organization of AMG on the statutory lines and had removed those who had usurped its authority; but there was hardly time for AMG to organize this now. AC did not like the idea of having some territory while the position was so unsatisfactory, the longer these persons were in power the more trouble it would be to remove them.

Sig. BERNARDINI said that he was aware of the irregular position which he was anxious to terminate. The position however was that the Statutes which had been issued did not meet with the entire approval of opinion in the North of Italy and modifications thereof were under discussion. He did not feel in a position to implement the present statutes knowing they were to be altered. Further it was undesirable that elections should be held at the present time because persons who claimed to be members of AMG who were not "true" patriots might until now members were admitted outside the true patriots. Provincial committees would probably be forced to prepare the way for proper elections. Col. GRIPES said that under the circumstances AMG could do nothing at present to help.

Col. GRIPES enquired whether there was any further information as to the name of the hospital at FERRARA to which it was desired to send patriots. The answer was in the negative. He said that he was expecting to hear by phone and



he would send through the Interior for their concurrence for transmission by AC to the Prefecture.

Col. CATTI informed Sig. BATTAGLINI that instructions to prepare lists of patriots entitled to the Medal had been sent out and that he had drawn the attention of the officers concerned that the ultimate decision as to entitlement rested with the commission which would be appointed under the 390.

Col. CATTI then drew attention to the situation in the North of Italy with regard to A.M.I. Not infrequently officers previously occupied by various commissions now had signs showing that they were now the citizens of A.M.I. In many places persons were purporting to act as provincial or communal committees or as officials of A.M.I. who had not been appointed in accordance with the A.M.I. statutes. These persons had no powers to act and what they had purposed to do was entirely irregular, some of them seemed to be acting most improperly. It might have been of material practical assistance to the Italian Government if A.M.I. had been able to take part in the organization of A.M.I. on the secretory lines and had removed those who had usurped its authority but there was hardly time for that to organize this now. A.M.I. did not like the idea of having back territory still. The position was so unsatisfactory, the longer these persons were in power the more trouble it would be to remove them.

Sig. BATTAGLINI said that he was aware of the irregular position which he was anxious to terminate. The position however was that the Statutes which had been issued did not mesh with the existing approval of opinion in the North of Italy and modifications thereof were under discussion. He did not feel in a position to implement the present statutes knowing they were to be altered. Further it was undesirable that elections should be held at the present time because persons who claimed to be members of A.M.I. who were not "true" patriots might still now members were admitted outside the true patriots. Provincial committees would probably be forced to prepare the way for proper elections. Col. CATTI said that under the circumstances A.C. could do nothing at present to help.

Col. CATTI enquired whether there was any other information as to the case of the hospital at Italy to which it was desired to send patriots. The answer was in the negative. He said that he was expecting to hear by phone and would keep the case informed of developments. He understood that Sig. BATTAGLINI was shortly visiting the North of Italy pending his return. Sig. BATTAGLINI might be in a position to outline the medical needs of patriots still requiring medical treatment both as to numbers and location of medical centres. Sig. BATTAGLINI said that that was one of the medical objectives of his tour.

Sig. BATTAGLINI enquired whether any information could be given on the point which he had raised the previous week, namely the removal from Military Hospitals after 60 days of patriots even though they still required medical or surgical treatment. Col. CATTI said that the answer was under consideration with those concerned but he was not yet in a position to make a statement. Sig. BATTAGLINI hoped that a decision could be reached at an early date as patriots requiring important further treatment were being turned out of Military Hospitals even though there was no suitable alternative accommodation to receive them. He quoted BATTAGLINI as an example. He regarded the matter as most urgent. Col. CATTI said that he would do all he could to expedite a decision.

Col. GRIGOR then said he had made a quick perusal of the decree of employment for wounded veterans, patriots etc. It appears to be extremely wide in its categories, it seems to include about all those between the ages of 16 and 60 in the whole nation.

Sig. BERKARADZHIAN - They will make an order on this decree giving directives as to implementing it.

Col. GRIGOR had the impression that 75% of any one category could be taken.



Sig. RECOMMENDATIONS agreed.

Col. CHILDS thought that the application of the decrees required further study, and suggested that rules, similar to those established in Great Britain after the other war, may be established by which no Government contract be awarded to any contracting firm not employing a certain percentage of war invalids.

Sig. RECOMMENDATIONS agreed and said the policy could be studied.

Col. CHILDS asked what the views of Ministry of War were concerning aid to partisans in the Venesia (Vine), in particular who should be entitled to receive aid, compensation and prison.

Sig. RECOMMENDATIONS - did not seem to have very clear ideas on the matter, especially when partisans having fought under foreign formations were concerned.

Col. CHILDS stated that he thought it would be equitable to pay compensation anyhow to the next of kin of fallen patriots.

## NOTES of a MEETING between

Lt. Col. WHITE, Sig. FERRARA, and Sig. MOSCONI

2 August 1945

Sig. MOSCONI - said that there were at present time in Rome a number of foreign nationals who had fought with the partisans and who were now receiving aid and he enquired what steps should be taken to send those people home and what should be done with these who did not wish to return to their country of origin.

Lt. Col. WHITE - pointed out that it was a Partisan problem to disarm pay and disperse them. In the case of foreign nationals, disposal was effected with by passing the person to Displaced Persons who have machinery for sending them home. They were also prepared to deal with those who did not want to go back. The MPWA was responsible for dealing with welfare of both partisans and repatriates. They could deal direct with DP S/C on this matter there was no need to deal through Patriots Branch.

Lt. Col. WHITE - referred to the fact that on the handover IAPRs would come under Prefects and said it was AMG's desire that this should take place as early as possible so that Patriot Officers should have time before the handover to see if either the IAPR or the Prefect were meeting with any difficulties. It was undesirable that the handover should not take until the day AMG moved out. Sig. FERRARA agreed but said it was still not absolutely certain whether the Prefect would act or some special office be created: the matter was under discussion between the Prime Minister the MPWA, and the Min. for War. He suggested that no action should be taken pending the result of this discussion. Lt. Col. WHITE agreed but asked that the point might be regarded as urgent decision. AMG regarded it as important that whoever lookover should have the benefit of working some little time with EPOs before they were withdrawn. Sig. FERRARA said he agreed, but the decision involved matters of high political importance, he hoped it would be made in the next few days.

Lt. Col. WHITE - pointed out that there would, even after the handover and allied Officers had been withdrawn, continue to be matters in which the Allies were interested. One was the machinery for passing to the allies arms recovered after the date of the handover and the other was the machinery for signing and issuing Alexander Certificates. Sig. FERRARA said the former would fall within the sphere of the Min. War to whom he would mention the matter. Would AC bring the point to the notice of the Land Forces S/C. Sig. FERRARA agreed that these persons were acting irregularly. He was as anxious as AC were to stop them.

Lt. Col. WHITE - referred to an incident at Civitavecchia in which alleged partisans had forcibly boarded a steamer to enable themselves to return to Sardinia and asked, as a matter of interest what the facts were - the matter was of course one entirely for the Italian Govt. Sig. FERRARA said that the Italian Govt. had been caught by surprise. The facts were more or less as reported. He had no further information. He enquired whether AC considered there was any lack of liaison or information which led to the surprise. Recently a convoy returning from Africa had been diverted from Leghorn, where all arrangements had been made to receive it - without notice to the Italian Govt. to Civitavecchia - where no arrangements were ready.

Mr. Mosconi explained that the situation, although not normal because of the responsibility of holding local elections, had been somewhat improved since the conference that was held soon after the 11 election between the ANPI officials of the North and the South from which a Central Committee of 17 members had arisen, where it seemed that all recognised parties were fairly equally represented on the Committee. It was to be hoped that the situation would now improve also in the the outside branches.

Col. Origo, said he was planning to go to the North sometime next week, and he wished on the occasion to investigate the ANPI situation. He suggested that perhaps it would be useful if he would be accompanied on the trip.

Mr. Ferrara stated that he had heard of some such organizations which apparently had been created by former partisans who had been repatriated from the North. The organizations claimed to be only welfare organizations in which case little or nothing could be done against their existence, but if the above organizations should have proved to have other and illegal tasks they would become a matter for the Police and Public Security to deal with. The matter any way was not a direct responsibility of the P.W.A. Ministry who could only signal it to the Ministry for Interior for any necessary action.

COL. CRIPPS said that he would find weekly meetings between himself and the Minister of Post War Assistance (MR. VERRARA) helpful and asked MR. VERRARA his views on the proposal. It was agreed that such meetings would be useful and it was arranged that they would be held at the Ministry at 1200 hours every Thursday.

COL. CRIPPS then enquired as to the proposed organization of the Ministry both centrally and particularly in the field. It would always be open to a patient to obtain payment if his family was in need of the money. A person who had been permanently incapacitated would be able to draw his bonus as and when he desired.

Sig. PIZZANI said that in Piemonte 30,000 persons had been paid on the lower scale. Colonel GILLES said that the payment of the balance was in hand.

The first problem related to those individuals returning from other countries, stating that they have been doing underground work on Patriot activities. They are turning up in some of the Patriot Centres and demanding pay as Patriots. Col. Cripps said he would like to know what the Italian Government had in mind with respect to such people. Do they agree that Italian nationals returning from other countries were not entitled to Patriot payments, etc.?
2. Sig. MOSCONI said he agreed. He went on to say that the problem needed an adequate solution, and said he thought there should be a clause of reciprocity included that those subjects who were members of foreign formations should receive the same treatment as Italian Patriots.
3. Sig. MOSCONI further stated that it was his understanding that a directive had been issued covering this point by Patriot HQ in the North; this allowed payment to foreign nationals serving with Patriot Bands in Italy and outlined the procedure to be adopted with regard to such individuals.

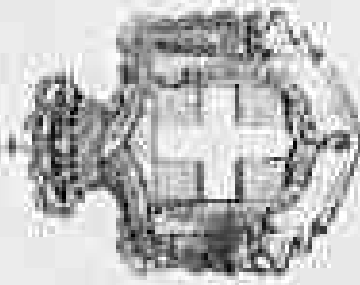

SUMMARY OF THE CONVERSATION WITH THE  
H.E. MULLICI AND COL. CRIPPS

Col. CRIPPS told us that returning from an exercise camp in the North he needed a few explanations on financial matters, which had been received especially in connection with the payments upon recognition of the OIA or by the OIA of the OIA. - Dr. CURCIO referred to Allied Commission letter 121/15/PAT of 12 Jun 45, and handed the reply showing how the criticisms and comments had been met. He asked whether the decree could now be issued, and was informed that his letter would be studied and a reply sent.
- Dr. CURCIO said that the decree authorizing the issue of a medal to patriots had been passed, and was in course of issue. No contract for the manufacture of the ribbon had been granted; it was open to any manufacturer to make the ribbon, and any person could buy it in the shops. Lt Col WHITE enquired what means of distribution was in contemplation and was informed that there were none. He pointed out that Associazione Nazionale Partigiani Italiani (Patriots' Welfare Committee) might be a satisfactory channel of distribution. J/Comd "KOTY" enquired whether the poster informing patriots of the steps that they should take to obtain a ribbon, had yet been printed and was informed that as no decision had been reached as yet with regard to the distribution of the medal it had not been possible to prepare the poster.
- Dr. CURCIO referred to alleged shortage of notes in Apuania. In reply to enquiry he said that the principal designations short were the smaller ones, in particular those for 100 lire and 500 lire. Lt Col WHITE said that he had already spoken to the Finance Sub Commission on the matter and they would take steps to ensure that there were no deficiencies.
- Dr. CURCIO said that the Under-Secretary of State proposed to go to Milan on a Monday. A point which was causing him particular concern was the insufficiency of sleeping accommodation. He asked whether Allied Commission could place accommodation at the disposal of patriots. Lt Col WHITE said that administrative details such as that were a matter for the Regional Commissioner on the spot. Perhaps the Under-Secretary of State would find time to discuss the matter with the Regional Commissioner when he was in Milan.
- Dr. CURCIO then referred again to the decree authorizing payment of bonuses to patriots and asked whether the same might now be published, and was informed that he would have a reply as soon as the Ministry's letter had been studied.

Lt.Col. WHITE referred to his letter of 6 June 45 and said that he desired to discuss the questions raised but in order to do so he first wanted a little further information. The letter referred to pay for "division" patriots but the period and scale was not mentioned. HE said that the pay would be the military rate of the rank equivalent to the duty performed for the full period over which those duties were performed.

Lt.Col. WHITE pointed out that the patriots had been maintained for a considerable time by funds from various sources and that in particular the Allies had provided considerable funds from which payments had been made to patriots in many cases at a rate higher than that which was now being discussed. It was considered that credit should be given for any such pay when calculating the sum payable. HE agreed in principle.

Lt.Col. WHITE then referred to the proposal that these payments should be made by IMRAs. He pointed out that the IMRAs had not the staff or time to investigate past payments and could not accept the responsibility for saying that the amounts shown to be due were correct. He asked why the present paying organization could not continue to pay. HE said that payment by IMRAs would be an assurance to the Allies that the money was being properly spent. They would also act as a check on the CIL or other officials some of whom were inclined to be a bit irresponsible sometimes over "generous" and not always impartial.

He also enquired whether credit had been given for the very considerable payments already made. HE said that neither the Treasury nor the Finance S/C has as yet been consulted. He was not satisfied that the sum mentioned had been payments already made into account. The figure of two milliards was to indicate the size of the problem, it was not an estimate. He hoped the sum would be considerably less.

Lt. O'CONNOR R enquired whether payments could not be made through the existing channel of the Intendents. Lt. Col. White said that it might have an important psychological effect in assisting the patriot to settle down in civil life if payments were made



through a usual civil channel rather than through special military, patriot or GI channels. Lt. Col. White said that while IAFs could not accept responsibility for the accuracy of the claims he would have no objection to the necessity for countersignature of the claim as a check on the person preparing the account provided the signature went only to the fact that the claimant was a patriot and the amount of the claim appeared reasonable. He agreed to this provided it was not published to the IAFs or to the persons preparing the claims; the deterrent effect would be lost if it were thought that the signature was a mere empty formality. Lt. Col. White said he would suggest a form of certificate.

Lt. Col. White then referred to the decree as to bonuses and suggested that under the decree as worded a wounded patriot appeared to be entitled to both the 5,000 and 10,000 grants. He said that this was not the intention, he would look into the matter.

Lt. Col. White also said that para 2 of Art 3 did not mention the missing or those killed by way of reprisals or those dying as a result of wounds or illness contracted on service. He thought the wording in the Ministers letter better. He said he would look into the matter. The decree had been passed by the Council of Ministers but it was still possible to amend it.

Lt. Col. White said that Art 3 appeared to be inappropriate. IAFs were at present employed by AG it was not appropriate to lay down their duties by decree. Art 3 was purely administrative in nature it would be more appropriate for AG to issue the matter contained in this Art to IAFs as an administrative instruction. He said he appreciated the point and the Art would be deleted. He enquired whether AG would be making these representations formally and was answered affirmatively.

He then referred to a problem which had arisen. It was the intention of the Italian Government to commence relief works in the North to ensure the re-employment of a number of patriots and to assist in bringing about their dispersal. The works in question were all of a public utility nature, reconstruction of roads, railways, bridges, tunnels etc. for this work there were in North Italy ample supplies of cement but the Italian Government had been informed that the whole supply was "frozen" for exportation for reconstruction work in a train. He asked that representations should be made apart from the necessity for these works the timing of work for patriots was an important factor in preserving good order in the North.

NOTES ON VISIT OF DR. CURCIO TO PATRIOTS BRANCH

1. Dr. Curcio visited Patriots' Branch on 9 June and informed Lt Col White that reports had been received at the Ministry of Occupied Italy, through General Parri, (who had just come from Milan,) indicating disquiet and trouble among Patriots, the cause of which was said to be a failure to make payments to them.
2. Dr. Curcio said that he had been in Milan on 7th June and had spoken with Lt Col de Garston who told him that increased bonuses had been authorised, but that it was not known how the funds should be obtained. Dr. Curcio had not spoken with Col. Cripps in Milan.
3. Dr. Curcio stated that the Ministry was proposing to give Gen. Parri 60,000,000 lire in the form of drafts, which he would take by air to Milan to-day, and that if he were not permitted to do so, the Ministry of Occupied Italy could not be responsible for any trouble that might occur in connection with patriots.
4. Lt. Col. White, after consultation with Brig. Upton, informed Dr. Curcio that it was quite unnecessary to take funds to the North; that there was plenty of currency available, the AMC Authorities and Italian Military Patriot Representatives were aware of how it should be drawn; all that was required was to draw the money and pay out to the Patriots. Lt. Col. White further showed Dr. Curcio signal No. 1089 received on 5 June from Lombardia, stating that they were proposing to start paying bonuses at the increased rate on 4 June, and A.C. signal No. 9155 of 5 June authorising them to do so.
5. Dr. Curcio agreed that on arrival in Milan Gen. Parri would contact the Regional Commissioner and the Partisan leaders and ensure that the procedure for payment as laid down by A.C. was fully understood. He would also probably go to Turin and Venezia for a similar purpose. In no case would he draw on the draft funds he carried without the agreement of the Allied authorities concerned.



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Dr. Curcio stated that the Ministry was proposing to give Gen. Parri 60,000,000 lire in the form of *credita*, which he would take by air to Milan to-day, and that if he were not permitted to do so, the Ministry of Occupied Italy could not be responsible for any trouble that might occur in connection with patriots.

Notes on conversation on 1 JUNE 1945  
between Colonel CRIPPS and H. E. CHIRI,  
High Commissioner for War Veterans.

COL. CRIPPS informed H.E. that he had received a letter from the Regional Commission of TOSCANA Region querying what is to be done with the Patriot Centre at FLORENCE. This Centre is accommodating 150-200 Patriots per day. It had been suggested that the centre should close down on 10 June, for residents at any rate, as this was the date when military rations cease. The Regional Commissioner had said in his letter that if it was thought that this date was too early to close the camp, he would carry on on civilian rations.

The question of rations for Patriots was being investigated and we were trying to find out whether the Food Sub-Commission would be able to carry the load of Patriot rations; failing this AME would be asked if we may be allowed to carry on with the Patriot military ration. Colonel CRIPPS added that so far as the provision of a ration by the Food Sub-Commission was concerned, they were trying to build up a reasonable ration from civilian rations available; nevertheless, some items, such as milk, would be lacking.

The question of feeding, in the opinion of Colonel CRIPPS, did not really arise since there would be either the military ration or a ration supplied by Food Sub-Commission. There was little chance of neither of these extra rations being made available, and in any case the ordinary civilian ration would be available.

Colonel CRIPPS thought it was as well to keep the camp going and said it was a good opportunity for H.E.'s staff to step in and take control of it.

H. E. CHIRI said that if AME was thinking of handing over, they would like to take over the whole thing, equipment, etc., and run the camp. H.E. enquired whether there were many more centres in Northern Italy.

COL. CRIPPS said that there were many Patriot camps in the North but there was some doubt as to how many would remain open. Col. CRIPPS said that there were 7 barracks in MILAN but he had suggested this be reduced to 4.

COL. CRIPPS said that H.E. would be able to get an idea of the position of the camp at FLORENCE on his trip and suggested the establishment of an office in FLORENCE. Colonel CRIPPS said that he would write to FLORENCE suggesting the camp should be taken over by the High Commissioner for War Veterans.

H. E. CHIRI said that he had heard a lot about the camp at FLORENCE and had been told that it was an excellent camp.

COL. CRIPPS suggested that H.E. might like to see what was happening in PESCIA camp as he himself was rather in the dark concerning it. Colonel CRIPPS added that he was no longer for keeping it open, except that there were some

Colonel CRIPPS added that he saw no reason for keeping it open, except that there were some Patriots in hospital there. Colonel CRIPPS said that the hospital was being run by the Ministry of Occupied Italy; originally supplied by army medical supply, it had since received supplies from UNRRA.

H. E. CHIRI said that he foresaw that a great number of people requiring hospitalization would come from GERMANY and it would have to be discussed who would take care of them; hospital accommodation would have to be made available.

H. E. CHIRI said that he thought he would like to take over the camp at FLORENCE.

COL. CRIPPS suggested that when H.E. was in FLORENCE he should find out whether they were ready to hand over on 10 June.

H. E. CHIRI said he would stop at FLORENCE on his way back from Northern Italy.

COL. CRIPPS said that by that time Colonel KUTWOOD would have received a letter from him (Colonel CRIPPS) concerning the hand-over of the camp.

COL. CRIPPS informed H.E. that while he was visiting the camp at FLORENCE he would no doubt be afforded an opportunity to inspect the complete documentation of Patriots which had been made by IAFRs. These would provide the information H.E. required concerning the grades of trades, etc., which was necessary for the planning of future employment of soldier and patriot veterans.

H. E. CHIRI said that he would call on Colonel CRIPPS when he returned to ROME after his visit to the North.

Notes of Conversation between

Colonel CRIPPS and E.E. CHIRI, High Commissioner for War Veterans

30 May 1945

E. E. CHIRI said that he intended to visit the North, probably leaving tomorrow, that he was interested in the welfare of veterans, both ex-POW and Patriots, and that he thought that Colonel CRIPPS might have some suggestions to make for this visit.

COL. CRIPPS pointed out that WMO & IPW Sub-Commission were responsible for ex-POW veterans and Patriots Branch responsible only for Patriots; Patriots are, in certain circumstances, considered veterans and when in transit are handled as ex-soldiers and, for convenience in making trains available, as refugees.

E. E. CHIRI said that he spoke of veterans as a whole and he was interested in what could be done to assist them generally.

COL. CRIPPS considered that the matter was much the concern of the Ministry for Occupied Italy, since they were handling the demobilisation of Patriots.

E. E. CHIRI said that he had already established contact. He would, however, like to be put in contact with regions regarding absorption and welfare of army veterans and Patriots. E.E. said that he had at his disposal some financial means which could be used for assisting Patriots and veterans.

COL. CRIPPS thought it was a little early to issue instructions in the North, since the whole matter regarding Patriots, etc., was much in a state of flux. He suggested rather that a directive be put out stating the form of assistance, etc.

E. E. CHIRI said that in territory returned to the Italian Government, Organisations for refugees and veterans had merged and welfare, canteens, etc., had been started.

COL. CRIPPS spoke of an evening on which he was advised by telephone of the arrival of some 200 Patriots in ROME when he had arranged that they be handled as returning military.

E. E. CHIRI agreed that Colonel CRIPPS had taken the right course. E.E. mentioned the fact that the home which was already open for veterans and patriots at via SAVOIA 13 (formerly a German school), would increase its facilities to accommodate 500 persons.

COL. CRIPPS said that he would like to have an outline of the manner of handling patriots and veterans when the Ministry of Occupied Italy's responsibility

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COL. CRIPPS said that he would like to have an outline of the manner of handling patriots and veterans when the Ministry of Occupied Italy's responsibilities cease.

H. E. CHIRI said that large public works projects were already being planned for central Italy which would ensure the employment of 300,000 war veterans per day. A grant of 60 million lire had already been approved to cover the work. These works were not dependent on equipment.

COL. CRIPPS said that similar plans should be worked out for the North. He considered that an inspection tour would be beneficial but that it was advisable to give no instructions in the North until a plan had been worked out; this was necessary to avoid confusion.

H. E. CHIRI assured Colonel CRIPPS that it was his intention only to gather data which would enable him to work out a plan when he returned to Rome.

H. E. CHIRI said that with regard to the plan he was at present having discussions with the Ministry of Agriculture in order to ascertain where works, etc., were required. It was extremely important that immediate employment should be made available in the areas in which the veterans already were.

H. E. CHIRI was anxious to establish the numbers and types of workmen the war veterans and Patriots could offer; farmers, brick-layers, etc., in order to make a general outline of what work was necessary to cover the demand.

COL. CRIPPS said that such particulars were already recorded in the Patriots camps but the registers were not yet available.

COL. CRIPPS said that since it was the intention to gather information for future plans he would give H.E. letters to Regional Commissioners and ask them to give him assistance.

H. E. CHIRI thanked Colonel CRIPPS and said that he hoped to be able to speak to Patriot Band-Leaders, etc. He said that when he had got a picture of the North he would return to see Colonel CRIPPS.

H. E. CHIRI said that he wished to visit MILAN-VERONA-PEDRETE-CENOA-PADUA-EMILIA-BOLOGNA. He pointed out that VERONA was the centre of war veterans from GERMANY.

IT WAS AGREED: That H.E. CHIRI would go on a general survey to the North in order to collect data on which to base future plans, for Patriot and ex-POW veterans.

H. E. CHIRI said that if Colonel CRIPPS felt it might be useful to send an officer with him it would be appreciated.

#### CLOTHING:

H. E. CHIRI said that the Minister of War had taken the responsibility of clothing war veterans of the Italian Army only. Patriots were being clothed by Allied Camps in forward areas. H.E. wished to know whether there was any way of assisting Patriots who have been "this side of the line" for some time and were badly in need of clothing.

COL. CRIPPS said that clothing was still a great problem. If these people had passed through the Patriot camps then they had already had the benefit of what little clothing we have.

H. E. CHIRI regretted that many arrived without adequate clothing, no doubt due to their own fault since many of them were in such haste to come South that they had not waited to be clothed properly.

COL. CRIPPS explained that AC received only a small percentage of salvage clothing which was at present being given entirely to Displaced Persons and Repatriation Sub-Commission, the bulk of clothing was allocated to the Ministry of Industry, Commerce and Labour who should be approached on behalf of the Patriot veterans by H.E.

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#### PATRIOT PREMIUMS:

H. E. CHIRI said that there was a difference in the amount of the ~~premium~~<sup>premium</sup> paid to Patriots in various provinces (£,000 - 1,000 lire) and requests were being received for the payment of the difference to those who had received the official amount of 1,000 lire.

COL. CRIPPS said that he had received no instructions to increase the amount and until he did he would continue to pay 1,000 lire.

H. E. CHIRI said that he would find out who had instigated the payment of the increased rate.

#### TRANSPORT:

H. E. CHIRI spoke on the subject of transport but Colonel CRIPPS suggested that Colonel CAMPBELL of WMO & IPW Sub-Commission should be approached for information on the subject.

H. E. CHIRI said that there would be a considerable number of military veterans, including those from France, who would have to be repatriated to the South and to Sicily.



SUMMARY: Notes on the Conference between M.L. Medici and Col. Cripps held in the latter's office on 29 May 45.

1. Col Cripps informed Mr. Medici that about a week ago while he was in Palermo, at the Regional HQ, discussing matters concerning payments of bonuses and compensation to Patriots with the Regional Patriots officer and with local leaders of various formations - Mr. Curcio, (for whom Col Cripps himself had obtained a permit to go North on a request signed by the Minister "Cossimaro") walked in person into the office. Mr. Curcio stated that the bonus to Patriots had been raised to 5000 lire and suggested issuing instructions to that effect to Italian Military Patriots Representatives from Milan.

Col Cripps answered that no instructions could be issued unless proper assurance had been received in writing by A.C. Local Government Sub Commission from the Italian Government, and that in any case such instructions could only be issued by the Local Governments' offices in Rome, in both Italian and English.

Assuming, though, that Mr. Curcio was a responsible official of the Ministry of Occupied Italy Col Cripps instructed Regional and Provincial Patriots officers to withhold payment of the 1000 lire bonus temporarily pending the issue of instructions concerning payments of 5000 lire.

Col Cripps also remarked on the general attitude of Sig. Curcio where Allied officers were concerned, and pointed out the unfortunate results that would inevitably arise should Italian officials assume the same attitude as Sig. Curcio, and so avoid making unauthorized statements. M.L. Medici replied that Sig. Curcio had never been authorized to give any kind of statement, much less issue instructions, concerning compensations, at least not by Medici himself (who at Ministry of Occupied Italy is responsible for patriot assistance) and that he would certainly call him sharply to book, both with regard to his duties as an Ministry of Occupied Italy official and on his personal behaviour in connection with Allied officers.

M.L. Medici furthermore stated that with regard to the increase in payments to patriots, during the Cabinet meeting attended by Gen. Cadorna and the other members of the C.I.N. of Northern Italy, it had been agreed to increase payments to patriots as follows:

- a) Demobilisation bonus from 1000 to 5000 lire.
- b) Organisation to be raised from 5000 to 10,000 lire.
- c) Compensation to families of fallen patriots from 10,000 to 20,000 lire.

While the previous increase, <sup>in the</sup> demobilisation bonus had applied to all patriots, the new increase, referred to above, would apply only to patriots who had been active up to the time of the final liberation of Northern Italy, in view of the greater hardships they had endured. M.L. Medici also stated that such provisions would require a certain time to become effective, because although approved in principle, they had still to be discussed in detail by the competent bodies of the Italian Cabinet, i.e. Treasury, Finance Minister, etc., and with the Finance Sub Commission Allied Commission.



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Col Cripps then asked if Medici thought it would be wise to instruct Regional Commissioners to continue with the 1000 Lire payments pending the last increase - to which Mr. Medici agreed.

Col Cripps then gave a full account of his impressions of his tour in the North and explained some provisions that had been adopted locally by Regional and Provincial Commissioners and by Patriot officers, more particularly where disarmament was concerned.



SUBJECT: Note of Interview - Local Government Sub Commission offices

DATE : 27 April 1945 - 1500 hours.

PRESENT: Col. R. E. Cripps, Director, Local Government S/C  
 Junior Commander Proby, Patriots Branch  
 H. E. Medici Tournaquinci, Under-Secretary, Ministry of Occupied Italy  
 Col. Farva, Liaison Officer, Patriots Branch  
 Capt. Di Robilant, interpreting.

1. Col. Cripps opened the interview by suggesting that H. E. MEDICI present his points for discussion first. Capt. Di Robilant, speaking for H. E. MEDICI, said that the necessity has arisen for the Patriots in the North to be given assistance as quickly as possible. Past experience emphasized this necessity, as it has sometimes shown that when officers are attached to a Region or Province, they are left on their own without supervision. This has brought about most unsatisfactory results and occasionally an irreparable mistake.

2. Col. Cripps asked if there were any suggestions as to how this condition might be overcome.

3. The conclusion has been reached, said H. E. MEDICI, that a dangerous atmosphere had set in amongst the Patriots because of the lack of assistance. It was only due to the personal initiative which H. E. had exerted in collaboration with Patriots Branch that it has been possible to completely change the situation which had established itself. In order to overcome these difficulties, they were proposing to institute a Provincial Commission, under the supervision of a Central Patriots Committee, in order to deal with those matters which had proved unsatisfactory during the past winter.

4. Col. Cripps asked if this were not the plan actually shown in the draft of Decree which had been submitted. It was replied that it was the same, but that all the points in that Decree were not quite clear and H. E. MEDICI wished to elucidate these.

5. One of the first faults in the proposed Decree is that it does not lay down <sup>how</sup> the Ministry of Occupied Italy could maintain liaison with the I.M.P.R.

6. The Decree furthermore does not make quite clear what the relationship between the Provincial Commissioner and the I.M.P.R. should be. Col. Cripps queried this point, and it was explained that the Decree does not define very clearly what the responsibility of the I.M.P.R. is towards the Ministry and towards the Allied Provincial Commissioner.

7. Capt. Di Robilant went on to say that under the Decree now being considered, there was provision for the institution at the Ministry of a Central Committee for the assistance of the Patriots to be presided over by the Under Secretary, H. E. MEDICI. But, he said, the Decree does <sup>not</sup> lay down the channels of control, nor does it state specifically who would be the "responsible person" to be made chairman of the Committee.

8. Col. Cripps stressed the point that if there was an allusion to the



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8. Col. Cripps stressed the point that if there was an allusion to the power of Military Government incorporated in the Decree, it might then be acceptable to the Allied Commission. It was explained that, assuming the Decree was to be operative in Occupied Italy, an effort would ~~be made~~ <sup>be made</sup> to find some way of incorporating such a clause.

9. It was pointed out that Article 4 of the Decree instituting the Ministry of Occupied Italy, states literally that:



"-----in all zones at present under AMG and in the territory which will be liberated by the Allied forces, the Assistance Officers will make all necessary provision for the preparation and implementation of the programs to give all possible material and moral assistance to the above formations of patriots and other civilian population of the above liberated areas: this in strict collaboration with and through the channels that will be laid down by the Allied Commission."

Therefore, it was stated, it will be possible to establish as a channel that the I.M.P.R. will be responsible to the Ministry of Occupied Italy as well as to the Provincial or Regional Commissioner. An amendment can be made to the assistance Decree to that effect.

10. Col. Cripps stated he felt this was an important point, for he felt that it was not possible for an officer to serve two masters. He said he felt that while an officer is under AMG, he must be under the control and orders of AMG officials. It was important that this point be made very clear.

11. There followed at this point some discussion of the second phase of the Decree, that relating to amendments to the financial estimates of the Ministry of Occupied Italy. Capt. Di Robilant stated that H. E. It was his idea that these inspectors should bring to the notice of the Ministry of Occupied Italy, through the Allied channels, all measures which were considered to be necessary in order to co-ordinate the work of the provincial committees.

14. Col. Cripps said he was wondering if the situation were not too temporary to warrant the appointment of such inspectors. H. E. MEDICI answered that approximately two months was the length of time they would be useful, and that he believed past experience had shown the need for these inspectors.

MEDICI that, because of the peculiar procedure which had to be followed in connection with Italian financial matters, it was most desirable that a "forecast" be given of amounts which it would be necessary for the Ministry of the Treasury to allot to the Ministry of Occupied Italy for patriot activities. This discussion included various references to the part played by the Allied Financial Officers and, in the end, it was decided that this phase would be taken up with Finance Sub-Commission when the draft Decree was re-submitted.

16. Col. Cripps said he had one other point to bring up and that had relation to the urgent need for sending officials forward to the North as quickly as possible. He stated that the Military authorities were having great difficulty in sending even their own people forward, and that when patriot officials were earmarked to go, they must be ready to leave at a minute's notice. It was agreed by H. E. MEDICI that this should be done.
17. Junior Commander Proby asked if it were not possible to set up a reserve list of people who had been screened and accepted, in order that it might be known who could be replaced. Capt. Di Robilant stated that it was the Ministry's intention to keep five or six officers "in cold storage" for that purpose.
18. Col. Cripps brought up points in connection with two patriot officials--POPEI and BALBI--and in the case of the first official, he said it was desired that he be dropped completely, because he had said a lot of objectionable things about the Allies and it had also been found that he was very difficult to work with. As to BALBI, this man was o.k. but it was preferred that he be the provincial man rather than the regional man.
19. One final point brought up by Col. Cripps related to the question of rations for patriots in hospital. He stated that AFHQ had asked the AC to take over control of this item and arrange to have all hospital cases treated in one central civilian hospital or group of hospitals. This request had been made because it had been felt that the rations did not always get to the patient under the present set-up. If the treatment of patriots was centralized in this fashion, it would be possible to have a patriot officer responsible for the question of feeding.
20. H. E. MEDICI agreed to take this point under consideration, and at this point the interview was closed.

Col. Cripps suggested that, possibly because of the Undersecretary's absence, the understanding and cooperation between the Ministry of Occupied Italy and the Local Government and Commission, are not as complete and as close as would be desirable.

Mr. Socciacardi replied that never until yesterday did he have that feeling, and the feeling was created by the fact that the directives concerning patriots had been issued by Patriotic Bands, which were not in accordance with previous directives, which had been based upon agreements reached previously and illustrated by Dr. Portini. The differences mainly concerned the institution of provincial commissions, the specific duties of Italian Military Patriot Representatives, and the financial measures necessary to supply Italian Military Patriot Representatives with funds.

Col. Cripps replied that the financial machinery had been devised only to simplify matters and to avoid the necessity, particularly undesirable at this time, of Italian Military Patriot Representatives, travelling to the north of the country with large sums of money in a suitcase.

It had therefore been established that all necessary moneys would be requested by Italian Military Patriot Representatives, with the approval of Allied Patriot Officers, from the Prefects, who would be supplied by Italian Financial Officers.

The differences mainly concerned the institution of provincial headquarters, the specific duties of Italian Military Patriot Representatives, and the financial procedure necessary to supply Italian Military Patriot Representatives with funds.

Col. Grippo replied that the financial matter had been devised only to simplify matters and to avoid the necessity, particularly in view of this time, of Italian Military Patriot Representatives, travelling to the North of the country with large sums of money in a suitcase.

It had therefore been established that all necessary moneys would be requested by Italian Military Patriot Representatives, with the approval of Allied Patriot Officers, from the Prefecture, who would be supplied by Allied Financial Officers.

Concerning the General directives to Italian Military Patriot Representatives Col. Grippo said that the Policy of the Allies, with regard to Patriots, when they were encountered, was to give them such assistance in the form of food, clothing, etc., as was possible, and return them as soon as possible to civilian life.

The Patriots effort could be acknowledged by the issue of a memorial medal, by the payment of compensation, and by the issue of Alexander Certificates.

It appeared that the decrees, the draft of which had been submitted to A.C. for scrutiny, would set up a sort of permanent organization whose duties it would be to take responsibility for, and organize in a nearly permanent way, patriot Centres where patriot formations would remain and be kept for an indefinite period; the decrees in itself did not seem to be in no ordinance with the policy of A.C.

In any case, if the decrees were approved, it could become effective only after A.N.G. territories were returned to the Administration of the Italian Govt.

Col. Cripps pointed out that the first responsibility for rehabilitation of Patriots was with A.N.G. This had been made quite clear and confirmed, and he called attention to the Aide Memoire addressed to the Prime Minister on 27 January 1945, para 2 C.

Mr Scoccimarro said that although the channels through which the work and the welfare for the patriots should be operated and been established the policy of this work and welfare had not been agreed upon.

In reply to a question from Col. Cripps, Mr Scoccimarro said that it had never been his intention to keep the centres as a permanent set up and that centres should not be maintained for periods of much more than one month.



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Mr Soccinero said that although the channels through which the work and the welfare for the patriots should be operated and been established the policy of this work and welfare had not been agreed upon.

In reply to a question from Col. Grippo, Mr Soccinero said that it had never been in intention to keep the centres as a permanent set up and that centres should not be maintained for periods of much more than one month.

Mr Soccinero gave also a complete explanation of how the provincial commissions should work, and what the political reasons for such commissions could be. He pointed out that the commissions would have two duties; the first would be to consider how assistance funds should be spent, <sup>3636</sup> which it would be better qualified to do than an Italian Military Patriot Representative alone.

The second would be political because the commissions would comprise one member of the C.L.M., one representative of the Prefecture and the Italian Military Patriot Representative. The three of them would be more fit to handle partisan



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matter than the Italian Military Police. Requirements also who may or be acquainted with local problems.

Mr Scoccimarro, furthermore declared that his views on military and civil reemployment were as follows:

a) Partisan units should be employed wholesale for replacements in the Italian combat units.

b) Partisans should be employed for "war follow" i.e. to trace and eventually destroy or capture enemy parties which may have been left behind in order to carry out sabotage or other war actions.

c) That the R.R.C. adhering with Allied Forces should be accomplished by partisans to enforce the law amongst partisans and civil populations who may be covered to the R.R.C. for political reasons.

d) The partisans should be trained for mine clearance duties.

e) Partisans from the centres should be detached for emergency labour such as reconstructions, clearance of debris etc.

He concluded that the partisan centres should be kept as replacement depots for the combat units and as emergency depots for miscellaneous labour. Mr Scoccimarro furthermore stated that abrupt dispersal of the partisans when they found themselves killed the Allied lines, or when they came through the lines, would be impossible, or at best would create very great difficulties. He concluded that, as far as the military reemployment of partisans

civil reemployment were as follows:

- a) Partisan units should be employed wholesale for responsibilities in the Italian combat units.
- b) Partisans should be employed for "war police" i.e. to move and eventually destroy or capture enemy vehicles which may have been left behind in order to carry out sabotage or other war actions.

He concluded that the partisan centres should be kept as replacement depots for the combat units and as emergency depots for miscellaneous labour.

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Mr. Macdonald further stated that abrupt dispersal of the partisans when they found themselves behind the Allied lines, or when they came through the lines, would be impossible, or at best would create very great difficulties.

Col. Orpington replied that, so far as the military reemployment of partisans was concerned the matter revolved entirely with the operational command. To use them for hunting machine guns and land vehicles would only lead to civil disturbance and disorder. Such duties are police functions. Partisans would probably be used on such police work temporarily, but this was a decision for the Regional Commissioner on the ground.

With regard next to the mine clearance proposition, he agreed this matter was of such delicacy that training was first required, and that if partisans were employed on such a task they would require at least a 14 days course



of training.

Concerning patriots employment on civil works such as reconstruction etc., the policy is that once employment has been found for them they should be considered as Italian civilians.

Instructions have been given to all Allied Labour Offices to grant first priority to patriots in possession of the Alexander Certificate.

Mr. Cocciari, then asked, what the actual duties of his Ministry were, and if it would be possible that he himself or the officials of his Ministry would be allowed to travel to the front in order to supervise the activities of the Italian Military Patriotic ~~Representatives~~ <sup>Groups</sup> and eventually give directives.

NOTES ON MEETING BETWEEN S.E. SCODOLARRO AND COL. CRIPPS  
AND LT. COL. CRAIG.

11 April 1945

1. At a meeting between Col. Cripps, Lt. Col. Craig and S.E. Scodolarro (Minister of Occupied Italy) it was mutually agreed that Italian Broadcasts to North Italy would be confined to :
  - (a) Activities of the Italian Government;
  - (b) Information from people of liberated Italy to relatives in the North which would be worded in such a way as not to expose them to reprisals by the Nazi-Fascists;
  - (c) Appeals for unity among the patriots;
  - (d) General appeals for action against the enemy;
  - (e) References - if it was necessary to refer to fighting in the North - limited to matter contained in the broadcasts of the Italia Combatta.
2. It was very definitely agreed that Broadcasts cannot be made without prior scrutiny of the script by Military Censor, P.W.D. and A.C. HQ. Scripts of broadcasts would be submitted for scrutiny at least three days prior to date of broadcast. When convenient this time will be reduced.
3. The Ministry of Occupied Italy would be particularly careful not to Broadcast promises which could not be fulfilled.

Asked if he knew anything about the departure of partisan volunteers for the front line, as published in the daily newspapers of April the 6th, he answered that he knew nothing about it. Although he had requested information to the Ministry of Interior. He also stated that if necessary he would release a statement to the press on the matter.

Shown a petition of the "Avanguardia Partigiana", in which authorization and means were asked to form partisan battalions for the front he answered that the association itself was not endorsed by the Italian Government, that he himself had tried to have it disbanded, as well as other such associations, and suggested that a copy of the letter should be sent to the Prime Minister in order to obtain definite restrictive measures on the subject.

## SUMMARY OF THE INTERVIEW ON 27 MARCH

BETWEEN Lt. Col. CRAIG and S.E. SCOCCIMARRO

1. Lt. Col. Craig informs S.E. Scoccimarro that Marchese Theodoli had graciously offered the Italian Red Cross Hospital in PRATO for the use of Patriots as a Convelescent Home.

S.E. Scoccimarro acknowledged this suggested gift with thanks and said he would contact Marquis Theodoli the next day.

2. It appears to Col. Craig that Italian Military Hospital may not be able to hospitalise all the Patriots coming through the lines, in which case he suggests that a ward in each Civilian Hospital be earmarked or reserved for Patriots.

Dr. Pertusi acting for S.E. Medici replied that Italian Military Hospitals have been instructed to hospitalise Patriots. Col. Craig pointed out that Italian Army casualties had first priority in their own Hospitals in which case it was possible that there might not be enough accommodation for Patriot casualties.

In view of this he suggested that a ward in each Civil Hospital be reserved for Patriots.

S.E. Scoccimarro takes a note of it.

3. Lt. Col. Craig asks if the Ministry of Occupied Italy can press the Presidency of the Council for the re-embursement of 3 million lire which was advanced by Finance Sub Commission for payment of Patriot Centres.

S.E. Scoccimarro assures him that he will bring the matter up with the President to-morrow morning, meanwhile he is ready to refund this money.

4. Lt. Col. Craig asks what the functions of the suggested "Provincial Commission" in Florence would be, and who the members would be. Dr. Pertusi explains that these Provincial Commissions will operate in liberated Provinces,

Convelescent Home.

S.E. Scoccimarro acknowledged this suggested gift with thanks and said he would contact Marquis Theodoli the next day.

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4. Lt.Col. Craig asks what the functions of the suggested "Provincial Commission" in Florence would be, and who the members would be. Dr. Pertusi explains that these Provincial Commissions will operate in liberated Provinces, the members will comprise : a representative of the Ministry of Occupied Italy, a representative of the local C.L.N. and a representative from the local Prefettura.

5. It has come to Col. Craig's notice that a Home for Partisan women has been established in Florence. What is the object of creating this institution ?

It was explained that this was done to avoid promiscuity and that the Home receives all Patriot women of which there are very few.

6. Col. Craig asked S.E. to define the position of the "Comando Superiore Partigiano". S.E. Scoccimarro stated that it is not a recognised body and will be eliminated by the Police.
7. Col. Craig asks for an explanation concerning Dr. Pertusi's statement on the economic treatment of Patriots.  
S.E. Scoccimarro made it clear that the Government wishes to grant to Patriots in the line, the same treatment as is granted to members of the Regular Armed Forces - about 50 lire daily - and he also adds that a few days ago he brought the matter up to the Ministry of War who will have to establish which of the two Central bodies will have this responsibility. He will go to Florence on the 11th April with a representative of the Ministry of War to study and settle the matter.
8. Col. Craig wished to know what would happen to the Pescia Hospital in the event of the Armies moving forward. Who would see to medical supplies.  
It was explained that an agreement had been made with IV Corps of 15 Army Group that O.S.S. would supply medicine. The administration of the Hospital would remain the responsibility of the Ministry of Occupied Italy. The mobile part of the Hospital would move forward. The stationary part would be transformed into a convalescent Home for Patriots.
9. Col. Craig wished to know when the names of the Italian Military Patriot Representatives would be approved.  
S.E. Scoccimarro answers that the problem would have been solved if it had not been for the Commissariat for Evacuation who warned him that some of names selected were being investigated. However, the next few days the Ministry of Occupied Italy will send in the final approved list.
10. Col. Craig asks if the institution of training and qualifying courses for Band leaders who may wish to have an Army rank is foreseen.  
S.E. Scoccimarro explained that a Commission instituted by the Ministry of War, with representatives of the Ministry of Occupied Italy will examine the applications and decide on their merits for the grant of Army ranks.

These Ambulances were not at their disposal permanently. They carried out their normal military tasks with the U.S. Army.

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
