

1. Further to your telephone conversation with the C/C, MFAA of this morning, re alleged activities of a De Gaullist News Agency in Rome.

2. PWB, Radio Monitoring Report No. 54, 10 Aug 44, p. 17 a, reported the Radio Tevere in Italian to Italy, 9 Aug as stating: "The de Gaullist News Service reports from Rome that in order to protect the works of art found by the Allies..., they will be brought to England. Among them is the "Primavera" by Botticelli." - It is conceivable, though most unlikely, that a friendly news service might have made so considerable a mis-statement.

3. In another Report (No. and date^{*} not now available) the Republican Fascist Radio on 18 July quoted from a "Gaullist Agency A.F.I." in the matter of the MONTECASSINO - VATICAN art objects. Here the statement was reasonably accurate and indeed the broadcast took exception to it.

4. There have been other quotations in the R.W.B. from such De Gaullist agencies, some, as at 2 above, seeming to comfort the enemy. This fact has led us to guess that the source might be fictional. Your agreement to determine the actual facts is much appreciated.

1. PROSTITUTION

a. Licensed houses of prostitution.

In ROME there used to exist about 40-50 licensed houses of prostitution.

b. Revelance of clandestine prostitution

There was a certain tendency to carry on clandestine prostitution. This, however, was successfully suppressed by anti-vivise squads who waged energetic war against both the prostitutes of the street and the procurers of women. At first a number of arrests were made for reasons of public safety. Then a caution was given to all the women. While the procurers were put in prison.

Some kind of discipline was imposed on prostitution by the Public Safety Law (Title, VII, Article 190-218), and the corresponding regulation. The law and the regulation were rigorously observed.

2. HOSPITALS FOR PROSTITUTION

Prostitutes were prevalently taken care of at S. MILITANO Hospital, which specialized in venereal and skin disease. There were 200 beds for V-D cases.

At the end of February 44 the circulation of paper money had increased considerably. The notes were printed in the plant situated at AQUILA, now transferred to Northern Italy. There are 100 in circulation.

Two types of notes were in circulation:

(S) with the "SALUTE" on a red disc,

(N) with the letters "NF" (Napoli Firenze).

There is a huge quantity of the latter as the Germans pay their troops with these.

The Monti del Tesoro and other Government Securities are quoted at high prices on the Stock Exchange but the public is trying to get rid of them and the average price is lire 22-30 per 100 nominal.

Insurance Companies are working nearly normally these days.

Banking operations are very much reduced.

One refugee said that in order to avoid inflation and heavy withdrawals of capital, clients are only allowed to withdraw lire 1000 every day other day, except those who have commitments for their firms or business. However a 2% stated that withdrawal of capital in Milan was controlled on a percentage basis, not more than 50% of deposit monthly being available. Wages of Government officials have been increased by 70%.

Over and above that increase they get an indemnity 20% zone of operations if they are anywhere near a theatre of war as well as an indemnity for bombings. In order to attract officers into the Republican Army their pay has been considerably increased.

In March 44 the Mint at Milan was controlled by the Germans.

The plant produced fuses, boosters, tracer assemblies, primers, nose caps for naval projectiles, breech blocks and replacement tracers for firing pin sleeves for the 20 mm BREDÁ M. Machinery included a foundry for aluminum, bronze, brass and iron, guillotines, presses and lathes. 55 persons, mostly technicians, were employed in the machine shop for tools, 40 were employed in the foundry and on the latines, assembly and presses, and the rest, mostly women, were on the latines, assembly and inspection. Production schedule was as follows: each worker produced 750 boosters daily, 2 workers produced 350 time fuses daily, 2 workers produced 4,500 brass primers daily, 5 workers produced 700 tracer assemblies of aluminum daily. Their principal duties seem to be to seek shops that are selling goods at absurdly high prices, and in theory to give the sequestered goods to the needy; and to round up those who have not answered the call to arms.

After 25 Jul 43 the "School of Mystic Fascism" (Mistica Fascista) founded by Arnaldo Mussolini to keep the pure ideal of Fascism alive, was dissolved. When the F.R.P. was reconstituted the dissolution of this body was confirmed. It appears however that the members of the School continue to meet in secret with the object of keeping in touch with members of the School in liberated Italy and organizing systematic sabotage there. In late Feb 44 the Corriere della Sera was still being published in MILAN. The Popolo d'Italia in whose premises Libro e Moschetto is being produced was not being issued.

The blind war hero Carlo FORLANI had just published the first issue of the daily paper "L'Italia Repubblicana".

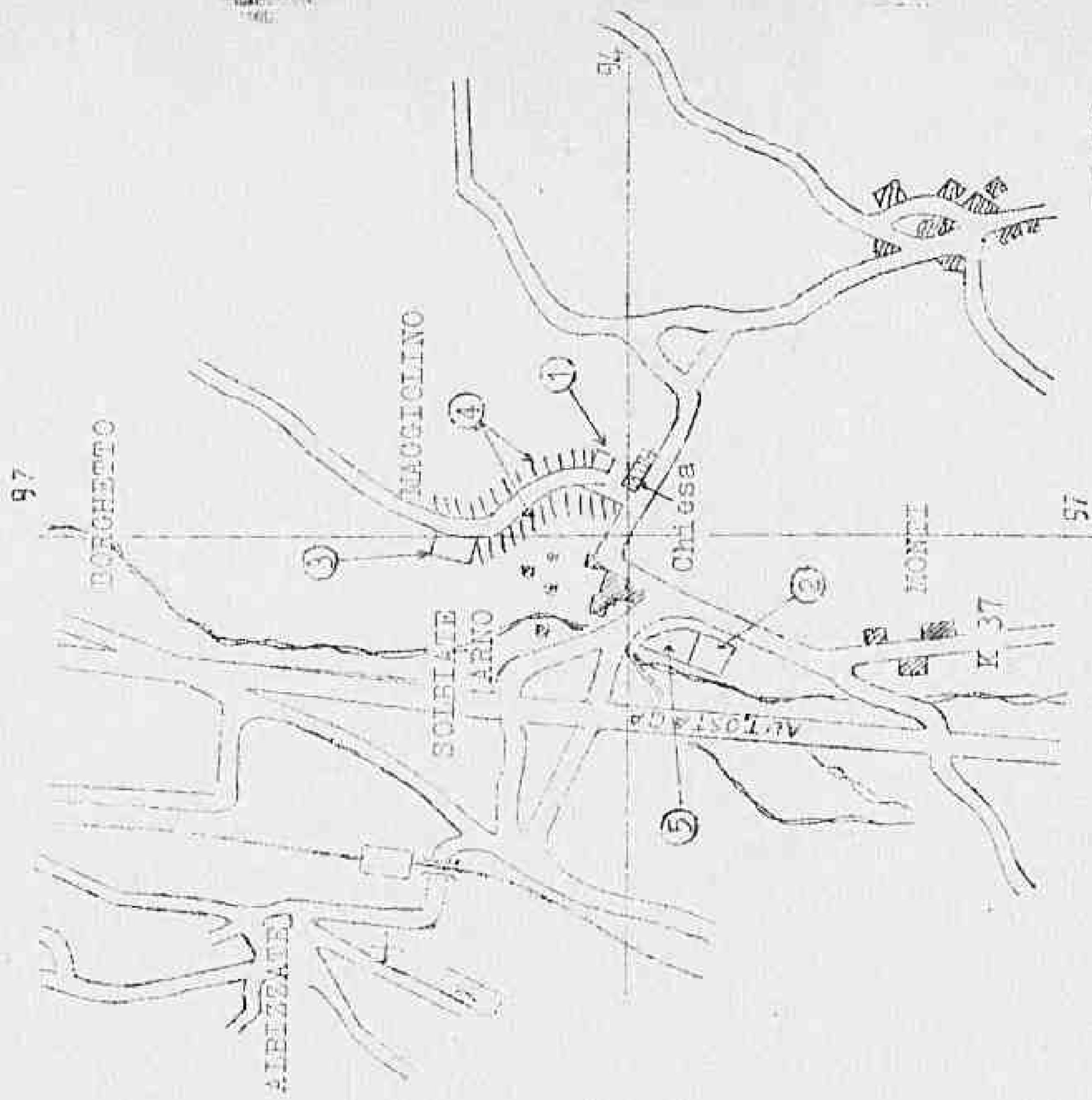

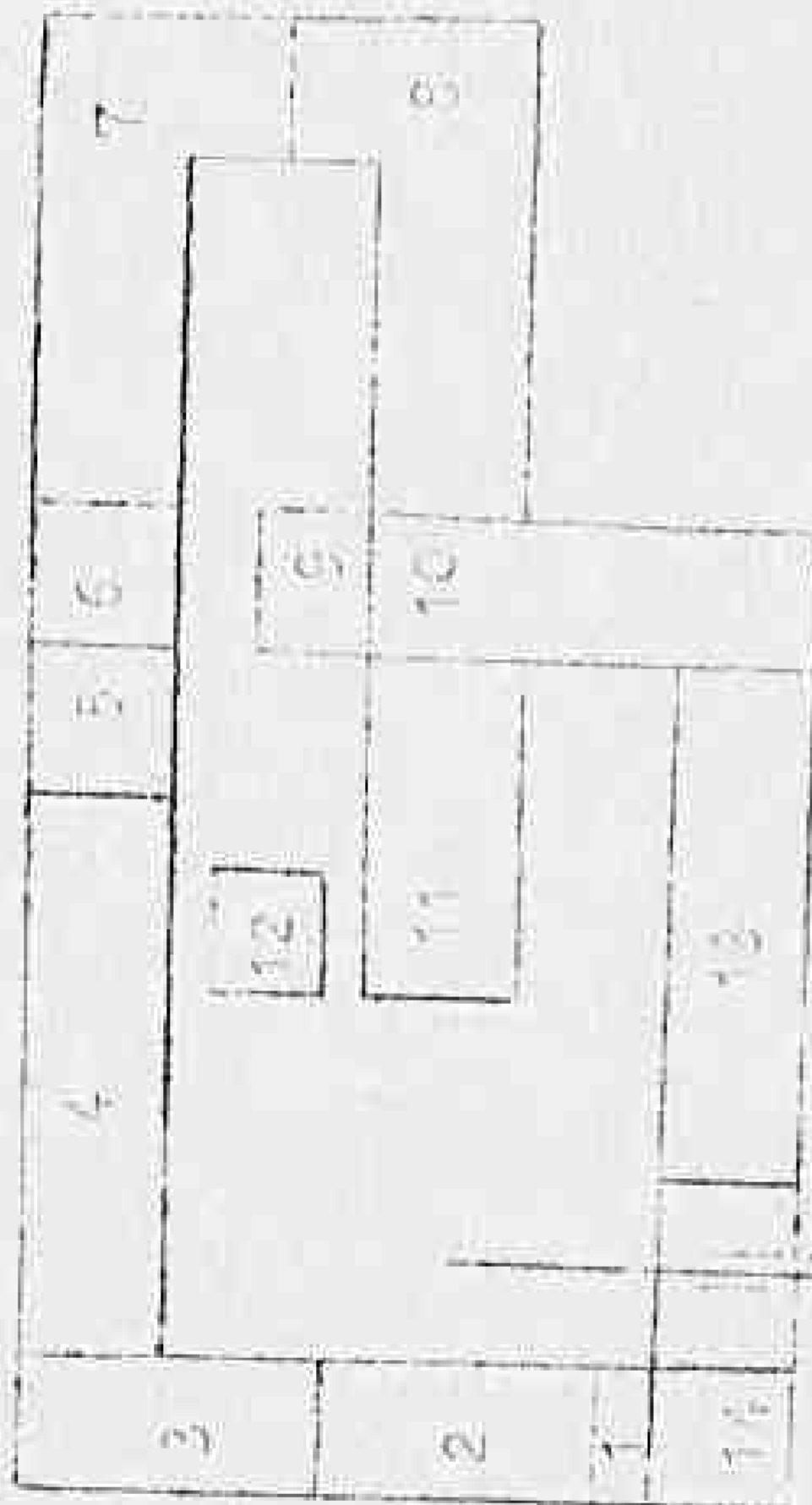

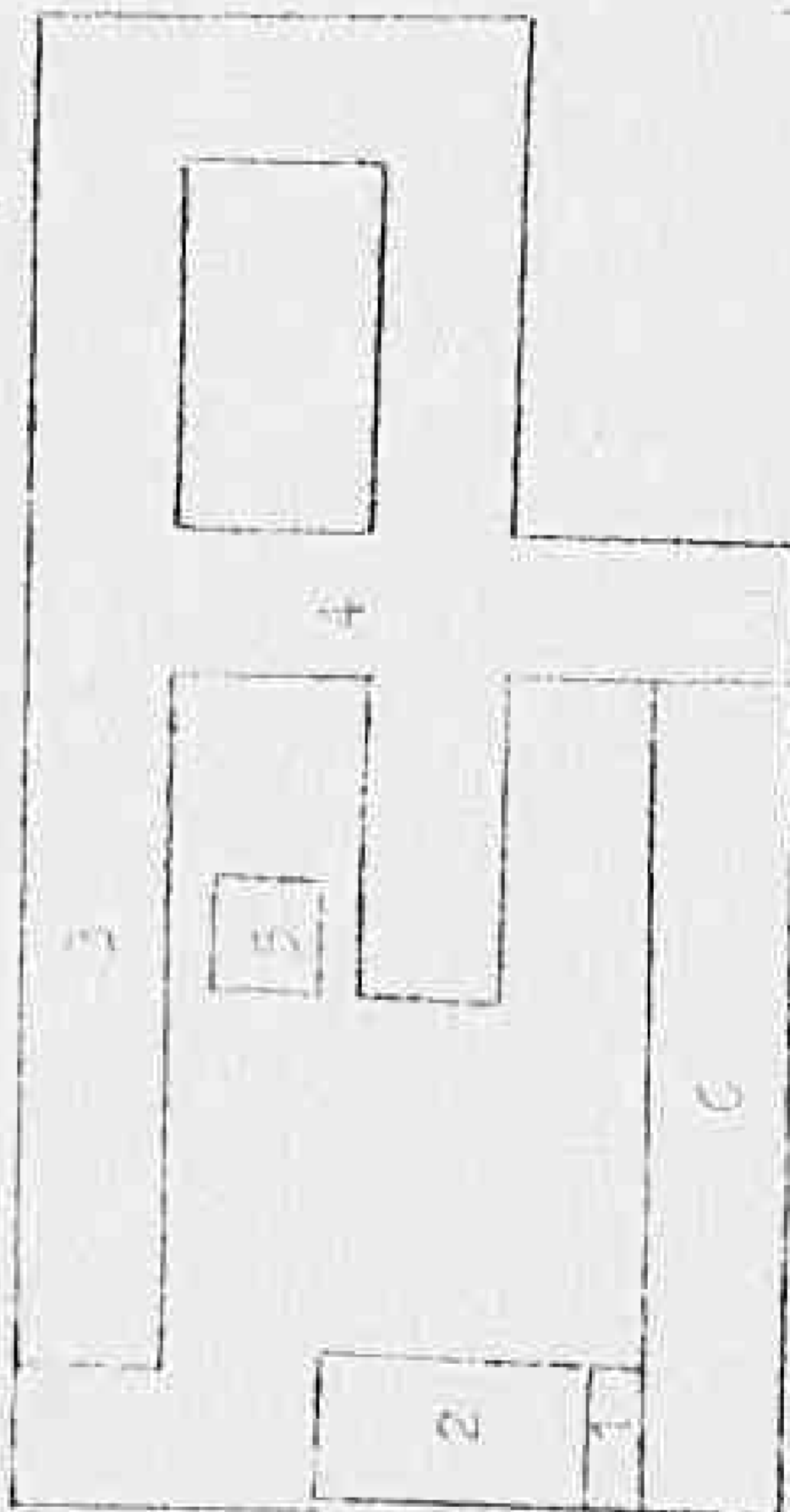
Enlargement Not to Scale of the Area SOLBIATE ARNO

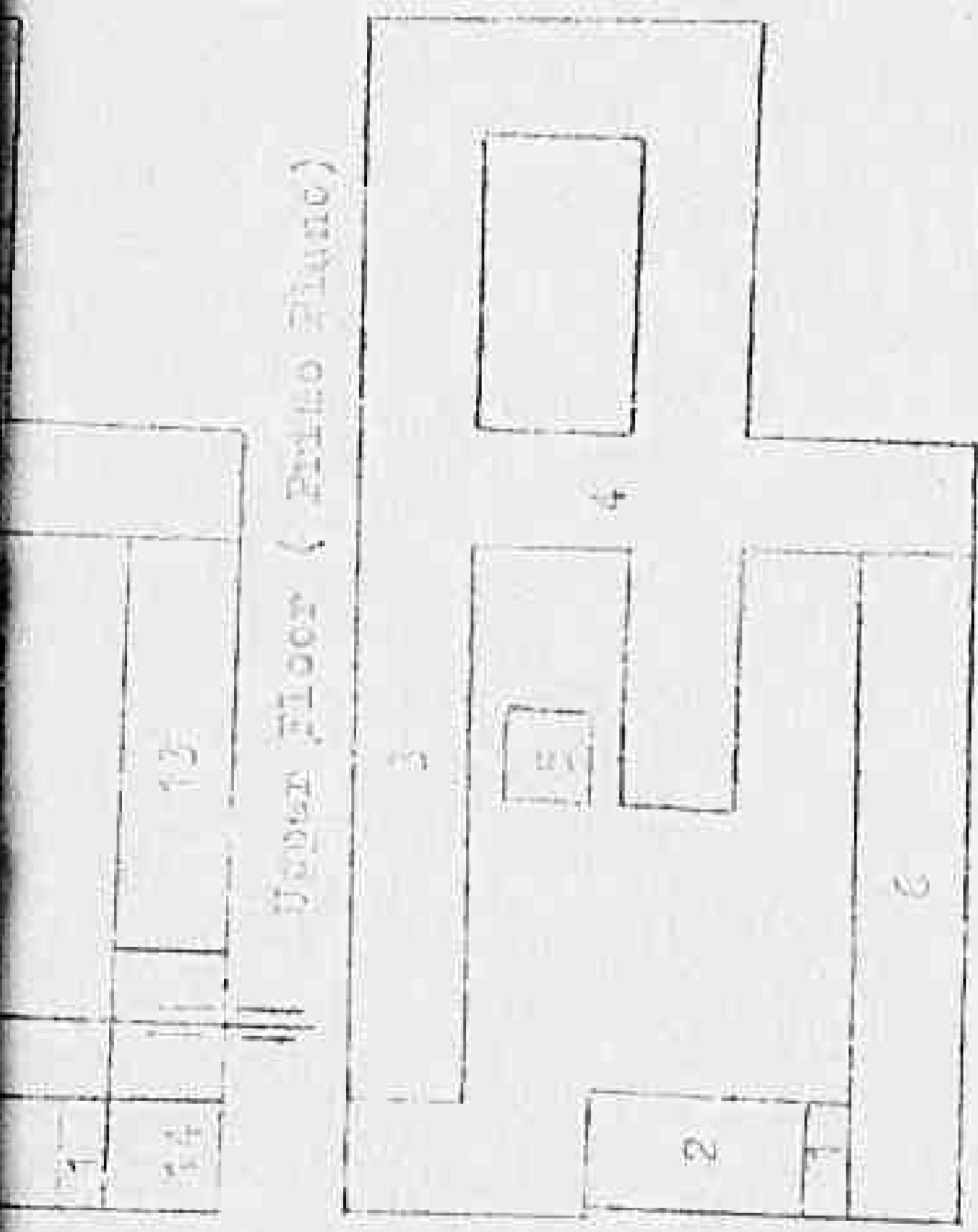

1. In response to your request the u/s "pointers" are passed to you please, for your information.
2. a) title "points for GMA - starts on arrival in survey Italy"
 - b) what have we:
 - (i) a sad and dis-illusioned people
 - (ii) war - Hunger is rife.
 - (iii) all elements of a population going to extremes in everything, in order to survive.
 - (iv) fuel - they are not practically not existent.
 - (v) restricted food supply - one cannot visit a "grocery" shop and buy food. Therefore, it is of a great importance to watch that necessary steps have been taken to order supply of ration before one sets off on a trip - this is the individual's responsibility.
 - (vi) transportation difficulties - so much is required for operational use that little is left for the people (loss of communication). It is sometimes better to ride in a truck that is added to the road conditions of a proposed journey than to ride in a comfortable bus which may not be able to make the journey. (An GMA party had at their experience nearly daily in Feb their transport was held up for days in the snow whilst military traffic continued to function.)
 - (vii) rough road conditions - generally the roads are full of pot or shell holes, nearly all the bridges have been blown and temporary ones erected; many diversions are necessary.
 - (viii) accommodation difficulties - accommodation is not always easy. One's camp bed may be required - a warm bath is pleasant but one is lucky if one gets a cold one. Water supply may be restricted (i.e., "turned off" except in the early morning and evening) - it is well to guard against that by keeping a little supply in reserve.
 - (ix) water is reported to be hard in Italy. Baths to pets are very necessary. One should make quite certain that the dog is efficiently tucked in around one's bed, otherwise it is of no value.

- (x) A town major in every place is always a most helpful person who shoulders all one's headaches.
- (xi) Black market rampant- the Italian custom is to bargain. Firmness is called for in all transactions - reduce price asked from 20% to 50%. For overcharging several shops in Naples have been put "out of bounds"
- (xii) Living conditions - one sees people living in a miserable life- one should try and appreciate the conditions and lessen the difficulties. One must not rely on the people to look after one - it is necessary to realize this and look after oneself.
- (xiii) Sightseeing - whilst the marvellous opportunity is offered, one should seize it and see all there is to be seen e.g., :-

Vesuvius

 Sorrentine peninsula
 Positano
 Amalfitana, etc.

1. Ref. your letter 17 March 1944, File 2153/INFO, and our reply of 25 April 1944, our ref. W/6/290, we have attached hereto two schedules to replace the one contained in our a/m letter.

2. These schedules are divided into material requested for Region II and the same material for the newly created Region VII. Your request was written before the division of the territory, and our previously submitted material did not differentiate between the two now separate regions. We feel that this will make the material easier for you to use.

3. Please note that the material in the schedule for Region II has been slightly changed from that previously submitted with our letter referred to in para 1 above. This change is in BARI Province, under "Communes Earmarked for Troops and Population of these". They submitted a revised schedule of the Communes after being notified by the military that there were also additional Communes which would be needed by the military and therefore could not be used for Refugees. The total population for Bari for these reserved Communes is therefore 736,757 in this revised schedule, whereas it was but 444,865 in the one previously submitted. This raises the total, of course, but as the schedule is now divided into that for Region II and Region VII, there is no comparable figures to be given, as we have listed each separately.

4. We have sent a copy of the Schedule for Region VII to the Region VII HQ. in case they desire it for future use. 4331

5. Please advise us if you need further Refugee information.

1. Due to urgency of prior military requests, it is impossible to obtain information desired through regular agent channels.
2. The subject of general medical control of ROME, in particular of venereal diseases, is covered in OSS Intelligence Procedure on ROME, April 1944. In this report it is proposed that doctors already in the City be organized by OSS agents to prepare studies of medical problems and, with those reports, meet the equivalent Allied authorities at a pre-arranged rendezvous in ROME when the first Allied troops enter the City.
3. It is hoped that the above procedure meets with the approval of AMG City Administration. Intelligence on venereal disease problems in ROME during the interim period (that is, prior to the Allied arrival) can be obtained through interrogation reports of civil and military refugees from authorized agencies, such as CSBIC and PWB.

1. The main problem of the Italian Refugee Branch at this time is the disposal of approximately 100,000 refugees in the area. It has been noted that the population which has been displaced by the war is not only large but also diverse in background and needs. There are, however, certain groups which have suffered great devastation.

2. It would be appreciated, therefore, if the following activities could be carried out in these areas: - U.S.S. Regions I, II and III

- a) General situation of each province, making comparison with pre-war population.
- b) Specific situation for Allied troops in each province, making population of each province.
- c) List of persons which have suffered particularly heavy devastation in each province.

3. It is suggested that the information given for any detail which may be required should be furnished at once to enable the necessary steps to be taken to solve the problem which is still being realized has operational requirements. It is thought that examination of action and these may serve as a guide.

1. Reference your letter of the 9th March 44, 2153/INFO.

2. As you know, our main problem - after dealing with the operational one of moving (where essential) refugees from battle zones, - is their dispersal into Provinces in Rear. Since they must be absorbed in the country, it has been decided that the only fair way to do this, is to fix a quota by provinces, based upon the population which each province supports normally.

3. There are complications however, in putting this policy into practice, and we should greatly appreciate the assistance of the Information Centre in solving them.

For instance certain communes in several provinces have been earmarked for troops, and can not receive refugees. Secondly whole areas, such as the perimetre around Foggia are earmarked for the U.S. Air Forces.

Thirdly, certain communes have suffered great devastation e.g. Capua and Isernia. Could you compile for this Branch, please, the following information regarding Region 1, 2 and 3 if only approximately?

- (a) Population of each Province.
- (b) Communes earmarked for troops in each province, giving population.
- (c) List of communes which have suffered particularly heavy destruction - say 50% or more.
