Nearly a million elementary school textbooks have been printed in liberated Italy since the first Allied landings in Sicily in July, 1943. It was announced today by the United States Sub-Commission of the Allied Commission.

At 9.5 the the Sub-Commission had to rely on Italian materials and imported newspapers, but supplies are now coming in from the United States. Recent shipments included 10,000 lbs. of glue, 150 tons of ink and over 100 tons of paper.

200,000 pupils' new books have also been printed and a million more are now being produced in Rome.

The greatest series of books for the five elementary school classes has been rewritten in 10 books of plain facts. Of secondary school books 75% had to be confiscated or expurgated while 4,447 are still in use.

Gravid progress towards the reactivation of the schools of liberated Italy can be seen in some of the facts that follow.

In the Naples area practically all rural schools are functioning with almost normal enrollment. City schools are open but struggling for accommodation.

South of the 1943/44 winter line, in an area recently reconquered by the old Republic of Salaparuta, 8 1/2 million Italians moved from the immediate vicinity of war zone Italy. The situation is normal now of 1944, the Allied Commission's Southern P. has reported today.

The Southern Region, as well as the surrounding of Campania, Puglia, Basilicata and Calabria, and living south of a belt of reconquered territory thirty miles long, the new and old Italy is in a state of normalcy. The rest of the country is the work of reconstruction. Brig. J. H. Doolittle is the Regional Commissioner in charge.

The general picture of a steady return to normality may be seen in some of the facts that follow. Certain large power plants were untouched by war and the whole region has some electric power. Railways, though limited and overworked, are still open to civilian traffic. Food is in fairly good supply and the physical condition is generally healthy and, on the whole, quiet and untroubled. To counteract the shortage of transport, which severely handicaps the Italian administration, every effort is being made to increase the transport carried by the railways. Naples is looking better, more reconstructed and less overworked. The area is in a state of local reconstruction and some progress is being made. The large leather shoe industry, formerly employing 30,000 workers, is gradually coming into its own again.

Campania has met and surpassed the goal for the Grand Set Popolo. Grain collections are considerably completed, amounting to 3,067,000 of wheat and 3,11,000 of barley. Despite heavy rains the planting of grain for the 1945 crop is under way. Wheat seed is still available, however, in several areas. Fruit and vegetable production is good for the season, but somewhat hampered by the shortage of railway cars. Most in the region was aided in the difficulties caused by lack of seed potatoes. Sugar beet and other vegetables are in excellent condition. The production of sugar is only slowly reduced because of shortage of transport. Fertilizer and more than 3,000 tons of rock phosphate received during the month of November. The supply of livestock was more normal and in places there are surpluses which are being disposed of as best as transport facilities permit. Lambs are arriving in Campania and export of P. P. is, where the high density of livestock in available pastures are not a limiting factor, the prevalence of animal disease is normal. Potato seedling in Campania provided 400 tons and some hundreds of thousands also available in the Naples area.

Six industrial plants in the Naples area were surveyed with a view to reconstruction. The Venetian plant at Portici now produces sulphuric acid and superphosphates and another plant at Marigliano should start pro-

Apart from those repaired under Allied Commission supervision approximately 60,000 pairs were distributed to agricultural workers for repair on a decentralized basis and over 47,000 pairs regarded as irreparable sent to the front for breaking up and making.

In recent months over 500,000 tons of vegetable seeds have been shipped abroad. To the United States West, 7,000 miles of onion seeds; to the United States East, 30 miles of broad beans, 300 cauliflower, 12,000 onion, 2,200 lettuce, 4,000 radish to North Africa (Algeria, Tunisia and Morocco) and Canada; 300 miles of cauliflower, 300 onion, 100 cabbage, 200 lettuce, 30 lettuce, 1,014 cauliflower, 107 kohlrabi, 2,400 radish, 130 parsley, 100 fennel, 771 onion, 121 cucumber, 550 radish, 4,400 carrot and 400 eggplant to Germany; 25,290 miles of broad beans; and to Sweden 44,000 miles of broad beans and 405 eggplant.

Further shipments to allied countries are also contemplated, including Greece, Yugoslavia, Albania and the Netherlands, and 10.5 tons of carrot seeds, 2.5 tons of broad beans and 85.5 tons of onions are available from remnants of the 1943 crop and the entire 1944 crop to help war-stricken countries.

The healthy state of the Italian vegetable seed industry is not only a factor in postwar Italy's own economy in order that it is also assisting other countries in the war to rehabilitate their shattered agricultural resources, officials said.

Plans are also being made for the re-creation of Italy's storage seed industry and the resumption of exports. In 1942 Italy exported no less than 8,000,000 kilograms of seed, with a value of 180 million lire.

A plant at Collefero, Province of Rome, has started the production of paraffinized paper panels in light metal frames as a substitute for glass. Existing materials will produce 60,000 square meters and output is estimated at 1,000 square meters a day.

Another plant at Collefero is producing 1,000 square meters of aluminum window sashes each day. Window stocks will produce about 100,000 square meters and transportation of further supplies is being arranged from the plant and others in the area.

In the same locality research is being carried out on the production of a new type of window frame which will be produced in large quantities.

A protest demonstration against the recent Italian call-up for military service in Catania, Sicily, has resulted in one person being killed and one wounded and some damage to property, reports to the Allied Commission from Italian sources said to-day.

A crowd estimated at 500 persons and believed led by students on Thursday morning, December 14, was reported to have gathered in front of the Italian military district headquarters in Catania to protest against the call-up. A hand grenade was thrown by persons unknown and one demonstrator was killed and one injured. Police dispersed the throng which then scattered in small groups over the city.

Military trucks were stopped and several burned. The provincial call-up office was occupied and set afire. The town hall was attacked in the afternoon, furniture and files were thrown out of the windows and a fire started. Also damaged were buildings housing the Young People's Association and the Corriere di Sicilia and the Palace of Justice.

Demonstrations against the call-up are also reported at Trani and Palermo but no casualties are reported from either.

BIOGRAPHICAL DATA ON COMMODORE ELLERY W. STONE, USNR.

Admiral

Stone, ~~Ellery W.~~, who is said to be one of the few reserve officers promoted to flag rank in the United States Navy, has been serving as Deputy Commissioner to the then Chief Commissioner of the Allied Control Commission, Lieutenant General Sir Frank Noel MacFarlane, since last February. ~~He~~ as Acting Chief Commissioner of the Commission when General MacFarlane left, and as Chief Commissioner since November 10.

One of the original members of the Allied Military Mission to Italy, Commodore Stone arrived in Italy on September 16, 1943, as head of the Communications Section of the Allied Military Mission. An authority on communications and radio, ~~Commodore~~ Stone's first task in Italy was also one of the most vital - that of insuring that Italian communications become as effective as aid as possible to the campaign for the liberation of Italy.

Recalled to active duty with the Navy in May, 1943, ~~Commodore~~ Admiral Stone's first assignment was as Naval Chief of Staff to Vice Admiral William Glassford, U.S.N., who headed the mission appointed by President Roosevelt to French West Africa.

In re-entering active service, Admiral Stone left behind him in civilian life the posts of President and Director of the Postal Telegraph System of the United States. A member of the Naval Reserve since World War I, the ~~Commodore~~ Admiral had been deferred from active duty during the time of negotiations leading to the merger of his corporation and the Western Union to form one telegraph system in the U.S. He had been president of Postal Telegraph since December 18, 1942 and before that had been executive vice president since 1935.

Commodore Stone was a pioneer in radio-telegraph communications. After having served in communications during the World War I as District Communications Officer of the Eleventh Naval District on the Pacific Coast, he was president of the Federal Telegraph Company which operated radio-telegraph service between the major cities along the Pacific Coast and which also established the first circuit from the American mainland to the Hawaiian Islands. ~~6741~~

The Federal Telegraph Company was later acquired by the International Telephone and Telegraph Corporation and was renamed the Mackay Radio and Telegraph Company. ~~Commodore~~ Admiral Stone then became executive vice president of Mackay Radio. Gifts from Americans to relatives and friends living in Italy are due to arrive here soon, the Communications Sub-Commission of the Allied Commission announced today.

Regulations limit each sender to one gift package a month, but allied postal authorities here expect to handle as many as one thousand 40 pound mail bags full of gifts for Italians before Christmas. The parcels may contain food, clothing, medicine and toilet articles and must not exceed four pounds in weight or 25 dollars in value.

After inspection by allied censors the packages will be sent by parcel post or military air transport to the Italian ports of Salerno, Naples and possibly Brindisi for delivery by allied transport to Italian post offices in Salerno, Naples, Rome and Vatican City.

According to the spokesman of transport United States postal authorities have already advised senders that addressees must live within the city limits of Salerno, Naples or Rome including Vatican City, the four places to which all packages may be mailed. To facilitate delivery of the gifts in these cities Italian postal authorities have worked out a system for sorting and storing them until the addressee can be advised by post card to come and get his package.

The most recently developed bacteriological culture for the production of a cattle vaccine against brucellosis has just arrived in Italy from the U.S. Department of Agriculture. The Public Health Sub-Commission of the Allied Commission announced today.

The vaccine is expected to save Italian cattle from infectious abortions and help reduce human undulant fever whose origin is carried in the raw milk of infected cattle.

The order for the vaccine was put in when the Veterinary Branch of the Public Health Sub-Commission observed that Italian cattle were falling victim in increasing numbers to brucellosis.

The Department of Agriculture's culture has been forwarded together with instructions for producing the vaccine in quantity to the Veterinary Division of the Italian Ministry of Interior.

The Allied Commission anticipates the Italian Government's plans for large scale production of the vaccine will permit the immunization of cattle and other herds throughout Italy. The first dairy cattle to be vaccinated will be large herds on the outskirts of Rome.

Rebuilding a railroad is not a new idea. Italy is no problem if you go about it in the right way according to what Supt. J. Crippen, who worked with the British Army in Italy.

General Smith and Major General J. Crippen, formerly a New York Engineer, started their work with the British Eighth Army and found that the British had been very successful in building a railroad and track, not only on the fact that the people of Italy advised their railroad and suggested they could be helped to get it back again, but they also had a good idea of how to get it back. A committee was formed, volunteer workers rallied to the cause and before long the Italian railroad was the number one reconstruction project in the world.

Once to the seriousness of war damage, the new line was completed and the old line was abandoned, with any extra line terminals.

Nevertheless, Italian engineers had used ahead, working up, and building a new line, removing mines and debris from tunnels, rebuilding stations and repairing the line and the small locomotives. This, an abandoned German track brought down from the mountains serving as a track and pushing right up with the new, they got four cars back into the rails.

After weeks of hard labor 17 miles of roadworthy track stretched through the mountains from Pistoia to Arezzo and Train Number 3310 was ready. The great works of art in Florence, kept in hiding for four and a half years, are now at last to be brought out so that they can be seen and enjoyed by the Allied troops and by the art-loving Florentine public. It was announced today by the art-General Edgar Esking Hume, chief of Fifth Army AMG. Under the auspices of Fifth Army, and due to the special interest of Lieut. General Clark, a great exhibition of Tuscan art is being arranged in Florence, by Italian officials of the Superintendency of Galleries in cooperation with Monuments and Fine Arts Officer for AMG Toscana Region.

The exhibition, planned to open in late November or in the early days of December, will occupy the rooms of the Uffizi Gallery formerly dedicated to the Tuscan school, and many of the masterpieces will be replaced in their original position on the walls, along with related works which have never been in Florence before, and are new for the first time as refugees from the war. The exhibition will represent the whole history of Tuscan painting from the thirteenth through the sixteenth century in terms of some of its greatest masterpieces. Works by Giotto, Cimabue, Duccio, the Lorenzetti, Filippo Lippi, Botticelli, Paolo Uccello, Domenico Veneziano, and many of the other great Tuscan artists will be on the walls, under ideal conditions of lighting and hanging.

It is no easy task to give such an exhibition in a section as thoroughly devastated as Tuscany. The Uffizi Gallery itself has been badly damaged by the German demolitions in neighboring areas and extensive work is necessary to reconstruction even a small section of it for the purpose. Many of the finest works of art from the galleries of Florence have been taken away by the Germans, ostensibly to Northern Italy to "protect" them from the Allies, and many hundreds of others are in mountain refuges such as castles and monasteries, rendered utterly inaccessible by blown bridges and swollen rivers. But due to the special interest of Fifth Army and the efforts of both AMG and Italian officials some at least of the problems will be overcome, enough to make an exhibition of Tuscan art which will be impossible to match anywhere in the world.

The opening of this exhibition of paintings, expected to last through the winter, will be followed by an exhibition of Tuscan sculpture at the Bargello Museum, in which the two great pulpits from Pisa, one by Niccolo and the other by Giovanni Pisano will be shown together for the first time. In addition to many other masterpieces of Tuscan sculpture. To provide officials of the Italian Government and of the Allies with basic data for developing and carrying through a maximum production and harvest of the most essential agricultural, forestry and fisheries crops in 1945, the Italian Ministry of Agriculture and Forests, in collaboration with the Agricultural Sub-Commission of the Allied Commission, have issued a detailed report for guidance, it was announced today.

Copies of the report, which is in Italian and English, are being distributed to all key Italian agricultural officials and Allied field officials down to provincial levels, in areas already liberated.

Preparation of the proposed programme was begun in May 1944. It was impossible, however, to formulate a livestock plan until an authoritative census of livestock could be made, but emphasis has been laid on encouraging the production of early maturing forms of livestock such as rabbits, pigs and sheep, since a slightly less than normal forage crop is contemplated in Italy in 1945, under the plan.

The basic economic policy of the Allies of reviving economic life and stimulating production in order to reduce to a minimum Italian demands on Allied sources, and of developing Italy as a source of supply for further operations, has been a guiding principle. A long term plan for Italian agriculture is not envisaged. The overall criterion in any emergency rehabilitation is savings of shipping space and conserving Allied supplies. Any demands for import of raw materials needed for Italian agriculture must be justified as being necessary for increasing production towards the general war effort.

Under war conditions any forecast of crop production becomes speculative, officials said. 1936 data have been used as being on a more accurate and realistic basis.

On the joint recommendation of the Allied Commission and of the United Military Employment of Italian Labor in Liberated Italy, the Allied Forces Local Resources Card has authorized a general wage increase up all employees of the Armed Forces in Italian Government territory, effective 1st November 1944, in order to meet the increased cost of living, it was announced today.

The increase ranges from 40 to 60 lire a day, the larger amount applying to employees in the lower pay categories. These increases constitute a temporary cost of living bonus which is added to the workers' present pay prefixed on the basic rate of October 1, 1944.

Examples of how the new increases will affect present pay scales follow:

- 1. Worker now receiving 65 lire a day will get a total increase of 30 lire, making his new wage 95 lire.
- 2. Worker getting 140 lire a day will receive an increase of 50 lire, making his new wage 190 lire.
- 3. Worker earning 240 lire a day will have an extra 40 lire, bringing his wage up to 280 lire.

In granting the increase, the Armed Forces recognized the necessity of an upward adjustment in wages to meet higher prices, so that there should be no impediment to the constant and uninterrupted flow of supplies, which labor needed in support of military operations.

in a letter to the President, dated October 1, 1944, in which he stated that the increase in pay for the enlisted men of the Army, effective October 1, 1944, was announced today.

The increase was from 40 to 50 cents a day. The higher amount applies to employees in the lower pay categories. These increases constitute a temporary cost of living bonus which is added to the workers' present pay indicated on the basic rates of October 1, 1944.

Examples of how the new employees' pay affects present pay rates follow:

A worker now receiving 25 cents a day will receive a total increase of 10 cents making his new wage 35 cents.

A worker receiving 30 cents a day will receive an increase of 10 cents, making his new wage 40 cents.

A worker earning as much as 100 cents a day will receive an increase of 10 cents, making his new wage 110 cents.

In granting the increase, the United States recognizes the necessity of an upward adjustment in wages to meet higher prices, so that there should be no impediment to the constant and uninterrupted flow of materials, skilled labor needed in support of military operations.

The so-called devastated areas, sites of some of the Italian campaign's most furious fighting in the breakthrough of the Hitler Line, lie in the provinces of Littoria, Frosinone, Aquila, Chieti and Pescara, with portions of the provinces of Naples and Campobasso also included. Population in the area which can be termed Institute, that is, without any resources of their own, is estimated at 300,000, of whom more than a third are children, according to Lieut. Col. A. D. Bonham-Carter (B), executive officer for the provinces in the Lazio-Umbria Region, who has been drawing up a headquarters relief program.

The area, which includes portions of the Lazio-Umbria Region on the west and the Marche-Abruzzi Region on the east, is entirely in Italian Government territory. Two AG teams are already at work in the Marche-Abruzzi region and more officers are being called upon to assign tents on the static military front to assist as necessary in the emergency relief program.

The population cannot be evacuated, first, because there are so few places they can be taken to; second, because of lack of equipment and transport for such a mammoth operation; third, and most important, because they do not want to leave their homes or what is left of their homes, only 150, for example, having agreed to leave shattered Frosinone.

People are now living in smashed houses, shacks made of rubble, caves and even dugouts and, of course, are doubling up with friends or relatives lucky enough to have homes still in one piece. There are also a fewfortunates with tents. Water is no problem, except for

Soup kitchens may be started later but at present only children in schools are getting lunches. There is also an attempt being made to give an

improved ration, even though a special ration has already been made available to the area for supplementary foods now given only to urban communities over 20,000 population. This means that for the four winter months there should be provided 10,000 tons of bread, 3,000 tons of pasta, 1,000 tons of sugar, 5,000 tons of milk, 2,000 tons of dried vegetables, 3,000 tons of dehydrated soup, 2,000 tons of cheese and meat and a regular ration of soap and salt. Transport of food to the area is more than transport in the area is the difficulty. The tough job in the distribution of food in the devastated areas will be to the isolated mountain hamlets where winds, snow, and slide-roads are blown by blizzards keep the residents in their homes the winter long.

While regional public works engineers are set to make priority repairs on houses and bridges where possible, emergency repair of houses is being planned with canvas. Some 30,000 square meters are now available and more sought. Until tiles and cement are found, the canvas will at least make some houses weatherproof for the time being. The housing program started by the Italian Government will not make any houses ready for occupancy until next spring, so has to be counted on as a practical measure. A few places near the area are sought as temporary re-location centers where the very old can be moved until a home in their own neighborhood can be made ready. Fiumi has some hotels which the military authorities will be asked to de-requisition for this purpose.

While regional public works engineers are set to make priority repairs on houses and buildings where possible, emergency repairs of houses is being planned with canvas. Some 30,000 square meters are now available and more sought. Until tiles and cement are found, the canvas will at least make some houses weatherproof for the time being. The housing program mentioned by the Italian Government will not make any houses ready for occupancy until next spring, so had to be counted on as a practical measure. A few places near the area are sought as temporary re-location centers where the very old can be moved until a home in their own neighborhood can be made ready. Finally, some hotels within the military authorities will be asked to de-militarize for this purpose.

The Italian Government, through the Finance Subcommittee, will also be asked urgently to make an immediate appropriation of funds and to eliminate administrative technicalities in getting aid to the area.

In the heavily fought-over country between Cassino and Rome the Archives of the Abbey and priceless MSS from other centres were safely transferred to the Vatican but there was much work to be done on the mass of material remaining in badly damaged buildings. In Umbria and Marche repositories have suffered lightly. The very important Archives of the Tuscan cities, Florence, Pisa, Siena, Livorno and Lucca have provided many problems but the archives have in each case escaped severe damage. At Pisa the State Archive building was heavily mined and booby-trapped and at Florence the building was blasted

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by the demolitions on the town. From Siena the remains still remain beautifully secure. Machinegun records which were found in the place of hiding to which they had been moved outside the city, but this is the only serious loss known through looting.

Among the Italians, Mr. Grogan added, there is appreciation of the importance of this town and recognition has been good. Among measures undertaken to safeguard the health of the Italian population this winter, demonstration teams under auspices of the Public Health Sub-Commission of the Allied Control Commission will visit Naples on October 16 as the start of a tour through all areas of Italy to show the latest methods of typhus prevention, and dusting techniques which were so successful last year, it was announced today.

Conferences will be held at Naples, Bari, Taranto, Catanzaro, Catania and Palermo, while similar meetings will be arranged later in Rome and Chieti. On-the-spot methods of dusting will be demonstrated in local prisons. Representatives from each province will be given a dustpump and a 10-lb. can of DDT powder as emergency supplies.

The Allied Control Commission has stockpiled enough dusting powder, which is the most effective agent of typhus control, to dust more than 500,000 persons if the need arises, officials said, as part of a campaign to prevent recurrence of another typhus epidemic such as broke out in Naples last year.

Since the health of the civilian population has a direct effect on the health of the military units stationed in Italy, ACC officers have also been given access to Army stocks of powder to dust several hundred thousand more civilians, in addition to ACC stocks.

Announcement of the visiting demonstration teams on typhus control coincided with preparation by the Public Health Sub-Commission of an exhaustive report on the Naples typhus epidemic, the most serious yet reported in the present war, in which 429 persons died among the 2,080 cases recorded from Jan. 1, 1943 to June 1, 1944.

This approximately 20.6% mortality rate among the typhus cases may be contrasted with the 50 to 70 percent mortality rates recorded in other epidemics. The energetic measures undertaken by the Allied health authorities in giving 3,255,788 dusting treatments to the population of Naples and vicinity was the chief factor in keeping the epidemic under control.

The role of the Allied Control Commission is taking the initial steps to suppress the typhus epidemic in Naples, the incorporation of the experience and scientific knowledge of the Rockefeller Foundation typhus team into military government service and the scope and complexity of modern measures to combat a dread epidemic are outlined in the report.

The next day officials of the Rockefeller Foundation and the Public Health Sub-Commission met in hurried conference in North Africa to plan for the danger, a danger not only to the civilian population which the Fifth Army was about to take over, but to the troops and the military operations they were engaged in.

The decision was reached to give control of the technical phases of typhus battle to the Rockefeller Foundation scientists and to use the louse powder disinfection method as the best safeguard of the general population. Regulations for 100 tons of DDT powder and spray guns were forwarded and preparations made to move into Italy as soon as military operations permitted.

Meanwhile, AUC public health officers of the 10th Army Group warned the situation carefully as the incidence of the disease began to spread. Measures were taken to energize the Italian health authorities, warning being given on November 29, 1943 that an epidemic threatened. A few days later on December 6, 1943, the AUC typhus team arrived and went into action.

The typhus specialists came to the scene of one of the greatest mass control experiments in modern medical history, with dusting powders developed at Orlando, Florida, by the United States Department of Agriculture and the Rockefeller Foundation, and with methods developed in tests on thousands of acres in North Africa, and in Egypt and Persia.

The powders used for dusting, first DDT and then the exceptionally successful DDT, killed the lice which carried the typhus germs without producing toxic effects on human beings. Spraying the powder on to the skin and garments of large groups of men and women without the necessity of their disrobing was the next big step in the development of the technique which made it so simple that practically anyone could handle it. The program was systematized down to the point where it was figured one pound of powder would be good for spraying 15 to 20 persons. Everybody liked the powder because it gave immediate relief in an easy, convenient way.

The AUC specialists soon discovered that the disease had entered Italy by way, first, of Russia in February or March, 1943 through a hospital train carrying wounded from the Russian front, and by way of North Africa where typhus had always been endemic. Prisoners of war from Yugoslavia also carried the germs and soon the crowded prisons of Naples and its vicinity were swarming grounds for the disease. The first appearance was at Foggia and almost immediately after at Naples. Conditions, especially in the air raid shelters gave the typhus lice the best possible chance to spread in the compact and densely populated area of Naples. Further, on September 30 the Germans opened the gates of the Foggiorale and Pozzuoli prisons and let loose the verminous prisoners on the city. The infectious germs thus was built up for the epidemic lightning which was to strike in December on the eve of the arrival of the Allied typhus of forces.

Official responsibility for direction of typhus control measures from the occupation of Naples on October 1, 1943 until January 2, 1944 was that of the 10th Army Group. After which it passed to the United States Typhus Commission until February 19 and then was turned over to the AUC Public Health Sub-Commission. These administrative overhead charges did not affect in any way the preliminary program worked out in advance by the Rockefeller Foundation and Public Health Sub-Commission in North Africa more than two months earlier. Field work was under supervision of the Public Health Officer for Region III.

Further, on September 30 the Germans opened the gates of the Regiole and possible prisons and let loose the verminous prisoners on the city. The infectious disease was building up for the epidemic situation which was to start in December on the eve of the arrival of the Allied troops of 1944.

Original responsibility for the direction of typhus control measures from the occupation of Naples on October 1, 1943 until January 2, 1944 was that of the 10th Army Group AMC, after which it passed to the United States Typhus Commission until February 19 and then was turned over to the AMC Public Health Sub-Commission. These administrative overhead changes did not affect in any way the preliminary program worked out in advance by the Rockefeller Foundation and Public Health Sub-Commission in North Africa more than two months earlier. Field work was under supervision of the Public Health Officer for Region III AMC.

Counting of the first group of doctors began on December 11. At first volunteers were relied on but soon workers had to be hired and paid daily by AMC on the only way to get sufficient and adequate personnel. The requisitioned powder and spray guns had not arrived so Peninsular Base Section came to the rescue with loan of 20,000 2-oz. tins of 400 lbs. of DDT and gave authorization to draw on 500,000 tins of DDT as needed, until 100,000 tins arrived. The first step was the dusting of all survivors and known associates of typhus victims on the spot. This was called delousing the "contacts" of the cases. Often, whole blocks of homes were deloused.

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Mass delousing as a systematic preventive was then instituted and no stations participated, the first such stations opening on December 26. The program became popular overnight and Neapolitan stood around watching men and other getting dusted while families and friends gathered from blocks around to go for a dusting. As many as 72,000 were dusted on any day. In fact, many had to be discouraged from coming too often, since one dusting was usually effective for two weeks. Flying squadrons to approximately 50 nearby localities also went into action January 3 and passengers on all trains out of Naples were dusted to keep the epidemic from spreading.

The peak of the epidemic came on Jan 6th, the cases reported rising to their highest figure by that date and falling off after it. The first civilian cases in Naples had been reported in April, 1943 and before November 1, there had been 51 cases reported. Even between November 1 and 10 there were conspicuous victims, since, homeless and footloose, they came into all sorts of contacts that made them easy prey for the virus. The other main type of victim were the five men and the typists. The other main type of victim were the mothers who nursed their families and then fell ill themselves. Most deaths occurred among the old, since their circulatory system had naturally impaired by age to an extent that it could not withstand the attack of the typhus virus on their already debilitated tissues.

A very little can be done to overcome in the general way the epidemic of typhus transmitted and changed-address of the Neapolitan population who often have the former address of a bombed out home - and so later could not be found. It also was so mixed up in the crowded quarters that it was almost impossible to locate them for contact delousing. Then, because of the general fear of the populace, there were thousands of false alarms, more than 1,000 visits being paid on non-existent missions.

Despite the fact that a severe malaria danger existed in Italy this year owing to deliberate German floodings, lack of supplies and transport and disruption by war of the Italian public health services, the Allied Malaria Control Program has definitely kept the threat in check and in several instances has notably lowered previous malaria rates of preceding years, the Public Health Sub-Commission of the Allied Control Commission announced today.

In a brief review of the health situation, the Allied health officers also revealed the following news in the matter of medical supplies:

600 tons of medical supplies had just arrived in Italy.

A national wholesale druggists' association is being formed, under the auspices of the Italian Government, to handle the distribution of medical supplies to liberated Italy.

Of the approximately 8,000 kilograms of quinine found by the Fifth Army in a warehouse at Salsola di Volterra, 4,270 kg. was turned over for Italian use, including that of the Italian armed forces.

The other 3,730 kg. were shipped to the United States for processing and use in Allied armed forces of the Pacific Theater.

4,000,000 tablets of atabrine have been made available to Italian health authorities for malaria prevention and cure, while another 7,000,000 tablets are stockpiled for use on call.

In addition, 14,520 ampules of quinine were imported from America for Italian use.

Other drug items made available to the civilian population include 775,000 units of insulin, 15,000 pounds of ether, 8,000,000 sulfa tablets and 50,000 ounces of sulfa powders.

ACC officers are also now satisfied that Italian biological laboratories are ready to take care of all needs in liberated Italy for anti-toxins, serums and vaccines in the three biological houses set up under ACC direction at Palermo, Naples and, largest and most recent, at Salsola.

ACC officers are also now satisfied that Italian biological laboratories are ready to take care of all needs in liberated Italy for anti-toxins, tumors and vaccines in the three biological houses set up under ACC direction at Palermo, Naples and, largest and most recent, at Salerno.

On the statistical side, the Public Health Sub-Commission reported as follows, adding the qualification that statistics under war conditions are extremely meager but that the figures were given from Italian sources are the best obtainable:

Malaria in Italy in August 41 resulted in 1,111 cases; in Southern Italy in the same period 493 cases, but in Region IV's (Liguria Province, there were 30,749 cases. However, only one death was reported from this last total. The Liguria incidence of malaria was clearly attributable to the scientific destruction

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of the Berlin conditions by the Germans, where out of some 12,000 deaths occurred, the ACC has succeeded in training almost half. The Costa Rican, for example, is now completely disease-free.

In Berlin, long noted as one of the world's worst malaria spots, ACC measures actually reduced the number of cases. From January to July, there were 1,550 cases this year, whereas last year in the same period there were 4,055. In several provinces in August, 1943, further, 221 malaria cases were reported, this August there were 150 cases.

Other diseases were reported to be under control. The typhoid epidemic in Bamertoto, traced to polluted water, is abating, only 85 cases being reported in September compared with 173 for August. Small pox in Naples has subsided, 178 cases being reported for the whole province in September, after the program of wholesale vaccinations was undertaken.

An analysis of the tuberculosis and infant mortality rates was also made by the Public Health experts. It was pointed out that even in the 1938 official "Notiziario" of the Public Health authorities, the statement was made that moderate tuberculosis statistics were unobtainable because of the "absence of obligatory notification of all cases." Only when communal life is led as in schools, universities, military organizations and the like is tuberculosis notification reliable. Careful inventory of the 23 caches of priceless art placed for safety in hiding places near Florence by Italian curators has revealed extensive losses of treasures while under German occupation, field reports to the Monuments, Fine Arts and Archives Sub-Commission of the Allied Control Commission indicated today.

A partial list has now been made of recorded art works, many of world-famed occasion, which have not been found to date and which, according to Italian testimony, were taken by the Germans on the pretext that the treasures were to be "saved from American barbarians", AOC officers said.

At the same Villa in Barberino, the Germans also threw all the cartoons of the Uffizi Gallery, the most important of which had been stored there, into the basement where they suffered the same fate as the books. Many cartoons were torn from their frames, while other frames had been smashed and as many as 25 cartoons, including some by Tintoretto, Fra Bartolomeo and other famous artists had disappeared entirely.

ACC officers of Region IX will investigate the report on arrival in Bologna.

From the Oratory of S. Onofrio at Diocorno, where the 26 cases of Hellenistic and Roman sculpture were taken, is missing the famous group of Wicke with her daughters. Again, the Germans gave the story that they were "saving" the treasures from the Americans.

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The pictures missing from another crate at Montignone amount to 251, including work by Titian, Botticelli, Rafael, Verrochio and a host of other noted names. These pictures were presumably removed to North Italy.

At the Palazzo Protorio at Poggi, a remote village in the Casentino, the Germans took 25 to 30 crates of small size away in one truck, after smashing open several other crates and rifling their contents. The crate was broken open despite an attempt by the Italian in charge to deceive the Germans with a false inventory.

The contents of the crates included the Flute Player by Watteau, Self Portrait by Guido-Bandi, Ruins by Bellotto, Noah's Ark by Sestiglione.

However at the same deposit Botticelli's Birth of Venus and Leonardo's Adoration of the Magi were found safe and intact.

Pictures and other art works found in the crates, after being inventoried, are being returned to their original places in Florence or under military guard.

The REAR ARMY CONTROL LINE and the RESTRICTED LINE have both been moved forward by Army authorities, thus increasing the area in which civilians may now move with less restrictions, the Allied Control Commission announced today.

The latest consolidated regulations governing control of civilian movement in Italy follow:

There are three zones set up to control civilian movement. These zones are called the ARMY ZONE, the RESTRICTED ZONE and the FREE ZONE.

ARMY ZONE

1. The Army Zone is bounded on the north by the actual line of battle. On the south the Army Zone is now bounded by a line running from Trimesino on the Adriatic Sea to Lake Trasimeno to Lago, Pesasso, Perugia, Assisi, then north of Lake Trasimeno to Sinigaglia, Siena, Volterra and Cecina on the Tyrrhenian Sea. The southern boundary of the Army Zone is called the REAR ARMY CONTROL LINE. It is now posted on all roads leading to this zone and 24-hour road patrols are on duty to check all entries. As the battle front moves forward this REAR ARMY CONTROL LINE will periodically move forward also and notices will be posted informing the public of the location of the new boundary.

2. In the Army Zone no civilian may travel more than 10 kilometres or enter or leave the zone without a pass approved by AGC officers in the zone.

3. Civilians who wish to enter the Army Zone from another zone must apply for passes to the Questura or AGC/AGC offices of the community in which they live. If their requests are approved by the Army authorities, they will be issued a pass. The only basis for making a request to enter the Army Zone is that such travel must directly benefit the war effort.

RESTRICTED ZONE

1. The next zone is called the RESTRICTED ZONE. It lies between the REAR ARMY CONTROL LINE and the RESTRICTED LINE. This RESTRICTED LINE now follows the northern boundaries of the provinces of Teramo, Rieti and Roma. The RESTRICTED ZONE includes both Italian Government territory and AGC territory, that is, the territory of the

These zones are called the Army Zone, the Restricted Zone and the Free Zone.

ARMY ZONE

1. The Army zone is bounded on the north by the actual line of battle. On the south the Army Zone is now bounded by a line running from Pissano on the Adriatic Sea to Fiesi Marittima, Poggio, Poggio Leone, thence north of Lake Trasimeno to Binasco, Siena, Volterra and Seina on the Tyrrhenian Sea. The southern boundary of the Army Zone is called the REAR ARMY CONTROL LINE. Signs are posted on all roads leading to this zone and 24-hour road patrols are on duty to check all entries. As the battle front moves forward this REAR ARMY CONTROL LINE will periodically move forward also and notices will be posted informing the public of the location of the new boundary.

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RESTRICTED ZONE

1. The next zone is called the Restricted Zone. It lies between the Rear Army Control Line and the Restricted Line. This Restricted Line now follows the northern boundaries of the provinces of Teramo, Rieti and Tora. The Restricted Zone includes both Italian Government territory and ANG territory, that is, territory not yet handed over to the jurisdiction of purely Italian administration.

2. The Province of Foggia remains in the Restricted Zone.

3. In the Restricted Zone no civilian may travel from one province to another or enter another zone without a pass issued by the Questura or AGO/ANG office at the point of departure.

ture where no is living. These rules apply equally to all parts of the Restricted Zone, whether it be under control of Allied Control Commission regional commissioners or under control of the Italian Government.

4. In the Restricted Zone the request for passes must be based on sound and sufficient reasons of official, commercial or family nature, clearly demonstrating the urgency of the needed travel.

FREE ZONE.

1. The Free Zone is all Italy south of the Restricted Line. The new relaxation of rules now adds the Provinces of Campobasso, Chieti, Pescara, Aquila, Teramo, Rieti, Rome, Grosseto and Livorno to the Free Zone.

2. In the Free Zone passes are required ONLY for movement from the islands of Elbe, Sardinia, Sicily to the Mainland or for movement from the Free Zone to another zone. These passes will be issued by the Questure.

3. There is only form of the general civilian movement pass - a yellow one. Police will recognize no other than travel agencies are instructed to issue no tickets to persons who have not proper passes in their possession.

4. The only other pass recognized will be the green card issued by the Public Relations Branch of the Allied Control Commission to authorized Italian journalists. These cards authorize travel in the Restricted and Free Zones but not in the Army Zone. For travel by journalists in the Army Zone the standard yellow pass is still required.

5. Italian military personnel on leave must also conform to the above regulations.

With the harvest season virtually over - although last-minute deliveries, after delays caused by transport difficulties, are expected to add to the collection total this month - at least the field report, 77 per cent, or 7,815,052 qtl. of the estimated 11,600,000 qtl. crop to be amassed has been delivered to the Granai del Popolo, the Agriculture Sub-Commission of the ACC said. The collections should stand at 75 per cent, when Sept. 30 field reports are in, it was added.

The basic statistics estimated of the wheat harvest in liberated Italy in 1944 are as follows:

The collections, ACC officials said, compare favorably with those in Fascist years, despite conditions which made the harvesting one series of crises after another, especially after the war in which complete breakdown of Italian efforts to collect the harvest in 1943 during the period after the fall of Mussolini, the formation of a new Italian Government and the invasion of the Allied Forces.

Fundamental handicaps facing the successful harvest were the hard facts of continuance of military operations, with their inevitable first and absolute priority (which account for the lateness of the collection in the forward areas), and the necessary growing

peins of Italian administration which had to start from practically nothing to organize the machinery and which resulted in late starts in field organization. Practical difficulties were headed, as usual, by shortage of transport, in addition to lack of storage space. Shortage of fuel for threshing machines, destruction of railroads and bridges for communications, lack of power for mills, delays in financial arrangements in some parts, temporary labor shortages and delays in delivery of winter twine and sacks.

An over-all factor was the reduced storage caused by destroyed farms, mined fields and German flooding. Comparisons with other years - 1943 statistics are unreliable because of previously described circumstances - indicate that the Italian farmer produced to the fullest extent possible as far as tillable ground was concerned, whatever may have been the eventual harvest and delivery to the Granai del Popolo. Total crops produced in past years in the same area as liberated Italy were 34,804,130 qtl. in 1941; 41,297,770 qtl. in 1942; 42,529,620 qtl. in 1943, and 43,234,420 qtl. in 1949.

The estimate of 11,000,000 qtl. to be amassed is the most recent downward and realistic estimate of the collections as made by the Agriculture Job-Correlation in view of conditions met. The original estimate last spring was 43 per cent. high was later cut to 38 per cent. and a target figure set at 13,645,173 qtl. for collections by regional commissioners of the AGC. The regional target has been kept so as not to interfere with previously arranged plans, although it was patently an estimation rather than a calculation. In any instances, however, due to the energy of AGC officers and Italian officials in the field, even this higher target figure has been met.

Nearly 50 such trouble-shooting officers were used. As one ACC regional commissioner remarked, our harvest control officer was good for 10,000 tons or 100,000 quintals' worth of grain as a result of the help and encouragement he was able to give.

The communal and provincial committees set up as an integral part of the Granai del Popolo campaign have played a noteworthy part in the campaign, officials asserted. Often the success of the local campaign was in direct proportion to the activities of the civil committees which, selected tentatively, had the responsibility of supervising and advising on most practical and suitable methods of furthering the harvest for the common good of producers and consumers alike. On the other hand, success often depended on the extent to which Allied officers and Italian officials from the national level, who, at most, were very few, could energize and organize the local farmers and officials, many of whom were confused, dispirited and distrustful.

The lack of transport for hauling often delayed transfers of the grain from the field to the threshing machine to the Granai and thence to the deficiency areas, not to mention the fact that Allied officers and key Italian officials themselves often had no transport to get out into the field for the mobile inspections which were of the first importance for a successful collection.

The rich, surplus provinces of Foggia, Matera and Maccarata, for example, have done exceedingly well, while Sicily and Sardinia have fallen below expectations, as is known. Close cooperation between the Public Health Sub-Commission of the Allied Control Commission and the Italian Red Cross in carrying out some of the most vital welfare services in Italy, despite severe losses as a result of military operations, will be maintained and strengthened in the imminent task of relief distributions to the Italian people, the Allied Control Commission announced today.

Thorough re-organization of activities is proceeding under the new president-general of the IRC, Dr. Umberto Lanotti-Blanco, who was formerly active in social welfare in pre-fascist years in Southern Italy as president of the Associazione Nazionale per gli Interessi del Mezzogiorno d'Italia.

ACC officials are following keenly the attempt of the Italian Red Cross under its present leadership to revive most of its activities. In an effort to arouse support of the Italian population, the IRC will hold a "Red Cross Day" in Rome on Oct. 15.

Besides carrying out certain essential public health services in its numerous General Hospitals, T.B. preventoria and Hospitals for Chronic Cases, the Society looks after sanitary conditions and aid in the various Refugee Camps. It has a number of mobile Hospitals with the Allied Armies. Helped by a petrol allocation granted by the Allies and as far as possible considering the rather poor condition of its motor-ambulances, the IRC also is responsible for the transportation service of patients from homes to hospitals.

In the new plans is envisaged the gradual demobilization of its anti-Air-Paid First Aid Stations with a view to using personnel and means thus made available for purposes of assistance to the civilian population.

In the meanwhile, the Red Cross Central Committee is expediting, in conformity with standing instructions in the matter, to a drastic investigation into its administration as well as into the political past of its personnel.

In addition to its statutory activities, the IRC has been asked to cooperate with the Government and the Vatican in becoming a part of the Agency, recently organized, for the Distribution of Relief to Italy. For this purpose, it will contribute wherever possible, through its provincial organizations, its personnel, warehouses, and all effective assistance.

As a direct result of loosening of controls by the Economic Section of the Allied Control Commission, approximately 1,500 quintals of unrationed foods are freely entering Rome daily for personal use without hindrance from road control posts, it was announced today.

The previous regulation said that only 10 kilos per individual could be brought into the city from the countryside for personal use. The limit has now been raised to 15 kilos for unrationed stuffs and includes potatoes. Further, horse-drawn carts also may bring in unrationed produce in unlimited quantities, thus restoring one of the traditional channels of supply for the Eternal City.

When the 10-kilo limit was in effect, only about 500 persons a day took advantage of the permission to bring in certain foods. After the limit was raised to 15 kilos, the number of individuals bringing in unrationed goods rose to 2,500 daily.

Similarly, horse-drawn carts numbering about 325 a day and carrying approximately 1,250 quintals are now entering Rome every day without restrictions. The gradual and careful loosening of controls to permit free flow of goods consistent with insuring that the major share goes to the controlled market for equal distribution to all purchasers is an eventual goal of ACC food supply experts.

Le strade che portano a questa linea sono indicate con appositi cartelli e vi sono 24 guardie stradali che controllano tutte le vie di accesso a detta Zona. Via via che il fronte avanza questa LINEA DI CONTROLLO DI RETROVIA verra' spostata in avanti e verranno affissi appositi cartelli per avvertire il pubblico della ubicazione della nuova linea di demarcazione.

2. Nella Zona di Guerra nessun civile puo' spostarsi per un raggio di piu' di 10 chilometri e non puo' ne' entrare ne' uscire dalla Zona stessa senza un permesso rilasciato dagli Ufficiali del Governo Militare Alleato della detta Zona.

La Zona Limitata comprende tanto il territorio dipendente dal Governo italiano quanto quello dipendente dal Governo Militare Alleato, cioe' il territorio che non e' ancora passato sotto la giurisdizione amministrativa italiana.

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2. Nella Zona Limitata nessun civile puo' passare da una provincia all'altra o entrare in una delle altre due Zone senza essere provvisto di un permesso rilasciato dalla Questura o dagli Uffici del Governo Militare Alleato o della Commissione Alleata di Controllo al luogo di partenza. 3. Nella Zona Limitata le richieste di permessi di viaggio devono essere fatte solo presentando ragioni plausibili sia di carattere ufficiale o commerciale o ragioni di famiglia, che dimostrino chia-

ramente la necessità di tale viaggio.

ZONA LIBERA

La Zona Libera comprende tutta l'Italia a sud della Linea Limitata.

1. Nella Zona Libera è necessario avere un permesso solo per passare da un'isola (Elba, Sardegna, Sicilia) alla terra ferma o per entrare dalla Zona Libera in una delle altre due Zone. Questi permessi si vengono rilasciati dalla Questura locale.

I permessi per lo spostamento dei civili vengono rilasciati sempre su uno stesso modulo, modulo giallo. La polizia non riconosce più come valido nessun altro permesso e le agenzie di viaggi sono state avvertite di non rilasciare biglietti a chi non sia in possesso del permesso regolamentare.

L'unico permesso riconosciuto, oltre a quello giallo, è la tessera verde rilasciata dall'Ufficio Stampa della Commissione Alleata di Controllo ai giornalisti italiani accreditati. Questa tessera dà il permesso di viaggiare liberamente nella Zona Limitata e nella Zona Libera, ma non nella Zona di Guerra. I giornalisti che vogliono andare nella Zona di Guerra devono essere provvisti del permesso giallo.

I militari italiani in licenza devono uniformarsi ai suesposti regolamenti.

Initiative displayed by Italian engineers and clearances effected by Allied officers in repairing under pressure a destroyed bridge in Terni Province will result on or about September 3 in a steady supply of 200 to 500 tons a day of sub-lignite or natural wood for the stoves of Rome, the Allied Control Commission announced today.

The sub-lignite which has long been used as a substitute for wood and charcoal will meet in large measure, but not entirely, the growing need for fuel for the bakers, hospitals and ordinary citizens of the city, Allied officers said.

The bridge near the sub-lignite mine is being repaired with steel from the Terni works, salvaged by Italian engineers and put to use on this essential construction.

Twenty railroad cars are already loaded with 400 tons of the fuel on one side of the bridge, waiting for the repairs to be completed. Work started on the bridge August 14.

Utilization of the sub-lignite mine has been an Allied Control Commission priority that has had to wait upon necessary clearances of rail traffic and procurement of certain materials and supervision.

In normal times of peace, Rome used an estimated 200 tons of charcoal a day in addition to its gas and electricity. Although gas service will be resumed on or about September 1, the lack of electricity and the greater demand for fuel from the city's overgrown population, makes the estimated demand for fuel that much greater. Officials pointed out that despite the new source of sub-lignite fuel will have to be carefully used and strictly rationed so that every citizen can benefit from the new supplies to be made available.

The Pontine Marshes south of Rome are being sprayed weekly by airplanes to kill breeding grounds for mosquitoes while 5000 ~~civilians~~ are working in the area north and south of Rome in a malaria control program, the Public Health Sub-Commission of the Allied Control Commission announced today.

Officials said that the German sabotage and flooding of the marshes had aggravated the normal malaria peril and warned all residents in affected areas to take precautions. Allied officers in the field must especially use mosquito netting, insect repellant and take atabrine regularly.

More than 6,000,000 atabrine tablets have been distributed to Italian authorities for civilians while an equal number are in warehouses to supply further demands. Allied Forces also have found four and a half tons of quinine north of Rome, estimated enough to supply Italy for a year.

As the malaria season approaches its peak, ACC officials are supervising the laying of paris green by hand, in addition to the plane dustings and are speeding the clearing of drainage canals and repair of pumps not wholly destroyed by the Germans. Flooding of the Pontine marshes, according to Col. Russel, head of the ACC malaria control section and Rockefeller Foundation authority, placed the condition of that area back to 1880 from a public health standpoint.

Observation, analysis and report on the current relief and rehabilitation needs of Italy has been started by a special mission of UNRRA attached to the Allied Control Commission, it was revealed today.

The reports will be forwarded to the main UNRRA headquarters in the United States for consideration at the second meeting of the UNRRA Council next month at Montreal where the question of UNRRA's undertaking relief and rehabilitation in Italy will be up for review.

The studies now being carried out in Italy by the UNRRA mission which is headed by S.M. Keeny of New York, supplies specialist and veteran of Hoover relief activities in the last world war, aimed at translating what UNRRA aid to Italy would mean in terms of imports, costs, personnel requirements, administrative setup and other requirements necessary first to functioning in a military theater of operations and later in conditions of peace.

UNRRA's position with regard to operating in an enemy or ex-enemy area is governed by the provisions of the UNRRA Agreement as confirmed by the UNRRA Council at its initial session in Atlantic City; the provisions of the resolution relating to such operations are as follows:

"If it appears necessary for the administration to operate in an enemy or ex-enemy area in carrying out the purposes of the agreement, it will do so only from such a time and for such purposes as may be agreed upon between the military command, the established control authority or duly recognized administration of the area on the one hand and the administration on the other, and subject to such control as the military command or the established control authority may find necessary; provided that the Council approve the scale and nature of the operations it is proposed to undertake and the standard of provision, and that all expenses connected with such possible operations in an enemy or ex-enemy area should be carried by the enemy or ex-enemy country concerned."

NOTES: The Allied Control Commission requests that the following statement of the rules for civilian movement in Italy be prominently displayed and run every three days for the next 15 days. It is highly important that this notice be properly understood by the public, because of the many misstatements of the position now appearing in the press.

Three zones are set up for civilian movement in Italy according to the I text agreements entered into effect immediately by the Allied Control Commission.

The three zones and the rules concerning movement in each zone and between zones are as follows:

Zone I. The zone south of the line following the northern boundaries of the provinces of Bari, Potenza, Avellino, Benevento, Naples.

Zone II. The zone lying between the above line and near Army control line.

Zone III. The Army zone.

(a) Within zone I there is unrestricted movement and no passes are required. This is Italian Government territory.

(b) Within zone II there is unrestricted movement within provinces, but an AMZ pass is required for movement between provinces. This is Military Government territory.

(c) Within zone III movement is restricted to 10 km and an AMZ pass is required for movement beyond this distance. This is Army territory.

(d) A pass is required for movement into zones II or III from zone I or vice versa.

Three zones are set up for civilian movement in Italy according to the 100/1000 distance ordered into effect immediately by the Allied Control Commission.

The three zones and the rules governing movement in each zone and between zones are as follows:

The following items of news have been received by Fine Arts Officers at ACC HQ from their men in the field.

1. Discovery of important 14th century fresco.

When a picture by the 16th century painter Sodoma was removed for safe-keeping from one of the altars of S. Agostino, Siena, an important fresco by Ambrogio Lorenzetti came to light. The fresco, hitherto unknown, is in excellent condition and represents the Madonna and Child enthroned and surrounded by eight saints.

2. Example of cooperation with Monuments and Fine Arts Officers at the front.

Villa Gamba-Castelli at Arceno was used as a deposit for some of the finest pictures from Siena, Massa Marittima and Grosseto. At the request of the Superintendent of the Galleries in Siena two British guards were placed at the Villa in spite of battle conditions. At one time eight British soldiers beat off fifteen Germans who were apparently bent on setting fire to the place.

EDITOR: The Allied Control Commission requests that the following statement of the rules for civilian movement in Italy be prominently displayed and run every three days for the next 15 days. It is highly important that this notice be properly understood by the public, because of the many misstatements of the position now appearing in the press.

Three zones are set up for civilian movement in Italy according to the 1st September order and into effect immediately by the Allied Control Commission.

The three zones and the rules concerning movement in each zone and between zones are as follows:

Zone I. The zone south of the line following the southern boundaries of the Provinces of Bari, Potenza, Avellino, Benevento, Naples.

Zone II. The zone lying between the above line and near Army control line.

Zone III. The Army area.

(a) Within zone I there is unrestricted movement and no passes are required. This is Italian Government territory.

(b) Within zone II there is unrestricted movement within Provinces, but an ABC pass is required for movement between Provinces. This is Military Government territory.

(c) Within zone III movement is restricted to 10 km and an ABC pass is required for movement beyond this distance. This is Army territory.

(d) A pass is required for movement into zone II or III from zone I or vice versa.

These zones are set up for civilian movement in Italy according to the 1948 arrangements entered into effect immediately by the Allied Control Commission.

The 1948 zones and the rules governing movement in each zone and between zones are as follows:

Zone I. The zone south of the line following the northern boundaries of the Province of Bari, Potenza, Avellino, Benevento, Naples.

Zone II. The zone lying between the above line and near Army control line.

Zone III. The Army zone.

(a) Within Zone I there is unrestricted movement and no passes are required. This is Italian Government territory.

(b) Within Zone II there is unrestricted movement within Province, but an Army pass is required for movement between Provinces. This is Military Government territory.

(c) Within Zone III movement is restricted to 10 km and an Army pass is required for movement beyond this distance. This is Army territory.

(d) A pass is required for movement into Zone II or III from Zone I or vice versa.

(e) All passes, which are yellow in color, are issued by the AGC/AMC officer concerned at the point of departure, except of movement into the Army zone from Zones I or II. In this case passes must be obtained from the AGC authorities of the Army concerned and application for such passes is normally made through the appropriate AGC/AMC officer at the point of departure.

There are two exceptions to the free and unrestricted movement within Italian Government territory. These are the cases of movement to and from the provinces of Chamrousse and Tignes. Although these are Italian Government territory and yellow passes are still required to go in and out of each province or to move from Tignes to Chamrousse or from Chamrousse to Tignes.

Civilians and local government officials may retain their yellow passes by applying to the appropriate police authority of their region. Central Italian Government officials may obtain their yellow passes by applying to their corresponding sub-commission in the Allied Control Commission.

The Allied Control Commission announces a new, simple system of passes for civilian movement in all of Italy exclusive of territory considered an Army area.

The only pass which will be valid henceforth for civilian movement in ACC and Italian Government territory will be a yellow pass. The passes are issued to two classes of persons: 1. The general public and all LOCAL Italian Government officials. 2. Officials of the Central Italian Government.

Passes to move within provinces are not required of anyone except in Army-controlled areas where the only valid pass is one issued by the AMG authority in that area.

For all movement between provinces, civilians and local government officials must go to the Questors of the province in which they live to obtain a yellow pass that allows movement anywhere in Italy south of the Army area.

Central Italian Government officials, including Ministers, may obtain their yellow passes by applying to that sub-commission of the Allied Control Commission which is its counterpart. For example the Ministry of Finance applies to the Finance Sub-Commission.

Civilians are warned against attempting to go to Naples or Bari particularly without proper credentials since those cities are very over-crowded and no accommodations exist whatsoever.

Immediate steps to give the most effective and widespread recognition possible to the valiant efforts of Italian patriots who have participated in guerrilla fighting on the side of the Allies are announced by the Allied Control Commission.

The courage, heroism and tenacity of Italian patriots, both those who have since passed into our lines during the progress of the Allied Armies in Italy and those who are still fighting the enemy with determination and skill further north, are symbols of the love for freedom and the ideals of democracy of the United Nations deeply felt by all true Italians and recognized as such by the Allies.

Measures ordered by the Allied Control Commission to effect the change of patriots from military to civilian status with a minimum of difficulty and already put into operation include:

CREATION of a Patriots Branch of the AGC to carry the continuing responsibility of aiding in the solution of the Patriot question.

DISPATCH of special instructions to AMG officers with the 5th and 8th Armies to regard the Patriots as Civilian Priority No 1.

ASSIGNMENT of special staff officers to Army and Corps AMG teams to advise on the identification of patriots and the handling of their situations.

INCLUSION at once of a substantial number of patriots in every local governmental committee newly formed after arrival of the Allied Forces.

PLANS for employment of patriots.

COLLECTION of arms from the patriots for use as a reserve from which patriots still fighting behind the German lines can be supplied.

ISSUANCE of Allied certificates of recognition to patriots who have been properly identified.

MESSAGES from General Alexander, Commander-in-Chief in Italy, to all patriots through posters, leaflets, radio and press, of Allied recognition and thanks for their valour and aid to the Allied Armies.

COLLABORATION with the Italian Government to insure that

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COLLABORATION with the Italian Government to insure that patriots continue to receive under Italian officials the recognition due to them for their efforts towards the liberation of Italy.

The patriot problem is beset with three particular difficulties which AMG officers attached to the Armies immediately encounter in the course of their tasks to insure order in the areas behind the front lines and to insure safety to the military lines of communications.

The first is that of proper identification of patriots. Allied authorities have evolved the following definition: Patriots (although mostly Italians, may be of any nationality) are persons in the ranks of genuine bands who have carried arms against the enemy, engaged in sabotage or secured important military information for benefit of the Allied war effort.

/ A clear line

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A clear line must be drawn between those who truly deserve the name of patriot and those who do not. Experience has shown that many false claims are made. In some places alleged "patriot bands" have been formed five minutes before - or even after - the entry of the Allies by persons who up to that time had been Fascists. Impostors must not be given the credit and recognition due to those who have really fought and suffered in the Allied cause. But in the heat and haste of battle, it is not easy for Allied officers to judge these matters with speed and accuracy.

In the second difficulty, there is the vexed question of the right of patriots to continue the fight and to continue to carry arms. To many of them it may seem right and proper that they should be permitted to do so; but experience has shown that such permission would earn the very cause for which they have fought. Every firearm which can be spared is needed - and urgently needed - to equip the patriots further north. Patriots must recognize that the allocation of arms for the Italian theatre, including the Allied Armies and for all other purposes, is strictly limited and controlled by the Combined Chiefs of Staff in Washington for the great demands of the battlefronts now spread in every quarter of the globe.

The continued possession of arms is contrary to the legal provisions enacted by the Allied Nations to preserve good order and discipline in liberated territory and to ensure that the smooth passage of supplies for the armies is not in any way disturbed.

Thirdly, there is the problem of the subsequent treatment of patriots - their claims to take part in local government and to be given a just reward in matters of employment and rehabilitation. Some patriots wish to continue the fight; others desire to return to their homes or to their former employment; and such claims must be considered with impartiality and promptitude.

The Italian patriot representatives will be responsible for advising the officers of AHC on the identifications of patriots found, or expected to be found, in the line of advance. In this way it is hoped to obtain rapid co-operation between AHC and the recognized leaders of patriot forces.

The Allied authorities are, with the advice of the Italian patriot representatives, now giving to each patriot a certificate of merit which shall act as a recognition of the part he has played in the liberation of his country. These certificates will be awarded to members of recognized fighting bands, including posthumous awards to next of kin, who have carried arms, carried out demolitions, or engaged in sabotage or provided important military information under the identification formula devised. Patriot leaders will authenticate the list of recipients.

The posters - 50,000 in number - prepared for issue in all places occupied by the Allies explain Allied policy.

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Every commune will have an Italian committee to handle the problem of finding employment for patriots. Each committee will be composed of the Sindaco (or Commissario Prefettizio), four or more representatives chosen from and by the patriots, two members of the Giunta Comunale if formed, or otherwise two well-known and respected local residents will be chosen. The committee will draw up lists of bona fide patriots and classify them. Patriots who desire to join the army will be offered such opportunities of military employment as best fit the immediate needs of the war effort. Those who do not reside in the area and wish to return to their homes will be given the necessary facilities. Those who wish to continue to serve as patriots will be selected, in small numbers, by the military authorities if needed. Finally,

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every effort will be made to find employment for those who wish to return to civilian life.

AMG officials will also attempt to give dignity and colour to the recognition of the patriots by ceremonies in new towns at which the patriot bands will be publicly thanked. When possible there will be parades, music and guards of honour and high Allied military leaders will attend the ceremony. Offices will be provided for patriot leaders to help carry out their work of close collaboration with the AMG authorities.

These are the first steps taken by the Allied authorities to accord due recognition to the patriot forces of Italy.

1. The Allied Control Commission announces the transfer to the Italian Government today, July 20, 1944 of all territories comprised in the provinces of Reggio, Campobasso, Benevento, Avellino and Naples, with the exception of the Comune of Naples. The Allied Control Commission further announces that on August 16, 1944 the provinces of Rome, including the city of Rome, and the provinces of Frosinone and Littoria will be handed over to the Government of Italy.

2. This transfer, which was recommended to the Supreme Allied Commander by the Advisory Council at their meeting on July 16, marks a further step in the procedure initiated on February 11, 1944, when the provinces of Salerno and Potenza and the compartments of Lucania and Calabria, together with the island of Sicily, were restored to the jurisdiction of the Italian Government. The provinces of Bari, Brindisi, Lecce and Taranto and the island of Sardinia were not at any time under Allied Military Government.

3. The transfer of territory has been made possible by the victorious advance of the Allied Armies in Italy. Only two months have elapsed since those armies opened their attack against the Gustav Line. The United Nations are thus fulfilling with the utmost speed their declared intention that the Italian people should be given the earliest opportunity after their liberation to enjoy the free institutions which are an inherent part of political democracy.

4. The Allied Control Commission is concerned with the responsibility for ensuring the effective use of Italian resources in the common war and of representing Allied interests to the Italian national and local governments. For this reason and in the interests of the common victory which is the indispensable condition of freedom, it has been decided, in agreement with the Italian Government, that the Comune of Naples, owing to its exceptional importance as a port for Allied supplies, shall remain for the present a military zone under the jurisdiction of the Commander-in-Chief. The United Nations also reserve the right to hold Allied military courts in territory handed over to the Italian Government for the trial of offenses against Allied forces and property.

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Commune of Naples. The Allied Control Commission further announces that on August 10, 1944 the provinces of Rome, including the city of Rome, and the provinces of Frosinone and Littoria will be handed over to the Government of Italy.

3. This transfer, which was recommended to the Supreme Allied Commander by the Advisory Council at their meeting on July 13, marks a further step in the procedure initiated on February 11, 1944, when the provinces of Salerno and Potenza and the compartments of Lucania and Calabria, together with the island of Sicily, were restored to the jurisdiction of the Italian Government. The provinces of Bari, Brindisi, Lecce and Taranto and the island of Sardinia were not at any time under Allied Military Government.

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6. The territory which has now been handed over to the jurisdiction of the Italian Government comprises some 46,000 square miles with a population of some 16,000,000 people. Thus, on August 15 one third of Italy will have been returned to Italian administration. Without prejudice to the rights which the United Nations have under the Armistice and which are exercised in their behalf by the Commander-in-Chief of the Allied Forces, and his representatives including the Allied Control Commission, all powers of government will henceforth belong to the Government of Italy. In his directive of February 11 the Commander-in-Chief states that the situation then in the making would make it possible for future transfers of territory to be made to an Italy which had grown in strength and stature. Since that date the Government of Marshal Badoglio was broadened on April

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21, 1944 to include the representatives of the six parties of the Committee of Liberation, and that Government in its turn gave way on June 18, after the liberation of Rome and according to the procedure envisaged, to the present Government under Signor Bonomi, which includes further representatives of the Committee of Liberation from newly liberated territories. The progress thus made towards the restoration of democratic government on a broadening representative basis is a welcome sign of the desire of the Italian people to eradicate forever the last taint of Fascism. Yet the enemy is still on Italian soil, and the United Nations, who are now bearing the brunt of the fight for its freedom, look to the people of Italy, and to their Government, to spare no effort and seek no other purpose until victory is achieved.

Without hesitation they reported the matter to their Commanding officer and in co-operation with the Allied Control Commission a trap was laid. The two soldiers took special risks in working with the Italians at night until the case was completed. They made two trips between Foggia and Naples. All the Italians were convicted and received terms of imprisonment; in two cases with the addition of a fine of 50,000 lire.

The conduct of the two soldiers has been noted in Red-tape Order of 57 lines and an entry made in their records.

The Allied Control Commission announced today to the Italian public that the prohibition of the payment of family allowances under AHC Proclamation No. 4 of 25 April, 1944 is rescinded.

Family allowances are now payable to dependents of:

- (i) Persons engaged in military service
- (ii) Unemployed prisoners of war
- (iii) Italian workers in Germany or other enemy occupied territory.

But these allowances are not payable to dependents of

- (iv) Men serving in either Fascist Republican or German military service, or
- (v) Italian workers in enemy territory for whom payment of family allowances was arranged under an agreement with the German Government.

No restrictions are, however, placed on the public assistance which Comrades are authorized and expected to give to the needy, or the basis of their verified needs, and nothing in (iv) and (v) above shall be construed as preventing such public assistance.

Benefit payments provided by law will be resumed immediately, retroactive to 31 March, 1944 for dependents of men whose last known status was that of a member of the Italian Armed Forces in liberated territory and whose families were deprived of further benefits by the Fascist Republican Government on 31 March 1944.

Benefit payments provided by law will be resumed or continued in the cases of men of the regular Italian Armed Forces held as prisoners of war and also in the cases of men of the regular Italian Armed Forces interned or imprisoned by the enemy, except those who subsequently elected the option of joining the Fascist Republican or German armies.

Benefit payments provided by law will be made to dependents of the regular Italian Armed Forces who were captured by the enemy and who subsequently elected the option of joining the Fascist Republican or German armies.

- (i) persons engaged in the liberation of territory.
- (ii) Unarmed prisoners of war.
- (iii) Italian workers in Germany or other enemy occupied territory.

But these allowances are not payable to dependents of

- (iv) Men serving in either Fascist Republican or German military service, or
- (v) Italian workers in enemy territory for whom payment of family allowances was arranged under an agreement with the German Government.

No restrictions are, however, placed on the public assistance which communes are authorized and expected to give to the needy, on the basis of their verified needs, and nothing in (iv) and (v) above shall be construed as preventing such public assistance.

Benefit payments provided by law will be resumed immediately retroactive to 31 March, 1944 for dependents of men whose last known status was that of a member of the Italian armed forces in liberated territory and whose families were deprived of further benefits by the Fascist Republican Government on 31 March

1944.

Benefit payments provided by law will be resumed or continued in the cases of men of the regular Italian armed forces held as prisoners of war and also in the cases of men of the regular Italian armed forces interned or imprisoned by the enemy, except those who subsequently elected the option of joining the Fascist Republican or German armies.

Benefit payments provided by law will be made to dependents of all men who are now serving or who enter service of the regular Italian Armed Forces. In the instances of men entering the regular Italian Armed Forces, who previously served in regularly constituted camps of patriots cooperating with the Allies, the period of effective service in the latter may be included for the purpose of calculating payments due, provided it is documented and certified by competent military authority.

Seven Italians have received sentences in AMG summary courts for illegal possession of Allied property among the first cases brought to trial for violation of Allied prohibitions and ordinances.

AMG officials said that it was evident that a part of the Roman population did not understand that it was violating the law in receiving, buying or taking any Allied property other than through legal channels, which are very few and rigidly controlled.

Purchase of Allied property from Allied soldiers or another civilian, gift, barter, theft or mere finding and keeping such property is illegal and punishable. The various sorts of Allied property include petrol, cigarettes, candy, clothing, food stuffs and any other goods brought into Italy for prosecution of the war and sustenance of the armies. Citizens must not buy or take such property and must return the property to the nearest Allied police station if found.

Wages for civilian labor employed by the Allied Forces have been increased in an order just signed by Maj. Gen. Harry H. Johnson, commanding General, Rome Area Command, on the advice of the Labor Section of the Allied Military Government, Rome Region.

Basic raise in wages is that of common laborers who were getting 70.5 lire a day under the German Todt Organization but who will now get paid 85 lire a day by the Allies. Extra food given the workers under the Germans was obtained by forced requisition from Italian farmers around Rome whereas extra food given the worker by the Allies is issued in the free lot allowance of additional allowance from the common ration stocks, allowances which range up to 500 grams a person a day in some categories.

The following resume of labor conditions encountered since the Allies liberated Rome is given by Lieut. Col. Thomas E. Lane, chief of the Rome AMG Labor section:

Plans made in advance have been carried out in virtually every essential detail, as, for example revising the system of labor exchanges which had been used by the Germans for their practices of forced labor importation for Germany. The main AMG labor office has hired about 15,000 Italians. Without adequate statistics being yet available, there are, however, an estimated 60,000 Romans who formerly were gainfully employed in the city's economic life who now are unemployed. This figure does not include the government employees whose employment rests on other factors.

The AMG labor office also issued its Order No. 3 earlier in Rome than at any other place in liberated Italy. This is the order which abolished the Fascists corporative system, guaranteed collective bargaining and free unions, and raised wages immediately 70 per cent. for government employees and granted a permissive increase of the same size to private employees.

Social security payments by mail are also being resumed and the postal system will again shortly sell and collect such taxes through its stamp sales. Most social security funds incidentally, were found in good condition, as much as 50 per cent. of the money being available. The exception is in the fund for unemployment compensation and old age pensions which the Germans and Fascists appear to have tampered with, so that some AMG advances may have to be made to cover the shortages.

AMG Officials gave credit to the work of the Committee of Liberation for being responsible in a large measure for the general good condition in which the social security structure was found in Rome. Special under round committees watched each department and used their ingenuity to prevent the funds from being stolen or dissipated by the Germans and the personnel from being ordered away. By a series of maneuvers, personnel of the national social security administration were quietly transferred to the provincial level, so that when the Germans ordered the national levels to move away from the capital with them, most of the actual national personnel was able to stay safely behind.

On the labor union side, two bodies have arisen from the underground--the Roman Camera di lavoro, the central labor union of the city, and the general Confederation of Labor, on the national scale. The confederation is now in process of negotiation with similar confederations of Italian labor at Naples and Bari for eventual amalgamation into one body. The Roman confederation includes representatives of the Christian Democrat party, which is not represented on the northern confederation as yet.
