"To see a crippled kid get up and walk - that's the greatest thing in the world for me."

The economic boundary line between North Italy and previously liberated Italian territory, established to prevent an influx of profiteers and speculation into the North, will be maintained only as long as is necessary to work out a policy for inter-regional movement that will promote the well-being of Italian economy as a whole, the Allied Commission said today.

"Only in this way can the differences between the cost of living in the North and in Central and Southern Italy be equalized without sudden and violent changes", said Mr. A.G. Antolini, Acting Vice President of the Economic Section of the Allied Commission.

"The measure", Mr. Antolini added, "is simply a wise precaution to protect an organism, whose tone is already considerably lowered, from receiving further shocks that could not but retard its revival."

The recommendation to retask the boundary was made by the Economic Section as a result of its experience to date in liberated Italy, which has shown that as the Allied Armies advanced northward each region became a zone of speculation and illegal traffic, with consequent grave repercussions on the food and industrial markets. This danger is particularly serious in the present situation since the price levels of the

regional movement that will promote the well-being of Italian economy as a whole, the Allied Commission said today.

"Only in this way can we differentiate between the cost of living in the North and in Central and Southern Italy as acquired without undue and violent changes", said Dr. L. C. Antolini, Acting Vice President of the Economic Section of the Allied Commission.

"The measure", Dr. Antolini added, "is simply a wise precaution to protect an organism, whose life is already considerably lowered, from receiving further shocks that could not but retard its revival."

The recommendation to maintain the boundary was made by the Economic Section as a result of its examination of data in liberated Italy, which has shown that as the Allied armies advanced northward each region became a zone of speculation and illegal trading, with consequent grave repercussions on the food and industrial markets. This danger is particularly serious in the present situation since the price levels of the North are at considerable variance with levels in Central and Southern Italy.

The goal of the Allied Commission, Dr. Antolini said, is to restore the normal life and flow of internal commerce as soon as possible so that full circulation of products and resources may go to the more needy and deficient areas without causing

the richer and surpluses which supply the needs.

Restoration of such free movement, now that all in all is liberated, will also bring much nearer the resumption of normal commercial relations by Italy with the United Nations and neutral countries. The members of each relations are being currently re-studied in the light of the new situation created by the liberation of the North. The war up to the recent surrender of the enemy in Italy has produced greater progress in solution of this problem of foreign trade.

The removal of commercial relations between Italy and the world is aimed not only at enabling Italy to help in her own reconstruction but to allow her to contribute to the reconstruction of the world's economy. Mr. Angelini said.

In conformity with the principles as often declared by the Allied Governments, private enterprise in Italy must be encouraged as far as possible, so that, freed from the rigid Fascist controls of the past, private enterprise may take the leadership in giving Italy all the advantages derived from a flourishing foreign commerce.

Brigadier General Roger Erskine Ross, GSC, Assistant Chief of Staff - G-3 - Senior Civil Affairs Officer and Chief of Allied Military Government of the 5th Army, like so many of his peers in this war, is no desk general.

Fifth Army troops, for example, recently captured Bologna, Modena, Reggio, Verona, and Vicenza, cities which General Hume's officers and men must relieve and organize. AGO officers with the troops took immediate stock of how many there would be to feed, how many more people would arrive in the cities from outlying districts, how the food situation was, how many buildings were demolished, how the water and public utilities functioned, etc.

At forward headquarters emergency staff meetings were held to meet the problems and present recommendations to the AGO chief. But in each case, General Hume had been in every town on the first day of liberation, often even before his own officers had had brief recommendations of his own to make. His staff officers, in fact, not infrequently complain that the paper work gets left behind, to which the General replies that there is always a chief of staff to do that.

General Hume, who has spent more than 30 of his 55 years in the Regular Army, has been making a habit of being first into towns throughout the entire Italian campaign. He landed in Sicily on D-Day, July 10, 1943, and at Salerno on D-Day, September 9, 1943. He entered Naples with the first combat elements on

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Laying a solid groundwork for the rehabilitation of Naples, which had been damaged severely by German demolitions which especially wrecked all public utilities, and mobilizing all

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resources to meet the most serious threat of a typhus epidemic in the present war, General Hume then went forward to the desk in the job of directing AMG operations in the field with the 5th Army, and of planning for the liberation of Rome, the first step of which was the attack on the city, where his officers were continuously under fire for as long as any combat units in their tours of duty.

Rome was another "first" for General Hume, who entered it with General Clark on June 5, while the team he had organized and trained went to pre-assigned stations and took over the administration of the refugee-packed Eternal City, the first European Capital to be liberated in the war, in what has been called the smoothest military government operation in history. One of General Hume's most notable acts in Rome was the unprecedented granting of freedom of the press to Italian newspapers which had been regimented as propaganda sheets for 20 years under Fascism.

From Rome, as the 5th Army advanced, General Hume went to Florence, where he directed rehabilitation of that ancient city of Dante and art, and helped to meet the problem of the Partisans, Italian Patriots who had engaged in guerrilla warfare against the Germans, and were left unemployed and homeless behind the Allied lines. Having looked ahead to the preparations for Bologna, General Hume went on to make his plans for the military government of the industrial cities of north Italy, hard-hit by Allied air bombardments, when the 5th Army should liberate them in its

advance.

In his task of directing the 5th Army AMG, which calls for fluid tactics to meet situations as the army's area expands or contracts with operational necessities, the General has not only to keep in mind the tactical needs of the enemy - where populations have to be evacuated, rearlines secured against civilian-clothed spies, arrest allayed, etc., - but has to begin carrying out the long-term objectives of the Allied Commission as the organ of the United Nations in Italy. The 5th Army AMG operates under Army Operational Command, but carries out its mission on the lines of policy objectives laid down by the Allied Commission,

which has the benefit of field recommendations made by General Hume.

On the recent anniversary of the establishment of the Joint Commission, General Clark publicly commended the 3rd Army and in a letter written to General Hume, and American personnel of 3rd Army who were awarded the Meritorious Service Unit Citation by Lieutenant General Lucien M. Truscott, Jr. several weeks ago.

A native of Frankfurt, Kentucky, General Hume still lists that city as his home, using the address of his sister, Mrs. Eleanor Hume Giffut. He is a widower. A son, Major Training Hume, Jr. is a Lieutenant in the U.S. Army. A first cousin, Commander Jerry South, Jr. is in the Navy.

Entering the Regular Army Medical Corps in 1918 through competitive examination, in which he stood first among several admitted applicants, General Hume attended the Army Medical School from which he was graduated highest in his class, and was executive officer of the Division of Sanitation in the Surgeon General's office during the 1917 mobilization. He was sent overseas, where he became the youngest Lieutenant Colonel in the Army, and was in command of all U.S. hospitals in Italy. He also saw duty on the Western Front during the Meuse-Argonne St. Mihiel offensives.

For his services during the Battle of Vittorio Veneto, when the Italians routed the Austrians in the first World War, he was awarded the Silver Medal of Military Valor and the War Cross by the Italian Government. He was also given the Croix de Guerre by the French and Czechoslovak Governments. He has been twice wounded in Italy. He holds the following American decorations: Distinguished Service Medal with oak leaf cluster, Purple Heart,

In addition he has honorary degrees from the Royal University of Naples, the Royal University of Madrid, Center College, College of William and Mary, Georgetown University, Washington and Lee University, Hampden-Sydney College, Pennsylvania University, University of Kentucky, Washington and Jefferson College, the University of Iowa in Nicaragua, the University of Pisa and the University of Florence.

Agreement has been reached between the Italian Government and the delegations representing the U.S. and British Governments which have been conferring in Rome that a public telegraph service shall be opened between Italy on the one hand, the U.S. and beyond and the U.K. and beyond on the other, the Allied Commission announced today.

Collection and delivery will be in the hands of Italcable and the external service will be conducted by Radio Corporation of America and Cables and Wireless while military necessity requires the presence of these companies in Italy.

The service will be available initially to the U.S.A. and its possessions and to the British Commonwealth of Nations. Traffic will be limited initially to private telegrams and to business telegrams containing simple enquiries and exchanges of information. Telegrams containing simple enquiries and exchanges of information. Telegrams must be in plain language and must be in either the Italian, English, French, Spanish or Portuguese language. The service will be opened on Friday, May 4.

Increased rates in every local and national tax of any consequence, together with recently enacted penalties for failure to make proper returns of income, have combined to improve the revenue situation in Liberated Italy, the Allied Commission reported today.

Government spending, however, is increasing at a rate faster than revenue collection, with the result that each month the budget deficit gets larger. The Finance Sub-Commission of AO has made strong recommendations on the subject.

Improvements in tax machinery and higher rates afford considerable hope, particularly if brakes can be more vigorously applied on the spending side. The Ministry of Finance and its counterpart in AO have worked closely in tightening up the taxing system. Most of the suggestions from the AO finance experts have been incorporated into the Italian decrees.

Tax collections for January and February reflected the improving tax situation, 3,567,700,000 lire being paid in. This compares with 2,480,500,000 for November and December, 1944, with 2,277,000,000 in September and October and only 1,543,000,000 in July and August.

Manufacturing taxes (amounting to 64,700,000) were higher than for any month since the war.

Revenue Service
reported today.

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Manufacturing taxes (amounting to 54,700,000) were higher than for any month since the Germans were driven out. Direct taxes totaling 526,200,000 were also the best for any month, as were also indirect taxes which amounted to 788,900,000 lire.

For centuries in need of a major overhaul, the Italian tax system has become unwieldy and expensive, both Allied and Italian officials agree. Everywhere the poor taxpayer looks

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a tax collector is in waiting. There are 54 State revenue and 21 local taxation heads under which the taxpayer must pay tribute. Many of these tax units have sub-heads, which together bring the total number of different taxes to well over a hundred.

When the Germans retreated northward, the tax machinery ceased to function. Records in many places had been destroyed, property damage was such that tax values would have to be re-assessed, and tax offices themselves were disrupted by some tax officials departing with the Germans.

It was planned to abolish the old tax system, simplify the tax laws and start off with a revenue plan which would rest almost entirely on two or three principal taxes. It was soon realized, however, that because of the tremendous disruption of property values, the confusion in tax offices and because of the psychological apathy on the part of both taxpayers and government officials, that it would be wiser to limit the effort to resuscitation and improvement of the existing machinery and the stimulation of tax collection.

A new tax system will have to await liberation of all Italy and an opportunity for the switch-over to be made under more orderly circumstances.

The Allied Commission directed the re-establishment of the tax administration. Its officers in the field ascertained where the shortage of personnel was most acute and arranged for the transportation of replacements, and assisted in finding accommodations where offices had been rendered uninhabitable. Paper was supplied for office stationery and distribution arranged to central depots.

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The system employed in Biblical times of farming out the collection of taxes is still used in Italy today. The state sells the tax book, which stipulates what each taxpayer is to pay, to the highest bidder on contract for a period of five or ten years. These collectors, or "Esattori" as they are called, have to deposit substantial amounts as guarantee and for this reason the contracts are often undertaken by bankers or syndicates of financiers.

Under this contract system the collectors have to pay over the total amount of the tax roll to the state officers within a few days of its due date, whether they have collected it or not. For undertaking this risk and to cover the cost of collection they receive an "aggio" or percentage of the total amount collectible. The "aggio" is recovered from the taxpayer by adding it on to the tax demand note. The average aggio is about 6 per cent., a high cost by comparison with the cost of tax collection in the United States and England.

The cost of gathering in communal taxes is even more expensive. Until the recent change in the basis of assessing Imposte di Consumo, or consumer's tax, the main source of communal revenue, the cost of collection was in some instances as high as 50 per cent. of the total collected.

The blankets, which were furnished by the Commerce Sub-Commission, have been placed at the disposal of the Welfare Branch of the Public Health Sub-Commission.

Hospitals, orphanages, child welfare and other institutions will receive priority treatment. Twenty thousand of the blankets are already on their way to Sicily and another 5,000 are being sent to Berlin for distribution there, Lieut. Col. John McWeeney, chief of the Welfare Branch, said.

In Rome a comprehensive survey of local charitable institutions has been made under the direction of Captain George M.V. Brown, Public Welfare Officer for the former Lazio-Umbria Region. The survey was carried out by a group of Italian women who volunteered to assist personnel investigations under the supervision of Mrs. Maymie C. Robinson, American social worker of the A.C.

As a result of these efforts, statistics have been compiled of local child welfare needs and the distribution of 10,000 blankets in Rome is now taking place. Another distribution of blankets is being made to Rome hospitals.

The cost of the new town plan will be \$200,000,000 and the plan will take twelve years to complete. Today, with a population of 100,000, Rimini is certainly not out of memory.

This is the background of the plan. The old Rimini covered an area of 2,500,000 square meters. The new city will cover an area of 15,000,000 square meters. New modern houses will be built for the people of Rimini and even prisoners will pay for his house. He will be paid in a new house. He will pay for his house in weekly or monthly installments. The city will consist of a number of quarters of which will include the hotel section on the coast, the stadium section, or governmental section, the residential section, the city center section, the sports and entertainment section and the residential section. All modern architecture and modernizing buildings will be utilized to create a model town of what we desire.

The town plan was already decided in the latter of April, 1945. Work on the new town is scheduled to commence towards the end of May. Rimini has prepared a plan which already is being copied by other Italian towns. Today, the citizens in many Italian towns are receiving suggestions of civilization asking to be permitted to help in the building of their new town. Rimini has received a letter from the twelve coastal towns requesting from Ravenna to know whether that a town plan similar to Rimini's should be prepared for them.

Italy's greatest experiment in social cooperation and reconstruction is on its way.

The scourge of malaria which for centuries has been a drain on the human resources of Italy is being attacked on several fronts by the Allied Commission, other Allied agencies and by the Italian government; it was unknown today.

Through three sub-commissions of AC - Public Health, Agriculture and Public Works and Utilities - treatment of malarial areas and prevention of any extension of the disease are being carried on.

With the onset of warmer weather threat of malaria always increases. Fifty million tablets of atabrine for public use have been allotted to AC by the Allied Military authorities, a similar amount is being provided by United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation Agency (UNRRA) and stocks of the Italian Government are being used both as a preventative and for treatment.

AC has undertaken to rehabilitate the pre-war government system for treating and controlling. Clinics in each province have been reopened and stocked with personnel and supplies for treatment. Tracortinoid sands work in the provinces cleaning out ditches, canals and other basins where water accumulates. Workers also spread Paris Green over swamp areas.

While planning by the Germans of the extensive transportation across Italy served to hold off the advance of Allied arms by only a few hours, medical authorities with the Public Health Sub-Commission of AD have stated that the flooding plunged the country back into the position it was before medical control was started 10 years ago.

Malaria had a sharp increase last year in Rome province and south. Historic provinces had 54,000 cases of malaria from June to December, in Rome province there were 10,000, in Grosseto 10,000 and in the whole of the Southern Region 50,000 cases. Few deaths resulted fortunately.

Three important developments which will definitely improve the transportation of essential civilian supplies in Italy were announced today by the Allied Commission.

A FURTHER SHIPMENT of 1,800 trucks requested by the Allied Commission from the United States has been approved. The trucks will be available for shipping by late spring and early summer. This will make an over-all total of 1,550 trucks authorized for Italy.

TRUCK ARRIVALS to Italy of the 1,700 consigned last fall now amount to 1,552. Arrivals began in January with an initial shipment of 72. All trucks under these consignment will be used primarily to move civilian supplies in liberated areas, particularly in the North.

AN ALLIED MOTOR TRANSPORT GROUP has been established, consisting at present of three U.S. G.M. truck battalions and two British C.E. columns. Operating personnel are 90 per cent. Italian Army officers and men, with an eventual strength of nearly 9,000.

The new consignment of trucks will include 250 10-tonners, the remainder being 14-ton trucks. Of the 1,850, 1,350 will be re-conditioned vehicles.

Even every last piece of wood in the shipping crates is used at the Rome assembly plant - for shelving and receptacles for the 500-odd spare parts/items shipped with each truck for a six-months' supply.

The Allied Motor Transport Group has been made a separate, integral unit of the Allied Commission with administrative autonomy similar to a region.

Since its first small beginnings in February, 1944, when military sources turned over 1,000 old trucks to the Commission, it has hauled to date more than 451,000 tons of civilian supplies, usually in the forward areas where its vehicles at times have been strafed and even captured and its personnel wounded while running food to the hungry front-line troops.

When units now being organized are completed, the transport group will have 1,200 trucks under American formation and 1,200 under British. Each Q.M. company has 50 trucks while each G.I. company has 120. There will be 24 of the former companies and 10 of the latter. There will also be a number of maintenance companies. The organization of the group is under command of Col. J.J. Carnes (Royalton, Minn.), a West Pointer who established the U.S. Army's truck training courses at the Infantry School at Fort Benning, Ga.

The new group has been established, Col. Carnes said, with the aim in mind of creating an organization that will be able to maintain itself at maximum operating efficiency in order to do the urgent job of moving Italy's essential civilian supplies most expeditiously where they are most needed. The group will have a total monthly list of 150,000 tons when complete. Currently 2,000 tons a day are moved.

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Eventually, the organization and trucks will be turned over to the Italian Government, on whose financial accounts they have been purchased. The trucks are not for sale to private buyers.

Extra trucks over the 2,400 number to be regularly assigned will be used as replacements for the worn-out stock now on the

Food, grain and other foodstuffs and materials essential to the life of Rome and environs are now coming through the historic port of Civitavecchia in steadily-increasing volume as a result of Allied Commission efforts in rehabilitating the German-devastated port.

Completely knocked out by air raids and by German demolitions which smashed every port building and pier and scores of fishing boats and large ocean-going cargo ships, Civitavecchia is once again a picture of activity as liberty and other ships are unloaded and their cargoes transferred to rail cars or trucks and headed for Rome.

Huge piles of rubble - conglomerates of stone and twisted masses of steel - are everywhere in the port area. Partially sunk ships and wrecked cranes and harbor equipment strewn the harbor itself. But throughout this maze of ruins Italian workers have cleared obstacles in the harbor, rebuilt piers and cleared the docks sufficiently to enable ships to come in and discharge.

Within a brief period port facilities will be restored sufficiently to handle 3,000 tons a day, all for Italian civilians. This tonnage, Allied Commission and Italian transportation authorities say, will be enough to supply the Eternal City with at least its minimum requirements from Allied sources.

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Of crucial importance because of its proximity to Rome, this old port, begun in 102 A.D. by the great architect Apollodorus under the Emperor Trajan, and shaped down through the centuries by such world-renowned artists and architects as Bramante, Bernini and Michelangelo, was damaged so badly that it was completely

immobilized for three months after it was occupied by Allied Forces. The waters of the Tyrrhenian Sea were muddy from the great underwater explosions suffered by the Germans before their departure. Mines continued to explode for weeks after the area was liberated.

Civitavecchia fell to the Allies June 7, just three days after Rome had been freed. It was not until September that enough mines had been cleared away to allow any traffic at all; in that month only 734 tons were unloaded. In October some headway had been made in clearing a channel and reaching a berth, and 4,748 tons were unloaded. Tonnage has been increased every month since, and for April 1948 tonnage was in excess of 60,000.

In October, 1944 it was decided to turn the port, which is about 40 miles northwest of the capital city, back to the Italians, since by that time the Allies had moved considerably farther north and had founded Leghorn, thus gaining an important port near the Fifth Army. It also was decided that Civitavecchia should be able to receive supplies for Italian civilian account, so it was logical that responsibility for the port should be placed in Italian hands.

Accordingly, Allied military authorities handed over the devastated port to the Royal Italian Navy. Cranes, bulldozers, deep shovels, pumps, a quantity of compressors and a repair ship were also turned over to the Italians, since all such Italian salvage and construction equipment had been destroyed or had been removed and taken north by the Germans.

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enough debris had been cleared away to allow any traffic at all; in fact, north only 734 tons were unloaded. Six sugar-beet processing plants will be re-activated this summer to produce an expected 13,000 tons of sugar and 4,000 tons of molasses, the Allied Commission announced today.

The plants to be started are located at Cesena, Granaiolo, Rieti, Foligno, Capua, and Jesi.

An estimated 17,500 acres (7,100 hectares) will be planted to sugar beets in the areas feeding these plants. Planting is taking place now in some localities.

Problems of food import and employment are being tackled in the island of Elbe under AWC direction as the battered isle returns to more normal conditions, the Allied Commission reported today.

The island has been administratively a part of Livorno Province in Tuscany Region since December. French forces who took the island last June had been in control previously.

In the island 30 per cent. of the people live off the land. The wine industry, with 20 million seed plants in the ground and valued at 10 billion lire, is a basic industry. Recent rains have improved the prospects of a good crop, although 500 tons of sulphur are still needed. AWC has blocked a percentage of the crop for island consumption at controlled prices.

Production of green vegetables meets about half the needs of the population. To raise more food some farmers have moved their vineyards higher up the hills and put in gardens on the lower levels. The area of arable land is small and a year's crop only feeds the island for one month.

Mines and abandoned barracks are being cleared. Ten ships were raised and are being refitted in a local shipyard. In good weather small boats ply regularly between the island and the mainland, though travel beyond Giombino is limited to ten persons a day.

The nearby islands of Capraia and Pienest now have telephone connections with Elba. There is a military line from Elba to the mainland.

With the large Ilva steel plant smashed and the iron mines sabotaged by the Germans, the island's heavy industry is inactive.

The electrical power plants running on diesel oil left in a German submarine base have a yield of 350 kilowatts for domestic lighting, milling and light mining.

Roads have been resurfaced with stone and gravel. Bridges are intact.

The civilian transport situation is good, ferries being 2 lines a kilometer, a lower rate than on the mainland.

Mainland refugees have all left the island. The only refugees remaining are inhabitants of Portoferraio who were bombed out earlier in the war and are staying with relatives.

Four famous medieval towers in the section of Florence known as the Germani on either side of the Ponte Vecchio are being rebuilt and repaired under 5th Army AGO supervision. The Allied Commission reported today.

Of the four towers, the Torre degli Uffizi is the principal one in the Por Santa Maria, and said to be one of the finest examples of 13th Century architecture. When the Germans blew up the Por Santa Maria, there was nothing left of this tower but one wall and portions of two others, with rubble heaped all around. The tower was seamed with cracks and apparently so badly that no one thought it could be saved.

Although Italian engineers wanted to demolish it because of the danger that the tower might fall on the people working below clearing away the rubble from the base, 5th Army AGO and AGO officers found Italian contractors willing to assume the risk.

Timber abandoned by army units in Florence's Piazza Michelangelo was found by AGO and brought down to use in propping up the tower. Wooden and iron clamps were also put around the tower to hold it together.

Now the rubble is completely cleared away, and a wall is being built with bricks removed from protected monuments -- monuments that are at the Palazzo Pitti. With these bricks

The Republic lies within the 8th Army zone of operations and has been assisted by 8th Army AMG officers to meet problems of refugees, particularly from Rimini, food, transport and medical

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San Marino officials also expressed their gratitude to Col. Bowman for AMG aid in curbing a typhoid outbreak and said the assistance from Emilia Region and 8th Army AMG had been a real "life saver."

Drainage of the Pontine Marshes, rich agricultural area south of Rome flooded by the retreating Germans a year ago, is practically completed the Allied Commission announced today.

Within another two months all flood waters will have been drawn off, according to present plans, it was added.

Most of the land which was flooded not only has been cleared of water but has been plowed and sown. Some land still to be drained will have to dry but will still take a crop this year, according to the Agriculture Sub-Commission of AC.

Additional pumping equipment will be necessary to control the autumn rains, however. Since no facilities are available in Liberated Italy for the manufacture of the pumps and motors needed, and since they cannot be assembled by cannibalization of wrecked equipment, efforts are being made to obtain the necessary machinery from the United States.

The Germans scientifically sabotaged the water control systems which drained the Pontine Marshes. Their purpose was two-fold: to destroy or impair the usefulness of the land for agricultural purpose, and to increase the spread of malaria.

The Pontine Marshes are actually two reclamation zones and together comprise the coastal plain from Torre di Foce,

accomplished only by pumping.

By the end of last May, about 27,000 acres of land in the marshes were under water and a much larger area was threatened. By the end of September, the inundated area had been reduced to about 13,500 acres and by the end of October the area was further reduced to 7,400 acres. Today there remain only about 5,000 acres still under water.

The Germans constructed a dam across the harbor channel of Porto Badino, into which feeds the Arasene River, one of the principal drainage watercourses. They also sank vessels in the harbor. Bridges over drainage channels were demolished, flood control gates destroyed and pumping plants were put out of commission by removing most of the electric motors, transformers and other electrical equipment, and by destruction of electric power distribution lines.

Measures to protect the health of the inhabitants were taken immediately by the Allied Commission and the Italian authorities. The flooded areas were sprayed or dusted with larvacides and over five million tablets of atabrine were distributed. Considerable was done in alleviating the flood condition by thousands of manual laborers who had to work without mechanical aids.

Italian Government officials promptly put forward detailed plans for rehabilitation, in the development of which they were assisted by AC officers. Mine fields, especially at Porto Badino, had to be cleared, the dam across the harbor had to be broken, and debris obstructing the many drainage channels had to be removed. By-pass channels had to be built around inoperable pumping stations and the accumulated silt in the channels had to be dredged out. Meanwhile, the Italian Royal Navy was

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Construction of the by-pass channels and clearance of obstructions in the channels and at the outlet to the sea involved an expenditure of approximately 50 million lire. In addition, 26 bridges were rebuilt on roads of various priorities. In

The discovery in Ravenna by an ABC Army AMG agricultural officer of a large and hidden store of farm tractor parts has resulted in the supply of a steady stream of spares to hundreds of farmers throughout Liberated Italy, the Allied Commission reported today.

The tractor parts, which are valued at 15 billion lire, were discovered during a search for a few spares required to repair a tractor belonging to a local farmer. The owner of the cache, Cornelio Grinassi, a machinery agent, then revealed that he had in his possession some thousands of vital machine parts.

Behind a false wall, which he had built with the assistance of a local bricklayer, Grinassi had hidden from the Germans enormous quantities of spares. In the cellars, covered with coal and fine wood were further supplies, while upstairs, piled to the roof were hundreds of apparently empty cases. The bottom layers of these were, however, packed tight with machine parts.

Further large quantities were packed into wire barners and, under the eyes of the Germans, transported in trucks and lorries to the country where they were buried. His show rooms contained only a few dusty specimens of damaged and out of date machinery and although his premises were inspected several times by the Germans, but never by the same Germans, they did not discover this immense store of invaluable material.

discovered and hidden separately and confidentially around the

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A number of complete tractors also in his possession were dismantled and placed apparently indiscriminately around the countryside. These are now being reconstructed.

The Army ALG's agricultural division now has complete control of all these parts and they are being distributed, through the owners' pre-war agents and under ALG's strict actions, to all farmers in need of them.

The world-famous botanical collection of the University of Florence has been safely returned by 5th Army AMG from the Villa Medicea in Cafaggiolo, where it was taken in June 1940 because of the danger of air raids, the Allied Commission reported today.

The Germans tried unsuccessfully to obtain the collection after the botanical collection in Berlin was destroyed in the air raids. The Florence specimens are rated second only to those at Kew, England, in Europe and is rated the seventh most important in the world.

Under the noses of the Nazis between February and May 1944, the University secretly brought back 8,000 packages of specimens and 5,000 volumes by any means that they could find, including horse carts. With AMG trucks, 10,000 packages of specimens and 27,000 volumes were returned to the University.

The collection includes that of Sir Philip Barker Webb, which was willed to the University of Florence with a legacy to insure its upkeep.

The Webb collection is the first widely-known collection of wild flowers. Botanists and laymen have sent flowers here from all over the world to have them verified or identified. Webb also bequeathed his entire library, and editions of the Botanical Magazine (British) from 1787 to 1940, when the last copy arrived from London. There are only three complete sets

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Among other individual collections included at the University are the Micheli, dating from 1700; the Beccari collection of palms; the Martelli collection of Pandanus, and the Cesalpino collection of medicinal plants dating from 1500.

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
