Brigadier Lush's Meeting - 3 February 1944

(1)

28 February

Brig Lush said that it was intended to print immediately a book containing the Executive Memoranda of ACC.

Brig Lush asked where HQ 5th Region now was. On being told Campobasso he said he would prefer it to be at Termoli.

Details of the Regional Commissioners meeting fixed for March 3 were discussed.

It was decided that a distribution list should be issued immediately.

Colonel Hulls said that he could get no bread or biscuits for refugees: only flour was supplied. Brig Lush ruled that Supply Officer Region 3 must get bread made.

Colonel Hulls wanted the press and radio used for the issue of appeals by the Italian government to the Italian people to take in refugees. He said villages were uncooperative. Brig Lush pointed out that this would be dangerous as the Germans would pick it up. He said there should be legislation. Colonel Hulls said this would be unpopular and the Italian government would be unwilling to enact it. He was asked to draft out what he thought necessary: it would be taken up with the Prime Minister.

Colonel Bowman said PBS had received a wire from NATOUS A saying that ACC must fix the price of coal and coke.

PBS also desired to set up a store for souvenirs to avoid high prices. Brig Lush was sceptical about this and said that armies would always pay highly for souvenirs but he had no objection to the attempt being made.

Members were asked to put up points for the Regional Commissioners meeting. There would be two meetings, presided over by General MacFarlane and Brig Lush respectively.

Brigadier Lush's Meeting - 29 February 1944

Major Atayer raised the question of transport for the Displaced Persons Sub-Commission and there was a general discussion of sources from which transport could be obtained.

Colonel Albright said we should get 50 Italian drivers shortly.

Brig Lush said we had to decide what type of vehicle these could drive and they should stick to those only.

Col Albright raised the question of a holding centre for the group from Tizi-Ouzou, and recommended dropping the idea until 8th Region was formed: he said HQ could look after the group in the meantime.

Brig Lush agreed.

Col Bowman said he had given PBS the prices of coal and they were surprised and grateful. He said there had been disorder and rioting in the Palermo area. He also raised some difficulties of liaison; he said people wanting supplies must know exactly what they want, also our officers must be quicker in giving PBS what it wanted. He also discussed problems of requisitioning between PBS and ACC.

Brig Lush produced an official text of that part of the Prime Minister's speech which referred to Italy. He said that it should have been distributed by Information Section. PRO said it had not been available until the Political Section got it by bag. Brig Lush directed the Information Section to have copies distributed.

Brig Lush said there was not sufficient coordination with GI about officers' appointments. Col Fiske said that there was too much loaning of personnel and assignment orders must be made in all cases. This led to a discussion on the movement of the Tizi-Ouzou group and Brig Lush announced that Colonel Spofford had been appointed Chief of Military Government Section at AFHQ.

Col Fiske raised the question of the transfer of communes between the provinces of Matera and Potenza by the Italian government, and said that Regional Commissioners Region II thought it undesirable. It was pointed out that AMG had transferred communes in Sicily. However, in this case it was thought that Reale was making political capital out of the transfer. Brig Lush said that in general changes of this kind by the present Govt were undesirable.

Brig Lush said that the composition of the PR branch had now been decided and a directive would be issued. There would be a Director of Public Relations, two Deputy Directors, and three Public Relations Officers for the present. There would be no Public Relations Officers in the Regions.

Brig Lush said that he wished D.P.R. to discuss with Major Hinkel the desirability of amalgamating the Information Section with P.R. Branch. D.P.R. said he did not think this was necessary or desirable and Brig Lush accepted this view.

Col Hulls said the influx of refugees was continuing and would be 1,000 a day up to 10,000.

Major Attayer raised the question of special transport. Brig Lush said that he must depend on the Motor Pool. Brig Lush added that he thoroughly approved of officers getting about the country: there was no reason why officers should not take a car, or fly, to Bari or other places to get information.

Brig Lush said he wanted an investigation of the treatment of refugees in Bari Camp.

Arrangements for the meeting of Regional Commissioners were discussed.

Brigadier Lush's Meeting - 2 March 1944

Brig Lush asked how many officers were leaving this week. Col Albright said about 100; 87 were American. There would be another 100 to go; after that we should not have any more calls.

Brig Lush asked how far ahead the chart of officers had got. Major Driffield White said it would be ready in two or three days. Brig Lush said he wanted Regional Commissioners to see it when they were here for the meeting.

Col Albright said some sub commissions wanted permanent passes issued to Italian Officials employed by them. Brig Lush asked sub commissions to consult Col Young: temporary passes should be limited to 40 or 50 people.

Col Albright said there were no doctors for Col Kirkwood's establishment. Brig Lush said that there were not enough permanent men, but there should be inspecting medical officers for Col Kirkwood.

Brigadier Lush's Meeting - March 1944

Regional Commissioners must get news in more quickly. A negro was shot dead and news took them weeks to reach HQ. Brig Lush asked all officers to let him know if they heard of important happenings.

Brig Lush said Regional Commissioners would meet at 9 to-morrow and Heads of Sub-Commissions would come at 11.

Col Fiske said he had an interesting trip to 10th Corps and found AMG officers doing excellent work. Too many people were going up for fun and too few who ought to go were in fact going. He thought orders were desirable.

Brig Lush said he thought Heads of Sections should deal with it.

) Col Fiske insisted that too many officers went.

Col Farley Smith said there was an order that officers should not go without permission.

Col Fiske said he thought we had too few officers on duty in the forward areas and this might be taken up at the Regional Commissioners' Meeting.

Col Fiske said we had lost our archives, but Mr Jenkinson was here and a weekly meeting might be arranged to discuss the question of archives.

Brig Lush agreed, but wondered if we had the manpower for appointments. He asked Col Albright if it was possible to get WAACS. Col Albright said it had been approved in principle, but they did not arrive.

Brig Lush said one officer might be appointed archivist to begin with.

Brig Lush raised the question of establishment and said a rigid establishment for Regions was unpracticable at present.

Col Hulls said PBS had refused him transport and Region 3 had done the same. PBS had said they had given ACC some trucks already.

Brig Lush said the trucks were being used for food. He suggested that Col Bowman should work it out with Col Hulls and Col Legg.

Col Hulls again raised the question of bread. 5(97)

Brig Lush said the officers concerned should see him.

PRO asked about seating the press at the meeting.

Brigadier Lush's Meeting - 6 March 1944

Brig Lush gave the details about the Balvano accident. He commented that the news had taken 2 days to reach him. Flambo had known and had not informed us. Liaison must wake up. Members also commented on the wild rumours which had been flying around.

Brig Lush said he had been through the minutes of the Regional Commissioners Meeting and hoped that those of the second meeting would be ready soon. Col Farley Smith said they were not yet ready.

PRO raised the possibility of issuing a short resume of meetings before they took place, for the benefit of the press.

Brig Lush said he was not going to pander to the press; they should have the sense to come to the conference.

PRO explained why this was difficult, and pressed for some sort of resume.

Col Farley Smith and Col Albright agreed that a previous agenda would be valuable.

Brig Lush said he wanted to keep the meetings informal, not to tie them down beforehand.

PRO pointed out that this was not necessary.

Brig Lush agreed that something might be done. Col Fiske should work it out.

Col Fiske raised the question of the enactment of legislation for billeting refugees.

Col Hulls said he had prepared a letter for that purpose.

Col Fiske raised the question of troops occupying the Palazzo Reale in Palermo.

Col Bowman said there was a similar situation here: we might defer the matter till both could be considered.

Col Fiske asked if we should take the matter up with ACMF.

Brig Lush said it seemed to him that there should be sufficient room in Palermo without using the Royal Palace.

Capt Stewart said there was also the question of the chapel at Caserta.

Brig Lush said he was not much interested in the Palazzo Reale at Naples, as it was already so much destroyed; but the others might be taken up with ACMF.

Col Hulls raised the question of transport. He had 1,000 people to move this morning and no trucks. It was an impossible situation.

Brig Lush said movement of refugees was a first priority. Orders must issue.

Col Bowman raised the question of supplies from PBS to ACC. PBS had authority only to issue to US personnel. He quoted the case of the issue of a generator to PRO.

Brig Lush said that all demands for supplies should go through G4.

Brigadier Lush's Meeting - 7 March 1944 (7)

Col Fiske said Major de Wald had come in to report on military occupation of the Royal Palaces.

Major de Wald said that in each case occupation was a "fait accompli" before ACC was informed. As a result there was damaging and pillaging and the Fine Arts sub-commission got the blame. There had been a special commission in Naples. Recommendations had been made.

Brig Lush asked if they had been carried out.

Col Bowman said not yet.

Major de Wald spoke of the Royal Palace in Naples and said it was intended to put in three units of French, American and British troops. He asked for the appointment of an officer with whom Fine Arts could deal.

As regards Caserta not a great deal of damage had been done. The chapel and six rooms had been received for storage space. AFHQ now wanted to requisition the whole building. He wanted storage space reserved.

Brig Lush said that both matters could be arranged with Regions. Had Major Gardner taken up the Colyer Report with Region III? Major de Wald said he thought not.

Brig Lush said it should be taken up point by point and action taken. Monuments should be clearly marked.

Major de Wald said after the fire in Palermo troops had broken in to the store room and stolen books and pictures. He recommended the troops be billeted elsewhere.

Brig Lush said Major de Wald should put in a written recommendation.

PRO handed in a rewritten directive and said he was quite satisfied to have the Regional staff if he could call them in and would prefer to make no more appointments until or unless he could find experienced men.

Brig Lush agreed and said PRO should take up the matter with Col Albright.

PRO raised the case of transport for Virginia Cowles to go to Bari.

Brig Lush asked whether PWB couldn't give it to her - they had plenty.

PRO agreed but said that PWB wasn't PRO and wasn't responsible for correspondents.

Brig Lush said PRO was very close to PWB.

PRO objected that correspondents were our responsibility.

Brig Lush accepted the position and said that all officers
should give every assistance to Virginia Cowles.

Brigadier Lush's Meeting - 8 March 1944

(X)

Brig Lush said the 70 British officers for UK had now nearly all been chosen and they should be warned.

Brig Lush said that there would be a semi-independent AMG with 8th Corps. Colonel Ship would be in charge. This, with 8th and 6th Armies made 3 semi-independent AMG units.

The Chief Commissioner had been approached about a conference on Venereal Disease. This had not been thought necessary, but severe measures against prostitution were being enforced. Control of VD, said Brig Lush, was chiefly a matter of discipline. He would write to Regional Commissioners pointing out legal enactments and asking for severe measures. Perhaps the great thing was to get Italian courts to function satisfactorily.

Brig Lush said there was great difficulty in getting Vatican property for hospitals. The Chief Commissioner would send another telegram to the Vatican today.

Col Fiske said Brig Carr felt our interpreters were not of the best and could be improved. Col Fiske agreed. We might perhaps draw recruits from Malta. Italo-American interpreters had not been altogether a success.

Brig Lush said there might be courses of instruction for interpreters. He did not think more were available from Malta. Perhaps we should write to Cairo. Could not we get help from Universities? Establishment should take this up.

Brig Lush said a directive had gone out to the effect that the acceptance of degrees and formation of Italian and Allied Social Clubs is forbidden. The Italians are not yet our allies.

PRO asked about the distribution of newspapers. Brig Lush ruled that this should be done by Information Section, who should collect payment from Heads of Sections monthly.

Brig Lush said he wanted PRO to get British and American newspapers more quickly. The position was appalling.

PRO explained what had been done.

Brig Lush said we might now send telegrams.

Brig Lush said an Archives Section would be set up under the Information Section.

PRO raised the question of notices about dances inserted in the Press. Brig Lush said Establishment had better decide. Col Farren said the notice in question should be modified.

Col Fiske raised the question of an American DDPR. He / said

said it was of the first importance. American and British should be co-equal, otherwise the Press would make a row.

PRO disagreed and said the present staff was satisfactory and Capt Leacacos was perfectly able to hold the American side.

Col Fiske said Leacacos was not big enough and Brig Lush agreed. Col Fiske said he would like Major Enoch Brown.

PRO agreed that Major Brown would be invaluable, but disagreed absolutely about co-equal status. It would not work administratively. He said he would gladly work under Major Brown if that was desired.

Brig Lush said perhaps Col Fiske was exaggerating the danger. The PWE was almost all American. Col Fiske should however get Major Brown into PR if possible.

Brigadier Lush's Meeting - 9 March 1944

(Brigadier Lush absent)

Col Fiske said he had a very interesting morning tracing food from ship to mouth. He thought a remarkable job had been done, though there was still stealing. Several thieves had been shot. The organized gangs were difficult to deal with. Losses had been as high as 20% but were now about 5%.

Col Fiske said there was great difficulty in keeping track of personnel. Transfers were being made by telephone. This would not do. He gave some examples. There must be no more "loaning". Orders must issue for all assignments.

Col Fiske drew attention to a report from Brig Duchesne, recommending his war establishment. Col Clough said there could not be separate T/Os. The whole thing was far too fluid.

Col Fiske handed the matter over to Colonels Clough and Farren.

Col Clough asked if we were to provide personnel for the Advisory Council. Col Fiske said he feared so, and they would need more and more. ACMF should really provide personnel.

There was a discussion regarding the status of Italian refugees born in America but domiciled in Italy. Col Fiske said advice should be sought from the American consul-general.

Brigadier Lush's Meeting - 10 March 1944

Lt- Col ~~Matthews~~ reported that PBS are not getting on with the work at the Capua Refugee Camp which it was agreed they should do. Col Bowman said channels had not been followed with PBS. Col Bowman and Major Matthews will visit the camp. Col Fiske will look through the correspondence and see General Pence.

Major Bullock raised the question of transport for Public Relations. Col Fiske said the question of transport must be clarified.

Major Attayer asked about accommodation in Naples for Allied National refugees withing to leave for Bari. There may be as many as 25 in the city at one time. If arrangements cannot be made to have them lodged in villas in POW camps, Col ^{Hulls} ~~Matthews~~ will put them up. A small imprest account was recommended to meet urgent expenditures. Region 3 will be asked to supply necessary transport between quarters and the trains.

Brigadier Lush's Meeting - 11 March 1944

Brig Lush said he had been to the beachhead. AMG were doing good work. C.O. had told him that all civilian problems had disappeared since AMG arrived. 9,000 out of 17,000 had been evacuated. Malaria would be a problem.

Brig Lush spoke about mail delays and said that the Postal Clerks needed warming up.

Brig Lush said Group Capt Benson was here to discuss AMG 8th Army changes.

Brig Lush said it was important for executives to keep in close touch with Heads of Sub-Commissions, especially at Salerno.

Col Albright raised the question of employment of Italian medical personnel by ACC. Brig Lush said he thought Col Kirkwood was exaggerating his demands, but proper scales of pay should be laid down for Italian personnel.

Col Albright read a telegram from Cosenza requesting transport for refugees. Brig Lush said it was a matter for the Regional Commissioner.

Col Farren reported that no interpreters had been taken on in the last fortnight, but the Universities would be combed.

Brig Lush said he thought interpreters were not well enough paid; the point needed consideration.

Major Attayer again raised the question of medical personnel. Brig Lush said he wanted to make it clear that Italians should be employed wherever possible.

Col Shipp raised the question of Italian drivers and requisitioned cars. Col Albright said that requisitioned cars were a headache. Brig Lush said that in towns they were useful and saved military vehicles.

Col Bowman said he wished to make it clear that all requests for civilian supplies must go through Industry and Commerce. He also thought that ACC Sub-Commissions should not do operative work which properly belonged to Regions. Brig Lush agreed and said ACC must not take over the duties of Local Government.

Brig Lush's Meeting - 13 March 19

Brig Lush said the party meeting yesterday had passed off peacefully. Nothing new in politics had emerged. It did not seem to him that there was any striking enthusiasm.

Brig Lush said that office procedure needed bucking up. Action was being delayed. Letters and telegrams should be answered quickly. He gave various instances. The float file was not an action file.

Brig Lush said the Food Commission needed two more officers and ten other ranks for wheat-milling. He suggested that for such work it might be possible to use shell-shocked cases. He asked Establishment Branch to consider this.

Brig Lush said we were feeding 84% of the Italian people instead of the expected 50%. There was something wrong. At least 50% ought to be self-sufficient. It would take three months or more to check ration cards. In the meantime he would like Regional Commissioners to be asked to give an opinion as to how many of their people should be self-supporting.

Col Fliske said he had visited 2nd Corps, who were out of the line, also the French Corps, and had found things working satisfactorily. He had also visited Campobasso. There were some difficulties about jurisdiction. The Regions must assist the Army by administering any area that the Army wished to get off its hands.

Brig Lush said we must particularly avoid dual control. Inside the army area all our personnel came under army AMG, not under the Region. In Chieti province, 5th Corps Area, the whole province came under 5th Corps AMG. Half of Campobasso was the same. In the army area the Prefects had no jurisdiction. Part of Benevento went into an army area; Colonel Poletti and Group Captain Benson were discussing its jurisdiction to-day. There should be no gradual handing over of communes; the frontiers should be clearly defined always.

Col Farley Smith said the Advisory Committee on Archives would be meeting to-morrow. There was to be one representative of C.A. Branch. Colonel Shipp was assigned to this.

PRO raised the question of the reports of sub-commissions, and pointed out that PR Branch needed these quickly. Brig Lush said that a copy of each should go at once to Information Section and everyone should consult the reports there. PRO objected that this would be difficult as he wanted to sift the reports. Brig Lush said he himself came to the Information Room and found no difficulty; other members agreed. PRO asked if correspondents could be sent to the Information Room. Brig Lush agreed, but said Information Officer would have to exercise censorship.

PRO raised the question of office space for PR Branch. Colonel Albright said that some office space in the Provincia was becoming available. Brig Lush asked him to discuss this with PRO.

Capt Gillett said Information Section was setting up a fiction library.

Colonel Albright said Colonel Parker had been appointed Commanding Officer of the 267th Regiment and outline his responsibilities. There was a discussion about his position. Brig Lush said that apparently he did not come under General Mason MacFarlane and this would not work. There could not be two commanding officers. The matter must be squared up.

Colonel Albright said it was chiefly a question of administration, maintenance and discipline of personnel; in these matter Colonel Parker might get direct orders from the American army authorities.

Brig Lush said it seems extraordinary that Colonel Parker should come here and see General Lemnitzer and not see either General MacFarlane or himself.

Col Fiske said that the Chief Commissioner had created a great impression by arriving in a sandstorm at Campobasso in shorts.

Brig Lush's Meeting - 11 March 1944

Col Fiske said Gp Capt Benson had written him a letter expressing fear that changes in titles at ACMF will confuse the Signals people. Brig Lush thought CAOs in forward areas might be called Provincial Commissioners. He would ask the General to decide also whether the designation ACC/AMG should not be dropped and the whole organization known only as ACC. Col Farron raised the question of a distinctive arm patch for ACC personnel. After brief discussion the point was dropped.

Brig Lush announced the lid on movement of civilians except by motor lorry in all areas except army spearheads was being lifted.

Lt Col Hulls reported on a trip to the Polish sector of the Front. No drastic mass movement from the area was expected except possibly from one village (unnamed) which is right in the line and another one 20 miles west of Isernia which was used by both sides as a jumping-off place for patrols.

Lt Col Hulls complained that another officer had been taken away from him without warning.

Lt Col Bowman reported on a Law Enforcement conference between Region 3 and the Provost Marshal of PBS. PBS will have its officers instructed by Legal Officers of Region 3 on the proper preparation of evidence. Lectures will be given. Brig Lush said he thought British MPs might be similarly trained. Col Fiske said the British MPs were all right.

Col Fiske said that Capt Talbot was drafting a monthly report on ACC which would be ready by 20 March.

Lt Col Hulls wants the Information Section to gather population figures not only by provinces. He thought figures could be gathered to show the population of areas administered by the Military and those communes which were our responsibility. Col Fiske said this was a proper request provided specific questions were drafted.

Lt Col Shipp inquired whether the vacant position of Archivist were important enough to justify pulling a man out of another job to fill it. Col. Farron said there was a writer named Magnus in ACC who might do the work. Brig Lush said the job was not so much one of writing as of detailed research and close work. Lt Col Shipp said the name he had in mind was now G-1 at 5 Army, and his name was Bennett. Brig Lush said the job was important enough for him to be pulled out. 5085

Major Bullock read a letter to DPR from Capt E.B. Smith pointing out that officers from the Field are refused meals in ACC/AMG Messes in Naples and that this creates hard feeling. Capt Smith's letter suggested more and better located Transient Messes and plain signs on ACC/AMG Messes pointing out that they are private. Brig Lush said the signs on some ACC/AMG Messes are too flamboyant and should be reduced in size. He thought that ACC officers should extend hospitality to officers from the Field. Col Fiske agreed that ACC officers should go out of their way to be hospitable to officers from the Field. Major Bullock suggested that PBS might be asked to put up signs pointing the way to Transient Messes and that there should be signs on ACC Messes indicating where the nearest Transient Messes are located.

Major Bullock reported on steps being taken by Public Relations and the food people to induce Italians to use dehydrated soup which is not moving well. The

Civilian Supply people at 5 Army AMG had worked out recip's for the use of Italians and when PWB reorganization was completed, they would be asked to co-operate in getting the information to Italians.

Capt Gillette said correspondents were going directly to heads of Sub-Commissions and asked if this should not be stopped. Brig Lush said the question was one for Public Relations. Capt Gillette said too many correspondents were coming individually and taking up too much time. Major Bullock said consideration was being given to the possibility of holding conferences between Sub-Commission heads and correspondents but that the difficulty was each correspondent wanted to get his own story in his own way and did not want to reveal to other correspondents what he was after. The problem was being worked out.

Major Attayer said the Russian Mission wanted to send two Russian Displaced Persons from Bari to Cairo for Russia via Iran. Russian air transport would be provided. Brig Lush said to wire the Middle East and ask for instructions. Policies on such matters as this and Yugoslav recruiting would be sorted out from Col Fiske's files for the Sections concerned.

Col Farron questioned the existing channels for promotion of American Officers. Col Fiske declared that all recommendations should be addressed to the Chief Commissioner and sent by him to the Regimental Commander. The Regimental Commander should not recommend promotions independently. Brig Lush referred to an order put out by the Headquarters of 2675 Regt announcing that promotions of U.S. officers were now unfrozen; he said it was not right that the knowledge should come first to the Chief Commissioner in such a way. Brig Lush and Col Fiske would seek clarification of the question. Col Farron said that all recommendations by Regional Commissioners affecting specialists should be referred to HQ ACC. Brig Lush said he wanted remarks from Regional Commissioners on specialist officers. Col Fiske said a memo would be issued on channels for promotions. Brig Lush said Col Parkin's memo must be cancelled.

Brig Lush announced that the Black Market situation was being tackled firmly. Both AFHQ and Regional Commissioners were being stirred up. Italian courts must be asked to impose stiff sentences on large-scale offenders. There had been 14 lorries with Black Market commodities intercepted in a single day. MPs and Road Controls as well as the Courts must be ginned up, the Chief Commissioner feels very strongly on the subject.

Brig Lush said that in the matter of Venereal Disease he had written to Regional Commissioners asking that Italian Courts and Italian Police be ginned up in the curbing of prostitution. Punishments must be imposed.

Brigadier Lush's Meeting - 15 Mar. 1944

Brig Lush introduced Col Taylor and Col Bontash, who had come from ME to study refugees and Balkan questions with reference to possible operations there. They should be given all possible help.

Brig Lush said CA Branch should take up the question of clothing for the Carabinieri. They were very short.

Brig Lush said Flambo had demanded 4 clerks from Displaced Persons Sub-Commission. This could not be allowed.

Brig Lush said No 3 District had taken up the question of V.D. strongly and asked CA Branch to study their memorandum. The work of No 3 District in rehabilitation might also be brought to the notice of Regional Commissioners. A real clearing-up drive was necessary before the weather hotted up.

Brig Lush said that the 8th Corps was now on the right flank, 8th Army in centre and 9th Army on left and at the beachhead. Fifth Corps AMG would come under 8th Army AMG for operational orders but would be fairly autonomous. Col Lord Grimthorpe would be in charge. Half of Campobasso (E Coast) would now come under Region V, the other half under 8th Army. In the case of Benevento Region III's jurisdiction would run into the 8th Army's area. The same applied to a small strip of Naples province.

Brig Lush said he had written to Regional Commissioners to the effect that a real drive must be made against the Black Market. It was useless to try to control luxury goods.

Col Bowmen said that an effort was being made to control luxury goods and outlined the PBS scheme as published this morning.

Brig Lush said that we ought to begin with basic foodstuffs. He felt that the troops were somewhat to blame. They were offered 50,000 lire and a woman per lorry. Luxury goods always would be sold at unreasonable prices; that didn't hurt the population.

PRC said that there was considerable feeling about luxury goods and it did react unfavourably on ACC.

SUS?

Brig Lush said he certainly wanted all possible help from PRC and Col Bowmen on stamping out all black market activities.

Brig Lush announced that the CO had learned with pleasure that the ban on American promotion had been lifted. An establishment order would issue. The procedure must be related to the facts.

PRC raised again the question of correspondents going direct to sub-commissions. Brig Lush said PRC should draft a letter to Vice Presidents for Col Albright to sign.

Col Bowmen said he had taken up the question of notices outside officers' clubs. He had also visited refugee camps and found they were getting all necessary supplies from PBS.

Col Hulls said he should have visited them a week ago.

Col Farren said Region III had 300 civilian drivers under training and we hoped to get some of these.

Capt Gillett said that Food Sub-Commission had received by indirect methods a report by VICA on Black Market activities in Naples. Brig Lush said he would like to see it.

Col Hulls said that there would now be separate organizations in his camps under General Biglino to sort out men of military age.

Brig Lush alluded briefly to the Russian approach to the Badovino Government.

Brig Lush said he wanted maps of the Russian front put up in the Information Room.

Brig Lush said papers were slow getting to the Regions. He instance various cases and said the Dispatching Room was not satisfactory. PRO gave some examples of delay. Col Farren said a supervising officer was necessary.

Brig Lush said Brigadiers Carr and Dunlop were to exchange posts.

Col Farren said he had got three good interpreters from education for the courts.

Brig Lush said the Red Cross had approached him about some destitute British women married to Italians. He thought they might be used as interpreters.

Col Farren said he had arranged for Capt Bennett to come to Archives. Brig Lush said that people should remember that the ETO list is confidential. There had been too much public discussion of the list.

Col Farley Smith said the Belgian representative to Displaced Persons had arrived at Bari yesterday. Brig Lush said he would like to see the terms of reference of these representatives. Also we wanted to find out for Col Taylor the number and units of Italians in Greece and Albania.

Col Shipp said he had seen Col Kirk about clothing for Carabinieri. It was a matter of priority between Carabinieri and other Italian Army units. Brig Lush said he thought there was a dump of clothing in Sicily. The matter should be taken up on ACMP level.

PRO raised the question of transport for correspondents to Potenza and further afield. Brig Lush said Col Cheyne would take Virginia Cowles, but he thought in general that transport of this kind could not be provided by ACC; the army should do it. PRO said it was a definite responsibility for ACC if they wished ACC activities to be covered. Brig Lush said there was not sufficient transport at present.

PRO raised the question of office space for PR Branch. Col Albright said that it was impossible to allocate the mezzanine rooms to PR Branch as they were essential for liaison. He would try to make room in the G-4 office space.

Col Albright said PBS had changed their office hours. Our office hours were now 8.30 to 17.00 with 1 hour for lunch. PBS would now have 8.00 to 17.30 with 1½ hours for lunch. Brig Lush said that we should stick to our present hours. Later we might arrange things so that there was time for physical exercise in the evening.

Brigadier Lush's Meeting - 1st March 1944

Col Fiske reported on the Chief Commissioner's trip to the Anzio Beachhead. The General went to within 200 yards of the front. He saw all divisions, had lunch with the corps commander and spoke to the 17 ACC officers in the area. We have evacuated 10,000 refugees. Food is no great problem, there was considerable flour in concealment and meat is abundant. ANZIO should be an excellent centre for the Rome party when it ceases to be under fire. It has a 300-bed hospital. Anzio and Nettuno have been evacuated. There is room for numbers of refugees with evacuation by sea and road.

Brig Lush had ordered all RC and MGS chiefs to attend the meeting. He told them their function was to serve 1,200 officers and twice that number of EM/OR in the field. He said he had noticed a lack of imagination and initiative in dealing with paper work. Documents should not be initiated or passed on without thought. There was an HQ tendency to become "wall-minded". Everybody should go out into the Field and heads of branches must see to it. There must be no delay in answering communications from Regions. Requests must be clear and explanations should be attached if necessary. When sub-commissions ask for information make very sure it is not at HQ before questioning the Field. Personnel must be moved only after Regional Commissioners have been consulted.

Brig Lush announced that Sir Harold Macmillan is back from England and is having discussions with the General. There is a POW commission out from England, but it is hush-hush.

Brig Lush has had several discussions on the Black Market with the Chief Commissioner. Ordinary foodstuffs produced in Italy, including oil, must be sold on the open market at controlled prices rather than as rationed goods.

There is threat of a strike at Taranto. The Prefect has been advised he must stop it and Allied Commanders have been forbidden to deal with Labor themselves.

Lt Col Hulls said he wanted assurance from AFHQ of a flow of shipping to Sicily to handle 750 refugees, 3 or 4 times a week. There were difficulties. Major Enoch Brown was helping. Brig Lush said he doubted shipping would be available on more than 24 hours' notice, but he was prepared to see anybody Col Hulls wanted him to see.

Brig Lush, Col Fiske and Lt Col Albright are preparing personnel ceilings for HQ, Sub-Commissions, Branches and Regions. Tentative figures drafted yesterday are 50 over strength of 1221. Any surplus personnel will be held in a pool or attached to Regions.

Col Taylor reported that he is preparing a handbook for Civilian Supply Officers defining their duties. He intends to deal with only Supply and Transport, leaving accounting to the Finance people. Brig Lush said he would probably find he could not get out from under the accounting end.

Bogadier Lush's Meeting - 1st March 1944

Brig Lush said Malfetto and Benevento seminaries were needed. Bishop at Malfetto was willing to move out to alternative quarters. AFHQ might have to intervene at Benevento. These are Vatican properties. It is a delicate position.

Col Young announced that screening of Italian officials was being tightened up.

Capt Gillett said that activity in Information was increasing. Lists of material in hand will be issued. This morning conference interferes with the work of the interpreters and holds up visitors seeking information. Brig Lush said we would meet in the big Conference Room.

Col Fiske said Legal Dept wanted copies of all orders and regulations issued in Regions and by Armies affecting Italian nationals. Brig Lush said there was no reason why this should not be done. Col Fiske pointed out this entailed establishment of another library. APs will send censorship regulations for Italian papers to Legal Sub-Commission.

Col Hulls said flow of refugees from forward areas was decreasing. Col Fiske said the Corps commander at beachhead wanted to keep them for labour.

Brig Lush said that military commitment on lorries would have to be increased and asked Col Bowman how priority would be established.

Major Bullock announced that the Legal Sub-Commission had agreed to arrange for release of full details of trials and punishments for Black Market offences. The Public Relations Branch was anxious, as were the troop papers and PWB, for authority to publish sentences imposed on military personnel for similar crimes. It was not clear whether names should be used in these cases. The Provost Marshal of PWB had already been approached on the subject, but had refused to allow any publication except in military orders. Public Relations felt the time had come to get this ruling changed.

Lt Col Snipp said a precedent had already been set by the British in East Nairobi, where full details of punishments, including names of military personnel convicted, were given the widest publicity.

Brig Lush instructed Public Relations to draft a letter to A.A.I. for his signature asking that the required facts be made available for publication. He added that he desired to congratulate the troop papers for their splendid cooperation in the campaign against the Black Market. He said he thought the editorial in today's STARS AND STRIPES was very good.

Major Attayer would like to have interested people see the work of Displaced Persons Sub-Commission.

Brig Lush would like Food and Agriculture people to visit the bridgehead.

Major Attayer said 3 of the 6 Italian doctors who had been brought in would be retained by him and 3 will be loaned to Col Hulls. There is friction between Italians and Yugoslavs. Brig Lush said discipline would stop this nonsense in the camps. We will not have Yugoslavs refusing to be treated by Italian doctors. Col Hulls said he did not need the 3. Brig Lush said the 6 must go across to release Allied medical personnel.

Col Albright called attention to a communication from A.A.I. on classification of documents. It would take a great deal of paper to publish it. Brig Lush ordered that it be circulated. Col Fiske asked if it could not be condensed. If it can go on one page it should go out, because it must reach Regions.

Col Shipp said present wage for interpreters barred first-rate people. Brig Lush said British Red Cross had a number of British wives of Italians who could be used. Col Fiske said a decent wage would be needed. Brig Lush directed that Displaced Persons Camps set up interpreters' schools.

Major Attayer said it was desired to know if an Albanian committee could be formed to direct Albanian refugees and accredited to ACC. Brig Lush said it was not necessary to make them a mission, but merely an informal group under the Displaced Persons Sub-Commission.

Brigadier Lush's Meeting - 20 March 1944

Brig Lush referred to a letter from Regional Commissioner Region 3 to the Co with a copy to CC. He said this was a wrong procedure.

Brig Lush said a strike was threatened in the Messina electrical industry. A warning had been issued that this would be treated as sabotage.

Col Fiske said the Parco Hotel was turning out its residents in favour of visitors.

Col Bowman said there was no great urgency about this.

Brig Lush said the duty of a billeting officer was to billet people and not to turn them out. Why did PBS want a monopoly of the Parco?

Col Bowman asked who would operate the Excelsior Hotel.

Brig Lush said Col Kincaid could do so. It would be run by Italian management under the Province of Naples. We must be perfectly clear about the purpose of this hotel.

Brig Lush asked if there was any danger from Vesuvius.

Col Bowman said that the lava was moving at 1,000 feet an hour and slowing down. He did not think there was danger. Col Kincaid was going up this morning.

Col Shipley said one or two houses might be engulfed.

Col Farren said that the party for England was expected to go about the 6th. Brig Lush said all members of the meeting should now have the list. He would like to know what feeling there was about it. He still had a few places up his sleeve.

Col Hullis complained that PBS was not getting on with the equipment of the refugee camp at Capua. He needed a mobile camp urgently for 4,000 people and had not got it.

Col Bowman said he was under the impression that PBS were doing all that was required. He did not understand Col Hullis' complaint.

Brig Lush said that it seemed PBS were preparing only for 1,000.

Col Bowman read a letter from PBS stating that 4,000 5077 would be prepared for, starting with 2 units of 500 each.

Brig Lush said that that seemed quite clear. The policy now would be to write to PBS and ask for more. That was for Col Hullis to do.

Brigadier Lush's Meeting - 21 March 1944

Brig Lush reported San Sebastian evacuated. His likely Carcola population 10,000 will probably have to be evacuated. The DFR will be out with Region 3 and go out with the idea of helping. Lt. Col Hulls is asked to take 5000 refugees from Vesuvius. Region IV is joining Region III on the job. Colonel Fiske reported that the military were doing most of the work under AMG supervision. Colonel Poletti and Colonel Kincaid are working very hard and have been at Vesuvius all of the time.

Major Bullock reported that he was refused transport to Caserta Sunday evening by the Orderly Officer. Brigadier LUSH said this was happening too much and must stop. Major Fielden said he tried to get transport yesterday noon, was sent to G-4 for a signature and there was nobody there.

Major Attayer said Major Drifford-White told him no food from Army sources was available for civilian servants. Brig Lush said we are on a different basis from the Army and thought the answer might be to keep dumps of civilian rations at Provincial Headquarters. Major Attayer said the dried peas, beans and similar rations supplied by Colonel Hulls' Division for displaced persons going to them were not good enough.

Brig Lush said for Major Attayer to come up with a plan for cooking food for these people and it would be approved. Arrange with a restaurant. Colonel Hulls said a small unprest account would help but Colonel Kirkwood had not agreed.

Colonel Fiske suggested that ^{Army} Press Release on Vesuvius ^{the military} authorities should be mentioned. Major Fielden said this had been done.

Brig Lush said the Duty Officer should have power to authorize transport for G-4.

Brigadier Lush's Meeting - 22 March 1944.

Brig Lush gave an account of the Vesuvius situation. Potina, San Sebastiano and Massa had been evacuated. The evacuation of parts of Portici, San Giorgio and Torre del Greco was under consideration. Salerno was receiving a rain of lava. Brig Lush was in close touch by telephone (55129) with Professor IMBO at the Observatory. A car had been placed at the disposal of the Professor and better quarters in the Observatory assigned to him. He was advising on the probable flow of the lava. It might be necessary to call on sub-commissions to provide personnel to help in the evacuation. The road to the observatory would be closed from to-day to all except officers on duty with passes from their Commanding Officers. There had been far too many sightseers on the mountain last night.

Brig Lush asked Col Bowman to thank the PBS very warmly for the great help they were giving.

Capt Gillett asked again that the information room should not be used for Conferences.

Brig Lush said that the big Conference Hall was impossible. Capt Gillett could perhaps work out with establishment an arrangement for using another room.

Brigadier Lush's Meeting - 23 Mar 1944

Brig Lush read a Sitrep which he was sending to AFHQ regarding the Vesuvius eruption.

Major Attayer said he had timed the lava flow at Torre del Greco (about 2 miles from the town) and it was then moving (Wednesday, 1 p.m.) at 7 feet an hour.

Brig Lush said that Professor Imbo had said the eruption was not over yet and we "must expect some surprises". We had sent 40 officers to Region III yesterday. The danger now was to Torre del Greco and Torre Annunziata. Damage to crops was great and this should be surveyed by the Agricultural Sub-Commission. He asked about the food situation at Cercola: a lot of people were eating freely there.

Col Fiske said that Col Legg had just returned from the beachhead, where he had been arranging for the stockpile of food for Rome.

Brig Lush said it would be unwise to put in too much until the port was out of shell fire.

Col Fiske said that shipping was earmarked for 10 days. Labour was to be provided at the port.

Brig Lush asked who was our Liaison Officer with ACMF.

Colonel Farley Smith said the French General appeared to be lost and Major Doe concurred. He had arrived at the airport and disappeared.

Brig Lush said there was no proper accommodation for such visitors. The matter might be taken up at a high level. Why not reserve rooms at the Parco?

Col Bowman said that was difficult, but the Excelsior might solve the problem.

Brig Lush suggested that Brig Hume's villa be handed over to ACM for this purpose. Col Bowman concurred. Col Albright was asked to fix this up.

Capt Gillett said that Col Brenner was lecturing on Vesuvius on Sunday night.

Brig Lush said he wanted Information Section and FPO to make a complete readable narrative of the Vesuvius eruption. He wanted all photographs put together, aerial and others, and photographs of the seismographs etc. This would brighten up our archives in the days to come. He wanted it to be really well done: a complete story. Major Fielder and Capt Gillett should work together on it.

Brig Lush asked how far the requisitioning of cars had gone. Col Abbott said everything that could be found was being taken, but some are very well hidden, others have essential parts missing. Three or four are needed to keep one on the road. Col Fiske said PHS requires ACQ to register its cars there. Brig Lush agreed this was all right for our requisitioned cars. Col Young said that when rules are made clear Public Safety will act on registration of Italian cars. He will consult Lt Col Bowman.

Major Hinke said the resume' for Regional Commissioners would be ready to-day. He asked everyone to hold in keeping such news. Major Astoyer asked if social news could be included, p.s. The Officers Club. Brigadier Lush said no. He said that contacts with us helped for PRS; perhaps PR and Information would work it between them.

Britz Lush said there ought to be a villa for visiting officers to stay in. He asked Col Farren to do into this. He referred to the villa at Favalllo which Lord Brimboroe had placed at the disposal of ACC officers. It was not for the use of the Political Section only. That had better be put in writing.

Britz Lush said he thought DPR must have a complete book of previous photographs for ACC and another for Regt n. III. DPR explained how the photo worked and said that we hoped soon to have duplicate negatives. Britz Lush said it seemed strange that people actually interested were not allowed to have photographs. Other officers said they would like to buy them. DPR promised to come back to him.

Col Clough said 70 to 80 caravans came in every day and were impressive. There were only two men to deal with this. It was not enough. He read a memo from the Adjutant outlining a new procedure. Britz Lush did not agree with this. He said the Messaure Centrale had done very well indeed; the procedure should not be changed, but the staff would have to be increased.

Col Hulls said that the reception of refugees in Sicily was going extremely well. Britz Lush said DPR should at once put out this story for RISORGENTO. Col Hulls said transport was not so good; there was a bottleneck at the Straits. Col Fiske said there had been a misunderstanding with AAI, who had expected 20,000 refugees and had not got them. Col Hulls said that they ought to be thankful and not annoyed. They had not made arrangements for 20,000. Britz Lush said Col Hulls should cover this with Major Brown.

Col Farren said 25 Italian drivers for HQ were arriving to-day. Britz Lush said they should be smartly dressed.

DPR said the agricultural report on Vesuvius damage was finished, and he would like to have it at once. Britz Lush asked Col Snino to get it.

Brig Lush said things were going as well as could be expected in Sicily. There were great difficulties in getting over to the economy stage. Messotini's appointment would be a trick. One important thing was to remember the difference between what we could do as Allies' government and what reflects as natives of the country could do. There was still much lack of coordination. Food rationing in Sicily had not followed the rules made here and there were in a jam; they had kept 50-150 grammes because stocks were insufficient, but Region I had not consulted HQ. Much the same applied to Calabria. Brig Lush said he had found that the Local Resources Board in Sicily had bought 2,000 tons of olive oil in Calabria and shipped it to Sicily for Army needs when there was a famine here. Army police had also taken to scavenging prostitutes' seeds, which was a bit streaky. He had seen the camp for Jews at Terrenonni, which was C.K., but orders had gone out that it should be moved on account of malaria and nothing had happened, nor had any Jews remained there. Similarly and Region II had needed greatly on private cars and had done well but now had no tyres. Who was taking this up?

Col Farren said G4 had referred it to AFHQ.

Col Seino said he had seen Economic Section about this and it was being taken up with AFHQ.

Col Fiske said TOP SECRET was reserved for things of utmost operational importance; AGO would rarely ever use it.

Col Shipp wanted to know if the Army Sub-Commission might write direct to A.A.I. on technical matters. The answer was yes.

Brig Lush said that we had received a note from A.A.I. asking us to maintain Staff procedure in our correspondence.

Brig Lush asked if the Information Branch had a good map of India. Major Hinkel said one was on order but had not arrived.

Col Farren asked if there were any policy about limited leave in this theatre of Operations. Brig Lush said such a policy would probably have to be considered when hot weather began. The question may come up at the Regional Commissioners' Conference. General MacFarlane took the attitude that in wartime officers kept going until they dropped; but Brig Lush said he thought it was up to Senior Officers to see that their personnel didn't drop.

Brig Lush said the Political Section were quite upset over a recent circular issued for the Education Sub-Commission. He himself could see nothing wrong with it and had approved its release.

Brig Lush announced that Col McCaffrey has been sent for for ETC. Col Anningwood takes over Region 7; Col Marquess takes over Region 2. Col Charles Findlay takes over Displaced Persons. The transfers will be arranged at the Regional Commissioners Conference.

Col Alorians said that for Bone examination and other duties assigned by the Army, American personnel in AOC should be increased. Brig Lush said AOC should take care of City Sub-Region for its part of new City Administration. Brig Lush said provincial staffs must be sifted and E/CR personnel might be moved forward. Col Alorians said they have been sifted. Region 2 is quite short now. Brig Lush said Region 5 should be covered now. Brig Lush said sub-contractors in Regions should not have "ALG Official" cards on their cars.

Major Brister reported four cases of typhus in Aversa. Doctors are on the job and the block where the cases are has been isolated with 200 persons in it. There are 2,400 refugees there. They are coming in at 800 a day from the bridges. There are 1,000 in the Naples Area.

Major Bullock asked that Field Phone communication be established between the Dispatchers and the British Motor Pool. He reported that strangers are wandering round the Province Building without passes. Major Hinckel says his branch gets 3 or 4 a day. Brig Lush said he wanted this tightened up and asked all officers to turn in to the guard any people found wandering around.

Major Attayer said he would appreciate it if these people were all sent to him for questioning.

Major Attayer submitted a specific request for clothing for 4,000 a month.

Col Albright said about tickets for M to see Irving Berlin's show, no exceptions to the system for issuing tickets.
