The Embassy of the United States of America presents its compliments to the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and, with reference to a note from the Ministry to the Allied Commission dated May 3, 1944 and relating to a project of the International Red Cross Committee for the creation of sanitary and safety zones, has the honor to inform the Ministry that a reply has not been received in this connection.

In relying to the Embassy's communication the Department of State has transmitted a copy of a letter addressed to the Honorable Carl Borchardt, president of the International Red Cross Committee in Geneva, in which it is stated as follows:

"The Government of the United States has a lively appreciation of the total character of modern warfare, especially total aerial warfare, with the consequent possibility that civilian populations may be subjected to its effect. It has therefore studied the proposals with sympathy and appreciation for the humanitarian interests which are represented therein.

"It is, however, the total character of modern warfare carrying with it a degree of intensity which may not have been quite fully anticipated in 1936 which must necessarily condition the attitude of the United States Government toward the creation of sanitary and immunity zones. The current war has brought into existence factors of warfare not confronted up to 1936 when the laudable proposals of the International Red Cross Committee relative to the creation of sanitary and immunity zones were put

laudable proposals of the International Red Cross Committee  
relative to the creation of sanitary and immunity zones were put  
forth. It is noted, for example, that it would be difficult to  
designate any zones in Germany which would not contribute in some  
way to Germany's war effort or would not contain a means of com-  
munication which might be an important military target. Further-  
more, the use by Germany of the flying bomb and rocket propelled  
projectile, neither of which can be securely aimed, would  
deprive the Allies of any advantage to themselves in establishing  
such zones."

The Political Section of the Allied Commission presents its  
recommendations to the Italian Ministry of Foreign Affairs and, with  
reference to their memorandum no. 6/277/72 of the 25th January,  
has the honor to inform them that the interested staff sections of  
OMO have studied the proposal that safety zones be established in both  
liberated and Occupied Italy and have concluded that from the Allied  
point of view the same considerations continue to apply as in June  
1943 when the question was previously raised. From the Italian point  
of view, it is felt that any possible need for the establishment of  
such zones has decreased considerably.

TO : C-5 Section, Allied Force Headquarters.

There is attached a copy of a memorandum No. 6/147/72 of  
the 13th January from the Italian Ministry of Foreign  
Affairs regarding the desire of the Italian Government to  
institute safety zones in liberated Italian territory.

2. It is presumed that the Italian Government could only give their consent to the scheme proposed by the chairman of the International Red Cross in respect of territory directly administered by them and that the Allied authorities could not object to their so doing unless they selected zones which were of strategic importance to the Allied Military authorities.
3. Similarly, the political section assumes that the Italian Government are in no position to speak for territory under Allied Military Government. Should it become apparent that the proposal would affect such territory, the section suggests that the views of the Allied Military Government authorities might be sought, but as a matter of principle it would be disastrous to discourage any such proposal.
4. The views of Allied Force Headquarters are requested in order that a reply may be returned to the Italian Ministry of Foreign Affairs.

## MEMORANDUM FOR THE POLITICAL SECTION A.C.

The International Committee of the Red Cross submitted last March to the extent of the belligerent Powers a "memorandum" concerning the institution of sanitary and safety zones which should shelter women, children, old people and sick persons, who would be otherwise exposed to the action of enemy bombardment.

As regards Italy said Committee had set forth the proposition of erecting a hospital center in Siena.

This Ministry expressed then the opinion that, for obvious reasons, the Italian Government should adhere to the proposition mentioned in the memorandum and requested the kind advice of the A.C. on the subject, but the Mediterranean Allied Headquarters informed by letter on June 29th, 1944, that they did not deem it opportune, for the time being, to set up sanitary or safety zones in the territory of liberated Italy, or of occupied Italy.

The Chairman of the International Committee of the Red Cross has now informed, through a circular message addressed to all belligerent Powers from Geneva on September 2nd last that Germany would be willing to examine favourably the institution of said zones and that, in spite of the difficulties the issue might meet with under the circumstances, an exchange of views on the matter would be appreciated by her. In consideration of the considerable grounds constituting the request of the International Committee of the Red Cross, the Italian Government would see no obstacle in giving their consent to the institution of the above zones, stating their willingness to participate in an eventual exchange of views on the subject.

The Ministry for Foreign Affairs, prior to communicating  
the consent of the Italian Government to the Chairman of the  
International Committee of the Red Cross, would be grateful  
if the AMILC Commission could acquaint them with their even-  
tual demands on the subject.



Sir:

I have the honor to refer to the communication received from the Royal Italian Ministry for Foreign Affairs, No. 1321 of March 10, 1944, relating to the proposal of the International Committee of the Red Cross with respect to the establishment in Vienna of a hospital center.

I have been informed by the Supreme Allied Commander that the result of previous examination it has been decided, in view of the fact that Vienna is a road and railway center held by the enemy, that it was not now practicable to declare Vienna an open or hospital city. The appropriate Allied commanders have, however, been instructed to take every precaution to safeguard hospitals and other structures of the city. First consideration must, however, be given to the military operations.

Under these circumstances I am instructed to inform you that the Supreme Commander regrets that no departure can be made from this policy.

AS A RESULT OF PREVIOUS EXAMINATION, IT WAS DECIDED THAT IT WAS NOT PRACTICABLE THAT SIENA SHOULD BE DECLARED AN OPEN OR HOSPITAL CITY, IN VIEW OF THE FACT THAT IT IS A ROAD AND RAILWAY CENTER AT PRESENT HELD BY THE ENEMY. The Royal Ministry of Foreign Affairs have the honour to inform the Allied Control Commission that the Italian Legation at Berne has received from the International Committee of the Red Cross the following proposals:

2) The German authorities and that Section of the Italian Red Cross under German control have advised the International Red Cross Committee as to their intention of establishing in Siena an hospital center with a capacity of 1000 beds for Civilian and Military ill and wounded. The proposal contemplates the evacuation of all soldiers from Siena so as to remove all military objectives from this city.

The Italian Red Cross Section still under German control has requested the International Red Cross Committee to inform the belligerant Governments of the project.

Should these Government give their approval, the International Red Cross Committee would be glad to examine the possibility of creating sanitary and safety zones.

3) The Royal Ministry of Foreign Affairs have the honour to express the opinion that, for obvious humanitarian reasons, it would be most appropriate to sponsor the establishment at Siena of a sanitary and safety zone, which of course, should offer the necessa-

4) The Italian Supreme Command has also received the above mentioned proposal favourably. However, as the proposal has been also submitted to the Governments of the United Nations, the Royal Ministry of Foreign Affairs have the honour to request the Allied Control Commission to kindly inform the said Governments of the opinion and desire of the Italian Government as expressed in paragraph 3.

The Royal Ministry of Foreign Affairs have the honour to request the Allied Control Commission to kindly advise them, as soon as possible, of the decisions of the United Nations Governments.

TELEGRAM #33 FROM ITALIAN LEGATION, BERN  
FOR ITALIAN FOREIGN OFFICE, SIGNED MAGISTRATI

According to the International Red Cross Committee at Geneva the German authorities and the Italian Red Cross propose to create at Siena a hospitalization center with 10,000 beds for military and civilian sick and wounded. The proposal envisages the evacuation from Siena of all soldiers so that there would remain there no military objectives. The International Red Cross Committee has been asked by the Italian Red Cross to communicate this plan to the authorities of belligerent countries. Should the belligerent countries approve, the International Red Cross Committee will be glad to study within the framework of its memorandum of September 9, 1939, the possibilities of creating safety and sanitary zones.

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
