Minutes of meeting held on 2 November 1945 in United Nations Commission

U.N.D.A.

Action by Mr. Brindley Lewis took the chair in the temporary absence of Mr. A/S.

He extended a welcome to the members of the UNRRA Mission and assured them of the support of the UNRRA Commission in their work of relief and help to the suffering population of Italy. He said that we were seeing stark realities in this country and that there was a physical shortage of practically every necessity of life. He pointed out that if the Allied Commission's help fell short of expectations it would not be due to lack of goodwill but to lack of practical ability to help.

Mr. Keay, UNRRA, gave particulars of the UNRRA directive. He said that at the second meeting of the UNRRA Council in Montreal in September a sum not to exceed 50,000,000 dollars had been made available for relief in Italy for a period not specified but which it was assumed by the Director General would be one year. Other resolutions would permit additional assistance to depend upon those of United Nations and additional aid to prevent the spread of epidemics to the extent to which that would be necessary. The general policy of the mission was indicated in the directive which had been distributed to the meeting. He said that the main point of the directive was that he was authorised to negotiate the necessary agreement with the Italian Government and was required to return them to Washington and London for confirmation. He expressed the desire of the Mission to work through normal channels.

2. Colonel Murray Maxwell, C-in-C UNRRA, explained the present status of negotiations between UNRRA and AFHQ. He said that AFHQ had already called forward a small number of key personnel in order to get the organization going. It would be necessary to call personnel forward to staff the camps and he asked for information as to the numbers. He asked if it would be possible for the memorandum on supplies to be accepted in principle before his return to AFHQ at the end of the week in order that the negotiations of supplies could be kept in hand. He asked that AFHQ facilitate in every way the negotiations between UNRRA and the Italian Government and added that AFHQ hoped to see a "tripartite pact emerge from the result of UNRRA-Italian Government deliberation." He said that AFHQ were convinced that UNRRA has only come to help and would not hinder in any way.

In regard to UNRRA taking over requisitioned buildings from the military, some difficulty was foreseen in this connection and it was agreed that the matter should be investigated by the Legal and Finance Sub-Commission with Claims and Hirings on UNRRA's behalf.

He instructed the Ministry of Education who, he said, would be responsible for the collection of the children and for the provision of the necessary mechanism for the carrying out of the operation. In reply to a query by the A/GC Mr. Keeney said that in the event of a break of contract by the Italian Government, the only way to enforce the contract would be to discontinue supplies.

(a) Transfer to UNRRA. It was agreed that UNRRA had already taken over and that would be ready for Colonel Mitchell to take over when he returned. It was not anticipated that the date of transfer would be before 1 January 1945. UNRRA's authorization to assume responsibility for certain activities in Italy.

1. UNITED NATIONS Relief and Rehabilitation Administration is now authorized by its council to assume responsibility for displaced persons of UNITED NATIONS nationality in ITALY. UNRRA has informed CCAC that it is prepared at request of CCS to assume responsibility for camps already established for this purpose and to expand this program if necessary. Your early recommendations are requested regarding transfer of this responsibility to UNRRA. If you wish, UNRRA will be invited to send representatives to your Headquarters to discuss with you and to assist in preparing proposals for submission to CCS and discussion here with UNRRA Headquarters with view to agreement for early transfer.

2. In addition UNITED NATIONS Relief and Rehabilitation Administration has been authorized by its council to undertake operations in ITALY for following purposes:

- A. Provision of medical and sanitary aid and supplies.
- B. Assistance in care and return to their homes of displaced Italians.
- C. Care of and welfare services for children and nursing and expectant mothers.

Limit of expenditure by UNRRA presently authorized for these purposes is 50,000,000 dollars of foreign exchange.

3. UNRRA undertaking in ITALY operations as in paragraph 2 above is subject to approval by CCS of scheme for carrying out such operations. UNRRA has after discussion with CCAC representatives submitted tentative proposals, summary of which is given in following paragraphs. These tentative proposals do not represent a firm UNRRA program but are transmitted to you for your information as to the fields in which UNRRA desires to operate as soon as possible in ITALY and as a basis for UNRRA discussions with your representatives in the Theater. References to tonnages merely indicate the projected scope of the program. Problems concerning phasing, allocation of shipping, areas of operations and the like are to be discussed in the Theater. If you so desire, UNRRA is prepared to dispatch representatives immediately to your Headquarters to give you all possible assistance in your consideration of the proposals. It is suggested that you establish air priorities for a group of 6 UNRRA officials to visit Theater for this purpose. UNRRA has requested CCAC to convey UNRRA's anxiety for this group complete plans as may be agreeable to you looking toward the general principles outlined herein, and subject to prior approval by the CCS on your recommendation.

The detailed arrangements within such general principles (including the extent to which you can make facilities available to UNRRA within ITALY) would be left to be worked out by you with UNRRA's representatives in the Theater. Any agreement to be made by the CGS with UNRRA on the subject would cover only general principles of the scope of UNRRA's operations and its relationship with the military. In any event, no agreement will be made by the CGS prior to receipt of your comments and recommendations.

4. Major part of UNRRA's operations would be care of and welfare services for children of school and pre-school age and nursing and expectant mothers. Intention is to provide supplies for these classes of population supplemental to and not in substitution for provision which can be made from other sources, for example, provision of supplies by military authorities within the scope of existing directives. UNRRA expects to confine assistance to approximately 1,700,000 children and 300,000 mothers. Recipients would be more serious cases of malnutrition mainly in larger cities. Program would furnish each child with up to 750 calories of additional food daily.

5. Estimate is that the total program in paragraph 2 above would as soon as practicable require 15,000 tons imports monthly, including dry skimmed milk, sugar, fats, flour, pulses, farine, fish, et cetera. Intention is that distribution would be primarily by Italian organization C.N.M.I. and Italian Ministry of Education. Exact method of distribution would be determined by agreement in field to meet local conditions.

6. As regards medical and sanitary aid and supplies UNRRA proposes to dispatch additional medical personnel to assist in restoration of Italian Public Health services and to furnish about \$,000,000 dollars worth medical and sanitary supplies, particularly items not now in military supply program. These supplies would be supplemental to those which may be included in military program. Plan of distribution is not finally decided but would probably in the main follow channels similar to those now used by AGC.

7. It is not at present proposed by UNRRA to present program for Italian displaced persons until further study has been made.

8. As UNRRA's intention is primarily to place responsibility for distribution on Italian Government or organizations UNRRA staff contemplated is small. At maximum it is anticipated that staff for purposes in paragraph 2 above would be 75 professional personnel including executives medical and technical and 80 clerical. Other personnel as needed would be recruited in Italy.

9. Resolution of UNRRA council authorizing these activities in Italy provides that operations shall be subject to such control as military command may find necessary. It is suggested that UNRRA should not operate as agent of military but as autonomous organization with control over its own personnel and programs subject however to compliance with general policies laid down by military authorities and overriding control of Theater Commander on all matters concerning or affecting military operations or security. Within such limitations UNRRA would be entitled to deal direct with the Italian Government and its agencies but would undertake to clear in advance with the appropriate military authorities all questions of general policy and to keep them informed of arrangements in full coordination.

10. In delivering supplies UNRRA could be free to establish prices and conditions of distribution, subject to Theater price policies and in consultation with military authorities.

11. UNRRA requests assistance from military on following matters in view of military control over supply shipping and inland transport and other aspects of internal economy in ITALY:

A. Inclusion in Theater Commanders shipping program of 15,000 tons monthly for UNRRA'S supplies as in paragraph 5 above additional to shipping for military relief supplies. UNRRA request that this should begin as early as possible, preferably by November 1.

B. Transfer for use in November and December from military stocks in ITALY or stocks afloat of 5,000 tons of foodstuffs of types in paragraph 5 above as to enable UNRRA to start operations in ROME and NAPLES without awaiting arrival of its own shipments. Such stocks to be reimbursable by UNRRA in cash or in kind. It is understood by UNRRA that possibility of making any such stocks available is for discussion in Theater.

C. Arrangements to be made where possible within Theater (subject to military operational requirements) for deliveries to UNRRA from military stocks against replacement from UNRRA supplies at later dates or at other points. Intention of this is to avoid delays in deliveries and unnecessary movements of supplies by sea or inland.

D. Use of storage warehouses and facilities for local transportation in Italy. UNRRA lays particular stress on request for assistance in transportation of supplies.

E. As regards UNRRA personnel, cooperation of military authorities with respect to transportation, accommodation, food, clothing, medical aid, communication facilities and use of post exchange of L.F.I. Payment to be made for all such supplies and services.

12. As regards paragraph 11 A it is agreed that the bid for necessary shipping for UNRRA'S supplies must be made by Theater. As regards paragraph 11 B it is understood that the question whether an advance can be made to UNRRA from Theater stock to enable operations to start as early as possible subject to repayment when UNRRA supplies are received must obviously depend on existing supply position in relation to present and anticipated military commitments including military responsibility for relief. As regards paragraph 11 C, D, and E it is considered that all possible cooperation should be given to UNRRA to enable them to carry out their task. However, the extent to which the various facilities can be made available by the military will not be made the subject of agreement here but must be left to be worked out by the military authorities with UNRRA in the Theater in the light of conditions prevailing from time to time.

13. Urgent reply is requested to this cable.

Dear Mr. McCloy,

As you undoubtedly know, at its second Session in Montreal just closed, the Council of the United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation Administration adopted a resolution establishing the scale and nature of relief and rehabilitation operations to be undertaken in Italy. In addition, the Council adopted another resolution authorizing operations in enemy and ex-enemy territory directed to the care and repatriation of displaced persons of United Nations nationality and to the control of epidemics. I am enclosing copies of these resolutions.

The resolution concerning Italy confines our operations to three types of assistance: the provision of medical and sanitary aid and supplies; assistance in the care and return to their homes of displaced persons; and care of, and welfare services for, children and nursing and expectant mothers. The resolution also limits our expenditures of foreign exchange for these purposes to \$ 50,000,000. The resolution concerning assistance to displaced persons of United Nations nationality and epidemic control work imposed no budgetal limitations. **2650**

UNRRA Programs for Italy

Our programs for Italy, pursuant to these resolutions, are briefly summarized below. It must be understood, of course, that this statement is quite tentative and is subject to modifications as result of further study of the Italian situation and as a result of negotiations with the appropriate authorities.

1. Assistance to Children and Mothers.

Our efforts under the first resolution mentioned above will be chiefly directed to providing care of, and welfare services for, children of school and pre-school age, and nursing and expectant mothers. The major part of the expenditures for this purpose will be for supplies to supplement the provision already being made for these classes of the population. Because of the limitation of our budget, we expect to confine this assistance to approximately 1,700,000 children and 300,000 mothers. This means that only one out of every five children of the ages included will receive this assistance. The recipients will be those children who are suffering from the more serious cases of undernourishment and malnutrition. The program will furnish each recipient, on the average, additional food up to the value of 750 calories daily. It is understood that such food will be in addition to the basic rations provided by other authorities.

Our operations in this respect will be centered largely on the bigger cities. We are not planning to furnish such supplies in the country or in the smaller communities, except in those which are not agriculturally self-supporting. So long as military operations in Italy continue, we shall, of course, also limit our operations to those areas which may be regarded as in repose.

Our present estimates indicate that the children and mothers program will require approximately 15,000 tons of supply per month, the major commodities being:

Dry skimmed milk	3,100 tons
Sugar	860 tons
Fats	820 tons
Flour	5,000 tons
Pulses	2,150 tons
Farina	315 tons
Fish	1,500 tons
Miscellaneous	1,255 tons

The ultimate distribution of these supplies to the recipients will in all likelihood be handled primarily by two Italian organizations, Opera Nazionale per la Protezione della Maternità e dell'Infanzia (ONMI) and the Italian Ministry of Education. The ONMI will be expected to conduct the distribution of supplies to the children of pre-school age and the nursing and expectant mothers. The exact method of distributing food, whether by issue for consumption at home or by other means, will be determined by agreement in the field to meet local conditions. The supplies for children of school age will be distributed by the ministry of Education, the food being distributed most probably through school lunches.

2. Medical and Sanitary Aid and Supplies.

Our assistance along these lines will consist of the dispatch of medical personnel whose primary function will be the rendering of advice in the restoration of the Italian Public Health Services, and the furnishing of up to \$ 3,000,000 worth of medical and sanitary supplies, particularly of commodities not now included in the military supply program, over the period

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of a year

of a year, to supplement the supplies now being furnished to Italy. With the medical supplies which are being imported into Italy at the rate for all of Italy of approximately £ 1,000,000 worth a month, this will provide a total of up to £ 20,000,000 worth for the whole country over a period of one year, an amount which appears extremely modest for a population of 45,000,000.

Included in the items to be furnished will be raw material from which certain medical supplies may be manufactured in Italy.

Our plan for distribution of medical supplies in Italy is to follow the system being used by A.C.C.

3. Displaced Persons of Italian Nationality.

We are not at present prepared to set forth a program of assistance for displaced persons of Italian nationality, because we do not intend to undertake any work along this line which the Italian Government can itself perform. An equitable division of responsibility between ourselves and the Italian Government can only be reached after further study. Most expenditures, in any event, will be in local currency, and only a small amount of import tonnage will be involved.

4. Displaced Persons of United Nations Nationality.

At the request of the military, we shall be willing to assume responsibility for the camps in Italy which are already caring for several thousand refugees of United Nations nationality. We are also prepared to expand the program, if necessary.

5. Epidemic Control.

We have not yet formulated any program under this heading. Before taking any definite action, we will consult with A.C.C. and its advisers regarding the nature and scope of our activities in this field.

6. Budget.

On the basis of the foregoing, we have made the following tentative budget allocation for one year of activities in Italy under the first three programs described above:

The budgets for displaced United Nations nationals and for epidemic control will be in addition to the \$ 50,000,000.

As indicated above in connection with the program for assistance to children and mothers and for the furnishing of medical and sanitary aid and supplies, we intend to place the responsibility for distribution upon the Italian government or upon Italian organizations. Consequently, for these purposes, a relatively small staff will suffice. This will probably consist of a small group of executives and a number of technicians, for example, the medical personnel referred to in Section I () above. Our operations will undoubtedly start with a small number to which we will add from time to time, as need develops but, at the present, we do not expect our mission to exceed 7 professional personnel and 20-30 clerical. Other personnel, as needed, will be recruited in Italy.

This statement does not include personnel who may be needed for work in connection with displaced persons of United Nations nationality and epidemic control.

III

Relations with the Military Program

As indicated in several places above, the assistance which the U.S. is planning to give pursuant to the resolution authorizing operations in Italy is intended to be additional to, and not in substitution for, assistance which is now being given or which will be given as a basic measure for the benefit of Italy generally. The UNRRA Council authorized these operations on the understanding that the scale of supply by the military or other authorities will be maintained or increased without deduction for the assistance which UNRRA is to afford.

IV

Relationship with Military Authorities

In our operations in Italy, we shall, of course, be in **2615**.
general policies laid down by the appropriate military authorities.
Subject to such general policies, we should wish to operate as an
autonomous organization, with complete control over our personnel
and our programs. In dealing with the Italian government we would,
of course, clear in advance all questions of general policy with the
appropriate military authorities and would keep them informed of our
arrangements.

S E C R E T

In delivering supplies to Italian governmental or charitable organizations, however, we should expect to be free to establish the prices at which we make the transfer and the conditions of the distribution of the supplies by the organizations, including the classes of persons to whom the distribution is to be made and the prices at which the supplies are to be sold (unless given away). The prices for sale to the ultimate consumers, however, would not be higher than the prices fixed by the appropriate price control authorities.

Assistance from the Military

In carrying out these programs, we are completely dependent upon the military authorities in view of their control over supply, shipping and internal transport, and over many phases of government and economic life within the country. I am writing to ask you, therefore, if you will obtain for us the issuance of directives to the appropriate authorities to facilitate the proposed operations and, in particular, to accomplish the following arrangements:

1. Transportation

(a) Beginning with October 1948, it is essential to have an allocation by the theater commander of 15,000 tons of shipping monthly from east coast U.S. ports to appropriate ports in Italy, over and above existing shipping allocations.

(b) As a beginning supply, we need the transfer, from military stocks in Italy or afloat, of 70,000 tons of the foods listed in section I (1) or of appropriate substitutes. UNRRA is agreeable to reimbursing the military for these supplies promptly in cash or in kind.

(c) Supplies beyond the 20,000-ton beginning stock can be provided by UNRRA through its own efforts, so long as shipping space is allocated as indicated under (a) above; but if the military authority prefers, UNRRA would accept an arrangement under which the military procured and shipped all or any part of the needed supplies for delivery to UNRRA in Italy against reimbursement by UNRRA in the United States in cash or in kind.

(d) To the extent that we ship in our own supplies, we should wish to be able to avoid delays in deliveries and unnecessary ^{23 Aug 48} and cross-hauls, by making arrangements in the theater (subject to military operational requirements) for deliveries from military stocks against replacement at later dates or other points.

(e) Our operations will require the use not only of ocean trans-

portation facilities, but also of storage warehouses and facilities for local transshipment in Italy. We would, of course, be prepared to pay appropriate charges for the service of transportation, handling and warehousing, in foreign exchange where incurred outside Italy, and in lire where incurred locally.

We understand that the most serious possible obstacle to this proposal is the existing shortage of local transport. UNRRA cannot discharge its obligations unless it has an adequate and unbroken supply line. Of necessity, we will require the same transport priorities as are accorded to A.S.C.

b. Assistance to UNRRA Personnel

We should like very much to have the cooperation of the appropriate military authorities in securing for our personnel assigned to the Italian program (subject of course to the limitations imposed by military necessity) necessary transportation, shelter, food, clothing, medical aid, communication facilities, and the use of Post Exchange facilities. This cooperation is essential to our effective operation, in view of the disorganization and inflationary conditions now existing in Italy. Of course, payment would be made for all supplies and services so furnished. As in other theaters under military control, we should also like to have for our personnel certificates of identity, entitling them to be treated as prisoners of war under the Geneva Convention, if captured.

I appreciate that most of the details of the arrangements referred to above cannot be settled in Washington but must be taken up with the military authorities in the theater, and in some cases, with the Italian government. Within this limitation, I respectfully request that the appropriate directives be procured from the Combined Chiefs of Staff so as to enable UNRRA to launch its program at the earliest possible moment. Should the necessary assistance be forthcoming, we would be prepared to commence operations on a limited scale on November 1, 1945.

Representatives of the Administration are waiting to leave for Italy to attempt to negotiate detailed arrangements along these lines, and it would therefore be appreciated if we could have your reply at your earliest convenience.

RECORD OF MEETING HELD WITH UNRRA REPRESENTATIVES,
CHIEF COMMISSIONER AND CHIEF OF STAFF,
26 NOVEMBER 1944.

1. Chief Commissioner received Mr. Jackson, Governor Cochran and Mr. Keay this afternoon.

2. Mr. Jackson explained the position with regard to requests for shipping made by UNRRA on behalf of UNRRA and asked whether the Allied Commission was prepared to provide a small amount of supplies on loan in order that UNRRA could make the gesture of entering into business. The Chief Commissioner advised the UNRRA representatives to take the strongest possible action at the highest levels in order to secure adequate shipping. He advised them that it was useless to count on mere requests made to COS and that even when the requests had been granted and provision of shipping had been made, these promises in many cases had to be broken and that they could have no assurance of implementation. He recommended that UNRRA should not attempt to commence operations or make gestures of help until they were assured of adequate supplies and adequate transport. He urged that Governor Jackson should make the strongest representations in order that his programme could be fulfilled.

3. The Allied Commission was unable, owing to the precarious state of food stocks, to provide supplies for UNRRA. Moreover, it had always been assumed that the UNRRA supplies would be supplementary to ordinary civilian supplies and not borrowed from them. He was, however, prepared to provide a measure of assistance in order to advance their operations. Once UNRRA had received notification that adequate supplies would arrive by a certain date, he was prepared to supply up to 2000 tons one month before that date on the distinct understanding that the supplies would be repaid immediately they became available to UNRRA and that if the UNRRA programme was cut, the supplies on loan would be cut by the same percentage. He directed the Chief of Staff to draft a telegram in conjunction with Mr. Keay informing ACO of this proposal.

SUBJECT: Importation of UNRRA or other civilian agencies.

TO : Headquarters, Allied Control Commission, APO 394.
(Attention: Acting Chief Commissioner).

1. Reference is made to your A/H/21 of 23 August 44.
2. At the present time UNRRA cannot operate in Italy or any other ex-enemy country and to enable it to do so will require specific decision from its Council. It is probable however, that the Council of UNRRA will take decision at its meeting on 15 September as to the extent to which UNRRA operations will be carried on in Italy.
3. Should the Director General of UNRRA approve the request that UNRRA provide relief for United Nations nationals in Italy, this could be done within existing authorities vested in him and would not need a specific resolution of the Council. It is thought possible that the Director General may agree to do so.
4. UNRRA activities in Italy before the withdrawal of AGO would be under the control of AGO. This follows on the application of UNRRA Council resolution number 1 which provides that,

"if it appears necessary for the administration to operate in an enemy or ex-enemy area in carrying out the purpose of the agreement, it will do so only from such a time and for such purposes as may be agreed upon between the military command, the established control authority or duly recognized administration of the area on the one hand and the administration on the other, and subject to such control as the military command or the established control authority may find necessary; provided that the Council approves the scale and nature of the operations it is proposed to undertake and the standard of provision..."

5. It is considered that UNRRA operations generally in Italy could probably not begin for at least three months after the modification of the Council resolution and January 1 is suggested as a target date. A possible exception to such a time lag might however be found in the 2608 caring for United Nations Nationals in camps in Italy.
6. The above has been discussed with Governor Cochrane of UNRRA who is in agreement with the views expressed.

PARAPHRASE OF TELEGRAM RECEIVED DATED AUGUST 14, 1944:

In discussion recently held here, it has been communicated to us by United States and United Kingdom Council members that responsibility for supplies will be assumed by another agency.

The proposal has been made that UNRRA accept responsibility for health services; for feeding and care of children; and for displaced persons in Italy.

The object is a maximum effect politically and morally in Italy and in other countries while not involving a cost of substantial amount and with operation by UNRRA limited.

A precise description has been supplied to us with regard to the work which is planned, for example in connection with displaced persons the recommendation has been made although such recommendation is not to be brought up as a question of principle that included among displaced persons will be displaced Italians.

Supplies which will be requisite for services of this kind will also be included in our responsibility.

A proposal along these lines may be expected by us at Montreal.

Although there is no commitment by the Director General, the explorations which are necessary should proceed at once.

Your special attention should be given to these matters and there should be obtained all possible information which may be necessary with a view to appraising the problem including requirements of personnel, supplies and finance. An outline and a general report while not essential would still be useful.

To be sent at once are specialist in the matter of welfare and health; these will make fuller report regarding this proposal.

The foregoing telegram was repeated as UNRRA 357 to Naples and as UNRRA 436 to London.

It is learned that a special commission of UNRRA, attached to the Allied Control Commission, has started the collection of data, the analysis and the elaboration of a report on Italian needs in the field of assistance and reconstruction.

The report will be submitted to the Central Office of UNRRA at the meeting of the Council which will take place next month at Montreal, when the question of entrusting to UNRRA the work of assistance and reconstruction in Italy is to be examined.

The study that the UNRRA Mission is at present carrying out in Italy aims at specifying the assistance to Italy in terms of imports, costs, staff, administrative organization and all other necessary details for its regular functioning, at first in a theatre of military operations and later under peace conditions.

1. Personnel of different nationalities, mostly British and American, are now present or due to arrive in this theater in the employ or under the direction of United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation Administration.

2. Such personnel are in possession of UNRRA green-bound Certificate of Identity issued in WASHINGTON by the Director General UNRRA. This Certificate will contain an indorsement as follows:

"Valid as an Identity Document in the Mediterranean Theater of Operations"

This indorsement will be signed and over stamped with the seal of the Adjutant General, this headquarters.

3. In accordance with paragraph 2, this Certificate of Identity so indorsed will be recognized throughout the theater.

4. A brief description of the Certificate of Identity follows:

Title: "Certificate of Identity", in gold lettering on green cover.

Size: 3 7/8 inches X 5 5/8 inches.

Contents: Twelve or sixteen pages (unnumbered), page 1 bearing the serial number of the Certificate; page 4, a photograph of the bearer; and page 7, the signature and/or seal of the Director General UNRRA.

5. Attention is drawn to the fact that this Certificate of Identity is not a passport, pass or permit, and does not confer any special privileges, unless further indorsed by appropriate authorities.
