MESSAGE TO: General Taylor

The following answers have been prepared with Colonel MacFarland to the questions raised in your attached memorandum.

- a. Monthly inflow: Italian - 12/17,000; Non-Italian refugees - 5000. (Present month estimate based on present known in Italy and rate of inflow from induction point.)
- b. Italians accept full responsibility in King's Italy and in AGO territory responsibility is that of AGO, utilizing local resources to the utmost from time of discovery until passed to the Italians. At railroad full responsibility rests with Displaced Persons Sub-Section (and Army and AGO forward). This period varies from one day to one week. Estimates of supplies are enclosed in the attached table.
- c. In the case of the Italians it has been assumed for the purposes of this report that no help is necessary once they have reached their destination in the King's Italy.
- d. At present the only safe assumption is that non-Italian refugees must be held in Italy for an indefinite period.

In referring to the attached report it must be noted that the table has been drawn up in the understanding that the civilian supplies in each area will be sufficient for the needs of Italian refugees and displaced persons after the initial period necessary for processing.

Investigations carried out as requested show that:-

- (1) The premises referred to in BARI, v Vittorio Veneto 32, are the UPIM building, where refugees from JUGOSLAVIA are temporarily housed pending their despatch to No 1 PW Transit Camp. It has not been possible to establish that any propaganda or enlistment is carried on from there.
- (2) It has not been possible to identify the camp on the outskirts of BARI. No 1 PW Transit Camp, under the control of Displaced Persons Sub Commission ACC, is situated at about that distance. Here large numbers of Jugoslav are housed and fed after disembarkation; they are occasionally issued with battle dress by the Sub Commission if they have no other clothes. At the moment some of the regularly enlisted Partisans are accommodated there and parades are carried out. There is no record of any Italian deserters being in the camp.
- (3) This HQ has information that there is a political commissar attached to the Partisan HQ in v de Rossi BARI who is particularly interested in recruiting deserters from the Italian forces who come from the provinces of ISTRIA, FRIULI and POLA: this is done with a view to furthering JUGOSLAV claims on these territories at the Peace settlement.
- (4) The position of this commissar is c. n. investigated by this HQ with Adv Force 133.

MEMORANDUM TO: Mr. H.A. Cassida, Political Section, HQ ACC, Naples.

1. Enclosed are two private letters from Marshal Badoglio which the Italian Foreign Office ask you to have delivered. I am at a loss to know what course means by "waiting for decisions of the competent authorities on the question of forwarding private correspondence" - I thought you had already made that clear to him.

2. With regard to the other letter (506) asking for help on behalf of "several Italians", principally Jews, refugees in Switzerland, I asked Cassida if he could tell me how many of these there were, since some definite figure would be required in asking for their financial assistance. He replied he had no idea and would telegraph to Bern asking for further details.

3. I am looking forward to seeing you and Leber and your guest tomorrow. Prunus is dining with the Luca d'Acquafonse, but will try to change that date and come to us instead.
