1. Reference our Memo No. P/345.1 of 2 February 1945.

2. It has now been agreed by the U. S. and British authorities that, since Egypt is a base for both U.S. and British military forces, she cannot be regarded as a neutral country discharging the obligations of neutrality. Egyptians in Italy should, therefore, be treated on the same footing as United Nations nationals.

3. The Political Section will be grateful if further instructions may now be issued to the appropriate authorities permitting the grant of supplementary bread cards to Egyptian subjects in liberated Italy.

The Egyptian Government, acting on information received from the Swiss Legation here, recently protested against the decision of the Allied military authorities to cease the issue of supplementary travel cards to Egyptian subjects in Italy. This decision was based on the statement that Egypt is neutral.

2. The Foreign Office, whom we have recently consulted, state that although Egypt is not a belligerent, she has broken off relations with all enemies of the Allies. She is an ally of the United Kingdom and Egyptian territory is a base for Allied operations under the terms of the United Kingdom/Egyptian Treaty of Alliance. Her position is certainly not that of a neutral fulfilling the obligations of neutrality.
3. On consulting the files of the Political Section, however, I find that in a letter to Chott of October 3rd, Office stated categorically that Egyptians are neutrals. I have spoken to the United States Embassy here and they are of the opinion that Egyptians should not be treated as neutrals. I therefore propose to arrange for the issue of further instructions to the Allied military authorities here, but before doing so I should be grateful if you would have a word with Office and straighten the matter out. I shall do nothing until I hear from you.

Status of neutrals countries in Tokyo

In the Foreign Office view, occupied Korea is not a belligerent, she has broken off relations with all members of the Allies. She is an ally of the United Kingdom and French Territory in a base for allied operations under the terms of the United Kingdom/French Treaty of Alliance. Her position is certainly not that of a neutral qualifying the obligations of neutrality.

2. I have consulted Mr. Morris, of the United States Embassy, who agrees that Korea should not be treated as a neutral.

1. The Egyptian Government have received a report from their Legation at Bern that the Allied Government has recently cancelled the supplementary bread cards held by 20 Egyptian nationals, resident in Rome, on the grounds that Egypt is a neutral country. The Egyptian Government state that these cards were issued to nationals of countries who were at war or who had broken off diplomatic relations with Italy and claim that in view of the fact that the Egyptian Government have broken off diplomatic relations with Italy, these Egyptian nationals should be included in the latter category. In view of the hardship caused by the loss of these bread cards, the Egyptian Government would be grateful if the Commission's decision could be revised.
2. The British Embassy has asked the Political Section to investigate this matter and the latter would be grateful for material for a reply.

Dear Bill:

With reference to your letter of September 18, 1944, transmitting a memorandum from M. Lozoraitis, former Minister of Foreign Affairs for Lithuania, I am returning the memorandum herewith. If it is necessary to make any reply to M. Lozoraitis, I would suggest that you tell him that Lithuanian citizens, as well as citizens of Estonia and Latvia, are considered, in the absence of specific evidence to the contrary in individual cases, by the Allied authorities to be friendly and there is no question of discriminatory treatment against them. I am sending a copy in translation of M. Lozoraitis' memorandum to the Department for its information, together with an indication of the suggested reply to be used by you.

The other enclosure to your letter, which is the original copy of a communication to the Political Section from the Internees and Displaced Persons Section is likewise returned. I have marked with a check mark the following nationalities whose governments, I believe, are members of the United Nations, although I confess that we do not have any authentic list in this office:

I have marked with a circle those who, although not members of the United Nations, are considered, in the absence of specific evidence to the contrary in individual cases, to be "friendly": Albanian, Danish, Ariani, Syrian.

Egyptians are neutrals.

Jews and White Russians take their character from their citizenship. Stateless Jews would be normally considered to be friendly in the absence of specific evidence to the contrary. Stateless White Russians have presumably been screened by the security authorities.



To reply to the specific questions: (1) The correct term is "member of the United Nations" rather than "Allied Nations;" (2) There is normally no relationship between White Russians and Soviet Russians other than a racial one, since White Russians are either Stateless or have acquired the citizenship of some other country; (3) The position with respect to Yugoslavs is that we recognize the Royal Yugoslav Government which, in turn, has recognized the Partisan organization as being the de facto administrative authority in the larger part of Yugoslavia. The latter, in turn, recognizes the Royal Government as its representative in foreign affairs. Both groups are considered friendly from our point of view, but it is usually wise to keep them well separated one from another.

I trust the foregoing satisfactorily answers the questions raised in the reference memorandum.

Dear Bill:

With reference to your letter of September 18, 1944, transmitting a memorandum from M. Losoraitis, former Minister of Foreign Affairs for Lithuania, I am returning the memorandum herewith. If it is necessary to make any reply to M. Losoraitis, I would suggest that you tell him that Lithuanian citizens, as well as citizens of Estonia and Latvia, are considered, in the absence of specific evidence to the contrary in individual cases, by the Allied authorities to be friendly and there is no question of discriminatory treatment against them. I am sending a copy in translation of M. Losoraitis' memorandum to the Department for its information, together with an indication of the suggested reply to be used by you.

The other enclosure to your letter, which is the original copy of a communication to the Political Section from the Interned and Displaced Persons Section is likewise returned. I have marked with a check mark the following nationalities whose governments, I believe, are members of the United Nations, although I confess that we do not have any authentic list in this office:
