

Dear Johnny:

I refer to my letter of March 24 in regard to Italian merchant seamen in Mexico. I have now had a further communication from the Italian Foreign Office which states that the Italian Government offers no objections should the Italian merchant seamen interned in Mexico wish to serve with the United Nations merchant marine or to secure employment locally. In its opinion these solutions seem the best under the circumstances in view of present difficulties connected with their repatriation and subsequent employment in southern Italy. The Foreign Office states that the Ministry of Shipping would prefer that the individuals in question obtained employment locally.

I enclose two communications, one to Mr. Hammond, and the other to Dick Southgate from his nephew. I telegraphed Jimmy Dunn in regard to the latter and hope you will be able to see that the letter reaches its destination. Jimmy will have Dick's other address if this is not sufficient.

Bob reports that you are working very hard over our problems here. I should like an opportunity of discussing some of them with you soon.

I received your letter of February 25, 1944, quoting a dispatch from Mexico City in regard to certain groups of Italian internees at Paracat. I discussed this question with the Italian Foreign Office which stated that in its opinion the interpretation of Article 11 of the Embassy's dispatch has been superseded by the recent decision of the Mexican Government to abrogate all restrictions imposed upon Italian residents. It is believed that the internees at Paracat have already been liberated. Many of them had previously been authorized to move to more friendly surroundings in Tepic.

The Italian Government would be gratified if we could be found to utilize the services of the March at Sanremo and eventually to repatriate them. The Foreign Office would appreciate a copy of our note in this regard.

I enclose a letter addressed to Mrs. Lint Mechan on behalf of Queen Elena. The letter is in reply to one from Mrs. Mechan which was transmitted to me through the Department for delivery to the queen.
