Sir:

I have the honor to report that upon receipt of your circular telegram dated December 22, 1944, and received at this Legation on December 23, 1944, I consulted, pursuant to your instructions, the British Representative in regard to the matter in question. In consultation with the Italian Charge d'Affaires, Baron Confalonieri, it was mutually agreed that the Italian Charge would accept and that the British Representative and the American Minister would recommend the following revised estimate for the monthly expenses of the Italian Mission in Dublin:

This is the amount provided in December, 1944, and is less by 60 pounds than the monthly amounts provided from May to October inclusive. We understand that the Italian Charge has transmitted a similar estimate to his Government.

It was further agreed that the Italian Legation should keep a separate Legation account with Guinness and Mahon, Bankers, 17 College Green, Dublin, from which the official funds will be paid.

As to assets

As to assets belonging to the Italian Government in Eire, neither the British Representative nor this Legation has any knowledge, and it is thought there are, in fact, none. The Italian Charge is of the same opinion. It is our understanding that the previous Italian Minister obtained an advance of several thousand pounds from the Irish Government on the security of an Italian ship interned in the port of Dublin. This ship, I believe, was subsequently released to the Irish Government with British approval, the British obtaining some equivalent shipping, however, in return. It is my understanding of the matter that the Irish Government offered payment for the ship in blocked Swiss francs, which under existing conditions were not available to the Italian Government. I also believe the Italian Government is now attempting to recover the ship, in which case, if it succeeds, it must presumably repay the advance obtained against it by its representative. On the 30th January, 1945, I sent a telegram to AMDEL, Rome, repeated in error to you as our No. 20, January 30.

Relations with Baron Confaloniere appear to be cordial. He takes a very reasonable view of the situation and is wholly cooperative in dealing with it. We will, of course, advise you if any new developments should arise.

When I saw Marchese Della Rosa on Friday, this was one of his proposed telegrams which we discussed. After we had considered the complications which would arise if it were sent as it stands, he himself said that it would be better if they withdrew it and cancelled the allocation of the number 17 on their books (which has been done).

He proposed that I should explain to you what MAE wants, (which is simply to have here copies of the whole of the series of telegrams which have been sent by BERARDIS since 1.1.1944 to complete their records) and that I should consult with you as to the most convenient way of helping them to obtain these texts.

There seemed to me to be two possible ways

1. BERARDIS is coming home shortly. Could he be authorised to bring these copies of old telegrams (cyphered, if they were sent in cypher) with him?
2. Could they be sent by Allied courier?

If one of these, or any other means, seems the best to you, Ministero Affari Esteri would draft and ask us to send a telegram to DUBLIN accordingly.

As to the three (37, 38, and 41) which they want repeated by wire I think they should (and are willing) to wait until DUBLIN has the new system, which will not be long now.

Would you let me know what you think.

MEMORANDUM

The following is a list of questions which the Foreign Economic Administration would like to have submitted to the Italian Minister in Dublin:

1. Is Ireland used in any respect as a war station for the smuggling of small critical materials to Germany? Materials susceptible to such smuggling might include platinum, industrial diamonds, drugs, etc.
2. Have enemy cargo submarines been used to convey critical materials from Ireland to Germany? Enemy transport planes?
3. Have the crews or passengers on vessels sailing from the Western Hemisphere or the Iberian Peninsula to or from Ireland engaged in smuggling in either direction for Axis benefit?
4. Has the Minister any information on the routes and methods by which Germany and Italy have procured industrial diamonds from the outside world? Platinum?
5. Has the Minister any information on routes and methods by which Germany and Italy export surreptitiously gems, valuables, and money for the purpose of establishing caches of wealth outside the blockade?
6. Has the Minister any information on collaboration with the Axis of various business concerns in neutral or United Nations' territories?
7. Has the Minister any information on routes and methods by which commercial and financial transactions are carried out between the European Axis and the Asiatic Axis? Any information on submarine block-

ade running of air transport between the two Axes?

8. In the matter of the Spanish Civil War debt to Italy, has the Minister any information on how and when this debt was consolidated and in what amount and on what terms of re-payment? What Spanish securities were given as collateral for this debt and in whose custody might these securities be at the present time?

9. Has the Minister any information on acute Axis raw material deficiencies, the relative high priority assigned by the Axis to such and methods undertaken by the Axis to remedy these deficiencies?

Who's News Today

WHAT about Eamon De Valera, Prime Minister of Eire? Does he tick in accordance with modern wartime or to the rhythm of dead centuries?

Tall, gaunt, dour, in a black suit of semi-clerical cut, he impresses the observer as an anachronism, a man who seems to live in a mystical world of his own making and to whom lives count little beside a "cause."

Like other modern chieftains (among them Hitler and Stalin) the land he rules was not his birthplace, for he was born, in 1882, in New York, his father a Spanish immigrant from Cuba, his mother an Irishwoman lately come to America.

HIS father died, and at the age of two his mother sent him to his grandmother in County Limerick. He went to the local school, won a scholarship to a religious school and for a time considered going to a Jesuit college, but eventually chose Blackrock College, where he showed himself a brilliant mathematician. After receiving his degree of B. A. from the National University of Ireland, he took a job as mathematics teacher. But not for long.

Easter Monday, 1916, found him a commandant in the Republican Army. The rebellion against England's rule was crushed and all its leaders sentenced to death and shot.

All but De Valera.

And what saved his neck?

Why, he was born in America and (though he had lived here only two years) he was considered an American citizen. The British military tribunal did not wish to alienate American opinion since they were anxious that we should come into the war with them—and the American vote and American sentiment were important.

So the incident of American birth saved the future head of Eire.

WELL, known is the picturesque story of his escape from jail, his journey to Ireland and then to America, where he was received with open arms and (what was more to the point for him) with open purses. He raised both money and sympathy for the Irish cause and established himself as undisputed spokesman for Free Ireland.

Neither need we repeat the gory details of the bitter civil war that followed his return to Ireland.

Once in power, he set about changing the country's entire economic life by methods which parallel our New Deal.

While thousands adore him, the populace is not solidly behind him. A minority believes he has made the union of Ulster and the Free State

American birth saved him from execution, but now Americans may die by thousands because he won't expel Axis spies from Eire.

remote and that he is a "vain, egotistical schemer whose real study is Machiavelli rather than mathematics, whose policies are crippling Ireland."

Does his thinking take a Machiavellian twist or does it run straight and true? Let's see what the record reveals.

He announced in 1936 that Eire would never permit its territory to be used by any foreign power as a base for attack on England. Yet he permits Eire to be the most important listening post in the world for the Axis.

He has said he didn't think he'd ever need to take up arms again for Eire but would "gladly fight and die for democracy."

He insists, "It's not what I want, but what the people of Ireland want." And yet: "What has been called the most savage censorship in Europe outside the Axis has operated to keep from the Irish any adequate picture of the war or world opinion as it concerns their nation." Thus he manipulates the "wants" of the people to reflect his will.

Kelly Weighs New Vote Act

LANSING, Mich., March 21. — Gov. Kelly today said he would call the Legislature into special session if he finds that the State absentee ballots cannot reach most of the Michigan men and women in the armed forces in time for them to vote at the November election.

"Our law should give plenty of time to transmit the State ballots to them and back for recording," he said. "I am sure the Michigan men and women in the armed forces would prefer to use the State ballot, but if for reasons of transportation or troop movements we cannot get this ballot to all of them, then I think it is better to let them vote the Federal supplementary ballot."

90 DAYS ALLOWED

The State ballot will contain the names of Federal, State and local candidates for public office. The Federal "blank" ballot will contain only spaces to write in the names of candidates for Federal offices.

Gov. Kelly in a telegram to President Roosevelt said the Michigan service voting law was delayed "until the last possible moment" to await action on the Federal bill. He said he had been informed that State ballots could be used if 65 to 70 days were allowed for transportation. The State law allows 90 days or more, depending on the time of State political conventions which will complete the State ticket.

He called attention to a Federal provision that a soldier may apply for the Federal ballot Oct. 1 if he takes oath that he applied for the State ballot prior to Sept. 1 but has not received it.

OFFERS NEW LAW

"Michigan has made every effort to provide a State ballot but if, in the opinion of those chargeable under Federal law with transporting, distributing, collecting and returning ballots for members of the armed forces, 70 days is not adequate, I will recall the Legislature
