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GENERAL PLAN OF ECONOMIC ORGANIZATION IN NORTHWEST ITALY

Summary

1. Description of Area Covered.

For the purposes of this plan Northwest Italy is defined as the four regions of Piemonte, Liguria, Lombardia, and Veneto. This area has a total population of roughly 11,730,000. It includes in its area the three of the largest cities in Italy: Genoa, Milan and Venice. The population of almost a million living in Genoa, more than one million in Milan, and almost one million in Venice. The population of a million and a half living in the industrial center of Italy, whose population exceeds the entire western world.

2. Plan of Outline.

 4. It is clear that Yugoslavia for national aspirations cannot be left out of account. I am, however, assuming that I have your support in the view that it is not the policy of the Allied Governments to do anything which might encourage a de facto Yugoslav annexation.
 5. It is further clear that any Allied Military Government which is set up will have a very much better chance of success if it avoids machinery likely to excite local feelings. The suggestion of either Italian or Yugoslav officials might have such a result. The central and declared aim of the Allied administration should be to impart their feeling to Italian and Slav alike.
 6. Three different possibilities must be envisaged:
 - a. "Allied Military Forces" - that is to say, forces under the command of the country after a rapid advance, before any entry of organized Yugoslav formations has taken place, and before there has been any crystallization of partisan control. Local administration based on the Italian system continues to function to a greater or lesser degree.
 - b. "Allied Military Forces" enter the country after a period of advance during which local Yugoslav partisans have assumed localized control.
 - c. "Allied Military Forces" enter the country in advance of any other "Allied Military Forces".

The essential considerations both in Case "A" and Case "B" is that no doubt should be left in the minds of the inhabitants, or of parties outside the territory, that the only governing authority is the Allied Military Government. As a visible indication of this fact only Serbian and British flags will be permitted to be flown from public buildings.

10. In the case of "C", a more difficult situation would arise inasmuch as the commander of any regularly constituted Yugo Slav invading army operating under the incumbent orders of his government, would automatically become the Military Governor of any territory occupied by his troops. In this case we should expect to find a Yugo Slav administration set up, with legal functions under international law, under Yugo Slav officers. It would be extremely difficult, if not wholly impossible, for an officer on the spot to displace such an administration or locally to attempt to impose Allied Military Government on such an administration. Such a difficulty might be overcome if agreement could be secured in advance with the Yugo Slav Government that any Yugo Slav army crossing the 1939 frontier into Italy should be regarded as an expeditionary force joining the Allied troops under command of General Alexander. This would ensure the legal position of the installation of an administration under the authority of General Alexander. Such a difficulty might be overcome if agreement could be secured in advance with the Yugoslav Government that any Yugoslav army crossing the 1939 frontier into Italy should be regarded as an expeditionary force joining the allied troops under command of General Alexander. This normally would cover the legal position of the installation of an administration as under the authority of General Alexander. It is, however, clear that some agreement must be made with the Yugoslav authorities which will include a clause to the effect that civil administration will be carried out by Yugoslav military government officers, in order to avoid difficulties, disturbances, and possibly unfortunate incidents in the area, and I would not think that at the appropriate moment this be done. It is also clear that a token force of Serbian or British troops or both, should be moved into the area at the earliest possible opportunity. An understanding should also be obtained from the Yugoslav authorities that in the event of a Yugoslav force occupying any part of the territory no attempt would be made to alter laws in force as on 8 September 1945. In all three cases the regional Commissioner and his staff will have full discretion to consult local opinion in the conduct of civil affairs.

11. It is evident that the limitation of Allied Military Government, whether under conditions "A", "B" or "C", will require a considerably higher concentration of officers and men than has been available lately. Moreover, a fundamental prerequisite for the execution of this plan under "A", "B" or "C", is the provision of an adequate force of Allied Military Police to be placed at the disposal of the provincial administrators. The minimum number deemed necessary for this are shown in annexure "A". In any event it is proposed to concentrate available resources on three main centers:

- (a) The port of TARIK.
- (b) The port of ALA and the coal and bauxite mines of northern EGYPT.
- (c) The port of ALGER.

It is felt that a fair, firm and consistent Allied administration in these three important centers will have a shattering effect on the remainder of the area, much of which is sparsely populated and will be, under winter conditions, difficult of access.

12. It is further requested that, should circumstances permit, full opportunity be taken of Allied naval power to make rapid and demonstrative landings in the three ports of TARIK, ALA and ALGER.

13. The small province of ALA was not mentioned in the Chief of Staff's memorandum referred to in para 5. I should be glad of your instructions as to the policy to be adopted in respect of this part and of the islands off the Delian coast.

14. I have considered the desirability of setting up a separate regional organization for VIOLETTA GILIA. It is clear that the problem of all six frontier provinces, the four of VIOLETTA GILIA and the two of VIOLETTA GILIA, must not only on each other but upon the neighboring provinces of UGIE and BILIBI and upon the whole of E.E. I.V.I. SUBJECT: Organization for Northwest Italy

TO : Chief of Staff

1. This memorandum refers to the recent discussions of the organization to be adopted in Northwest Italy, and includes the views and opinions of the entire Economic Section.

2. The organization for Northwest Italy was discussed at some length at the Economic Section meeting on 29 December 1944, and the talk generally favored the proposition that the Compartimenti of LIGURIA, PIEMONTE and LOMBARDIA should be treated as one AC region rather than three separate regions. Because of the importance of this matter, we asked for written comments from the Sub-Commissions.

3. It is the unanimous opinion of the Economic Sub-Commissions that some strong AC authority be established in MILAN. Two of the Sub-commissions talk in terms of an Advance HQ, while the remaining Directors describe it as a region or a Super-region. In form, however, all of the suggestions amount to having a strong regional HQ in MILAN staffed by top-flight people. Some of the comments of the Sub-Commissions may be of interest in this connection;

a. Transportation Sub-Commission is already organizing one complete transportation team to handle all transportation in LOMBARDIA, PIEMONTE and LIGURIA regions in the initial period following liberation. The Director of this Sub-Commission even says that if it is decided to have three regions in that area he would seek permission to operate from a single HQ independent of the regional boundaries, especially during the initial stages.

b. The Industry Sub-Commission believes that many minor decisions on industrial problems could be made at MILAN without reference to HQ; and that it will be important in the field of industrial coordination, to have an HQ which can give reasonably high-level decisions on questions of requisitioning and operation of productive facilities.

c. The Food Sub-Commission believes that uniformity of policy can best be assured by having the Director or Deputy Director of the Food Sub-Commission stationed in the North, in a position to make decisions on all of the major questions.

d. The Finance Sub-Commission strongly believes that consolidation of the three regions into one would make for greater flexibility and more efficient use of the officer strength available. Procedure with regard to banks and financial institutions, relief to United Nations

nationals, budget procedure, etc. has now been standardized to such an extent that the work of the Regional Finance Officer has been considerably reduced; so also the centralization of the Finance Accounting and the transfer to various Italian organizations of Supply Accounting has very considerably simplified the work of the Regional Accountant and the Regional Supply Accountant. The volume of work at Regional HQ should therefore be considerably reduced and one well-staffed Regional HQ should be capable of handling the problems of the 20 provinces in the area.

g. The Public Works and Utilities Sub-Commission is already planning to have its Deputy Director operate from MILAN.

h. In such a Regional HQ covering the whole of the Northwest area, it is suggested the Economic Section would undertake to appoint a high-ranking officer to coordinate the work of the Economic Section Sub-Commissions in the area, and to act as general economic advisor to the Regional Commissioner. It is recommended that if a Regional HQ is set up for the northwest area it be organized in the same way as HQ AD is organized -- that is, divided into four sections with the Sub-Commission representatives operating under the sections.

i. Below the Regional level (assuming the "Regional level" to be at MILAN for the whole area) it is thought there should be some differences in the organizational set-up to perform the various economic functions of AC. Roughly speaking, the work of the Commerce, Food, and Public Works and Utilities Sub-Commissions could be carried out with a zonal organization; and some of the other Sub-Commissions, such as Agriculture and Industry would probably want to have a few local or moving representatives. In the case of transportation (in the initial stages) and Finance, it is probable that their functions would require a high degree of centralization for the area as a whole. It is therefore suggested that there be established zones within the northwest region, but that no attempt be made to staff these zones with a full complement of officers representing all specialties. The Regional Commissioner, in consultation with the various Sub-Commission representatives would have to determine the specific functions for which he would be required to interpose a zone HQ between the Region at MILAN and the Provincial Commissioner in the 20 Provinces.
