Excerpt from session given by Eden

I explained that the three Powers had not agreed on most of the major questions connected with Italy. There was, however, some misunderstanding about what was proposed; there had been a good deal of inaccurate press comment. All that was proposed was a consultation des faits. If Italy declared war we should take note of that fact. If she fought alongside us she would be a co-belligerent. This would not, however, entitle Italy to any special advantages. She would continue to be bound by the antichrist which still remained the basis of our relations with Italy. The terms of the armistice might later on be modified if we wished to do so, but there was no bargain with Italy on this subject.

The internal Italian situation was difficult, since there was a shortage of anti-Fascists capable of taking part in the Administration. It would not be a good plan to use Signor Grunzi. Count Sforza was about to arrive from America, but it was not clear how much weight he would carry in Italy. Although we had urged Marshal Badoglio to broaden the basis of his Government it was not easy for him to find the people to do so. When Rome had been captured, the position might perhaps be easier.

I then took occasion to explain how the inclusion of the words "Emperor of Abyssinia and King of Albania" among the King of Italy's titles in a recent proclamation had come about.

The Greek Ambassador said that there was some anxiety lest, once Italy was co-belligerent, she would gradually be able to win favours to the disadvantage of countries like Greece and Yugoslavia who had fought against her. I said that there was no question, as had been alleged in some quarters, of giving back Albania, the Dodecanese or colonies to Italy.

M. van Kesteren said that opinion in Holland was somewhat anxious about the composition of Marshal Badoglio's Government. If Italy became a co-belligerent, it would be a good thing to remove some of these suspicious characters. General Roatta was referred to, and it was clear that his removal would be generally welcomed.

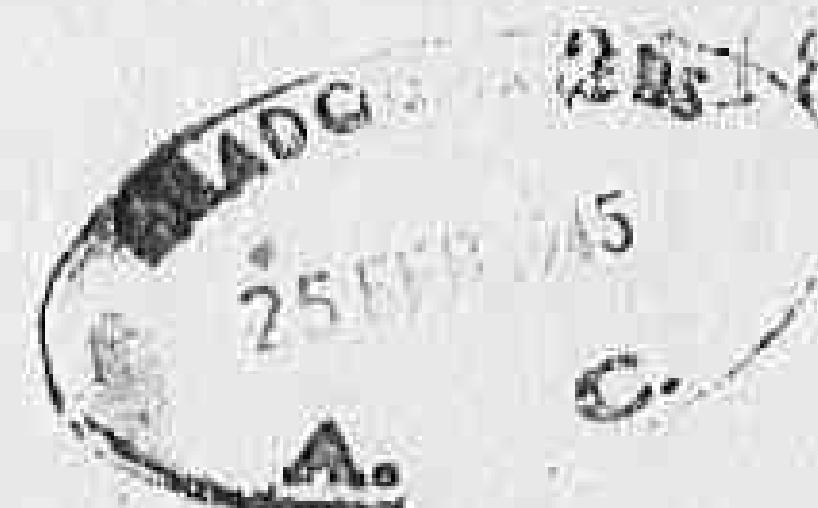

1. Reference your letter 505-EE of 20 October 1944 to Regional Commissioner, Sicily, copy of which we have in our files.

2. We are enclosing herewith a reply to such letter which we have received from Regional Property Control Officer, Sicily Region.

3. In answer to an enquiry from the said RPOC as to his responsibility for the care and custody of properties of German nationals, we have informed him that the Italian Government is responsible for the care and custody of such properties. We have further instructed him to inform the Intendenza di Finanze of the existence of the subject German property and to relieve himself of any responsibility in respect thereto.

4. It is requested that future enquiries of this nature be forwarded to the Property Control Division for attention and not sent directly to Regional Commissioners or RPOCs. A compliance with this request will result in more efficient operation of Property Control activities.

1. The apartment at Via Caltanissetta n.2, Palermo, where Dr. Ellwanger formerly lived, is owned by Countess Laura Perrier Pintacuda who lives on the first floor, same address.

2. The furniture and personal effects, as per included inventories, belong to Dr. Ellwanger.

3. All furniture is presently located in the apartment formerly rented by Dr. Ellwanger (ground floor right) while all personal effects have been stored by Countess Pintacuda in her apartment. The furniture seems to be all in good condition.

4. One of the closets, designated as closed in the furniture inventory, was found to be open and a list was taken of its contents. A bureau, found closed, was opened by a locksmith in the presence of both a representative from this Office and of the Countess (her daughter). An inventory was made of its contents. Materials contained in both closet and bureau was turned over to Countess Pintacuda for safekeeping. Inventories of such herewith attached.

5. Dr. Ellwanger's former apartment is presently being rented to U.S. Naval Officers who are paying 2000 lire per month including the use of the Doctor's furniture.

6. Rental of 300 lire per month was paid for empty rooms only before the invasion. Countess suggests that rent of 2000 lire per month be divided as to: 500 lire for use of the furniture and the remainder to herself. The daughter thought the Countess might agree to 750 p.m. U.S. Naval Officers have occupied the apartment most of the time from 1 Sept. 43 to 31 Oct. 44, but are understood to be vacating at an early date.

7. At onetime the Countess received an offer of 1500 lire per month exclusive of furniture, from Società Imera, and to be used as offices. They did not come to terms however and

They did not come to terms however and it is doubtful whether such a high rental could be obtained to day as there are only 2 rooms and a kitchen.

FROM : Political Section

1. With reference to your inter-office memorandum No. AC/14022/1/PS dated 30 January 1945 requesting comments with regard to the proposed entry of Mr. Engiestrand and Mr. Delin, Swedish Nationals, into Italy, Political Section has to state that there has not been a general policy dictated regarding the visit of neutral commercial representatives to Italy. In the main, however, such visits have been considered as promoters, and some weeks ago, in the case of the Erickson Telephone Company, it was found expedient not to authorize a visit to Italy by its representatives. Only recently AUSA refused to permit the visit to Italy from the United States of a British pharmaceutical expert originally connected with the Roberts Chemical Company of Italy, whose presence here was requested by the Economic Section.

2. Political Section feels that unless some compelling reason of assistance to the war effort is involved, the visit of commercial persons should not be allowed for the present.

3. There is attached hereto (for return to Political Section) a memorandum in the premises which has been received from the Swedish Legation.

Mr. Caccia,

H.M. Consul-General at Tunis has been approached by a leading Italian socialist resident in Tunisia, by the name of Doctor Alfonso Errera who desires to obtain an entry permit for Italy. Errera, who claims to be a friend of Pietro Nenni and of Minister Saragat, was born in 1892 at Pantelleria and entered Tunisia in 1904. He returned to Italy in 1908 but went back to Bizerta again in 1920. He was a lieutenant in the Italian army in the 1914-18 war and would have been a lieutenant-colonel had he not been tried for political activities and demoted in 1929 by the Italian Fascist Government. He was sentenced to 10 years' hard labour in absentia. According to the French records, he is a notorious anti-Fascist. At the same time, he has been a most prominent opponent of the repressive French policy towards the Tunisian Italians and seems to have been alternately flattered and threatened with expulsion by the French authorities.

2. Errera's departure from North Africa has been approved by Headquarters North African District at Algiers and referred to the military authorities in Italy. It is not anticipated that there will be any objection from the French side.

3. Perhaps you would like to mention this case to the Ministry of Foreign Affairs.

1. There has been received from the Italian Ministry of Foreign Affairs Memorandum No. 6/990/414 dated 8 November 1944, of which a copy is attached, requesting travel visa for Ing. Giulio Foglia, a Director of the Fiat Company to proceed to Portugal in the interests of his Company. It will be noted from the memorandum that the Sovereign Order of Malta has entrusted Ing. Foglia with a mission to obtain feedstuffs in Portugal for distribution in Italy.

2. This matter was referred to the Economic Section of Allied Commission and the following comment was elicited from the Director of the Food Sub-Commission:

"The question of Minor Foglia's proposed visit to Portugal has been investigated. It appears that the Sovereign Order of Malta is in treaty with the Portuguese authorities with the view to the purchase of some ships, and they wish Minor Foglia to conduct these negotiations.

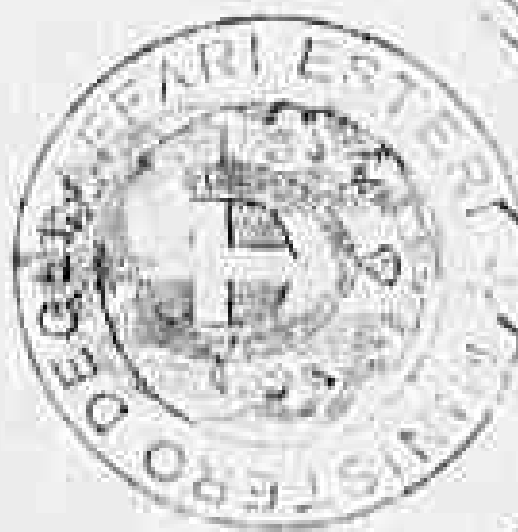

1. The FIAT interests in question would be/wolframite and a cassiterite (tin) mine in Portugal, purchased during the war by the present and very competent Fiat director there (Ing. Chiaffredo Toesca) on instructions from Fiat Turin.

2. It is known that Toesca has direct contact with the anti-Fascist heads of the Fiat in Turin and it is unlikely that Ing. Foglia could settle anything in Portugal that Toesca could not do together with the Allied authorities there. Rather, it would seem to introduce an unnecessary third party into an already delicate matter.

3. Ing. Foglia is director of the Fiat firm known as S.A.C.E.M. (Soc. An. Commercio Estero Minerario) and is said to have anti-Fascist sentiments. This notwithstanding, for the reasons given above, this Sub-Commission cannot recommend the journey.

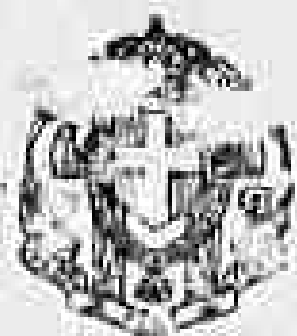

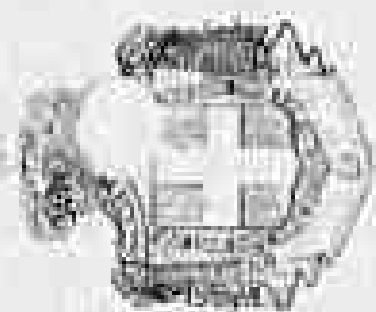

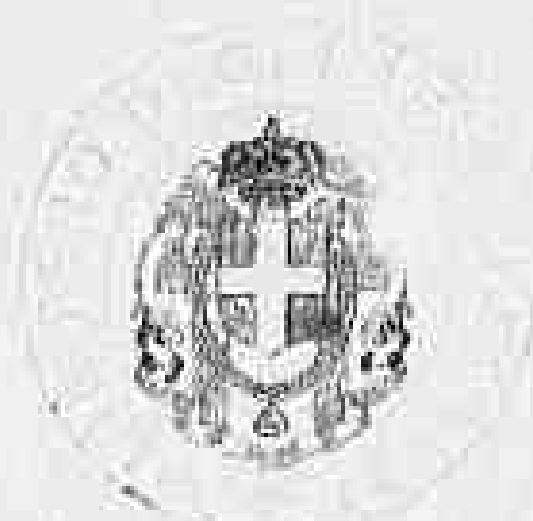

MEMORANDUM FOR THE FINANCIAL SUBCOMMISSION

On August 28th, 1943, the Bank of Italy sent Baron Edmondo RAATZ VON FRENTZ, German citizen living in Rome since 1931 (Piaz-za Digiore 2), high official of the Pontifical Court as "Cameriere segreto del Papa e Spesa" a letter containing a notice of pay-ment (number 75721/11) of Lire 8832,80, issued to his name, as equivalent of 800 Reichmarks accredited to Baron von Frentz by the Reichpresssekanner of Berlin.

Baron von Frentz, who since November 1943 has been living permanently in the Vatican City, received the letter only last July; he produced the notice to the Bank of Italy but was told that the payment could not be effected owing to a temporary freez-ing of all payments coming from abroad.

In view of the precarious financial situation of Baron von Frentz, it would be much appreciated if the competent Allied Authorities could cause that his request be, if possible, com-plied with. *YWH*

Mr. Andreas Clausiusz, who is personally well-known to me, now arrested by the Allied Authorities, always expressed himself against the nazi though collaborating with a company named "S.A.P.T.A." under German direction, and assured me several times, that the director of the company, too, was antinazi.

He was always ready to help and succeeded in many cases in liberating persons who were arrested by the German authorities, among these numerous Jews. On these occasions he always expressed his great satisfaction that he had been able to help persecuted persons by making use of his position that he always declared to be harassing and highly unpleasant.

To that purpose I think it would be useful to specify, a.o., that by the intervention of Mr. Clausiusz the following persons have been released: Mr. Massimo Gaston, accused of collaboration with the Italian partisans and threatened with capital punishment; Messrs. Akos Tolnay and Ladislao Kiss who were kept under arrest in Via Tasso; 17 Hungarian Jews who were personally arrested by the ill-famed Lt. Gott. Koch. -I can personally testify that on these occasions Mr. Clausiusz on account of his undaunted and resolute conduct ran the risk of being immediately shot.

Furthermore I can personally testify that Mr. Clausiusz with a praiseworthy sentiment of philanthropy and without minding financial sacrifices maintained both with money and food whole families and numerous persons who, being searched by the nazi-fascist police, lived in hiding.

This paper was Fascist in outlook and the editor left Egypt at the outbreak of war with the Italian diplomats. Since then Madame GALASSI's father has died in Egypt and she is most anxious to get back to her mother. She is perfectly open about her husband but, rather naturally, says he is not really Fascist and merely edited the paper in order to earn his living.

2. It occurred to me that if she is a proper person, and if her mother, Madame FOUCAULT, Address: Manantelli House, 16, Sharia Wilcox, Cairo, is also an acceptable person, it might be possible to get her away in charge of a party of displaced persons if no other procedure can be found.

Subject: General RIGGIOTTI GARIBALDI

On February 4, General Garibaldi went to Santa Maria C.V. and got in touch with a paper-merchant named Luigi VERDE age 48, son of the late Antonio VERDE, and placed upon him the task of recruiting volunteers to be used eventually in the struggle against the Germans. Subsequent to that the General wrote to VERDE giving him instructions concerning the recruiting.

It appears that his intention is to raise an Army of 80,000 to 100,000 men which upon his order would render aid to the Allies in fighting the Germans.

As for VERDE, there is nothing to be said against him at the present time. He has undergone a number of court trials, is a violent anti-Fascist, socialist reformist and is a correspondent of the "Risorgimento". Towards the end of January he wrote to Garibaldi at 155 Via Borghese, Naples, care of M. Martino, and placed himself at his disposal.

Garibaldi also had something to do with one GIACOMO CAMPOCCIA of Calitragione, age 53, son of the late Ignazio CAMPOCCIA and residing at present in S. Maria C.V. In a letter addressed to VERDE, Garibaldi urges him to avoid any friction with CAMPOCCIA, advising him to cultivate his friendship if this would be helpful.

CAMPOCCIA is a bad character and judging from his past behavior he is nothing but a common law-breaker.

He is a former Army officer who was relieved of his commission. He was inscribed in the Fascist party from 1920 until 1928, when he was expelled because of his merose nature.

After the arrival of the Anglo-Americans he organized a group of Garibaldi volunteers which was dissolved by the F.S.S. Following this he got directly in touch with General Garibaldi, coming to Naples on various occasions, the last visit occurring last week.

For the time being we are not able to pass judgment as to the real aims of General Garibaldi. However, it appears that he has political ambitions and he bitterly criticized Count SFORZA, asserting that the Count does not have the historical background which would qualify him for the presidency of the Italian Republic.

The appearance of CAMPOCCIA in the Garibaldi propaganda picture justifies any suspicion which one may entertain.

Ricciotti Garibaldi, residing for some time in this city at 55 Via Mazzini is working together with General Vittore MARCHI, who has also moved to this city at 19 Piazzetta Olivella.

Garibaldi has voiced his plan to form an Army of Garibaldi volunteers but has affirmed that this will take place after certain agreements with his excellency Marshal Badoglio and with General Alexander who will have to furnish the equipment for the troops. Until the present time the work of Garibaldi has been limited to collecting the names of the adherents.

The functions of the organization will be two fold; the first is political - propaganda for the republican ideal according to the traditions of Mazzini. The older men and those not fit to join the Armed Forces are concerned with this function. The second is military - the forming of an Army of volunteers as we have already mentioned.

It is called "Giovane Italia" (Young Italy). General MARCHI has furnished some of his followers with propaganda circulars which are to be distributed, and a pamphlet is also being published in order to spread the new ideal.

General MARCHI is also working with Prof. BARTOLUCCI of the local University who/it appears has also joined this new movement.

My dear Mayner:

Thank you for your letter of 3rd March, which I only received on 9th March, with the news about Major Gavronsky.

The first thing that strikes me is that it is somewhat extraordinary that an officer should be sent to Switzerland to make a report on the political conditions in Northern Italy without consultation or the knowledge of the Chief Commissioner, and secondly, that he should produce a report on 11th February which is sent to the Allied Commission, not as a matter of course, but incidentally, attached to a DO letter from you.

As you know, it is vital that the Allied Commission should receive prompt information about all matters affecting the political situation in Northern Italy. If officers of P.M. are being sent to that area or to neighbouring countries, I would ask that the Commission be consulted with regard to any special information which we may wish to acquire and be given information on general and particular subjects as soon as it is available to P.M.

Your letter of the 23rd of February about Major Gavronsky:

The position is this. He is a member of the PWB Combat team which is headquartered at Nice with an outpost at Grenoble. This team is known as PWB "B" Force, the code name being PHILIP, and is under the command of Lt. Colonel MacFarlane who was our staff officer at AAI.

The "B" Force combat team is operating on the same principle as our combat teams with the 5th and 8th Armies with the difference that dissemination of leaflets by air and artillery is very much less, and the gathering of intelligence and the infiltration of material is very much more.

Gavronsky was sent on a mission for the purpose of gathering intelligence material and he returned with a report which I think it will interest you to read and of which I attach a copy. I would be glad to know if you have any comments to make on this report. The question of his going back again for the same purpose is under consideration, but no decision has been made, though I think you will agree from looking at the report that there are opportunities for useful work by an officer with a full knowledge of political background and directives.

Gavronsky is a newcomer to PWB and I do not suppose that he has seen the directive you refer to. I will see to it that he does. MacFarlane of course has it.

I can set your mind at rest that he will not go back to the Committees "and tell them things".

My dear Rayner:

Mr. Savronski lunched with me today and told me that he had been travelling on the outskirts of Northern Italy making contact with CLRAI's, presumably from a distance, and that he was returning thither on the same mission, that is to say, putting across to the Italians in Northern Italy Allied policy and propaganda, etc.

He spoke as if he had not seen the directive which was issued for the use of PWB officers and ELO's working with the Northern groups and as if he did not know any of the policy with regard to our future treatment of partisans. He ~~ask~~ also asked me if he could "go back and tell the Committees of National Liberation that the Allies would make use of them, etc. etc."

What is his position and what direction has he been given, and does that direction tally with the policy of the Commission and AHC? It struck me that he was groping a little bit in the dark with regard to policy, although extremely earnest to find out what that policy was and to transmit it to the people in the North.
