*My dear Sirs,*

Not much to report from here except that having no less than four Ambassadors in the place at one moment is quite clearly and unmistakably an embarras de richesses. Up to date all embarras and no richesses!.

2. Had half an hour of Bogo today who wants three ships with which to run some unstated business between Italy and the Persian Gulf. C-in-C, Med's reactions will probably require setting to music.

3. Sforza is very upset that I have not allowed him to send his agent, Almagio, into Rome with "S" force. I am glad I have put a complete ban on politicians scrambling for Rome as I have also had to deny permission to Longobardi, Cianca, Tarchiana and Tedeschi. What fun they would have had.

4. Sforza assures me that he was sending Almagio to see Bauer and the Action Party to tell them to keep quiet and not produce demonstrations against Badoglio and the Prince. I am asking Sforza to give me a letter on these admirable lines for Bauer and I will send it to you by first opportunity. If you don't get it before contacting Bauer yourselves please give him Sforza's love and the message.

5. I enclose with this a self-explanatory message which I was going to send you as a message but which I can now get to you with this letter.

6. I hope that you are both in good health and that the jeep is holding together.

7. I am seeing Badoglio tomorrow afternoon and the King has been told exactly what he is expected to do when he gets the word.

Harold Bayard MacDonnell, acting Lloyds agent at Palermo, was on outbreak of war with Italy arrested on charge of alleged espionage acts committed before the war and sentenced to 30 years imprisonment by special Tribunal for Defence of the State. Against this wholly iniquitous sentence there was no right of appeal.

MacDonnell who was for some time in the political prison at Civita Vecchia was in February last reported to be in prison at San Gimignano in Province of Siena. Owing to hardships of imprisonment his health, never robust, has seriously deteriorated and he is believed to be tuberculous. Red Cross have done what they could to help him with special invalid foodstuffs etc.
