SUBJECT : Captain Stanko MILIC

TO : Displaced Persons and Repatriation S/C
(Attn: Major Simcock)

1. Further to letter, even number, dated 17 January, 1945, copy to you, in which it was reported that instructions had been issued to the R.P.S.O's, Southern and Lazio Umbria Regions, that steps were to be taken to ensure that subject, a member of the Yugo Slav Army, did not travel from the mainland to Sardinia without the approval of this Headquarters.

2. It is now reported that Milic arrived at Cagliari (Sardinia) accompanied by another Yugoslav officer - Galich Alois - towards the end of December; he stated that they came from Brindisi and belonged to the Royal Yugoslav Mission of that city, a claim substantiated by their papers, and that object of his journey was that of tracing his brother, Stanko Milic, a soldier in the 40th Regiment of artillery at Sassari.

3. The two officers were invited, on arrival, to present themselves to the Command of the "Calabria" Division, but ignoring this request they made direct inquiries with the soldiers of the 40th Regiment. They did not fail, on all possible occasions, to carry out anti-Italian propaganda amongst the Italians of Slav origin.

4. The Italian Military Command of Sardinia informed of the Yugoslav officer's activities Col. Simons, of the M.M.I.A., and the latter had them return to Cagliari in order to control their papers and remark on their failure to present themselves to the Mission.

5. Probably perceiving that he was kept under close observation and having unsuccessfully tried to cross into Corsica, Captain Milic left Sardinia.

SUBJECT: Captain Stanek Milich

With reference to Minister Gruar's letter to Mr. Schacht of 15/24/12 of January 30 concerning Captain Stanek Milich and to Mr. Belford's verbal request for additional information on the subject, the Ministry for Foreign Affairs has to acquaint the Allied Commission with the further developments of the aforesaid officer's journey.

Captain Milich arrived at Cagliari (Sardinia) accompanied by another Yugoslav officer - Captain Alois - towards the end of December. He stated that they came from Trivisio and belonged to the Royal Yugoslav Mission of that city, a claim substantiated by their papers, and that object of his journey was that of tracing his brother, Stanek Milich, a soldier in the 40th Regiment of Artillery at Casseri.

The two officers were invited, on arrival, to present themselves to the Command of the "Esercito" Division, but ignoring this request they made direct inquiries with the soldiers of the 40th Regiment. They did not fail, on all possible occasions, to carry out anti-Italian propaganda amongst the Italians of Slav origin.

The Italian Military Command of Sardinia informed of the Yugoslav officer's activities Col. Simons, of the M.M.I.A., and the latter had them return to Cagliari in order to control their papers and remark on their failure to present themselves to the Mission.

Probably perceiving that he was kept under close observation and having unsuccessfully tried to cross into Corsica, Captain Milich left Sardinia.

The Italian Military Command in Sardinia have stated that the collaboration of the Allied authorities in this question has been very useful and particularly appreciated.

Captain Milic arrived at Galliera (Sardinia) accompanied by another escape officer - Milic Alek - towards the end of December. He stated that they came from Divulsi and belonged to the Royal Yugoslav Mission of that city, a claim substantiated by their papers, and that object of his journey was that of bringing his brother, Stanek Milic, a soldier in the 40th Regiment of artillery at Sassari.

The two officers were invited, on arrival, to present themselves to the Command of the "Sardinia" Division, but, ignoring this request they made direct inquiries with the soldiers of the 40th Regiment. They did not fail, on all possible occasions, to carry out anti-Italian propaganda amongst the Italians of Sardinia.

The Italian Military Command of Sardinia informed of the Yugoslav officer's activities Col. Blomke, of the M.I.A., and the latter had them return to Galliera in order to control their papers and remark on their failure to present themselves to the Mission.

Probably perceiving that he was kept under close observation and having unsuccessfully tried to cross into Corsica, Captain Milic left Sardinia.

The Italian Military Command in Sardinia has stated that the collaboration of the Allied authorities in this question has been very useful and particularly appreciated.

Rome, 8 January 1945

My dear Schott,

The Ministry for Foreign Affairs have known from a very reliable source that Captain STANISLAV MILIC, of the Yugoslav army, has arrived or is about to arrive from Bari at Rome where he intends to obtain a permit to reach Sardinia.

A great number of soldiers originating in Venezia Giulia serve in the ranks of our army and navy in Sardinia, and it is presumed that Captain Milic, who has a thorough knowledge of the Trieste dialect, plans to carry out amongst them an action of anti-Italian propaganda; such plan of Captain Milic appears to be connected with the well-known Yugoslav activities aiming at recruiting in the Yugoslav army Italian military men and civilians of Giulian origin, activities which have been repeatedly brought to the attention of the A.C., as inadmissible.

I deem it necessary therefore to inform you on the above suggesting that the opportunity be examined of preventing the voyage of Captain Milic to Sardinia.
