The interview given by Nenni to the London Press and published in AVANTI this morning contains the following passage:

"..... the Italian Government should be permitted to re-organize its internal administration. Nearly every prefect in charge of administration in the liberated provinces is still a career official of the Fascist regime. During the first Bonomi Government the Socialist Canevari, Under-Secretary for the Interior, put forward the names of 57 antifascists carefully selected to replace these career prefects. At the time of the Government's resignation, only three of these had been approved by the Allied Commission, without whose consent no such replacement is possible. This failure to give a democratic character to the administration was one of the main causes of the Government crisis."

I raised this matter at the Chief of Staffs meeting today since it will obviously bring up all the old "pro-Fascist" accusations against the A.C. I am inclined to think that A.C. should issue a statement if Nenni's facts are inaccurate. Do you agree?

The British Labor Party have responded to the Italian Socialist Party an invitation to attend a Labor conference in London on the 10th of December, at which France, Belgium and other European countries will be represented. The British Office endorsed this invitation but requested the British Embassy, in communicating it to the Italian Socialist Party, to state that no representatives could be accepted who were members of the Government. The Secretary General of the Italian Socialist Party, Sig. Antonio Benini, has accepted the invitation and has informed the British Embassy that he, himself, together with Sig. Arnaldo Marescalchi, the Joint Secretary of the General Confederation of Italian Labor, and Sig. Mario Aguri, a member of the Council of the Socialist Party, would be the Italian representatives.

2. Only completed applications for Military Travel Authorizations are attached, in duplicate, hereto.

3. If G-3 Section approves the journey of these persons, it is suggested that the Military Travel Authorizations and Travel Orders should be forwarded to Political Section as soon as possible. In view of the importance of the delegates arriving in time for the opening of the Conference, the British Resident Minister's Office at AGO have been asked to arrange for the reservation of seats on the direct aircraft leaving for England on the 6th of December.

The two great American organizations have chosen Italian-American and seamors: Corrado Imbriani, first Vice President of the I.L.O.W.U., the great American organization Ladies Garment Workers, and General Secretary of "Local 69"—that is, the New York Section of said organization which has 35,000 members, and comrade Salendzi, first Vice President of the National Textile Syndicate belonging to the C.I.O.

None of the four delegates of the American and English union organizations is a newcomer to the past and present battles of ~~the~~ Italian workers; Comrade Antonini has taken a prominent part since 1935, when he participated at the Brussels Congress against the Ethiopian War convened by the Italian Socialists and Communists; comrade Alderici has been a constant member of the Mussolini dictatorship.

Therefore we've had a great deal from their mission and from that which is under study by a delegation of the English Labor Party.

We must break the isolationism ~~which~~ ^{under} which we have lived for so long, we must present our problems on a European and world ~~planes~~ ^{level}, not as particular and exclusive problems of Italy, but as an aspect of greater and general problems of the Peace. That this should come about through the channel of ~~the~~ labor organizations pleases us and it has a symbolic value, inasmuch as the interests of the workers are those of the Italian society in its entirety.

But before the American and English delegations arrive in Italy, we should have clarified, among ourselves, the nature and the extent of our needs. We should have made the inventory ^{which} we have often so often in the "avant".

We hear a great deal about private enterprise and the miracles which we can expect from it. We do not wish to suffocate private initiative, but it is absolutely necessary to control it.

Turned over to private initiative, the reconstruction of the country would degenerate into chaos. A general plan of reconstruction is necessary, conceived by necessary to consider it. ~~It must be remembered that we are not only the particular interests of the country~~

in such a manner as to keep in mind not only the particular interests of ~~the~~ ^{the} producers, but the general interests of the nation. For the elaboration of this plan there must be cooperation of all ~~the~~ forces and ~~all~~ ^{all} sound interests of the

the industrialists, the agricul-

There must be very definite general ideas on foreign assistance from State to State, in the framework of the Peace organization, are indispensable to our country and to all the countries of Europe. Large scale investments of private foreign capital in private firms, would reduce us to a policy of exploitation and would create political and social disturbances.

To obviate such a situation, prompt and rigorous government measures are necessary in the set-up of the state monopoly of foreign trade and of exchange control. Therefore, let us begin with the principle of ~~the principle of~~ ^{knowing} what we want and how we want it. The Anglo-Americans are essentially a practical people; the English are empirical and the Americans possess the spirit of the pioneer. The only way to deal with them is to discuss definite plans and figures, not variable hypotheses in their concrete entity from one to one hundred or to one thousand.

World opinion and interested governments can be of great use to the union delegations which will soon be within our walls and through which the working classes will re-link the international relationships of collaboration and solidarity.

I shall be glad if you will let me know whether Monsieur Nicolau may be evacuated from Tirana. There should be no difficulty in bringing him to Italy by air together with his effects, provided that the Roumanian Legation and the Allied authorities agree.

"It seems that the British Embassy in Madrid, had kindly undertaken to reserve her a place on a ship sailing from Spain or Gibraltar for Italy.

"It would be much appreciated if the A.C. could see fit to interest the competent Allied Authorities to the effect of authorizing, if possible, said repatriation."
