The Ministry of Foreign Affairs will much appreciate an assurance in this sense from the Allied Control Commission.

The Italian subject Tullio RICCIO, Commander Tucci's brother in law is a civilian war prisoner in Kenya since summer 1941.

He was brought to this concentration camp from Addis Ababa, where he was manager of the Bank of Italy.

He is favourably known to the British Authorities, through his activities with the bank of Italy in Addis Ababa, also during the first period of British occupation; as well as for his behaviour in the concentration Camp, and also for his activities in London in 1932 and 1933 as Assistant Manager of the Bank of Italy.

Commander Tucci would be very grateful if the possibility could be examined of promptly releasing his brother-in-law and repatriating him to Southern Italy or to Spain.

re: SALVATION ARMY OFFICE AND PROPERTY IN ITALY.

May I be permitted to refer to previous correspondence dated 10 September 1943 regarding the above and to place the following matters before the Ministry's Secretary of State.

1. There is no authentic word of the release of our leader, Donatista Camilla Lombardi, from imprisonment on the island of Ventotene in Italy. A report of his release appeared in an American paper last December, but has not been confirmed. On 12.2.44, the position was reported to the Military Government Section of the Allied Force Headquarters, from whom we had been following your own communication, but we have no further information.

2. One only of our officers has been contacted - Major Franceses Riccio at 10, Via Colzaolunga, 10, who was taken by a Salvaion Army Italian Officer attached to the Canadian Army. Major Riccio had been freed from a Concentration Camp but the Salvation Army Property was still in the hands of the Italian Government. Our Canadian officer saw the G.O.C. who promised assistance in respect to the release of the Property.

We greatly desire to get into touch with Major Riccio as quickly as possible to ascertain her needs and send financial assistance if necessary. It is understood that we cannot telegraph, but may communicate direct by letter. This will doubtless take some time. May I,

therefore, respectfully ask if His Majesty's Government could lend us contact with an assistance to this country?

3. We are particularly anxious to know if we have any selection Army Officers now in East Africa, if so, whether they could undertake relief work in the area.

The attention to our previous communications has been kindly appreciated. General Darnley, also Commissioner of the International Secretariat for the African continent, will be grateful for any further help that His Majesty's Government may be able to render in this connection.

La moglie dello scrivente, Signora Maria De Petri, prima del matrimonio, era suadita inglese, nativa di Malta e figlia di un alto funzionario del Governatorato.

Fin dalla prima lettera ricevuta, lo scrivente rilevò che per la mancata corrispondenza di qualsiasi sussidio a cura del Governo Inglese la sua famiglia era vissuta e viveva in condizioni tristissime; ma non gli fu possibile - pur avendo esagitato tutti i mezzi normali ed eccezionali - effettuare l'invio di una qualunque somma che potesse alleviare le pietose condizioni di vita dei suoi familiari.

La domanda di sussidio avanzata a suo tempo dalla moglie al Governatorato Inglese di Malta non era stata presa in considerazione per le seguenti ragioni:

- 1°) perchè lei aveva perduto la cittadinanza Inglese per avere sposato un cittadino Italiano;
- 2°) perchè il sottoscritto non era né prigioniero né internato;
- 3°) perchè lo scrivente aveva volontariamente abbandonato l'isola nell'aprile 40

La infondatezza delle motivazioni del rifiuto sono evidenti giacchè, per quanto è noto, un sussidio competeva indipendentemente dalla cittadinanza della moglie dello scrivente.

Agli affetti della corrispondenza del sussidio non poteva poi interes-

dare la eventuale prigionia o internamento del sottoscritto, tanto più che lo scrivente, portatosi a Malta per alcuni giorni, da Bari, era ritornato in Italia al suo abituale domicilio, ancor prima che potesse prevedersi la entrata in guerra dell'Italia. - Tangasi per presente che la moglie dello scrivente - formata ed internata al Forte Corradino, ma subito dopo rilasciata - non venne affatto invitata dal Consolato Italiano a rientrare in Italia all'atto della dichiarazione di guerra, e ciò in considerazione del fatto che la sua residenza in Malta era divenuta definitiva dal giugno 1937, per precipua prescrizione medica.

Tutto ciò premesso, a poiché ragioni di umanità esigono con le disperate condizioni dei familiari del sottoscritto vengano immediatamente sollevate in maniera completa, anche perché per vivere finora hanno dovuto barattare gioielli ed oggetti di valore, lo scrivente rivolga viva preghiera all'E.V. perché s'interessi benevolmente per far risolvere la faccenda con la sollecita corrispondenza dei sussidi già autorizzati, rendendo anche possibile al sottoscritto l'invio diretto di denaro, conformemente a quanto già venne praticato dal giugno 1937 fino allo scoppio della guerra, allorché lo scrivente potette avvalersi dell'autorizzazione del Ministero degli Affari e Valute per inviare sensibilmente alla propria famiglia un assegno di 25 lire sterline.

L'urgenza del caso va anche desunta dal fatto che, dopo essersi privata di tutti i suoi mezzi di fortuna, la famiglia ha potuto in qualche modo sostenersi con l'unico aiuto della sorella della moglie, pur residente in Malta, aiuto, ripeto, unico, e malheureusement finita per la morte della soccorritrice avvenuta circa due mesi fa.

A dimostrare che la situazione sia proprio tragica non è il caso di soffermarsi in ulteriori particolari, e pertanto lo scrivente confida molto nell'opera e nella sollecitudine dell'E.V. nel soccorrere alla famiglia, muovendo gli opportuni passi presso le Autorità Inglesi per la corrispondenza diretta del sussidio, ed autorizzando lo scrivente ad effettuare rimesse di denaro.
