Your letter of the 28th April arrived just as Mr. Trower was leaving for a few days' fishing in Yorkshire, and he has asked me to thank you for your kind enquiries regarding my son, and to say that he will write to you later. Meanwhile I am asked to send you his very best wishes.

I note that you say that the best course would be for me to contact the Brigadier's A.P.O. number or official address, so that I am wondering if it is better to save time, you would be good enough to write a letter to the Brigadier on the lines Mr. Trower wrote to you. In case you may have missed that letter I give you an extract hereunder:-

"One of my secretaries a Mrs. Jessie Thomas, an English lady who has been living with us here for the last 21 years, and whom I have known for some years, married a Roumanian directly after the last war. She returned to England in the Spring of 1939 with her only daughter, age 23, who is working with the R.A.F. Her only other child, a son, then aged 17, she left in Roumania to finish his education. The boy took his final entry into University certificate at the age of 19, and then made plans to escape from Roumania in the hope of being able to reach England and join the R.A.F., having already studied flying in his spare time and taken first-class pilot's certificate at the age of 18. He succeeded in making his escape about two years ago and landed at Haifa, Palestine, where he is living with the British Chaplain, the Rev. Roger Allison, and he is now working with H.M. Office, as a draughtsman. The boy is very keen on doing something more useful, and his C. in C. has agreed to release him as soon as he can find a job more suitable to his capabilities. He speaks English, French and Roumanian fluently, and has a very good knowledge of Italian and German. I am wondering whether the boy could be used for any purpose in connection with the A.M.C. He is extremely anxious to serve the allied cause, and is entirely pro-British. His father is also entirely pro-British."

As an alternative, perhaps you would be kind enough to drop a line to my son - Jessie Thomas Tucker, c/o British Chaplain, St. Luke's, Haifa, Palestine, giving him the Brigadier's full A.P.O. address, and advising the boy to enter his services in that direction.

Both the British Chaplain, and Sir Patrick Coghlin of British Security Division, C.I.B., who know the boy personally, will, I feel sure, be ready to give any references which may be required regarding the boy's character. I shall be exceedingly grateful for any assistance you are able to give.
