He speaks English, French and Spanish fluently, has a very good knowledge of Italian and German. He is extremely anxious to return the allies cause, and is entirely pro-British. His father is also entirely pro-British.

I have had to reply that there is nothing going on regards Italy, but I am wondering whether there might be a possible place for him in one of the agencies on your own.
