The Political Section of the Allied Commission presents its compliments to the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and, with reference to their memorandum No. 6/100/44, of the 9th January, has the honour to inform them that the appropriate military authorities in the Middle East have stated that the Ethiopian Government have refused permission for Signor Failing Vasegian to re-enter Ethiopia. No reasons for this attitude have been given. It is proposed, however, to suggest to the Princess Hachia that on her return to Ethiopia she should approach the Ethiopian authorities and endeavour to arrange for this refusal to be withdrawn.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE POLITICAL SECTION A. C.

Signor Pailag Yazegian, an apolid of Armenian origin, who held important posts in Ethiopia before 1935, resides in Italy since 1937.

As he has already forwarded an application to the Allied Authorities with a view to obtaining permission to return in Ethiopia, the Ministry for Foreign Affairs, with reference to their Memorandum N. 6/467/412 of November 6th., beg to suggest to the Allied Commission that the possibility be considered of allowing signor Yazegian to join the party of Princess Nasibu, to whom he is personally known.

The Ministry for Foreign Affairs thank the Allied Commission for the steps they will see fit to take in the matter. *rap*
