SUBJECT: Italian Colonial Affairs.

TO : Mr. H. A. Caccia, Political Section.

One of the Italian Liaison officers has just called upon me with reference to an application by four (4) officers of the Italian Minister for the Colonies to go to Rome. Their names are Dimiquino, Cappe, Dardone and Citto and they have apparently been vouched for by the Italian Foreign Office.

The comparative urgency of the arrival of these gentlemen in Rome is none of my business. My most recent information however, is that Italian colonial affairs are being handled by the Italian Minister of Interior and that arrangements for repatriation and transactions concerning individuals are in the hands of the Displaced Persons Sub-Commission. It was therefore with some surprise that I was informed by Roberti that the Italian Ministry for Colonial Affairs is to be continued.

When you have time I shall be glad of instructions on the subject.
