MEMORANDUM FOR THE POLITICAL SECTION A.O.

The Italian Legation in Bern has informed that the Swiss Red Cross is willing to supply 500,000 units of insulin at the price of 5.500 Swiss francs.

The offer could be accepted by the Italian Public Health Department, but the sum to be paid should be discounted from the Italian frozen accounts.

The Ministry for Foreign Affairs would much appreciate if the Political Section could kindly approach the competent Allied Authorities with a view to obtaining that the amount in Swiss francs required for the above said purchase be released from the Italian frozen accounts. *EAB*

In reply to your personal letter N.946 of 2 March on the subject of medical supplies I am informed that some 130 quintals of medical supplies were delivered to Taranto on 18 February 1944 in addition to considerable quantities received in Bari, Naples, Cagliari,ardinia and Sicily. The Public Health Sub-Commission claimed that these have been supplied to occupied Italy on schedule and that no delay has been occasioned due to the dearth of shipping space. They point out however that the Justice Provinciale of each Province is responsible for the distribution in his province, and lack of surface transport has unquestionably hampered the distribution from Taranto.

For your own information I may add that no official complaint has been received as to unexplained lack of medical supplies in the provinces.

It is hoped that the new Under-Secretary of the Interior, His Excellency Capasso, will meet with success in his reorganisation of the Italian public health service.

SUBJECT:- Medical Supplies.

TO : - Captain Pearson, Political Section.

Reference letter from the Italian Ministry of Foreign Affairs addressed Harold Caccin Esq. (Attached herewith) the views of this Sub-Commission are as follows:-

The letter addressed to the Political Section has been written without full knowledge of the existing facts referable arrivals of medical supplies into occupied Italy.

Due to communication problems the writer may not be familiar with the fact that some one hundred and thirty quintals of medical supplies were delivered to Taranto on 12 February 1944. In addition supplies were also delivered to Bari and hundreds of quintals were received in Naples. Supplies have also been delivered to Cagliari, Sardinia and Sicily.

To date medical supplies have been shipped to occupied Italy on schedule and no delay has been occasioned due to the dearth of shipping space. The exigencies of the war may in future upset this orderly delivery, this however would be something beyond the control of this office.

It is desired to point out that the Medico Provinciale of each Province is responsible for the proper distribution of medical supplies in his province. Dearth of motor and other surface transport has unquestionably hampered the rapid distribution of medical supplies throughout the Provinces from Taranto.

Great exception is taken to this communication which might be misconstrued as a charge that medical supplies are not being distributed in certain areas.

It may be added that no official complaint as to lack of medical supplies has been made to this office.

It is also felt that any criticism of medical administration should be addressed through proper channels in order that they may receive immediate attention.

It is hoped that the Undersecretary of the Interior, His Excellency Capasso will have every success in his reorganisation of the Italian Public Health Service."

It is hoped that a reply on somewhat similar lines may be sent to the Ministry.
