With reference to memorandum dated 18th ult., the

order that it might be possible to inform in useful time the
Italian Commission to Bern and to plan for the listening of the
message in question.

Furthermore, owing to great disturbance in the trans-
mission over the Zone Rail, the Italian Minister at Bern
suggests that the message be repeated also by the S.M.D. and
American Stations in their respective environs. *Cette*

SUBJECT: Agreement between PWS and Italian Ministry of Communications

TO : Military Government Section, AFHQ, AFM 512

1. Supplementing my letter dated 22 April, file no. as above, there is forwarded herewith a copy of an agreement executed May 11th between PWS and the Italian Ministry of Communications, pursuant to which PWS agrees to restore to EIAR the control of its administrative and operational divisions, leaving the program division under control of PWS.

2. With reference to para 3, the following should be noted. Originally in the negotiations, PWS proposed that the expense of programs should be prorated between EIAR and PWS based on the relation between the hours devoted by EIAR stations to broadcasts for Italian listeners and the hours devoted to external broadcasts (Balkans, etc.). The Ministry of Communications, however, contended that EIAR should bear the full expense of all such programs as its contribution as a co-belligerent. Moreover, it proposed that EIAR should reimburse PWS for all program expenses retroactive to the date of the Armistice, on the grounds that EIAR in liberated Italy would have spent such sums in the furtherance of the Allied war effort had EIAR been allowed to retain control of its programs. The offer was accepted, as set forth in para 3.

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AGREEMENT BETWEEN P.W.B. AND THE ROYAL ITALIAN MINISTRY
OF COMMUNICATIONS ON THE ADMINISTRATION AND TECHNICAL
CONTROL OF E.I.A.R.

1. The Italian Authorities in consultation with the Allied Authorities will immediately form a General Directorate of EIAR which will re-organise the administration and take sole charge of all administrative matters, including technical management but excluding program management, which will remain with PWB until such time as AFHQ directs otherwise. With the approval of Allied authorities, a General Commissioner for EIAR will be appointed and vested with the powers of President and Chairman of the Board. It is agreed that all employees will meet integrity requirements and Allied security standards.

2. All sums collected in Liberated Italy as payment for Radio-Audition taxes will be deposited with the Finance Ministry. This Ministry, after deducting the percentage lawfully due the State, will credit the balance to the Concessionary Corporation, EIAR, which will use said balance to cover expenses outlined in the following paragraph.

3. EIAR, through its General Directorate, will be responsible out of current receipts for all the following expenses:-

(a) All expenses met by PWB in the operation of Italian broadcasting stations from September 3rd, 1943, to date. These expenses will be refunded by EIAR to PWB.

(b) Salaries of all EIAR technical and administrative personnel. It is understood that one of the requisites of Italian technical management of the EIAR stations will be conformance to PWB engineering standards and that failure to maintain these standards, (so far as possible conforming to FCC standards), would result in control of these stations reverting in the last resort to PWB. Technical directives to effectuate the foregoing will be furnished by PWB to EIAR.

(c) All salaries and all expenses incurred by PWB for programming and transportation for radio purposes; PWB making the contracts and disbursements and submitting at the end of each month a list of these payments for reimbursement.

(d) All expenses relative to the construction, improvement and maintenance of radio installations owned by EIAR or managed by EIAR for the Italian Government and all expenses on future EIAR installations or their appliances directed or ordered by PWB, (power, lines, antennae, equipment, real estate, rental, etc); American or British equipment imported by PWB to be excluded.

(e) All expenses relative to the technical and administrative operation of EIAR stations, and of the administrative offices, (rents, furnishing,

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ture, stationery, light, heating, typewriters and business machines, automobiles, fuel, etc.).

(f) In general, all expenses entailed by PWB broadcasting operations of any kind of all stations in Liberated Italy, except army broadcast transmitters used as mobile units.

4. All personnel engaged in the administration and functioning of XIAR will be taken over administratively by XIAR, and their position settled according to the Italian laws on private employment, (seniority, insurance, social security, settlement upon dismissal, etc).

5. At a later time, (namely, after having reorganized the administration), the General Commissioner of XIAR will take over technical operation under the direction of PWB of stations operated by PWB for broadcast purposes except army broadcast transmitters used as mobile units.

6. Disposal of the funds remaining to XIAR's account after the above expenses have been set will be determined by the Finance Sub-Commission, AGO.

REPORT ON BARI RADIO

20th January, 1944

One talk told the story of an Italian patriot in hiding from the Germans who was helped by a small boy. In another talk a letter from an Italian soldier on the 8th Army front was read. One commentary was given on the tradition of freedom and courage in Czechoslovakia. A short topical commentary on the days' news was given. During the workers' period of the last letter/~~letter~~/Pierre Semard, a member of the French Communist Party, before being shot by the Germans was read. A talk on Lenin was also given. The most important talk of the day was a political commentary by the representative of the Italian Communist party in the series of talks given by the leaders of the opposition. During the press review an article from Le Libre Voce, the weekly paper of the Party of Action, was given.

21st January, 1944

One talk spoke of the need not only to weed out Fascism from public places, but also to change the whole Italian way of thinking, which had inevitably been affected by 20 years of Fascist education. A short commentary was given in commemoration of the death of Lenin. The commentary in the series of talks by opposition leaders was given by the representative of the Cetolice party. Cetolice's political talk dealt with the force of public opinion for good or bad; partly responsible for having brought Fascism into power, it was now one of the strongest forces for good in Italy. "L'Italia Combatta" included a talk describing the mind-workings of an attentiste through 20 years about the crime of the 10th June 1940. Another talk recalled the vast amount of work and paper wasted by Fascism and ridiculed its prominent writers. The W.M. Youth period included a talk on Lenin. The press review consisted of articles from Banca Guardia, the Italian naval paper, and Liberale Voce, the weekly paper of the Party of Action.

22nd January, 1944

The main talk of the day was the political commentary by the Socialist Party representative entitled "Per l'Italia Comune". A short military comment was given on the Allied landing S. of Rome. Another talk described the Fascist propagandists' changed tactics - from having ignored the activities of the Italian patriots, now that the death of Fascists and Nazis were becoming so numerous they were forced to invent "patriots" in S. Italy. A talk on the abolition of racial laws recalled the fact that they were first ~~abolished~~ on the orders of Berlin. 

The main talk in the "Italia Combatte" programme was given by a Sicilian who described his impressions on his first visit to Sicily since the war. One talk by a soldier was addressed to the dead General Amico, who had given an example of resistance to the Germans. The daily comment on topical events was given. The youth programme gave an account of an interview with Zeniboni and of his trial by the Fascists; a talk described the anti-Fascist youth movements' work before the fall of Mussolini.

The weekly comment on the military situation was given. A talk was given by a member of the Central Committee of Liberation who had come down from Rome a few days before. A teacher spoke about the re-opening of the schools. The press review broadcast an article from the Italian naval paper "Buona Guardia." The day's political commentary was given by Michele Cifarelli, who speaking as the representative of the Party of Action, summed up the work of the Congress. During one period a translation of an article from the 8th Army News on the new Commonwealth ~~proxim~~ party in England was read. One talk explained the real meaning of the word "Republic" and contrasted it with the present Fascist Republic. The Workers' quarter of an hour gave details of a referendum asking people to send in answers to various questions about their work and reactions to the Bari workers' programme. "I'Italia Combatta" included a talk on the work of the patriots behind the lines by a woman who had seen some of this work personally during her journey down from north Italy, and a talk on the traditional friendship between England and Italy. During the press review an article from the Italian air force paper was read, describing the reactions of a group of pilots to the Armistice.
