1. As you will no doubt have seen there have been certain changes in the Yugoslav Government during the last few months. A new representative has been appointed for Yugoslavia to the Advisory Council for Ister. This representative is responsible for the policy regarding loans to individual Yugoslavs and, in the light of present developments in Yugoslavia, financial assistance is only likely to be given to those who are prepared to support Marshal Tito in his efforts to free Yugoslavia from the Germans.

2. Payments authorized by the Yugoslav Delegation for January are only about fifteen percent of those authorized for December. It is quite likely, therefore, that you will receive inquiries as to why certain people were not authorized to receive the January payment.

3. The Yugoslav Representative to A.C.I. has made it quite clear to this effect that he is the only person in Italy with the authority to commit his Government in respect of these payments. Moreover, he has verbally stated the following points regarding eligibility:

- (a) no advances will be made to able-bodied males of military age who refuse to join the National Liberation Army of Yugoslavia
- (b) no advances will be made to persons who have been offered the opportunity to return to Yugoslavia and have refused.
- 4. The state of affairs between the Yugoslav Government and Partisans is quite delicate at present. It is not impossible that many dissenting Yugoslavs will have to be treated eventually as stateless. The question of providing financial assistance for them is under consideration but no decision is expected for some weeks.

MEMORANDUM TO: The Royal Yugoslav Delegation to the Advisory Council
for Italy.

In reply to your memorandum No. 258 of the 26th June, the following reply has been received to enquiries made concerning the office material left in Bari by the Yugoslav Committee.

2. We are informed that the British military authorities when they closed the Committee referred to were only interested in some of the members of it and a certain amount of propaganda material which they found on the premises. The typewriters and other things referred to were not touched and it is thought likely that those members of the Committee who were not taken into custody by the British probably took the typewriters, etc., away with them. The British Captain who was responsible for closing down the Committee assures us that nothing was impounded except a certain amount of propaganda material.

3. It appears that this question has been raised by Yugoslav authorities on more than one occasion during the last seven months, who have been repeatedly told that the articles in question are not in the possession of the British military authorities.

With reference to the attached letter No. 258 of the 26th June from the Royal Yugoslav Delegation to the Advisory Council of Italy, I have been making enquiries into this here and find that the British military authorities when they closed the Committee referred to by Mr. Smiljanic were only interested in some of the members of it and a certain amount of propaganda material which they found on the premises. The typewriters and other things referred to by Mr. Smiljanic were not touched and it is thought likely that those members of the Committee who were not arrested by the British probably took the typewriters, etc., away with them.

I have spoken to Captain Kennard who was responsible for closing down the Committee and he has assured me that nothing was impounded except a certain amount of propaganda material. I can only suggest, therefore, that Mr. Smiljanic should be told to try and trace the various articles which he wants among his own compatriots.

Incidentally, Captain Kennard tells me that the question has been constantly raised by the Yugoslavs during the last seven months, who have been repeatedly told that the articles in question are not in the possession of the British military authorities.
