REI HURSHALMT FOR STUDENT OFFICERS ATTINDING SERVICE SCHOOLS ON TE POPARY DUTY

- 1. Service schools, for the purpose of reimbursement on per tiem basis to student officers attending same, till include any school operated under the supervision of the Arry or any of its components, either at a military installation or under contract at a civilian educational institution, plant, factory, or laboratory, which regularly conducts formal education courses for officer personnel. Service school does not include civilian educational institutions to thich officers may be detailed to take regular courses open to civilians and which are not directly supervised by the Army. It foce not include operation installations to which officers may be sent for practical training, or installations to which officers may be sent for practical training, or installations to which officers may be sent for practical training, or installations to which officers may be sent for practical training, or installation of interial arms by or destined for the filitary or Neval establishment, or for observation of infustrial procedures.

EXCESS GRADES RESULTING FROM RECLASSIFICATION TO LIMITED ASSIGNMENT

Hemorandum No. W 615-44, 17 May 1944, subject as above, is rescindenderk the following substituted therefor:

In absorbing excess grades in theaters of operation resulting from reclassification of combat noncommissioned officers to a limited assignment status because of wounds, illness, or injury, and in reassigning able-bodied men recovered from service units and retrained for combat duty, the following is directed:

- 1. The maximum possible number of combat-wounded limited assignment noncommissioned officers must be returned to their own units and absorbed therein.
- 2. A determined effort must be made to retrain the balance of limited assignment noncommissioned officers for service duties commensurate with their grades.
- 3. Limited assignment noncommissioned officers reassigned to their own units or to new units after retraining will be carried as excess in grade until absorbed.
- 4. Combat-fit noncommissioned officers recovered from service units and assigned to combat units after retraining will be carried as excess in grade until absorbed.
- 5. Excess in grade only is authorized for reassignment and assignment as referred to in paragraphs 3 and 4. Excess in Table of Organization or allotted strength is not authorized under this memorandum. (AG 221.01 (5 Jun 44)



IMPLEMENTATION OF OVERSEA ROTATION POLICY

- 1. Reference is made to Circular No. 58, War Department, 1944, subject, "Rotation or Return of Military Personnel as Individuals on Duty Outside the Continental United States."
- 2. Failure of theaters to comply fully with the provisions of the above reference, and misinterpretation of other provisions, have resulted in the unsatisfactory operation of the rotation policy. Shortage of personnel to fulfill the requirements of this policy, with attendant difficulty and delay in procurement, and failure to appreciate that personnel procured from the continental United States cannot be expected, without opportunity for indoctrination and familiarization, to possess the experience and proficiency of a man of comparable grade in the same military specialty who has been working in an assignment for an extended period, have adversely affected the policy and resulted in a great many complaints and criticisms. The success of this policy can be obtained only by thorough understanding of the problems involved and by accurate interpretation of instruction for its implementation. The importance of the effect of this policy on the morale of personnel overseas can not be overemphasized. It is essential that overseas commanders exercise every precaution in implementing the procedures involved to assure that unfavorable reactions to the policy are not permitted to arise.
- 3. The instructions issued in this memorandum are intended to supplement those contained in Circular No. 58, and to clarify instructions that have not been fully complied with to-date by all theaters.
- 4. Paragraph 2, Circular No. 58, will be interpreted to include procedures for shipment to, and assignment in, continental United States, of personnel from overseas and from duty elsewhere outside the continental United States, the provisions of letter AG 370.5 (6 Oct 43) OB-S-E-SPMOT-M, 11 October 1943, subject, "Procedure for Return of Individuals From Canada and for Their Disposition After Arrival." as amended by letters 7 January and 3 March 1944, same subject, being applicable.
- 5. Selection.—a. Persons rotated under the provisions of the rotation policy will be selected from those with the longest continuous service in the command or those with the longest continuous service overseas regardless of their present assignment, whether to vacancies in T/O units, overhead allotment, or attached unassigned in depots or pools. It is firmly believed that discrimination against individuals because of their present assignment will have a decidedly adverse effect on the morale of that group. Selection of eligible personnel in depots and pools will give added flexibility to the problem of matching skills.

- b. Until his rotational replacement is present in his unit, no person in the theater will be advised he is to be rotated at a specific time. Personnel will not be relieved from assignment prior to arrival of rotational personnel. The uncertainties of procurement, training, and shipment will not permit advance selection of individuals. Advising personnel in advance of arrival of replacements can result only in disappointment with serious effect on the morale of the command. Exceptions to the above policy will be made only with specific War Department approval which must be received prior to advising personnel that their rotation is contemplated.
- c. The maintenance of lists of personnel eligible for rotation, with appropriate priorities indicated, will be necessary. These lists will not be published. It must be understood that eligibility does not bestow the right to be releived from an oversea theater, but establishes a basis for selection and planning. Actual relief is dependent upon the availability and receipt of the rotational personnel as replacements and the priorities established by the theater commander.
- d. To provide the theater with a greater variety of qualifications from which rotational personnel can be selected to replace individuals eligible for return under the rotation policy, nuthority is granted to use any personnel received either as replacements or as rotational personnel so long as this exchange does not offect a reduction in the total number of loss replacements. All personnel received in these two categories, upon arrival in the theater, becomes available for replacement purposes. Using this memorandum as authority, the theater will rotate, within numbers provided for each of the three major forces, personnel by color, arm or service, and grade in numbers equal to those received as rotational personnel. While it is desired that, so far as practicable, MOS or SSN of personnel returned agree with those of rotational personnel received, it is not essential that this be done in every case if to do so delays the return of individuals or the prompt use of rotational personnel received. Rotational personnel received and not required because qualified replacements were exchanged for persons to be rotated will be absorbed within the theater as replacements and reflected in future requisitions.
- 6. Requisitions. In order to establish a uniform requisitioning system, all requisitions will be submitted as of the first day of each month and will consolidate, for each major force by arm or service, grade, color, and MOS or SSN, personnel requested for delivery during the month beginning 3 months from the date of requisition, e.g., for the requisition submitted as of 1 May delivery requested 1 through 31 August. Requisitions will not exceed monthly theater authorized percentages or quotas after allowance has been made for personnel to be returned to the United States on leave or furlough, who, for the purpose of determining the authorized number to be retated, are charged against these authorizations.
- 7. Reports. -- Not later than 30 days after the arrival of the rotational personnel, individuals to be rotated, selected in accordance with paragraph 5, will be reported to The Adjutant General (Attention: SPGAR) as ready for

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shipment, quoting the file reference (shipment number) under which rotational personnel for the shipment were received. Partial shipments may be reported as soon as data are available whenever it is desired to expedite the return of a portion of the personnel to be rotated. Personnel will be reported as prescribed in paragraph 7, Circular No. 58.

8. Commanders of theaters, bases, departments, and defense commands outside the continental United States will comply with all instructions contained in Circular No. 58 as modified herein.

 That issued to an individual, the return of which is authorized by competent authority, and such Government issue property as the individual has purchased from the Government out of personal funds.
- (b) .11 other items the shipment of which is prohibited.
- (c) Captured military trophies, except those items specifically authorized by the theater commander for which a certificate in duplicate signed by the individual's unit commander is inclosed. (See Hemorandum No. 570-3-43, 22 July 1943, subject, inclosed. (See Hemorandum No. 570-3-43, 22 July 1943, subject, PRotention of Captured Material Trophies by Military Personnel.")
- (d) Decuments, papers, and photographs unless passed by a military censor, and undoveloped exposed film. (See TC 15, ID, 1943.)
- (3) In order that Government issue property as outlined in n(2) (a) 2 above may be readily identified by inspecting officers and customs officials, a certificate will be prepared and placed in the container by the interested officer or an affidavit in the care enlisted personnel essentially as follows:

"I certify that the fellowing items of Government issue are my personal property or were issued to me, and are authorized for this shipment by competent authority."

(4) All property, including Government issue, with-drawn by inspecting officers at any time, will be inventoried and a certificate listing each item with a brief description thereof will be prepared, signed by the inspecting officer and placed in the baggage from which the property has been withdrawn.

(5) Clothing and textile items originating in areas where louseborne typhus fever exists will be properly disinfested in accordance with paragraph 24, SGO Circular Letter 33, 2 February 1943, subject, "Treatment and Central of Certain Tropical Diseases." (See AR 40-205, and 615-250.).

(6) The importation into the United States of insects, certain fruit and vegetables, and other plant natorials which may present a plant quarantine problem is prohibited by Henorandum No. V3h0-15-h3, 23 February 19h3, subject, "Cooperation with Plant Quarantine Program."

(7) After begange has been inspected as prescribed above, held or unaccompanied baggage will not be returned to the custody of the owner prior to loading about ship.

6a. (1) All baggage shipped by military personnel from overseas to the port commander for forwarding to a specific addresses in the United States will be opened and examined under the supervision of a commissioned officer to be designated by the port commander. An inventory of each percel will be prepared in duplicate indicating the name of the owner, his Army serial number and grade, and address of consignee. All Government issue property; except that listed in paragraph 5a(2) (a) I and 2 and such other items the shipment of which is prohibited, will be withdrawn, suitable notation being made on the inventory. The inventory officer will certify as to the correctness of the inventory.
