AWARD OF SILVER STAR

By direction of the President, under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-15, as amended, the Silver Star was awarded by the Theater Commander to the following named personnel:

ROBERT E. EHALT, 32173099, Master Sergeant, First Ranger Battalion, for gallantry in action near Cisterna De Littoria on 29 January 1944. When the First Ranger Battalion was ordered to infiltrate five miles through enemy lines and capture the town of Cisterna De Littoria, Master Sergeant Ehalt as Battalion Sergeant Major assisted in leading the Battalion to within about 600 yards of the town when they were detected by the enemy and a devastating fire fight with a vastly superior force developed. Master Sergeant Ehalt was located on the top of a slight rise and operating the only workable radio in contact with the force commander, and despite the fact that the enemy had closed within 150 yards of his position and were concentrating terrific machine gun, mortar and artillery fire in the area, he remained in his position for over three hours successfully directing friendly artillery into the area. When an enemy self-propelled 150 mm gun was destroyed and burning furiously it set fire to a fuel tank nearby causing terrific explosions which inflicted casualties upon the Ranger Force. Upon hearing the cry of a wounded soldier, Master Sergeant Ehalt with complete disregard for his own safety dashed 25 yards through intense fire and successfully carried his wounded comrade to a place of safety. His courage, efficiency and devotion to duty reflected great credit upon himself and the Armed Forces of the United States.

WILLIAM R. BOND, 01012717, Captain, Cavalry, Company A, First Ranger Battalion for gallantry in action near Cisterna De Littoria, Italy, on 29 January 1944. When the First Ranger Battalion was ordered to infiltrate through the enemy lines and capture the town of Cisterna De Littoria and after traveling five miles through enemy territory, had reached a point approximately 660 yards south of the town, the enemy became alerted and directed intense rifle and machine gun fire on the raiders. Captain Bond led his company into a position facing the entrenched enemy 200 yards away, then disregarding his own safety from enemy machine gun, mortar and artillery fire, he constantly exposed himself to enemy fire in order to visit his company positions and direct their fire, and during one enemy attack on his position, he procured a rifle and destroyed fifteen of the enemy. Then upon learning that all the officers of Company F had been killed and the Battalion Commander wounded, Captain Bond, continued to expose himself by visiting that portion of the line occupied by Company F in order to direct their fire and encourage their efforts. By his coolness and gallantry in continually exposing himself to withering enemy fire, Captain Bond was an inspiration to all who witnessed his actions.

EDWARD B. KITCHENS JR., 0384420, Captain, Army of the United States, First Ranger Battalion, for gallantry in action near Cisterna De Littoria, Italy, on 29 January 1944. When the First Ranger Battalion was ordered to infiltrate five miles

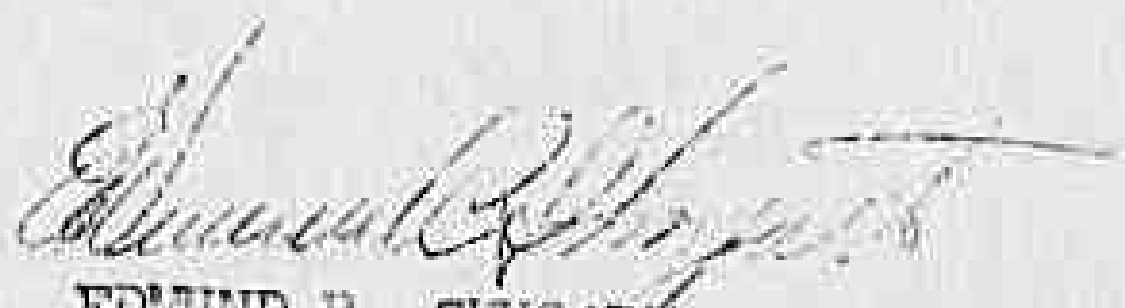

through enemy lines and capture the town of Cisterna De Littoria, Captain Kitchens, as assistant Battalion S-3, aided in leading the battalion to within about 600 yards of the town when they were detected by the enemy and a devastating fire fight with a vastly superior force developed. During the fighting an enemy 150 mm self-propelled gun was destroyed and burned furiously within 25 yards of Captain Kitchens position. The flaming tank set fire to a fuel truck and the resulting explosions caused many casualties to the Ranger Forces. A machine gunner and his assistant were wounded by enemy fire and the exploding gasoline and shells from the disabled tank were causing them additional injury, when Captain Kitchens, with complete disregard for his own safety and in the face of a withering enemy fire, dashed forward to recover the wounded men. A terrific explosion from the tank knocked him down, dazed, but exhibiting great personal courage, he again started forward and reached the wounded soldier carrying him to a place of comparative safety. His gallant action, efficiency and devotion to duty reflected great credit upon himself and the Armed Forces of the United States.

JOHN W. DORSON, 021052, Major, Cavalry, First Ranger Battalion, for gallantry in action near Cisterna De Littoria, Italy, on 29 January 1944. When the First Ranger Battalion was ordered to infiltrate through the enemy lines and capture the town of Cisterna De Littoria, Major Dobson, as Battalion Commander, led his men through an enemy defense area and when scouts reported several enemy occupied foxholes deployed directly in front of eight 150 mm self-propelled guns, with the assistance of two scouts, he undertook the mission of silently killing the enemy soldiers guarding the heavy weapons. While the Battalion paused, Major Dobson went forward, flanked the enemy position and came in from the rear and after a brief struggle killed the German sentry with his knife, returned to his men and ordered them forward. The enemy at this time discovered the presence of the Battalion in their midst and a most violent and devastating close quarters fire fight developed in which about 100 Germans were destroyed during the first fifteen minutes. When the enemy moved tanks into the area, Major Dobson with utter disregard for his safety and under intense fire, leaped to the top of one of the tanks and emptied his pistol into the turret following it with a grenade which destroyed the tank. The enemy by overwhelming superiority in numbers soon threw their entire forces into the fight and soon surrounded the Battalion, Major Dobson heedless to the carnage dashed from place to place encouraging and organizing the men until he was seriously wounded by enemy fire. Entered the United States Military Academy from Virginia.

AMENDMENT TO GENERAL ORDERS NUMBER 312, 1945

Section II, General Orders Number 312, this headquarters, 1945, is rescinded and the following substituted therefor:

"II - AWARD OF SOLDIER'S MEDAL

By direction of the President, under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45, as amended, the Soldier's Medal was awarded by the Theater Commander to the following named officer:

EDGAR FRANKLINE HUME, 04033, Brigadier General (then Colonel), General Staff Corps, Senior Civil Affairs Officer, Region III, Allied Military Government, Fifth Army, for heroism at Naples, Italy, on 7 October 1943. On 7 October 1943, the explosion of a time bomb placed by the Germans before their withdrawal six days previously, caused the destruction of a part of the main Post Office building at Naples, Italy. Upwards of a hundred people were killed or wounded, including many women and children. Brigadier General Hume, who was in his office across the street at the time of the explosion, immediately rushed to the scene of the disaster. He helped to organize first-aid for the victims, himself assisting in the work. When it was found that several people were trapped in the cellar or tunnel under the corner of the wrecked building, and attracted by the screams of two women therein, he descended a hastily made ladder into the still-smoking cavity and, with the help of an Italian civilian, managed to bring five wounded persons to the street level, by means of ropes and an improvised hammock. This act involved great personal risk and it was thought that other German bombs in the building might explode at any time, and that toxic gas might be in the pit. Nevertheless, the officer voluntarily risked his life to save those of others. After three men and two women, one of whom died shortly thereafter of injuries sustained, had been brought to the surface, Brigadier General Hume gave them medical care. While this was going on and before ambulances could arrive, a part of the damaged building collapsed, partly filling the crater into which Brigadier General Hume had just descended. His presence of mind, extreme personal courage, and professional skill, saved the lives of these unfortunate people, while risking his own. Entered service from Frankfort, Kentucky.

I -- AWARD OF SILVER STAR

By direction of the President, under the provisions of Army Regulations 600-45 as amended, the Silver Star was awarded by the Theater Commander to the following named officers:

CLIFFORD B. COOK, 02955883, First Lieutenant, Infantry, Company F, 474th Infantry Regiment, Second Company, Second Regiment, First Special Service Force, for gallantry in action near Borgo Sabotino, Italy, on 21 May 1944. When his company was making a reconnaissance in force and one platoon was pinned down by highly accurate artillery, mortar, and small arms fire, First Lieutenant Cook courageously led his platoon in a flanking movement into a position so that deadly fire could be brought to bear upon the enemy. Despite overwhelming fire power and superior enemy strength, the enemy was beaten off and the remainder of the company permitted to withdraw. The coolness and courage displayed by First Lieutenant Cook in the face of great danger, was an inspiration to his men and in keeping with the highest traditions of the Armed Forces. Entered service from Junction City, Kansas.

CLARENCE S. IRVINE, 016630, Colonel, General Staff Corps, for gallantry in action during the months of September and October 1943 while on temporary duty with the Twelfth Air Force, where he voluntarily participated in combat missions in the Mediterranean Theater of Operations. On 1 October 1943, Colonel Irvine, as pilot of a B-17 aircraft, participated in a bombing mission against the experimental factories of the Messerschmidt Plant at Augsburg, Germany. Taking off from his base in Tunis, Colonel Irvine faced extreme hazards during the entire course of the flight. Over Florence and the Brenner Pass his plane was subjected to intense and accurate anti-aircraft fire. In the flight over the Alps, severe icing conditions were encountered at 23,000 feet. Despite these impediments, and with exceptional courage and determination, Colonel Irvine pressed on to his target. In the target area enemy aircraft shot out an engine and intense anti-aircraft fire inflicted further damage to his plane and wounded the navigator. Nevertheless, with imperturbable courage in the face of intense enemy action, Colonel Irvine released his bombs on the war plant with devastating effect. Because of the extensive damage to his plane, Colonel Irvine had to make a forced landing at Sardinia, taken only the day before from the Germans. Previously, on 30 September 1943, Colonel Irvine displayed unusual valor and gallantry as a pilot of a B-25 on a reconnaissance mission from Taranto to Bari, Foggia and Salerno in Italy. Despite the fact that his aircraft was attacked by a force of strong enemy fighters, which he successfully evaded, and that his aircraft was subjected to heavy anti-aircraft fire between Salerno and Foggia, Colonel Irvine completed his mission and returned to his base.

WILLIAM L. TICKLE, 0930502, Second Lieutenant, Air Corps, 765th Bombardment Squadron, 431st Bombardment Group, for extraordinary achievement while participating in aerial flight as pilot of a B-24 type aircraft in Italy on 19 April 1945. Displaying superior leadership and courage, Second Lieutenant Tickle, although his airplane was severely damaged while en route to bomb highly strategic enemy installations, continued through to the objective and aided the ultimate destruction of the assigned target. After leaving the target area, he made possible the safe return of his damaged aircraft without injury to the crew, thereby completing a difficult and hazardous assignment with a high degree of success. By his professional skill and devotion to duty, as evidenced throughout twenty-eight missions against the enemy, Second Lieutenant Tickle upheld the highest traditions of the military service, thereby reflecting great credit upon himself and the Armed Forces of the United States. Entered service from Dyersburg, Tennessee.

III - AWARD OF BRONZE STAR MEDAL (POSTHUMOUS)
