With further reference to your AFSC/R/1Q/2/AIR dated 14th August 1944 and my letter of even reference dated 15th August, I have now interviewed General Piacentini and he tells me that he has personally been down to Lecco with the object of infusing a better spirit into the Bomber/Transport Squadrons. He tells me that he has given you 30 sorties on the last three nights which is fairly satisfactory. Moreover he himself went on one of the sorties in a Cant. 1007 last night which I think you will agree is a good show, and even a better one considering that he flew up here and arrived in Rome before 09.30 today to take part in a Cabinet meeting.

He has replaced the Squadron Commanders of the two Squadrons concerned with younger and more energetic people, and hopes that this will all bear fruit.

He does however wish me to stress the very ancient and dilapidated condition of the aircraft, and the fact that they are doing all the sorties with practically the same aircraft on every occasion that they go out, that is to say that they have no reserves whatever.

Please let me know at once if you have any further complaint.

With reference to your D.A.C./3.2234/4/SO of 14th August 1944, this has only just caught up with me.

I am very glad that you wrote to me about the slackness at Lecce as for a long time I have felt very much the same as O.C. 334 Wing seems to think, and have been continuously plugging at with the Italian Air Ministry. In my view the trouble lies with the Colonel Commanding the Station who has got his finger well and truly in. I have tried repeatedly to get him changed, and I think this should provide sufficient ammunition for me to do so.

You must, however, remember the extremely "nicky" condition of these aircraft. I don't know whether you have ever examined them at close quarters, but it is really rather a wonder that they fly at all. There is also the consideration that quite a large proportion of their rather small number of SU.82's has been diverted to the ferrying of Spitfires from Vis. (I do not know how much of this has been done, but one of the aircraft was laid up for some time for reworking up purposes,) and our commitment as regards ferrying equipment and "G" stores for the Baltimores in from Algiers.

However I do think that they are not putting their backs into the job, and I am sending a copy of this letter, together with a copy of D.P.Y. own to Eccles and Denby at R.A.F. to ask them to take it up at once as strongly as possible. Meantime if the Minister turns up in Rome towards the end of this week, as I think he is going to, I shall raise it again with him.

By the way you will remember that we only flew them on the Supply Dropping missions on moonlit nights. I am only too anxious to help B.A.F. in every way I possibly can, and you can be assured that I will push the thing as hard as I can from here. I am afraid that I am stuck in Rome for some time now as we are having our big A.U.C. Conference on Tuesday week, which always takes a few days, so that I shall probably miss two of your Friday meetings. Please apologise to the A.O.C. for me.

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You must, however, remember the extremely minority condition of these aircraft. I don't know whether you have ever examined them at close quarters, but it is really rather a wonder that they fly at all. There is also the consideration that quite a large proportion of their rather small number of SM.32's has been diverted to the ferrying of Spitfires from Vis, (I do not know how much of this has been done, but one of the aircraft was laid up for some time for rocking up nutcases,) and our commitment as regards carrying equipment and "C" stores for the Baltimores in from Algiers.

However I do think that they are not putting their backs into the job, and I am sending a copy of this letter, together with a copy of **Op 49** own to Zocches and Derry at Bari to ask them to take it up as strongly as possible. Meantime if the Minister turns up in Rome towards the end of this week, as I think he is going to, I shall raise it again with him.

Dear A.V.M

I have just received a very frank letter from O.S. No. 334 Wing criticizing the manner in which the Italian transport units at LECCE are carrying out their duties. It appears from this that they have no great liking for the job and that they are lacking in determination in carrying out supply dropping under bad weather conditions.

I have checked the tonnage they dropped in July which consisted of 140 tons nett out of an allotment of 150 tons. The other units of No. 334 Wing dropped nearly double their allotment. So far this month they have only succeeded in dropping 27 tons, and I am informed that they have cancelled four weather on several nights when the remaining aircraft of No. 334 Wing have carried out missions without difficulty.

I would be grateful for your views on this matter as we are getting pushed for meeting our commitments in Yugoslavia owing to requirements in Poland and Italy and due to the fact that No. 60 Transport Group have lost 50% of their navigators which has drastically reduced their effort.

If we can only urge the Italians to get going a bit harder it would help us out a lot, and I must say I find it a bit discouraging at a time like this to receive such outspoken decrying of the Italian effort.
