ITALIAN CUSTOMS CONTROL FACILITIES AT CIAMPINO

Numerous complaints have been received by this Secretariat and other Sections in A.P.L.S. that the Italians are not being afforded the necessary facilities to carry out Public Security checks and normal customs duties.

2. It is reported that civilian passengers have landed at Ciampino and been conveyed from the aircraft direct to Rome without passing through the Italian Customs.

3. It is therefore directed

- (a) That you co-operate with the Italian Authorities by allowing them either adequate office space or to build offices on both the British and American sides of the airfield.
- (b) That all civilian passengers landing at Rome be directed to the Italian Public Security Office before leaving the airfield.
- (c) That proper telegraphic communications between the Public Security Offices and the American and British sides of the airfield be put into operation.

1. I refer to your letter P.S. No. 2 No. 300/61852/3-25 of 10th November 1944.

2. This matter has been referred to Allied Forces Headquarters for action and their early decision is awaited and will be communicated to you upon received.

3. Meanwhile, the Air Forces Headquarters, although it is not their responsibility, have discussed the matter with both the British and American Officers Commanding at the Giugino aeroponti who have stated that they will do all they can to facilitate the work of the customs and immigration officials.

4. Therefore if the details can be arranged locally with these officers, no objection will be raised to Italian goods being stationed at the two main gates, and to Italian officials meeting each aircraft and clearing up civilian passengers.

5. Unfortunately the buildings available on both sides of Giugino are already occupied and it is regretted that at present no buildings can be made available for Italian officials. There is however enough space available on both sides for the erection of such temporary structures and it is therefore suggested that your Government should send a responsible official to discuss this matter with the two Commanding Officers to arrange for the allotment of such space and to put the necessary arrangements in hand to erect temporary or permanent accommodation.

6. The question of installation of such telephone lines required should also be agreed with these officers but the installation must be carried out through Italian channels.

Ref. M.13 I discussed Enclosures 26A and P with the Deputy Commander A.T.C. Ciampino, Lt. Col. NMDS.U., on Tuesday 3rd December, 1946.

In Enclosure 26b The Italian Public Safety Division make specific requests which can also in part be granted on the American side of the airfield.

- (1) The A.T.C. Authorities agree with the C.C. H.A.F. in the matter of space available for guard quarters. No building or part of a building is available at this time but there is ground space available for the erection of adequate quarters. T.W.A. plans to enlarge the terminal building in the near future and are including in their plans, offices for customs officials.
- (2) Lt. Col. Marshall stated there was no objection to enlarging the number of security police on the airfield. He suggested the Customs people place a guard on the main gate to check papers. An American guard is already located at this gate.
- (3) The A.T.C. Command is ready to give as much aid as possible to establish an efficient Customs Service at Ciampino.
- (4) The telephone situation is a responsibility of the Ministry of the Interior and not of the allied Authorities, Col. Marshall stated.
- (5) It is believed that if the civilian station commanders were briefed on the situation existing at Ciampino, it might aid the Customs people in carrying out a more efficient check of passengers.

Ref. M.13. I discussed Enclosures 26A and B with the Officer Commanding R.A.F. Ciampino on Saturday 30th November, 1946.

In Enclosure 26B the Italian Public Safety Division make specific requests which can in part be granted on the R.A.F. side of the airfield.

- (1) To their request for premises for 15 - 20 guards the R.A.F. are not able to allocate a building or part of a building but in their letter Ref. CPO/15 a/Org. dated 23rd November, 1946 (Enclosure 16A on AWG/39/6/Air) they confirm that there is ground space available for the erection of a building large enough for officers and for living quarters for all personnel.
- (2) The customs and immigration officers will be given every facility to check passengers leaving and entering aircraft and leaving and entering the airfield by the main gate.
- (3) The two customs posts are at present connected together through the R.A.F. and American telephone exchanges. If they require a private line it must be their own responsibility to have it installed.
- (4) The O.C. R.A.F. Ciampino is anxious to have these officials settled in permanent offices as they are now occupying space in the passengers lounge in the terminal building. He pointed out that all the buildings on the R.A.F. side were overcrowded and it was therefore impossible to give them rooms anywhere in the site.

a. To open an avenue through the Italian system based on

g. Then this proposal is as follows by Italian authorities, 1943
Commander should give them full responsible assistance including:
a. The release of merchandise to Italian ports in the area here

b. Allowing Italian authorities to establish supervision of entry into
and exit from port areas of Italian personnel and goods.
c. Notification to the Italian authorities of the arrival of U.S. goods
imported on Italian account in ships or other means of transport over land
and/or controlled by the Allied authorities.
7. The majority of the requirements of the Italian authorities should have
only local implications. Only those proposals which involve major policy must be
referred to this Headquarters.

In general, the maximum assistance and cooperation should be given to the local Thai authorities in the establishment of their Customs Services, so long as essential military requirements are not thereby prejudiced.





AIRFIELD

We inform you that on the 1st Sept. ult. an English civil aircraft, G A H J F, Capt. of crew PAUL MAC DONALD WUEBER coming from Nizza, landed on the airfield of Pescara in which he carried out a load of grapes for the firm GIORGI BROTHERS of Bologna and left in the same day at 10.45 hrs for Nizza, direct successively to London.

The above firm notified to Airfield Command of Pescara that some other transports of grapes will be carried out.

For the operations of the Custom Office the same firm GIORGI had before advised the relative organs of Finance, which provided to send to the place two agents. Control of the goods loaded on the aircraft by Vice Brigadiere commanding of the Detachment of Carabinieri of the Airport has been carried on, for part of the Airport Command.

The air crew was furnished of the regular passport and a note relative to the leaving from Rome, wherefrom the aircraft landed for Pescara has been noted on the book of ~~6007~~.

We notify the above matter for information of this Air Forces Sub Commission, asking to communicate to the writer whether there is any irregularities for this transports of the goods, to inform the Command of the Airport concerned.

1. At this meeting the following airlines were represented: -

2. Customs will apply to all, with the following exceptions: -

PERSONNEL.

1. All Allied Military,
2. U.S. War Dept. Civilians, Diplomatic Officials,
3. Diplomats on Diplomatic Passports,
4. British civilians other than revenue passengers.
(Non revenue personnel would be equivalent to
U.S. War Dept. civilians).

CARGO.

1. All mail to A.P.O's.,
2. Diplomatic Pouches,
3. Mail to any Military installation,
4. French equivalent A.P.O. (Postes Auxiliaire Armes).

3. It was requested by the Italians that this control be put into effect at all fields where there was Allied Control and that Diplomatics be exempted from customs fee but not baggage inspections. This was to be recommended to M.A.A.C. by Lt. Col. Crow.

4. Two customs offices will be set up at Ciampino, one for the British side of the field and one for the American side, with the main office on the American side.

5. The above regulations are not yet officially approved.

3. ^{2P} We wish to inform you that our letter reference AFSC/39/1/AIR dated 13 August, 1946, is not the official recommendation listed by the conference held on the above dated, but a copy of the minutes taken by a representative of this Sub-Commission.

3. The only information to be considered at this time is the official recommendation sent by Lt. Col. Crow to C.G. MTOUSA for approval.

4. Enclosed you will find a copy of the official ^{8A, B, C} recommendation sent to C.G. MTOUSA and a replying letter of acknowledgment sent by Col. Brown, Air Adviser G-4, Hq. MTOUSA.

5. In view of the above correspondence not being complete, and that personnel subject to custom inspection is still in a debatable stage, we do not consider it advisable to refer this matter to the American and British Embassies.

1. Inclosed herewith your letter, 7 August 1946, regarding Italian Customs Service meeting, and comments relative thereto from this office and from G-5, MTOUSA.

2. The G-5 Section has retained one copy of your letter. This request of the Italian government was approved in a letter dated 26 Jan., 1946, AG O91.311 C/O, subj: "Rehabilitation of Italian Customs Service". G-5 will also answer ES/1362/F, which is now in possession of AFHQ, and pertains to the same subject.

3. Any further information gathered on this subject will be immediately forwarded to you, or if important telephoned first. However, Inclosed correspondence is more or less conclusive on Italian rights and obligations of Allied authorities to permit whatever arrangements are necessary to rehabilitate customs and permit normal functions.

It is considered that this Headquarters is concerned only with allied personnel and property and it is not therefore considered proper that instructions should be issued which will cover persons who do not come under this heading (e.g. <u>any civilian.....in direct support of a Government</u>).</p> <p>2. It is considered reasonable that at the same time that the Italian Authorities are granted customs jurisdiction over non-Allied persons and property they should also be granted facilities to establish reasonable medical and internal security control of entrants.</p> <p>3. It is not considered that any bickering between the various Italian Ministries is a concern of the Allies. Customs are normally a Ministry of Finance matter and presumably on an Italian Air-field the Ministry of Air provides the facilities - e.g. inspection huts. However which Department is going to be responsible for a particular part of the general personnel and property import control is an <u>Italian</u> matter for them to arrange amongst themselves.</p>

1. The attached inclosure relative to Italian Customs Services, from the CO, Ciampino, Rome, is forwarded for your comments relative to permission for Ciampino Station Commander from this theater to allow Italians to proceed.

2. Information indicates some bickering between the Ministry of Finance and the Ministry of Air as to which should control the customs, and at the meeting, altho not related to the subject, the Ministry of Air brought up the question of being sanitary and airfield inspection personnel.

3. As in paragraph 7, attached letter it is deemed reasonable that a letter from this headquarters clarifying the situation, and instructing the CO Ciampino of his duties and responsibilities in this situation be dispatched,

4. If the general contents of this letter could be communicated to this office in time before the 12th of August, assurance could be given the CO Ciampino that this headquarters either concurs or does not concur in arrangements tentatively made.



TO : Commanding General
Mediterranean Theater of Operations
APO 512, U.S. Army.

1. A meeting was held this date at this Headquarters concerning the establishing of Italian Customs Services at Ciampino Airfield, with representatives of the Italian Ministry of Finance, Italian Ministry of Air, Air Forces Sub-Commission, European Air Transport Services, Air Transport Command, Trans-World Airways, Pan American Airways, British Overseas Airways Corporation, Dutch KEL, Air France and Swedish ABA Transport Corporation.

2. The purpose of this meeting was to inform all Military and Civilian Agencies concerned of the plan to, in the near future, begin subjecting certain personal luggage and cargo to inspection by Italian authorities upon departure and arrival on this airfield, in accordance with the instructions outlined in letter AG 091.511, Allied Force Headquarters, Subject: Rehabilitation of Italian Customs Service, dated 26 January 1946.

3. All parties present generally agreed to the practice. However, it was determined that certain exceptions to the inspection should be made; and it was recommended that these exceptions, as listed hereafter be generally applied throughout Italy at pertinent airfield. Except:
 (1) Allied Military personnel; (2) Diplomats and Personnel travelling on Diplomatic Passport; and (3) Any civilians travelling as other than revenue passengers, which generally is that category of personnel whose travel is in direct support of a government, all personnel who land or deplane at Ciampino Airdrome in the terminal under control of the U.S. Army Air Forces or under control of the Royal Air Forces will be required to allow their personal luggage to be inspected by the Italian authorities and will comply with customs regulations. Except further:
 (1) Cargo and mail addressed to an Army Post Office, in the case of U.S. or British mail and in the case of French mil, Post Aux Armes;
 (2) Diplomatic cargo and pouches; and (3) Cargo destined for a military installation, such as the Commanding General MTOUSA, RAF 149 Staging Post, etc., which may not bear an APO number; all cargo on or off-loaded at Ciampino will be subject to inspection by Italian Customs Service and customs regulations complied with.

4. During the meeting it was brought out that other airfield in Italy which are used as terminal points for flights originating outside of Italy are Capodichino at Naples and the airfield at Udine and Bari. It is suggested that any rules that are made be applicable to each installation.

5. As regards Ciampino, space has been made available in the Passenger Terminal for the main office and baggage room of the Italian customs service, and a branch agency will be set up and space allotted by the Royal Air Forces on the opposite side of the field. It was the opinion of the representatives of the Italian Ministry of Finance that personal luggage belonging to Diplomats and personnel travelling on Diplomatic passport should be subject to inspection, which reportedly was the practice during peace time; it is recommended that such personal luggage not be made to inspection.

6. The anticipated date on which this service will begin is 18 August 1946.

7. It is requested that action be taken on the recommendations contained in Paragraph 3 at that earliest possible date and any comment relative to the desires of your Headquarters concerning the service be made.
