permitting.

Wearing of mourning bands, firing of salutes and draping of National
and Regimental colors and standards will be dispensed with in view of war
conditions.

General order announcing the death and instructions for its promulgation
to troops will follow."

Subject: Flying of Italian Flags

To : Regional Commissioners,
 Regions I, II, III, IV, V, VI, VIII & IX.
 SCAO., AMG, 5 Army.
 SCAO., AMG, 8 Army.

1. The C-in-C has directed that only Allied flags should be flown together.

2. If an Italian headquarters is located in the same building as a British and/or American headquarters, there is no objection to the flying of the Italian flag to mark the location of the Italian headquarters. In this case the Italian flag must be flown by itself in a less important position and under no circumstances should the arrangement give the impression that British, American and Italian flags are now being flown together.

MEMORANDUM:

TO: HEADQUARTERS, A.C.M.P.
(For the ATTENTION of Commander-in-Chief)

1. I would be glad if you would give me a ruling on the subject of the flying of Allied and Italian flags.
2. With the return of territory to the Italian Government, local Italian prefectures and possibly other government buildings will wish to fly the Italian flag. In many cases the Regional Control Commissioner or other A.C.C. representatives will probably retain an office in the building and will hitherto have been flying the British and American flags.
3. Is there any objection to the British, American and Italian flags being flown together, or should they be flown separately? In one or two cases already, the three flags are being flown together.
4. I have had the theory advanced that only allied flags should be flown together and that so long as the Italians are only co-belligerents their flag should not be flown side by side with the allied flags.
5. The Italians would doubtless like the flags flown together, but there are obvious political reasons why it might be considered desirable not to permit this in the meantime.
