Your comment on the bread ration is likewise noted. In view of the facts that the Vice President of the Economic Section, the Director of the Food Sub-Commission and other experts from your staff as well as the Chief Civil Supply Officer from this Headquarters are now in WASHINGTON, we think it may be assumed that the questions you raise on the supply implications of these announcements are being canvassed with the proper authorities. Meanwhile public announcements and Italian expectations based thereon are not taken here to warrant any decrease in importance of effecting maximum realization of local resources this winter.

The Synod of the Reformed Presbyterian Church of North America respectfully request from you a word of direction to the commanders of our forces and administrators in Italy, and if necessary a word of request to the other Allied forces in behalf of the Waldensian people who live in the Alpine valleys west of Turin (near Pinerolo and Torre Pellice) who, we understand, are in distress. This small group of Primitive Christian people are so few that they may be overlooked to destruction.

Historically these people have survived since about A.D. 1000 and possessed the Scriptures in their own tongue much before the Reformation, and were no part of the Protestant Reformation.

We probably do not need to remind you, Sir, that the whole English speaking world would be distressed if our administration of any kind in Italy would result in the destruction of the Waldensian people through any oversight or failure to call their distress to your attention.

Neither do we need to call to your attention that these are the historic descendants of the very people concerning whom the great poet, Milton, wrote the historic sonnet, which begins:

"Avenge, O Lord, Thy slaughtered saints whose bones  
Lie scattered on the Alpine mountains cold.  
Even those who kept thy truth so pure of old  
When all our fathers worshipped stocks and stones."

1. The father, Posentini Romeo of Antonio, born at Battaglia (Padova) on the 4th of August 1875, official in the Constructions Office of the R.R. Mills;
2. The mother, Bisoffi Amelia of Alessandro, born in Verona on the 8th of September 1879, housewife;
3. The sister Anna, born in Verona on the 30th of January 1907, housewife, married to Tosbera Mario, living in Legnano (Verona) since 1929;
4. The brother Renato, born in Treviso on the 20th July 1915, married, living here, Via San Giovanni in Valle 18, serving at present in the Italian Army in Center of Italy.

The parents as well as the brothers are, by no exception, of perfect moral behaviour and they have never had anything to do with judicial authorities; they live very plainly and they are enjoying the esteem of everybody owing to their correctness and their train of life.

The father Cav. Romeo has always professed antifascist sentiments and, though being employed by the State, he was never a member of the Fascist Party."

1. In answer to your enquiry of 12 April 45, it is regretted that no record exists of Maggiore Pilote Scarpetta, Pier Giuseppe neither as a prisoner of war nor as an enemy combatant whose death has been reported or body found by British forces.

2. There were several combats at that time taking place over Malta and Northwest of Gozo which would render reasonably certain that the two pilots were shot down in the sea, but from the meagre and approximate information provided by General Infante it is difficult to state their fate conclusively.

My dear Gayle,

I appeal to your kind courtesy for a question that I.R.R. is very much concerned with, and that the allied organs only can perhaps solve, for we have already tried all the other channels of information (Red Cross, Vatican, etc.).

On August 13th, 1942, maggiore pilota PIER FRANCESCO SCARPIA, returning at about 11 hours from an action over Sicily together with two other planes, met a numerous formation of British pursuit planes, with which he engaged fight, in the neighbourhood of the island of Linosa.

Of the three Italian pilots, one only came back to the base, severely wounded, and because of the incidents of the fight, he could give no definite information about the fate of his companion.

Since then, nothing has been known about major pilota PIER FRANCESCO SCARPIA who is considered as missing.

To meet the wish of the poor mother who cannot get over the loss of her only son, I.R.R. wants to know whether it would be possible to obtain more information by looking up the report on the war operations of the Delta aviation on August the 13th, 1942, and to get information about possible life-saving operations.

Besides, the mother being tormented by the doubt that her son might have been saved but might have lost his memory, I want you to tell me, my dear Gayle, whether it would be possible to publish Major Scarpetta's photograph on those of your papers which are being distributed in areas where there are Italian prisoners.
